Report of the 14th Annual National K of C Softball Tournament.

The 14th annual national K of C Softball Tournament was hosted by Biloxi Council 1244 with games being played in Biloxi, Gulfport, Mississippi on Labor Day weekend 1993.

The participants started arriving 3 to 4 days before the tournament started, to enjoy the beaches, hospitality, golf courses and casinos. Registration of the Brother Knights on the 48 teams participating, representing 29 state jurisdictions, took place at the Biloxi Council home by the Board of Directors of the KC National Softball Association on the first floor, with a boiled shrimp plate being offered on the second floor of the council home. There was great fraternalism displayed from the start and lasting throughout the tournament. Six teams who had planned to attend had to pull out due to the midwest flood. And while we are on that subject, the floods came to Miss. with the tournament. All of the games were scheduled to be played in Gulfport at the Milner Stadium complex and the Gulfport council home softball field. It rained 2 days before the tournament and off and on during the tournament. afternoon the Board of Directors went to Milner Stadium and the 4 fields were completely under water so they scurried all over looking for fields to play on the next morning at 8:00AM.

They settled on Hiller Park and Cavalier Fields in Biloxi and the Gulfport Council field. So, all plans had to be changed. Saturday morning the games started at 9:00AM and the last game for Saturday's schedule was played at 2:00AM Sunday. Then, Sunday's games were back on schedule at 8:00AM and finally ended at 10:00PM. All of the teams participating had only Praise for the local Knights for their efforts to have a smooth running tournament.

Our State Deputy Tom Zettler did himself proud. Everyone who spoke to him or listened to his speach at the trophy presentation ceremonies agreed that he was a top notched State Deputy and that he told it like it was. Just an easy going Joe. He wore his title in his heart not on his shoulder. State Deputy Zettler was present for the entire weekend. The 1994 Tournament will be held in Richmond, Virginia. At a coaches meeting it was voted that the 1995 tournament will be held in Austin, Texas. There were over 600 rooms reserved by the teams and over 1200 Knights and their family members were present at the tournament.

35 and over category was won by Rayne, Louisiana.

The Directors held a 50/50 raffle and presented to the local Doll and Toy Fund (Christmas toys to needy children) a check for \$400.00. The Directors presented the annual Barry Kearns Award, given each year at the tournament to the team or council who displays the best sportsmanship and fraternalism, to Biloxi Council 1244 and Gulfport Council 1583. Site Director for the 1993 tournamet was Freddie F. Steinwinder III.

MSGR. John J. Burns Council 802 Meridian, MS

Council 802 continued to flourish in many respects during this ten year period. The Council has a First Degree team which was certified in 1984 and as a result we have been able to provide timely First Degrees to our members as well as to neighboring Councils. Our major sources of income were from weekly bingo games and the rental of our hall. Because of the level of income that the Council has sustained, except for short periods of time, we have been able to maintain a myriad of charitable works for church, school and community.

Highlights from these fraternal years are as follows:

1985 - Meridian hosted the State Convention and at this convention Brother Wiley Price was elected to serve as State Deputy of the Mississippi Jurisdiction. Brother Tom Zettler was appointed as State Program Director. The Monsignor John J. Burns Award for community service was presented to Brother Tom Minniece, the first recipient who was a member of our Council. The Fourth Degree Assembly received an award for Outstanding Community Service.

1986 - The Council instituted a perpetual display of the American flag at the Council home as a sign of our patriotism. Brother WILEY PRICE was reelected for a second term as State Deputy. Brother JOHN MALONEY was elected to serve as a delegate to the Supreme Convention representing our Jurisdiction. The TOM ZETTLER family was elected as the Council Family of the Year and subsequently as the State Family of the Year. In addition, this family was third in the Supreme International Family of the Year contest - a first for a Mississippi Family. The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was presented to Mayor Jimmy Kemp of Meridian. The Fourth Degree Assembly was named the Assembly of the Year. The Council received a Supreme Council Award of Merit for placing in the Top 10 International Church Activities.

1987 - The Council donated \$10,000 to St. Patrick Church to assist in the renovation of the Church. Brother TOM ZETTLER was elected State Warden. The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was awarded to Fredna Cross.

1988 - The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was presented to Billy Sollie of the Meridian Police Department for his service with the DARE Program. Brother TOM ZETTLER was reelected as State Warden. The Fourth Degree Assembly received an award for Outstanding Community Service.

1989 - Due to a severe lack of funds, the Council rescinded the budget for several months until such time as income could again be generated. The John Maloney Family was elected as the Council Family of the Year and subsequently as the State Family of the Year. Brother Tom Zettler was elected State Advocate and during the year as the result of a resignation of the State Secretary was appointed as State Treasurer. Brother Tom Zettler was elected to serve as a delegate to the Supreme Convention representing our Jurisdiction. Brother John Maloney was appointed to serve as District Deputy. Late in the year the bingo was reinstated and the programs were reinstituted. The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was presented to Rush Gordon for his work in the Scouting program.

1990 - Bingo was again suspended in the early part of the year. Brother Tom Zettler was reelected as State Treasurer. In addition, he was elected as the Council Knight of the Year and was subsequently elected as the State Knight of the Year. John Maloney was reappointed as District Deputy. The John J. Burns Award for community service was presented to Brother Tom Zettler, the second Brother Knight so honored. Late in the year, the Council again instituted the bingo games and fared well in this regard. The Council received the Insurance Promotion Award from Supreme for a net gain of 12 insurance members.

1991 - The Council hosted the State Free Throw contest at Meridian Community College gym. Brother Tom Zettler was elected State Secretary. Sadly, our Council Chaplain, Father John Egan died on Palm Sunday while serving as Pastor of St. Patrick. The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was presented to Hartley and Melia Peavey for their work with abused children.

1992 - The Council hosted a major degree exemplification. Brother Paul Carpenter was appointed to serve as District Deputy and Brother Tom Zettler was reelected State Secretary. The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was presented to Nell Grissom for her work for the underprivileged. Brother John Maloney was elected to serve as a delegate to the Supreme Convention representing our Jurisdiction. The Council softball team received the fourth place trophy at the State Tournament. The hall was used as a hurricane shelter for the homeless as a result of the hurricane that hit the coast. The Council received a Supreme Council Award of Merit for placing in the Top 10 International Council Activities.

1993 - The Council continued to prosper financially. Brother Tom Zettler was elected to serve as State Deputy of the Mississippi Jurisdiction. Brother John Maloney was elected Council Knight of

the Year and was subsequently elected State Knight of the year. The Brother David Duncan Family was elected as the Council Family of the Year and was subsequently elected as State Family of the Year. Brother paul Carpenter was appointed to serve as District Deputy and Brother John Maloney was appointed State Program Director. Wiley Price was elected to serve as a delegate to the Supreme Convention representing our Jurisdiction. The Council purchased a stained glass window in St. Patrick Church in memory of our deceased Brother Knights. The John J. Burns Award for Community Service was presented to Judy Siefker.

1994 - The Council submitted a resolution to the State Convention which condemned assisted suicide. This motion was adopted by the State Council and submitted to the Supreme Council. At the supreme Convention, it was made a part of the overall pro-life resolution. The Council hosted the State Softball Tournament. The Council 35 and older team won that championship. The Council received the Supreme "Contest of Champions" Trophy for having the highest net gain and highest percentage gain in the State.

John T. Savage Council 848 Jackson, MS

With the start of 1970 many of our Knights and their Ladies visited New Haven at Supreme Convention time. The enthusiasm they brought back has carried the council through the years. From the relief effort and fund raiser for the victims of Camile to the taking of the Mississippi School for the Deaf to the afternoon matinee at the circus. A Spaghetti dinner was held at the council home on Dec. 7 to raise funds for St. Jude Parish center, which burned. Visited the sick at the V.A. Hospital and provided the callers for bingo and prizes. Laid the groundwork for a formation and Knighthood degree team and Initiated 34 in March.

1971#72 Started the year off with our 4th of July celebration, helped with the Novena at the Carmelite Monastery. Held our first K. C. Football Bowl. Held a Memorial Service for deceased members and visited all parishes of the city and held a prayer service at each. Collected glass and aluminum cans for the Girs Scouts of St. Mary and re-striped St. Mary school gym.

1972-73 Was a very active year for the council. Starting with a benefit card party for Sanders School for Cerebral Palsey. Sold candy for the Kidney foundation. Laid out and surveyed and set the concrete markers for St. Joseph high school field and did the same for St. Marys School. Furnished hall with chaperones for C.Y.O. Dance. Held a father and son Dove Hunt. Sponsored M.I.S.A.C. 5th and 6th grade Basketball League. Finishing up with annual Easter Egg Hunt.

1973-74 Found our council working on a pilot program with the American Cancer Society. By providing the manpower assistance to prepare and assemble materials for their state wide drive. Entered jointly with the Fourth Degree in participating in first Friday Nocturnal Adoration and prayer at St. Dominics Chapel. Other activities included K.C. Bowl, New Years Eve Dance and Fish fry.

1974-75 Held a special bingo game day to raise funds for the relief of flood victims. Helped the State Highway Patrol with the sale of circus tickets. Worked with a non-Denominational Pro Life committee by furnishing the literature. Rang the bell for the Salvation Army and held a V.A. Christmas party. Held a blood drive and had a Vocations and Careers day with social for the C.Y.O. Had a monthly covered dish dinner for members and their families.

1975-76 A lot of our programs are on going, such as our Saturday night steak supper and bingo. The funds raised from this pays for such things as our Donation to the Priest Education Fund, C.Y.O. dances, Christmas party at the V.A. and Easter Egg Hunt. Along with our K.C. Bowl Food baskets to the needy and other act of charity. Besides our other ongoing activities, others include delivering 4,200 K.C. Book covers to the 5 Catholic elementary schools in Jackson. Sponsored a Boy Scout Troop for camp and distributed keep Christ in Christmas bumper stickers.

1976-77 The most notable activities of this year, was working with the committee from St. Richards parish to help establish a R.E.A.C.H. program here in Mississippi. Helped Holy Family Parish with a Rummage Sale.

1977-78 Held Dinner for area C.Y.O. and R.E.A.C.H. personnel to kick off our Tootsie roll program. The proceeds from our K.C. Bowl goes to our Scholarship Fund. This year we awarded three to religious education teachers in the Mississippi School Jurisdiction. Delivered 4,800 book covers to Jackson area schools and took first place in the State Bowling tournament.

1978-79 This years activities included The Last Fun in the Sun FLing, on Labor Day, to say good by to summer. The other was the First annual Basketball tournament, proceeds to go for equipment for youth game from in the basement of our council home.

1979-80 The first thing on our agenda was a Spaghetti Dinner Benefit for our members which were directly effected by the Easter flood. While other members donated their time in helping with clean up. We celebrated our Diamond Jubilee with a dinner and the burning of our council mortgage. Sent a financial aid to the hurricane Frederic relief fund. We held our first day of Recollection with conferences and Mass. Our thanks to Father Tony Pudenz. We also hosted the State Bowling Tournament.

1980-81 This years activities included a program of fellowship and dinner for the Religious community of Jackson. Members also served as Lay Ministers, Lecturers, Commentators, Ushers and gift bearers for the nine parishes of Jackson. The council provided funds and support to the Pro Life booth at the Mississippi State Fair. Assisted St. Jude Parish Chruch after a fire destroyed it.

1981-82 Started the year off with a Spaghetti Dinner for St. Jude Church rebuilding fund.

With the dawn of the 80s well on its way the council was faced with a time of change and growth. The ground work was laid, as small nucleus of members were chosen to help build new council. From St. Jude to Holy Savior to St. Therese. Our members were there helping to build. We were not daunted by this. As members worked with area 8 Special Olympics. From score keeping at bowling tournaments to the first annual Crawfish Dinner as a fund raiser. Do to changes in corporation Tax Laws. The council set out to rewrite our so as to comply. The council also had to re write council by laws and send copy to Supreme. We still held our Memorial Mass for deceased members, rang the bell for the Salvation Army, and held our K.C. Bowl and Basketball Tournament. Held fund raiser for food baskets, etc. With the decision to sell the council home. We asked and recievied permission to return home to St. Peters Catherdral. A homecoming after36 years. The hardest part was finding someone to buy the council property that would use it to the benefit of the community. We believe we have done this. We sold the property to the REcovery Lodge, to be used as Alcohol and Drug Rehabilitation program. Due to the ever increasing liability the K.C. Football bowl was replaced by our Basketball. We have a spaghetti dinner in March to raise funds for the Priest Education Fund. With the beginning of 1994 one can reflect and see the legacy that was made and left by others. After 90 years of service to the greater Jackson area, where one council stood there is now six.

1994 Started off with council members assisting the Fourth Degree in a Shrimp Dinner. Made a donation to the Georgia Flood Relief. Held a get to know your Knights Houseboat party in September. Held a Stead Dinner at lake Catherine. For all members, friends, and guest who had supported our council through the years. In November we held our Memorial Service for a deceased member with Mass.



Vicksburg Council 898 Vicksburg, MS

Introduction

This brief history of Council 898 covering the period from 1 July 1984 through 30 June 1994 was compiled from Council minute books, newsletters, program reports, and interviews. Highlights are presented in annual summaries. At the beginning of the period, the Council observed its 80th anniversary and its tenth year in the Council Home on Fisher Ferry Road. By mid-1994 and several Grand Knights later, the Council and home were ten years older. Interestingly, however, the membership had a younger average age because of growth and the vigorous recruitment that has taken place.

1984

During the first half of 1984, several important events took place. In February, the Council honored Brother Bud Tacke for his 50-year tenure as Scoutmaster of Council-sponsored Troop 7. The celebration included Mass, a reception, an award from the Vatican, and certificates from Senator Cochran and President Reagan. Other pre-July milestones included a First Degree exemplification by Council 898's team (eleven new members), support of a City League softball team, St. Patrick's Day celebration, Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner, and Run Thru History in March; sponsorship of a Dixie Youth baseball team and St. Aloysius after-prom party; and receipt of an Honor Council award at the State Convention; sponsorship of a breakfast for St. Aloysius graduates; and conduct of the Tootsie Roll Drive.

Council 898 began the 1984-1985 Fraternal Year with Brother Bernie Theobald as the newly elected Grand Knight. In July, the Council held its annual Independence Day picnic. The Council home was served as a meeting place for Vicksburg Right to Life (after fire damaged their previous site). St. Aloysius A Club benefitted from a \$100 contribution from the Council. During August, Council 898 hosted a Fourth Degree exemplification and bought a \$60 advertisement in the St. Aloysius football program. The annual Labor Day picnic in September was enjoyed by members and their families. September donations included a \$50 bond to the Vicksburg Fire Department essay contest and a retirement purse

¹ Brother Joe joined the Knights of Columbus in 1946 and over the past six decades has held a number of offices, including Grand Knight (1954-1955); his last office was trustee in the early 1990s. Brother Tony joined the order in 1980, becoming Fourth Degree in 1984; he has held several Council and Assembly offices including Faithful Navigator. Currently serving as Advocate, his other responsibilities include Program Director, District Warden, and member of the First and Fourth Degree teams. Brother Tom became a Knight in 1987 and Fourth Degree in 1989. His various Council and Assembly offices have included Faithful Navigator. He has been Council 898's Grand Knight since 1993 and also serves on the First and Fourth Degree teams. Tom received the State Top Proposer award at the 1994 State Convention.

to Father Sullivan. October activities included a Columbus Day celebration and a children's Halloween party. Troop 7 received a \$250 donation to purchase needed equipment. The annual November Mass to honor deceased brother knights was held in the Council home; during the past year the bereavement committee had honored these members with prayer services at the funeral homes. Approximately 140 persons participated in the annual Christmas party at the Council home. A December quarterly communion at St. Paul's Church was an excellent way to end the year on a spiritual note. The same month saw a Troop 7 Court of Honor in the Council Home. December donations included \$100 as a Christmas gift to Chaplain Father Brett and another \$100 for miscellaneous purchases for indigent nursing home patients. Altogether, \$6,960 was donated during 1984.

1985

During the first quarter of 1985, Council 898 donated \$100 to St. Michael's CYO and offered use of the Council home for meetings of that organization. Donations during the first quarter included \$500 to Saltillo, \$100 to the City reward fund, \$2,000 to purchase a car for Father Brett, \$150 to Dixie Youth Baseball, and \$500 to purchase chickens for barbecuing at Play-a-Day-in May-Away (Catholic School fundraiser). The March Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner raised \$2,000 for that cause. April events included a First Degree exemplification with seven new members, a Hospitality Room at the State Convention, and the use of the Council home for both prom and after-prom events. In May, the Council donated \$200 to the Boys' State program and \$100 to a CYO retreat, hosted a gathering of St. Aloysius alumni, Brothers of the Sacred Heart, and former coaches of the school, and repaired and sealed the parking lot. The Council donated a \$10,000 certificate of deposit (1988 maturity value of \$12,000) to St. Michael's Building Fund in June. Brother Theobald was again elected and began his second year of office in July. Donations in July included \$50 to the CYO and \$200 to the Father Dulaney car fund. In the same month, the \$4,700 proceeds from the Tootsie Roll Drive were sent to the State Council. The two donations in August were \$100 to St. Aloysius A Club and \$25 to the Mississippi Association for the Blind. The annual Labor Day Picnic was held on the Council Grounds in September followed by the Columbus Day Celebration in October. November saw the First, Second and Third Degree exemplifications at the Council home after Mass, with Council 898's First Degree team participating; there were a total of 66 new members as a result of the day's activities. Also in November were the approval of a new budget, celebration the annual Memorial Service for deceased members, and the purchase of a \$100 raffle ticket in support of the Catholic Schools' fundraising countdown. The highlight of December was the annual Christmas party in the Council home. During 1985, Council 898 made a total of \$7,830 in donations and (not including the St. Michael \$10,000 certificate of deposit).

1986

The year began with a January CYO dance in the Council Home. February events included planning for a pro-life billboard, a roast of long-time Financial Secretary, Brother

Bill Lauderdale, hosting a recognition banquet for Boy Scout Troop 7, and holding a quarterly communion at St. Michael's Church. In March, the Council donated \$150 to support Dixie Youth Baseball. Events that month included a St. Patrick's Day celebration with Father Hurley as speaker, and an Easter Egg Hunt for the children. Donations in April included \$2,000 to the Priest Education Fund (proceeds of the annual spaghetti dinner) and \$500 to purchase chickens for Play-a-Day-in-May-Away. In the same month, the Council hosted a Hospitality Room at the State Convention. The May Tootsie Roll Drive netted a \$3,705 contribution to the mentally retarded programs, and the St. Paul Church Sodality was the beneficiary of a \$100 donation by Council 898. In the same month, there was a First Degree exemplification by the Council's team. Brother Floyd Whittington assumed the duties of Grand Knight in July. Summer saw the opening of the pool and associated social activities. Approval of a new budget for the 1986-1987 fraternal year and the annual Independence Day picnic were July milestones. During August, the Council purchased a \$65 advertisement in the St. Aloysius football program. The Labor Day picnic resulted in a \$58 contribution to the CYO. The Columbus Day program was held in October. Donations in November included \$200 for Thanksgiving baskets for the needy and \$50 for Father Brett's Christmas gift. The annual November Memorial Service for deceased brothers included a Mass celebrated by Father Brett. Food baskets were again distributed to area needy in December. In that same month, the Council held its quarterly communion at St. Paul's Church. The Christmas party was the finale for a great year in which \$6,380 was donated to charitable causes.

1987

To start the New Year on a charitable note, the Council donated \$500 in January to the Saltillo mission. Council 898 also agreed to fund and fully participate in the Red Cross Meals on Wheels Program. In February 1987, it officially adopted the first Saturday of each month on which it continues to prepare and serve approximately 40 meals to the community sick and elderly. February donations included \$150 to Dixie Youth Baseball and \$100 to the St. Paul Church Sodality. Council members again assisted the community in the March Run Thru History by preparing and serving food to race participants. The major project during March was the Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner, which cleared \$3,050 (supplemented by a Fourth Degree contribution of \$350). In addition, a donation of \$500 was approved to purchase chickens for Play-a-Day-in-May-Away. During April, a gas pipeline company secured an easement through Council property only after diligent negotiations by a group of committed knights. May contributions included \$200 to the fledgling Cub Scout Pack and \$100 to Father Egan's 25th Anniversary purse. A drug abuse program in June that drew a large crowd from the three Vicksburg parishes and the scouts featured Warren County Sheriff Paul Barrett. The Tootsie Roll Drive that month netted \$3,900 for the mentally retarded. Council elections resulting in Brother Allen Derivaux being named Grand Knight. An interesting development in July included the establishment of a required quorum of 15 members to hold a weekly meeting each Tuesday. Also in July, Troop 7 was offered the large Council room as a permanent Monday meeting site. Council members and their families enjoyed the annual Independence Day picnic on 4 July.

A final July activity was Council approval to construct a Right to Life Billboard on highway frontage and worked closely with the American Cancer Society at its annual benefit. In August, another \$65 advertisement in the St. Aloysius football program was approved, and a First Degree exemplification was held. September functions were the Labor Day picnic and a special benefit to aid a brother knight in need. The Columbus Day celebration and children's Halloween party were two outstanding October events. First, Second, and Third Degree exemplifications at the Council Home in November resulted in 48 area candidates being initiated. Another traditional November event was the Memorial Service and Mass for deceased brothers. December 1987 marked the Council's first participation in the City Christmas parade plus the usual Christmas party. Total donations during 1987 were \$8,865.

1988

Troop 7 received special awards during January. Also in January, the Saltillo choir was hosted by the Council with three meals provided to these visiting Catholic youth. During February, a total of \$3,421 was raised and dispensed to cover the final bills of a deceased knight in need. Six new brothers received First Degree honors in March. Other events that month included the St. Patrick's Day celebration and the Marian Hour of Prayer. In April, the \$10,000 certificate of deposit purchased in 1985 matured (and now worth \$12,000) was presented to St. Michael's Church Building Fund. Contributions in April included \$500 for Play-a-Day-in-May-Away and \$2,700 to the Priest Education Fund. During the same month, the Council attended the State Convention and operated a hospitality room. May efforts included the Tootsie Roll Drive (\$4,000) and the Muscular Dystrophy Fund (\$500). In June, the Council funded purchase of an ice machine for Saltillo and actively participated in the dedication of the new St. Michael's Church. Brother Derivaux began his second year as Grand Knight in July. The Council collected and sent 1,039 pounds of clothing to Saltillo in July. In the same month, a burglary of the Council home caused some serious damage. The Council sponsored a Right to Life program in August. Other August activities included the purchase of an advertisement in the St. Aloysius football program and raising \$733 for St. Michael's Building Fund. The two donations in September were \$100 to St. Paul Church Sodality and \$150 to Dixie League Baseball. A Council-sponsored golf match that month drew strong interest. In October, there was a fine Columbus Day program. Donations during October were a dishwasher to St. Michael's CWA and \$100 to the Cub Scout Pack. The November Memorial Service honored deceased members. A \$100 donation that month benefitted the American Family Association. During December, the Council purchased bocci balls and gave a \$50 Christmas gift to Father Brett. The Council took a stand against the local sale of cigarette papers, which had been used with illicit drugs. Christmas parties for both the members and children were enjoyed by all who participated. The total donated to various caused during 1988 amounted to \$24,969, while the 1984-1988 total amounted to \$54,455.

The year began with a dues increase to \$60 yearly. The first month also saw the local Free Throw competition offered to community children and the presentation by St. Michael's CWA of a new banner to Council 898. In February, the Council approved the donation of \$10,000 to St. Francis Building Fund. A total of \$15,000 was allocated for building and grounds improvement. The membership count during February stood at 292, with 66 being life and honorary life status. A special three-man committee was established to recommend indigent members for dues exemption. A Knight of the Year award was set at \$75 during a March meeting. Donations in March included \$500 for Play-a-Day-in-May-Away chickens and \$100 for a chance on the Catholic Schools' countdown fundraiser. March activities included a St. Patrick's Day celebration, Run Thru History support, and a children's Easter Egg Hunt. As a matter of interest, during March, lounge price were established as \$1 for beer and \$0.50 for soft drinks and snacks, a price that has remained unchanged to this day. During April, \$2,700 was donated to the Priest Education Fund as a result of the annual spaghetti dinner fundraiser. That same month, the Council team held another First Degree exemplification. The minutes also note that the Council tractor was sold. At the State Convention, the hospitality room was a big success, and the Council managed to garner Honor Council and best yearbook awards. Father Brett received a Council donation of \$100 during May. New officers were elected in June followed by some resignations in August and September. The June Tootsie Roll Drive netted \$3,200 for the mentally retarded. The July activities included a donations of \$500 to Saltillo and rosaries to the Bereavement Committee and \$75 to purchase an advertisement in the St. Aloysius football program. A breakfast that month realized \$158 for the Saltillo mission. August purchases included a pool cover. Officer resignations resulted in the special election of Brother Zenon (Sonny) Sucharski for another term as Grand Knight and Brother Charlie Marshall as Warden. In October, Council 898 purchased its steam table, which has proved invaluable in various cooking efforts. The annual Memorial service in November with its beautiful Mass and eulogies paid tribute to recently deceased members. Also in November was the collection by Troop 7 (with the aid of the Council) of 400 pounds of food for area needy. Culminating 1989 were Christmas parties for the membership and the children. A total of \$17,300 was donated to various charitable causes in 1989.

1990

During January, Council 898 held a Superbowl party for members and guests, a Free Throw competition for area youth, an insurance night, and a First Degree exemplification for three new members. In the same month, the Cub Scout pack sponsored by the Council, was the recipient of a \$100 donation. Early in the year, Council Bingos were initiated to generate funds for charitable activities. February events included a lasagna supper, a Right to Life Program, a health program, a banquet for the Three Rivers Boy Scout District, and the Marian Hour of Prayer. Lenten fish frys became a Council tradition in March 1990, with a delicious fish dinner available for parishioners after Stations of the Cross each Friday. Also in March were the annual Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner (netted

\$2,000), St. Patrick's Day celebration, and a covered dish social for members and guests. April marked a reinstitution of a Council tradition, that of participation in the Holy Thursday Vigil when the Blessed Sacrament was exposed at each of the parish churches; brother knights volunteered for an hour each during the exposition. Other March activities were the Tootsie Roll Drive (\$2,400 turned in), a children's Easter egg hunt, Saltillo breakfast, and Riverfest (city block party) Mexican booth. In May, Financial Secretary Lauderdale retired after over 30 years of faithful service, and Brother Tom Chady was appointed to replace him. In the same month, the Council voted to hold two monthly meetings on the first and third Tuesday of each month, a practice that was later discontinued when the current four-meeting format was restored. Additional May functions included participation in the Catholic Schools countdown and Play-a-Day-in-May and Cajun and Mexican dinner socials. Brother Sucharski was elected for another year as Grand Knight in the June elections. In June, the Council donated \$50 to a 25th anniversary purse for Father Sam Messina. The following month, the Council purchase a new mower for maintaining the grounds. Also in July were the Independence Day picnic and contributions of \$100 each to Saltillo and Dixie Youth Baseball. August marked the beginning of another tradition at Council 898, the family Pool and Burger night, which has since been held every Friday during swimming season. September 1990 marked a donation of \$100 to Troop 7 and the Labor Day picnic. October marked the beginning of the Council tradition of hosting the priests of the Jackson Diocese during their biennial meeting. A delicious steak dinner prepared by Council chefs and served by Knights in tuxedos and a fully stocked hospitality bar also manned by Knights made for an enjoyable evening for the 95 priests and Bishops Houck and Brunini. Also in October was the beginning of the monthly Saltillo breakfast fundraiser plus full participation and leadership of Octoberfest (St. Michael's celebration and fundraiser), a manicotti supper, and a second 1990 Right to Life program. An interesting November milestone was the establishment of the a 13-member meeting quorum. In November, Council 898 also had its annual Memorial Mass and a quarterly Communion. December activities included a First Degree exemplification, Christmas parties for both the adults and the children, and a New Year's Eve party. Throughout the year, continuing efforts included Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Meals on Wheels, the three Vicksburg parishes, Run Thru History, St. Aloysius Football, participation in the State Convention, to name a few.

1991

January socials included a Superbowl party and an insurance night. Departing pastors, Fathers Prendergast and Egan were honored by the Council and presented with commemorative plaques and \$100 checks that same month. February saw the Three Rivers Boy Scout District annual banquet, the Marian Hour of Prayer, Free Throw Competition, and a quarterly breakfast. In March, Council members enjoyed the St. Patrick's Day program and participation in Run Thru History and fully supported the Holy Thursday Vigil at the local parishes. Charitable activities that month included the Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner (\$2,500 raised), Special Olympics (150 shirts donated), and a benefit for Michelle Coomes, a young St. Michael's parishioner who sustained spinal injuries in an automobile accident. A First Degree exemplification in March added some fine new

members to the rolls. In April was another fundraiser, a bingo, for Michelle Coomes. Also that month, Council 898 engaged in a full-fledged cleanup of the home and grounds, participated in the State Convention (receiving several awards), and enjoyed a Fifth Tuesday social. May marked the resumption of Pool and Burger night. In addition the members enjoyed a spaghetti supper and participated in Play-a-Day-in-May-Away, the Catholic Schools fundraiser. June functions included a Tex-Mex dinner and the Tootsie Roll Drive. The Cub Scouts were given \$100 to support their activities. At the beginning of July, Brother Sucharski began another term as Grand Knight. In that month, the Council approved purchase of a yearbook advertisement from St. Aloysius, and members enjoyed both the Independence Day picnic and a Fifth Tuesday social. August saw the installation of new officers, the reinstitution of weekly meetings, a trip to the Saltillo Mission to deliver lecterns, and the donations of \$200 each to Fathers Dulaney and Camp, who observed 25th anniversaries that year. Donations and charitable activities in September were \$100 to St. Paul's Church Sodality, fetal statues to the Vicksburg Catholic schools, an advertisement in St. Aloysius football program, and a special bingo for St. Aloysius Band. Members that month enjoyed the Labor Day picnic and participated in the New World Mass in Jackson. In October, there were quarterly Communions at St. Michael's and St. Paul's, a Columbus Day celebration, a First Degree exemplification, a meeting of Past Grand Knights, a Right to Life Program, a covered dish supper, and a Fifth Tuesday social. Council members participated in November's annual Memorial Mass, plus the Tootsie Roll Drive (\$1,057 net), a Thanksgiving Dinner for the retired Sisters of Mercy, and the Fourth Degree Turkey dinner fundraiser. December marked the Christmas parade, dinner theater party, Christmas party and dance, children's Christmas party, and a New Year's Eve covered dish dinner. Total donated by the Council in 1991 was \$4,367.

1992

Council 898 began the year by holding a steak supper and Super Bowl party in January. During the same month, bingo was moved to Thursday nights, and the quorum required for weekly meetings was reduced to twelve, the present figure, and officially adopted in December. In February, members and guests enjoyed another steak supper and Scout Sunday at St. Michael's with Troop 7. Events that month that the Council organized included the Free Throw competition, the Miss Vicksburg pageant concessions. The Council purchased a \$100 ticket for the Catholic Schools countdown, Brother Bill Geesler, who sold over 200 tickets to the Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner earned the privilege of attending with his sister, Mary; members volunteered for food and beverage service, administrative duties, and cleanup for that February event. Finally in February, Council 898's First Degree Team initiated 13 new Knights. Besides the Priest Education Dinner, March events included Run-Thru-History, St. Patrick's Day party, Three Rivers District Boy Scout Banquet, and a Fifth Tuesday social. In April, the membership participated in the Holy Thursday Vigil in Vicksburg parish churches. The children's Easter Egg hunt and the State Convention were also April events. May events included Play-a-Day-in-May-Away, the Catholic Schools fundraiser, pool opening (with Friday Pool and Burger Nights), the Tootsie Roll Drive (\$1,340), a benefit bingo for St. Aloysius Band

(\$1350), and the last Saltillo Breakfast of the September 1991-May 1992 season (\$1,726 delivered to Father Quinn in August). The Knights organized a rummage sale for the Scouts and enjoyed a Fifth Tuesday social in June. June Council elections resulted in a new Grand Knight, Brother Billy Wilson assuming his duties in July. In July, officers were installed, and the membership and their families enjoyed an Independence Day picnic. August events were a Council trip to Saltillo to deliver additional lecterns, clothing, medical supplies, toys, and candy and to work with a dentist and a chiropractor. In the same month, a \$50 advertisement was purchased in the St. Aloysius football program, and members and guests enjoyed a covered dish supper. Among the events in September were a Mexican covered dish supper, a steak supper, the Labor Day Picnic, and a "Meet the Candidates" forum where candidates from the State legislature addressed the membership and fielded questions. The biennial convocation of the priests of the Jackson Diocese drew a lot of interest for the clergy and bishops present; they were served a complimentary chicken and fish dinner and provided an open bar for their enjoyment that evening. Other October events were the Columbus Day program, a quarterly Communion, and the purchase of a St. Aloysius yearbook advertisement for \$62.50. During November, the Council had its annual Memorial Mass for deceased brothers and a Thanksgiving Dinner for the retired Sisters of Mercy. The St. Francis soccer team was granted free use of the large meeting room for a function in November, while in December the 6th Grade at that school used the same room for a crafts show. Other December events included a Children's Christmas party, a Christmas dance for members and guests, and a New Year's Eve social. Total donated by the Council in 1992 amounted to \$7,500.

1993

January began with a Cajun covered dish supper and the Free Throw competition for area youth. In the same month, the Council purchased a \$100 ticket in support of the Catholic Schools countdown. A February "Town Meeting" served to seek input and program ideas from the membership as a whole to more clearly focus the Council and to solicit greater participation of the Vicksburg Knights. Regular February events included the Three Rivers District Boy Scout Banquet and the resumption of Lenten Fish Frys following Stations of the Cross. In the same month, the Council held a First Degree exemplification and a special covered dish supper for Father Quinn and the Saltillo youth. A March milestone was the banning of smoking during Council meetings. In addition, members conducted the Priest Education Fund Spaghetti Dinner, donated \$50 to a Brother Knight in need, and enjoyed themselves at the annual St. Patrick's Day celebration. The State Convention in Tupelo and the children's Easter Egg hunt were two April activities. May saw the opening of the Council pool and the return of Pool and Burger Night and the full Council support (\$500 for chickens) and participation in Play-a-Day-in-May-Away, a Catholic Schools fundraiser. In June, State Deputy-Elect, Tom Zettler, installed newly elected officers, including Brother Tom Chady, who assumed the duties of Grand Knight for the 1993-1994 Fraternal Year; a covered dish social followed installation. Events in July included the annual Independence Day Picnic, School of Columbianism in Brandon, full support of St. Paul's Parish picnic, the use of Council facilities by St. Michael's choir,

and a donation of \$1,000 to Saltillo (proceeds from monthly breakfasts). In August, all four degrees were offered at the Council home - First, Second, and Third on one weekend (ten new Third Degree Knights for Council 898) and Fourth Degree on a later weekend (fifteen new Sir Knights for the Vicksburg Assembly). During August, the Council voted to say the rosary before each weekly business meeting; at the end of the month, members and guests enjoyed a Fifth Tuesday social. In August, Council members also traveled to Saltillo to deliver toys, medical supplies, candy, clothing, and contributions from the Council and individual Knights; the Brothers spent the week working with a dentist and a chiropractor, and they distributed goods. September was a particularly busy month with the resumption of monthly Saltillo breakfasts, a benefit bingo for St. Aloysius Band, the Labor Day Picnic, a Luau, a "Meet the Principal" night, and hosting a District meeting. The Council also purchased a \$100 countdown ticket from the Catholic Schools, appointed liaisons to St. Michael and St. Paul parishes, and allowed the CYO full use of the Home and grounds in that same month. In October, members enjoyed and participated in St. Michael's Octoberfest, Columbus Day program, a quarterly awards and covered dish supper to welcome new Knights and their families, St. Paul's social, the annual Tootsie Roll Drive (net \$2,004), and a Council golf tournament. The highlights for November 1993 included a Memorial Mass by Chaplain Father Robert Dore for deceased Knights, a First Degree exemplification, the first annual tri-parish Harvest Supper (with collections of canned goods and clothing to benefit Gateway Rescue Mission), a Fifth Tuesday Social, and a Thanksgiving for the retired Sisters of Mercy in McAuley Home. The last month of the year included such events as preparation of a Christmas float in the Vicksburg Christmas parade, a Christmas dance, children's Christmas party, Christmas dinner for the retired Sisters of Mercy, and a New Year's Eve social.

1994

The year 1994 began at a rapid pace in January with a First Degree exemplification for three new Knights, the annual Free Throw competition, a District meeting in Leland, a Fourth Degree Superbowl party, Miss Vicksburg pageant concession operation, the St. Aloysius A Club benefit bingo, purchase of a \$100 countdown ticket, and organization and full support of the Catholic Schools International Dinner. February activities the Holy Family Hour of Prayer led by Chaplain Father Robert Dore at St. Michael's, a winter trip to Saltillo and the delivery of a prototype portable confessional by several Vicksburg Knights (including dentists) the Three Rivers District Boy Scout Banquet, the purchase of a CYO convention advertisement for \$100, the Countdown at St. Aloysius, a celebration of the 60th anniversary of Troop 7 (sponsored and led by Council members throughout its history), the renewal of Lenten Fish Frys each Friday after Stations, the formation of a hospital visitation committee for both local facilities, a steak supper, and an annual awards banquet. The level of activity in March was also high with socials that included St. Patrick's Day, a steak supper prior to a regular business meeting, and a Fifth Tuesday social. Other March functions were the Priest Education Spaghetti Dinner (net \$3,069), the support of Run Thru History, a First Degree exemplification (four new members), St. Aloysius Band benefit bingo, and the presentation of a Top Proposer award to Grand Knight Chady by State

Membership Director, Brother Lou Zylka. By April, 30 confessional units had been modified based on Father Patrick Quinn's recommendations after examining the February prototype and prepared for delivery in August. In the same month, 48 children enjoyed an Easter Egg Hunt, and the members enjoyed a fine steak supper prepared by Council chefs. For the first time in five years, the Council operated a fine hospitality room at the State Convention in Biloxi that featured smoked meats and the famous Vicksburg Bloody Mary. The Council received Honor Council recognition and Grand Knight received the State Top Proposer Award. May events included the celebration of the 90th Anniversary of the charter of Council 898. On hand were fourteen of the fifteen living Past Grand Knights, State Deputy Tom Zettler, State Treasurer Bubba Quinn, State Warden Roy Patterson, District Deputy Warren Doiron, Mayor (Brother) Joe Loviza, descendants of charter members, Council members, and many other guests. Also in May were pool reopening and the resumption of Pool and Burger Night, sponsorship of a Dixie Youth Baseball team (\$250), full support of Play-a-Day-in-May-Away (\$500 for chickens), and the formation of a team to lead Vicksburg's bid for the 1999 State Convention. In June were the election and installation of officers by District Deputy Warren Doiron, with Brother Chady being reelected to the office of Grand Knight. In the same month, \$50 was donated to former Chaplain Father Brett's 50th Anniversary purse and \$1,000 to Saltillo (proceeds from the monthly breakfasts). Members and guests also enjoyed a covered dish dinner.

Even though the second half of 1994 is outside the range of time to be covered by this history, some events are worth noting for the record. In August, Brothers Billy Wilson and Tony Dardeau led a group of young people accompanied by their adult leaders (who including Father Sam Messina) from Belżoni, Anguilla, and Vicksburg to Saltillo. Besides the usual delivery of medicine, toys, and treats, they delivered 30 confessionals. While in Mexico, the Vicksburg Knights assembled the confessionals and worked with two volunteer dentists. Bishop Houck was also present for his biennial visit to the mission. In October, Council members again hosted the biennial convocation of 80 priests of the Jackson Diocese and Bishop Houck, who were treated to a steak dinner and complimentary beverages. Council members continue to grow and enjoy Columbian and family fellowship as they work, pray, and spend time in the service of Church, community, council, family, and youth. The next ten years (1994-2004) should reflect even greater growth, fellowship, and service as the men of 898 continue to exemplify the virtues of charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism.

On September 2, 1945, a group of Catholic men, that belonged to the Greenville Council, had a meeting for the purpose of forming a new Council. Alphonse Carollo served as chairman and they voted to start a council in Leland. An election was held and John Kain was elected the first Grand Knight. There were fiftyone men who either joined or transferred to the Leland Council and received their charter on the 30th of September, the year 1945, becoming the Leland Council No. 2945. Meetings were held every Wednesday at 8:00 p.m. at the old funeral home at 403 North Broad Street until 1949. After the St. James Catholic Youth Center was built, they held their meetings in one of the classrooms. On January 11, 1958, a new Council home was completed at 708 East Seventh Street, where we are currently holding all of our functions. In July 1958, the Council home was dedicated in honor of C. G. Shapley, a deceased Brother who had put a great amount of time and work into our order. The Council's name was so changed to honor his memory. Our council home and two lots were paid for in 1967, so we are debt free in this matter. Our membership now totals 69, including 37 insurance, 28 associate, and 4 inactive insurance members. Business meetings are held on the first and third Wednesdays at 8:00 p.m., and on every fifth Wednesday a social is held with wives.

For many years prior to the establishment of a Knights of Columbus council in Cleveland, a number of men from Our Lady of Victories Parish were members of the Greenville or Clarksdale Councils and functioned as a local Club in Cleveland. In the year 1962-64 Victor J. Aguzzi, Sr., President of the Cleveland Club, encouraged by Rev. Patrick J. Hannelly, conducted a campaign to establish a council in Cleveland. Their efforts were supported by District Deputy John Laurenzi and Past State Deputy John Sommers under whose guidance a charter for Father Rotondo Council No. 5556 was granted on April 20, 1964.

Aguzzi, Sr.; Chancellor, Sam Danna; Recorder, Leslie McGovern; Financial Secretary, L. T. Michie; Treasurer, Ned Fioranelli; Lecturer, Dick Miller; Advocate, Martin King; Warden, Mario Barbati; Inside Guard, Rudy Battistelli; Outside Guard, Albert Rocconi, Sr.; and Trustees, Ned Aguzzi, Joe Aguzzi and Dominic Rizzo.

In addition to the officers, the charter members of the council were: Charles A. Feduccia, Sr., Lawrence A. Feduccia, George Ferri, Jr., Armand Fioranelli, John F. Homan, James B. McGowan, James P. Rocconi, Frank Roncali, Jr., William A. Smith, Jr., Elio Tarsi, Jr., Roger K. Wyatt, Dr. A. K. Abide, Jr., Francis B. Aylward, Wendel J. Chudy, Joseph Correro, Sr., Albert Ferri, Fred Fioranelli, John A. Holland, John H. Janous, Sr., James Pambianchi, Tony Rizzo, Julius P. Rocconi, Sr., and John D. Rogers. Of the charter members Dr. A. K. Abide, Jr., Ned Aguzzi, Francis B. Aylward, Mario Barbati, Joseph Correro, Sr., Sam Danna, Charles A. Feduccia, Sr., Lawrence A. Feduccia, Sr., Rev. During its thirty years of operation, Father Rotondo Council has consistently given special attention to its membership strength. Although sources of new membership have been limited because of the relatively small size of the parish, the parish is growing and the council continues to have successful membership campaigns, increasing in membership from 106 members in 1984 to 145 members as of December 31, 1994. Membership campaigns were also strengthened through the 1st degree team formed in 1987 after the original team became inactive for several years. The council now has several third generation knights. Membership success has also been recognized on a state and national level in the last ten years as the council received the Fr. McGivney award and/or Founders' award in many of those years as well as the State Top Gun award in 1989-90 for over a 10% increase in members.

The success in building membership strength and year in year out accomplishments of council objectives and completion of council programs reflects the leadership abilities and dedication of those brothers elevated by the members to the office of Grand Knight. These Grand Knights were ably supported in promoting the ideal of unity and fraternity by those brothers who filled the various council offices over the years and those brothers who unselfishly gave of their time and talents to the many programs the council successively completed.

Several milestones have occurred during the past ten years: With the council home mortgage retired and the recreation building (known as the "Bocci Barn") in need of improvement, the decision was made to tear down the existing wooden structure and rebuild an insulated metal building so that bocci and other games could be played comfortably in inclement weather. A \$10,000 raffle was held to help raise funds for the project. With proceeds from the raffle, a sound financial position, and interest free loans from several brother knights, construction was completed without any outside funds.

In May 1989 the council celebrated the 25th anniversary of its charter. The celebration was held at the council home with brother knights and their wives enjoying a steak dinner and dance.

In 1993 the council assisted in sending several parish CYO members to the World Youth Conference in Denver, Colorado, attended also by Pope John Paul II.

In 1994 the council assisted the parishes of the area in the celebration of 100 years of Catholicism in Bolivar County, Mississippi.

From its inception the council has endeavored to fulfill the purpose of the Knights of Columbus and has followed the programs

suggested by the Supreme Council. A survey of the Recorder's minute book discloses considerable council attention to fraternal, charitable, family, youth, and community projects, Catholic and church activities, and support for special programs sponsored by both the Supreme and State Councils. In addition to the membership awards won, the council has received Supreme's Star Council Award for most of the past ten years and on the State level has won the Distinguished or Honor Council Award in each of those years. council received the State Softball Tournament's Sportsmanship Award in 1986, the State Best Large Council and Best Community Activities Awards in 1987, the State Family Activity Award in 1988, and the State Best Large Council and Best Council Activities Awards The council participated each of the past ten years in the State Tootsie Roll Program for the mentally retarded and the Priest Education Fund. It has participated in the State Bowling and Softball Tournaments and hosted the Softball Tournament in 1986 and 1989 and will again in 1995.

On the local level attention has been given to promoting the mission of the Church. Members are encouraged and do serve on the pastoral and finance council and serve as lectors, teachers, eucharistic ministers, choir members and perform other services as needed. The council was also responsible for serving as ushers. In addition to other activities already mentioned, the council took an active part in the Parish Renew Program, held activities for the alter boys, had 1st Friday masses said for vocations and sponsored the Marion Hour of Prayer program.

The council sponsors a number of activities for the benefit of its members in the spirit of fraternity. Hospital visits, get well cards to members and families who are ill, masses and wakes for brother knights and family members lost and an annual special mass for all deceased brothers of the council are standard policies. In 1994, several brother knights made a stained wooden plaque with the name of each deceased member inscribed on an individual golden metal plate in memory of deceased brothers. The plaque will hang in the parish church foyer. On a happier note, the council sponsors dances and other social events that include wives and children. Other activities include bocci tournaments, a softball team, a bowling team, and monthly social meetings. At one of the social meetings during the year members are urged to share the benefits of the Order's insurance program. The council hosted the School of Columbianism in Sept. 1987 and has served as host for numerous District meetings.

The council has also not neglected the idea of Charity not only with regard to its own members but also with concern for the larger community. Charitable projects have included contributions for food baskets at Christmas for the needy, for the earthquake victims in Mexico, for Christmas packages for inmates at the Miss. State Penitentiary at Parchman, Ms., for the local mental health center, and for needs of the community of individuals who need assistance because of property loss or serious health problems. Funds are raised for these programs through projects such as an

annual spaghetti supper, numerous football pools, the Tootsie Roll drive, and a bocci tournament to name a few.

The council's sense of responsibility to the community is also demonstrated by its participation in community wide activities. Programs such as drug abuse, pro-life, practice of CPR, dangers of smoking, blood drives, voter registration, and hunter safety all continue to be concerns of the council.

The emphasis given by Supreme to family and youth continues to be met with a strong response from Council 5556. Many of the fraternal activities mentioned above involved family members. Family outings, picnics, Family of the Month/Year program, annual installation of officers, basketball free throw competition, sponsorship of Boy's and Girl's State, parish senior breakfast, CYO functions, Brownie and Girl Scout troops, pizza dinner for parish Confirmation class, outings for alter boys, American Legion baseball program and programs on vocations for young people all are also integral parts of council activities.

During its relatively short life in addition to the numerous honors and awards the council has provided leadership to the Mississippi Jurisdiction. Several members have had the honor of serving in leadership for the State:

Brother Henry Mosco has served as Insurance Agent for the Mississippi Jurisdiction since March, 1983 after beginning as an agent in 1982 and also added responsibility for the Arkansas Jurisdiction in 1989.

Brother Jerry L. Woods has been an insurance agent since 1986. Brother Victor J. Aguzzi, Jr. served as District Deputy from 1991-1994.

Brother Marvin L. Lott served as District Deputy from 1983-1985, State Warden from 1985-1987, State Secretary from 1987-1989, State Deputy from 1989-1991, and has served as Vice Supreme Master of the Bienville Province since 1992.

The council was greatly saddened with the loss of one of its most dedicated brothers in October, 1992. Dr. William F. LaForge served the Knights of Columbus in many capacities, not only as a leader but as a friend and true brother. The first Grand Knight of Council 5556 from 1964-1966 and again in 1967-1968, Dr. LaForge received the Fred L. Westbrook, Sr. Memorial Award in 1968. He served as District Deputy from 1968-1970, State Secretary from 1970-1971, State Deputy from 1971-1973, and served as the council's Financial Secretary from 1972 until his death. The council's fourth degree assembly honored Dr. LaForge in 1992 by naming the assembly the Dr. William F. LaForge Assembly No. 1503.

As Council No. 5556 begins its fourth decade, it remains committed to the ideals of the Order and determined to continue and to expand those activities which have characterized the first thirty years of its history.

Shelby Council 6555 Shelby, MS

The Shelby Council was officially chartered February 4, 1974 with a membership of 45 members.

Most of the older members dates back to 1942 and 1945. For a number of years, they were members of the Greenville Council which was the nearest council at that time. As the years went by, the men from Clarksdale were joining the Knights of Columbus and they also were members of the Greenville Council and as most men joined the Knights of Columbus the Clarksdale group had enough members to form their own council and receive their charter. All of the Shelby members became members of the Clarksdale Council because the Clarksdale Council gave the Shelby group a refund of 10% of the dues and because it was closer to Shelby.

We always did have enough members for a council, but at that time it was required that you had to have 21 insurance members before the Supreme would issue a charter. So we could never get 21 members to take full insurance. Then later on in the years the Supreme Council passed a ruling that 21 insurance member was not required any more to receive a charter. So, as I mentioned, the charter was issued in February 4, 1974. So we were members for 31 years before we had a council and in 1981 the Shelby BOCCI Club discontinued their operation. And most Knights of Columbus members were members of BOCCI Club and it was subleased to Council 6555 and it was then that we had our own council home. It is now the Knight of Columbus no. 6555 home.



St. Joseph Council 8760 Holly Springs, MS

In the 1981, some members of the St. Joseph Parish began inquiring about the possibility of starting a Knights of Columbus Council in the Parish. At that time there were just men in the Parish who were already members of the Order. However, both worked in the neighboring state of Tenneesee and they were infrequent visitors to St. Joseph's. The desire did not completely die and was evident on a few occasions throughout the year. After a few informal discussions during the year of '82, it was decided by some of the men of the Paeish to make enquiries to the Council to the southwest, namely, the Hernando-DeSoto Council #7120.

After conducting a survey of interest, the Round Table was formed in late'82 and the first official meeting was scheduled for January 8, 1983. An envoy from Council #7120, Grand Knight Larry Campbell and Immediate Past Grand Knight, Jim Higgins, graciously consented to attend that all important first meeting which was led by Acting Chairman, Frank Houck. Other members in attendance were; George Perry, Hillie Shipp, James Rayford, Danny Houck, Felix Osuji, Benedict Njoku, Reuben Pegues and Claude Vinson, Sr.

G.K. Campbell and IPG.K. Higgins imparted valuable information at that meeting and they were to serve unwaveringly throughout our period of organizing. In fact, Larry Campbell was to go on and become District Deputy for District One.

The very first exemplification of first degree Rite was carried of in St. Joseph's Parish Hall on January 22, 1983 at 7: 30 P.M. The class consisted of 10 strangers and the Holly Springs council was on its way to becoming the first fully integrated Council in the Mississippi Jurisdiction.

The Council was officially chartered later that year and the Charter Officers were: Cecil Jones, Frank Houck, Felix Osuji, Benedict Njoku, Lloyd Taylor, Hillie Shipp and Claude Vinson, Sr. The Charter was officially received and presented in 1985 while Dr. David Stratman was entering his first term as Grank Knight.

The Council achieved its first statewide recognition during the tenure of Bro. Stratman, winning the Honor Council Award in the Fraternal year '86-87. Stratman brought many years of experience to council leadership and pushed for members to become fully knighted into the Fourth Degree. His urgings bore fruit when in 1987, on a Saturday in May (30th), four 3rd degree members of St. Joseph's Council became members of that distinguished plateau. The four were: Felix Osuji, Hillie Shipp, Emmanuel Ugorji and Claude Vīnson, Sr. That same year, the Council sent its first two delegates to the State Convention in Jackson, MS. Those delegates were Claude Vinson and Lloyd Taylor.

Claude Vinson, Sr. became the Council's third Grand Knight and became the first to serve three consecutive terms. He was succeeded by his son, Claude Vinson, Jr., who added two more "firsts" to the Council's young and colorful history. Claude Jr., became the youngest Grand Knight and part of the first (and only, thus far) father-son team in the history of the Coucil. Other elected Grand Knights were:

There have been just two Financial Secretaries in the history of the Council, Cecil Jones and Ralph Howard. The Council has continued to strive and survive, although at times, struggling with dwindling membership. However, 8760 has been very participatory in all programs and won membership and Insurance awards, along with numerous Honor Council Awards and the Columbian Award.

The Council expects to regenerate the faded interest and recapture that spirit of progress which was prevalent in the early days of its history.

The significant task of the extraordinary maintenance of the facade of St. Peter's Basilica and the 13 travertine statues, located above it, begun in April 1985 and finished on 30 November 1986. It was an offering to the Holy Father John Paul II from the Order of the Knights of Columbus, who, by this new undertaking, desired to make a perpetual commemoration of the fortieth anniversary of the priestly Ordination of His Holiness and the eight of his Ministry as Universal Pastor of the Church.

The extraordinary maintenance of the Facade required numerous and different types of travertine plugs, as well as the rebuilding of a great number of old iron clamps, the consolidation and resurfacing of many missing pieces of travertine; in addition, there was the restoration of 78 mosaic letters, 1 metre high, which compose the title of the Basilica along the main frieze of the facade.

Father Robert Reitmeier Council 8848 Tupelo, MS

The Robert Reitmeier Council was chartered on December 2, 1984 and is named after Father Robert Reitimeier, the first pastor of St. James from 1922 - 1952. He died April 10, 1956 and is buried at St. Bernard Abbey in Cullman, Alabama. Throughout the last ten years this council has lead the State every year with collections for the Mississippi State Mental Retardation Program. Total collections for this time period were over \$138, 000. Also, the Tupelo Council was active every year with Commodity Distribution for the Lee County Welfare Department, meals provided for our parishioners after Holy Hour during Lent, and a Care Tree every Christmas for needy families. Many other worthwhile projects have taken place over the last ten years which are too numerous to count. Our Charter Members were as follows:

St. Mary Council 9124 Gautier, MS

The history of St. Mary's Knights of Columbus Council began with the arrival of Fr. Michael Kelleher as pastor of St. Mary's in January 1985. Coming to the parish from his previous assignment at St. Peter's, Bassfield, where he also facilitated in establishing a new council, he was familiar with the procedure involved, the pride of the men, the obvious benefit to the parish, etc.

Within weeks of arriving at St. Mary's, Fr. Michael was in touch with some of the men in the parish who were showing some interest in having their own council and especially with one--Joe Furlan, whom Father had met on previous occasions through Knights of Columbus events. (Joe had served as a Knights of Columbus Insurance Agent some time previously.) The need for and obvious benefit of a new council was promoted by this core group. Within a few weeks enough men had made a commitment to make the establishing of a new council possible.

The pros and cons of separating from the larger Pascagoula Council were discussed at length. The prevailing sentiment among the state officers at that time was for smaller, more active councils--possibly at the parish level. Since St. Mary's was a relatively new parish (officially established in 1968) and since the community of Gautier was talking about incorporating (which took place the following year in 1986), the sentiment for a new independent parish council was growing.

On November 11, 1985, a new council designated by the name ST. MARY'S COUNCIL #9124

with a total of 36 charter members was officially established. Joe Furlan was elected the first Grand Knight of the new council. Five of the original charter members had other family members (viz. sons) as charter members also. They were Clarence Abbott (son, Michael), Charles Martin (sons, Michael and Lee), Walter Perez, Jr. (son, Walter Perez, III), Ray Vecchio (son, Dion), and Henry Weber (son, Albert). Reinhart Schroeder Council 9409 West Biloxi Biloxi, MS

In October of 1986 MSU won over Arkansas State Indians 24-9 and the Mississippi Gulf Coast Bulldogs defeated the Pearl River Wildcats 9-7. Jim Rigsby, Fabian Husley, and Forest Taylor from Biloxi Council with the approval of Rev Francis Farrell, pastor of Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Church were taking the initiative to form a new council and to recruit the 33 members required.

On October 12 the weather in Biloxi was cloudy with a chance of thunderstorms. The temperature ranged from 69-83 degrees. At sunset the Jewish Day of atonement, Yon Kippur began. On this day in 1492 Christopher Columbus discovered the new world and so on this day October 12, 1986 the West Biloxi Knights of Columbus Council 9409 was chartered with a membership of 39: Jose P. Aflague, Elwood Cavalier, Michael D. Chapman, Charles E. Chester, Rick L. Cleayelin, Lawrence G. Desbien, John B. Dubaz, John P. Durham, Gerald M. Eluskie, William F. Entriken, Rev. Francis Farrell, Stephen F Farry, Kenneth L Girten, Gerald J. Hopkins, Michael J. Hue, Fabian V. Husley, Allen Konyn, Gary P. Marston, Michael R. Miller, Rev. Patrick Mockler, Charles L Moniot, Windell D. Norris, Gary A Peters, George Pitts Jr., Alfred E. Plourde, James H. Rigby, Daniel E. Roche, John E. Romeo, Max Roybal Jr., Paul Sebenmorgen, Ray H. Taconi, Forest H. Taylor, Richard G. Taylor, Joseph W. Tiblier, Scott W. Thompson, John Welter Jr., John Welter IV, Howard Westman, George A. Ziz.

There was a diversity of personalities. Most were active or retired military and Civil Service Employees. One was a POW from two major wars. 4 of the men were father and son, two were Roman Catholic Priests. There was a building contractor, a banker and a photographer. The majority of the new council were transfers from Council 1244. A portion had joined the Knights years before and now reentered. Some were new members. They all joined to make the new council's birth possible.

Jose "Joe" Aflague first joined the Knights in 1953 and reentered. Elwood "Woody" Cavalier was a new member. Michael D. Chapman, active military was a transfer. Lawrence G Desbien, active Air Force, was a transfer. John B. "J.B. Dubaz, retired, had been a dedicated church worker for Fr Farrel. John "Bull" P. Durhan, retired from active duty in the Army and the Air Force was a transfer from 1244. William "Bill" F Entriken, a supervisor for Inglea Ship Builders, was a new member. Rev Francis Farrell, first joined the Knights in 1950 and reentered in 1986. Steven Farry, was a retired Air Force And Civil Sevice Employee. Ken Girten was a transfer from 1244. Fabian Husley retired Air Force transfered from 1244. Allen Konyn, manager of Charter Marketing Co. was a transfer from Long Beach, Ms council 4898. Gary Marston, active duty Air force had climbed from the enlisted ranks to those of a

commissioned officer and was a new member. Michael Miller, a Veteran Administration therapist, was the council's first Recorder. Rev Patrick Mockler, transferred from Ocean Springs council 5654. Jim Rigby, an Air Force instructor for faculty development, was a Past Grand Knight and Former District deputy, transferred from council 1244 to become the council's first Financial Sectary. John Romeo, a fireman from Ingalls, was reinstated from council 1244. Paul Sebenmorgan, active Air Force first joined the Knights in 1972 and then rejoined to start the council. Forest Taylor transferred Richard Taylor, a state employee, from council 1244. California, transferred from 1244. Joseph "Jay" Tibler, building contractor and co-manager of Belmar Motel Inc later became a trustee in our council. John "Jack" Welter Jr. a civil service employee, first joined in 1958 and then reentered in October of 1986. John Welter IV was a Bank Loan Officer. George Ziz was a photographer.

Today (as of Dec 94) four of those charter members are deceased: The deceased Charter members are Max Roybal Jr.(6/18/27-5/2/88), Howard Westman(8/26/14-1/4/92), George Pitts Jr.(9/1/23-4/24/93), Windell D. Norris(7/16/18-11/22/93).

Max Roybal was the first member of the council to pass away. The Golf Tournament was named after him and held annually in his honor.

Howard Westman had been the Councils first deputy Grand Knight.

George Pitts was the epitome of what Knight of columbus should be. A Joiner for Ingalls Ship Yard, George joined the council as a new member. A strong family man, he was completely committed to what he believed. He believed in the Knights and was involved in every thing that council 9409 did. He was very involved in recruiting new members. In fact he was the most exuberant Membership Director in the history of the council personally sponsoring more members than any other individual.

Win Norris had always been involved and active during his membership with the Knights. He became the Knight of the Year in the Forth degree assembly. He was a retired Air Force Col who became New York Life insurance Agent. At the time of his death he had been an Advocate with the council and was a FaithFul Navigator for the Forth Degree Assembly.

The council was named to honor Reinhart Schroeder a renowned Knight from the state of Mississippi who's life of service to the church so exemplified what a Knight would strive to be and who died during the exemplification of the third degree in Bassfield, Ms on January 28, 1979. Reinhart was a retired Civil service Worker from the Air Force he is survived by his wife, who has remained active with the parish council to this date.

There were a number of planning meetings and then on November 5, 1986 the enthusiastic council met and put the emphasis on growth. Deputy Grand Knight Mike Leleux from Biloxi Council 1244 spoke of challenge of recruiting new members. Followed by then elected Advocate Steve Farry who endorsed what had been said and pledged himself to the cause. Lawrence L. Lewis was proposed by Howard Westman and approved for membership with a 15-0 vote. Reinhart Schroeder Council 9409 was on its way.

On November 19 Monica Hall became the setting for the initial installation of officers and the ladies Auxiliary. District Deputy Greg Niolet of District 19 seated the Knights officers and Mrs Martha Dartz, District Regent installed the officers of the ladies auxiliary. Past State Deputy member of Biloxi Council 1244 was the guest speaker. The event was recorded on video by Brother Mike Leleux.

The first Grand Knight of the newly formed Reinhart Schroeder Council was Forest Taylor, a retired Navy Chief Electronics Technician and Harrison County Deputy Sheriff, Volunteer. He was a former Grand Knight and former District Deputy. He served from October 1986 until June 1988. He was followed in that office by:

The first president of ladies auxiliary was Anne May Taylor, wife of Forrest Taylor and mother of Richard G. Taylor. She had She succeeded herself in office and has been the custom of every woman who has served in this office to date.

The new members went through their initiation in the Knights of Columbus Hall in Pascagoula, Mississippi. Michael Miller, Veteran's Administration Therapist and the council's first recorder still remembers "the excitement of uniting together of a fine group of men". When he recalls his years with the Knights he says, " It has been a great experience. I've enjoyed every minute of it."

In 1988 Forest Taylor was replaced as Grand Knight. He had been the Charter Grand Knight and had followed himself in office for a second term. He became the council's first District Deputy (1988-1989). Membership under him had been increased to 56. And the newly chartered council received the award for the best newsletter for a small council. There were 8 "family of the Month" awards with one family receiving one of the top honors from the Supreme Council. Danny and Roberta Lechner received the state of Mississippi Family of the Year Award for 1987-1988. Council members through the operation of a weekly bingo games had allocated moneys to the Priest Education Fund of the Diocese of Biloxi. And, then put untiring efforts into a "Tootsie Roll" sale of which the profits went to help the mentally retarded. In addition to their work in the Knights a large number of the members were serving community as eucharistic ministers, lectures, ushers, and members of St Vincent DePaul. The new council was looking forward to the future with projections of instituting a First Degree Team and chartering a West Biloxi Columbian Association.

When Steve Farry began his term he had already served his council as Advocate, and Deputy Grand Knight. When he completed his term as Grand Knight in July 1989 the council had 71 members showing he had not wavered from his original commitment to growth slightly more than 3 years before.

During his term the council provided support both financial and spiritual, to assist an aspirant in his preparations for becoming a religious brother. It supported the baseball team for the youth of the parish. And, it provided both financial and man power resources in upgrading parish playground equipment. The council promoted and sponsored a Marian Hour of Prayer and a quarterly corporate communion for brother knights and their families. It had members attended the school of Columbianism and participated in the Knight of the Month and Knight of the Year program. It had five brothers who were weekly carrying Holy Eucharist to the home bound sick, hospital patients, and nursing home residents.

Bingo games were being conducted to raise funds to help support Our Lady of Fatima parish. A drug awareness program, a health education program on eye care, and an insurance program night were sponsored. A golf tournament, a free throw contest, and family picnic were held. The amount of money raised in the Tootsie Roll drive was more than doubled from the year before and approximately \$1,800. was given to Cheshire House for the retarded. To end the calendar year the members of the council assisted with the parish Christmas Tree Sale and in collecting and distributing Christmas food baskets to the needy.

The council had been true to it's commitment to the family. It began a tradition of memorial Masses for deceased members. It had provided monthly maintenance to the church and was establishing a Columbian Squire Circle.

In July of 1989 John Cunningham followed Steve Farry in the office of Grand Knight and a new slate of officers were installed.

In December Brothers said fairwell to deceased Brother Floyd Mattina (11/20/04-12/05/89).

The knights of council 9409 continued their dedicated service. Many served in the church as lectures, commentators, CCD and RCIA instructors, members of the parish council, school board, and other parish organizations. They also were good stewards giving of their time and talents to support the church bazaar, raffles and school fund raising activities.

They continued the Marian Hour of Prayer, the quarterly corporate communion Sunday, drug awareness program, their contribution to the State Priest Education Fund, the carrying of communion to the sick in hospitals and at home, and assistance to the St. Vincent DePaul Society in preparing and delivering of food baskets for the needy at Christmas.

Members of the council began serving on the Diocesan Board for the Cursillo movement and served as team members during the weekends. Other members served at team members on Arise weekends. Still others provided manpower to support the local Red Cross Chapter and coached a baseball team for the youth in the city league. A Brother member became active in the Harrison County Exchange Club. And, a new Vocation Director began offering programs throughout the year.

The council's accomplishments were many of those painting of the living quarters in parish rectory and the repairing and refinishing of all classroom doors were two. Repair purchasing and installation of playground equipment was another. A 50/50 club was imitated with 50% gain to support council projects. Council held a health night and purchased an ad in the parish school year book. It co-hosted the state convention with four other coast councils. It added CYO to the list of organizations that the knights were already supporting and assisted the youth in making their trip to the mission at Saltillo, Mexico. A fishing trip was sponsored for the alter boys and cross bearers.

In July of 1990 John Cunningham was reelected Grand Knight and was the second member of the council to follow himself in office. During his second term 12 new members were initiated which was well above the goal established by the council and all but one was exemplified as a 2nd and 3rd degree.

The council was faithful in perpetuating the works that they had started and in addition served as group leaders for a pre-marriage program.

Under the leader ship of Chris Billeaud, Community Activities Director, council members served as offices in the Biloxi area Forth Degree Assembly, conducted a parish blood drive, and provided manpower assistance to the local Elks club in delivering of food to the needy.

Council Activities Director, Winn Norris, oversaw the golf tournament which had become an annual event for raising funds to defray the cost of operating the council and participation in Knight of the Quarter Program. Family Activities Director Frank McNeil organized the councils continuing crusade for the protection and the enhancement of human life with a written awareness program and participation in a Pro-Life rally. Youth Activities Director, John Taggert, added football to the list of sports for the youth already being coached by the Brother Knights.

In 1991 Fred Spencer became Grand Knight and Past grand Knight John Cunningham became District Deputy (1991-1993).

In this term 4 new members were added two being exemplified to 2nd and 3rd degree. The council continue its good works initiated under grand knights who had gone before. Newly appointed Program Director, Daniel Cervantez, gave guidance to all directors for preparing a monthly newsletter. Under Tony H. Bittner, Church Activities Director, the membership began assisting the Holy Name Society and Home-School Association. Community activities Director, Forest Taylor, oversaw a clothing drive conducted for the needy. Stephen Farry, Council Activities Director, saw to it that council participated in a bowling tournament and met the membership drive Bob Weldon, Family activities Director, Representative Antoine Otto speak to members and families about Pro-Life. George Pitts, Membership Director, held membership drives a Church functions Sunday mass and the Annual Bazaar. Taylor was the community Activities Director, in which area Council members served at Officers in the Biloxi area Forth degree assembly, conducted a clothing drive, and gave assistance to the local Elks Lodge in delivering food to provide for the needy. Council Activities Director, Stephen F. Farry, Family Activities Director, Bob R. Weldon, Youth Activities Director, Jim Rigby, were successful in continuing the good activities the council had begun to preform in the years since it's inception.

In March the brotherhood said good bye to another deceased brother Shelton Skinner (9/23/45-04/24/93).

From July 1992 to July 1994 the Office of Grand knight was held by Daniel Lechner. Making him the third individual in the history of the council to succeed himself in that office.

Danny grew up in Biloxi. He was a coordinator for Ingalls Ship Builders. He had been very active in The Crusillo movement and local prayer groups. He and his wife Roberta had been working with the CYO and other youth organizations for years. He remembers that when he entered the Knights Council 9409 in 1986 as a new member after completing his first degree he was given a package and told he would be the Youth Activities Director. Chosen out of 49 councils he also recalls vividly the when he received the Mississippi Family of the Year Award. Danny says "It was my first year to go to the State Convention, the award was unexpected and both Bishops were there to congratulate me. After he had been a Knight for about 6 months he was appointed Financial Secretary by Supreme Council and served in that position until he resigned to run for the Office of Grand Knight. Danny to a large extent had contributed much toward the success of parish Bingo.

In Grand Knight Lechner's first term Dan Carrol took over his duties as Financial secretary. Robert Corcoran, Chairman of Community Activities lead the council in conducting a hurricane relief drive for the victims in Fla and La and coordinated a clothing drive for the Battered Wives and Children's Center. With Matemo Yapit, Chairman Family Activities, council organized participation in the Chair of Prayer program in support of Pro-Life. Youth Activities Chairman, Daniel Carroll members served as leaders in the Boy Scout program. They also worked with parish Catholic Youth Ministry to raise funds for its trip to see the Pope in Denver, Colorado.

2nd term for Danny Lechner Grand Night He began with a speech which included a eulogy to the recently deceased Brother George Pitts. In the speech the Grand Knight laid out the goals of the council for the coming year goals that to be fulfilled would require the enthusiastic involvement of the brotherhood.

It was a busy year for the council continuing the projects begun in earlier years. Something new was a Community Recognition Night organized by Community Activities Chairman, Bob Corcoran.

At the conclusion of his second term Grand Knight Danny Lechner received the Knights of Columbus international organization's top honor for the 1993-1994 fraternal year. The Star Council Award overall excellence in the areas of membership recruitment and retention, promotion of the fraternal insurance program and sponsorship of service activities. The announcement was first made by the Knights of Columbus headquarters located in New Haven, Connecticut and then presented to the membership by the state deputy. In his announcement, Virgil C. Dechand, president of international said, " Please accept my sincere congratulations upon attaining this prestigious award. The dedication to the principles and aims of the Order shown by your officers and members is exemplified by the high standard of excellence you have achieved." Grand Knight Danny Lechner proclaimed " The Star Council Award is for us. We're extremely proud of an honor accomplishment."

As of December 1994 Steven Farry had been in the Knights 49 years. This year will be celebrating his Golden Jubilee. The council has 86 members and Jim Rigsby is one of 3 generations of Knights in the council. There are four Honorary Life Members, Fr Farrell, Fr Mockler, Steve Farry, and Norris Haltli.

Dan Butler, a United States Marine Corp Gunnery Sergeant, is the current Grand Knight. In 1992 he transferred from a council in Ratoul, Ill. Dan fondly remembers how when he first arrived in Mississippi in the winter '92 the heater had gone out in the camper in which he was living and it was Brother George Pitts, the knight that he was, who came to his rescue. Grand Knight Butler has served council 9409 as a program director and a Past Deputy Grand Knight. He is stressing what his predecessors have been striving for since the councils inception namely a closer working relationship within the organization and cohesive work with in the parish organizations culminating in a stronger community for everyone.

AT THE END OF THE 1994-1995 FRATERNAL YEAR, MISSISSIPPI RANKED #1 IN HIGHEST PER CENT GAIN IN CIRCLE DEVELOPMENT AND #1 IN HIGHEST PER CENT GAIN IN MEMBERSHIP WORLDWIDE. NOW, IN THE 1995-1996 FRATERNAL YEAR, WE ARE STILL RANKED AT THE TOP OF OUR DIVISION #6 WITH TOTAL MEMBERS GAINED AND PER CENT GAINED AND WE HAVEN'T FELL FROM THAT POSITION NOT ONCE DURING THE FRATERNAL YEAR.

WE HAVE HAD SOME GREAT SERVICE WORK PERFORMED BY OUR SQUIRES. THEY HAVE BEEN ACTIVE IN HELPING THE ELDERLY AT NURSING HOMES, HOSPITALS, AND HELPING THOSE THAT ARE SHUT-INS. THEIR PARTICIPATION IN CHURCH ACTIVITIES HAS SOARED TO ITS HIGHEST LEVEL EVER. WHEN A YOUNGMAN BECOMES A SQUIRE HE IS ASKED BY HIS NEW BROTHER SQUIRES TO PERFORM CERTAIN DUTIES. ONE OF THESE BEING TO BECOME AN ALTER SERVER SO THAT HE MAY BETTER SERVE OUR LORD AT MASS AND IN HIS EVERYDAY LIFE. IN MEMBERSHIP FOR THE PAST 5 YEARS, THE SQUIRES HAVE GROWN IN LEAPS AND BOUNDS. IN THEIR ACTIVITIES WITHIN THEIR COMMUNITIES, THE SQUIRES HAVE EXEMPLIFIED THE ACTIONS OF THE YOUNG CATHOLIC GENTLEMEN THAT THEY TRULY ARE. FOR THE FRATERNAL YEARS FROM 1992 THROUGH 1995, OCEAN SPRINGS CIRCLE 2852 WON IT'S THIRD IN A ROW CORP DE ELITE AWARD, WITH LAUREL CIRCLE 3768 AND GULFPORT CIRCLE 3091 ALSO WINNING CORP DE ELITE AWARDS ONCE EACH OVER THE PAST 6 YEARS.

CURRENTLY THERE ARE 7 SQUIRE CIRCLES IN MISSISSIPPI, THEY ARE AS FOLLOWS, OCEAN SPRINGS CIRCLE 2852, GULFPORT CIRCLE 3091, LAUREL CIRCLE 3768, LIZANA CIRCLE 3872, PICAYUNE CIRCLE 4234, KILN CIRCLE 4251, AND LUMBERTON-POPLARVILLE CIRCLE. THANKS TO THE HARD WORK AND PLANNING OF THE WORTHY GRAND KNIGHT, MR. WILSON JOHN, AND THE WORTHY DISTRICT

DEPUTY CURT STANSEY, THE REALITY OF HAVING A SQUIRE CIRCLE SPONSORED BY THE LUMBERTON-POPLARVILLE COUNCIL TOOK PLACE ON MARCH 3, 1996. ELEVEN YOUNGMEN SAID YES TO THE CALL ON BECOMING A SQUIRE. THERE ARE SEVERAL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS COUNCILS THAT ARE CURRENTLY CONSIDERING SPONSORSHIP OF A SQUIRE CIRCLE IN THEIR AREA. A CHALLENGE HAS BEEN SENT OUT TO ALL COUNCILS IN OUR STATE TO SPONSOR A SQUIRE CIRCLE. THE GREATEST ACTIVITY A COUNCIL CAN PARTICIPATE IN IS THE SPONSORSHIP OF A COLUMBIAN SQUIRE CIRCLE. THERE IS NO BETTER WAY TO SHARE OUR LOVE FOR GOD, OUR BROTHER KNIGHTS, OUR FAMILIES, AND COMMUNITY, THAN TO SHARE IT WITH THE YOUNG CATHOLIC GENTLEMEN KNOWN AS THE COLUMBIAN SQUIRES OF MISSISSIPPI.

ON JANUARY 27, 1996, OUR STATE SQUIRE OFFICERS TRAVELED TO OCEAN SPRINGS FOR THEIR FIRST MEETING OF THE YEAR. THEY ARE TRULY A CIRCLE THAT LIVES UP TO THEIR MOTTO OF "ESTO DIGNUS".

THE FIRST STATE SQUIRES CONVENTION WAS HELD THIS PAST FRATERNAL YEAR AND WAS HOSTED BY THE LAUREL CIRCLE 3768 AND THE LAUREL COUNCIL 2180. THEIR WAS A FOOTBALL GAME IN THE PARK, A BASKETBALL GAME AT THE PARISH HALL, AND A VOLLEY BALL GAME IN THE PARKING LOT. AROUND 5:00 P.M., THEY ALL GATHERED AT IMMACULATE CONCEPTION CATHOLIC CHURCH TO GIVE THANKS TO OUR LORD FOR A BEAUTIFUL AND PRODUCTIVE DAY THAT THEY ALL SPENT TOGETHER. EACH SQUIRE CIRCLE AND NEWLY ELECTED STATE OFFICERS WERE RECOGNIZED BY OUR COUNCIL CHAPLIN FATHER KEN RAMON-LANDRY. FOR THEIR OUTSTANDING WORK PERFORMED OVER THE PAST YEAR. AND HE BLESSED THEM THAT THEY MAY CONTINUE TO PERFORM THEIR DUTIES FOR MANY YEARS TO COME. AFTER MASS WAS CELEBRATED, THEY ALL

RETURNED TO THE PARISH HALL WHERE THEY SAID THEIR FAREWELLS TO ONE ANOTHER, ONLY UNTIL THEY MEET AGAIN ON THE PLAYING FIELD AT PICAYUNE.
