PROCEEDINGS OF THE 85TH ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Friday, April 28, 1989

The 85th Annual State convention of Mississippi State Council, Knights of Columbus was convened at 6:00 p.m. with State Deputy Dennis E. Ladnier, Sr. calling the meeting to order. After the opening prayer by State Chaplain Father Anthony Arguelles and pledge of allegiance to our flag led by John P. Myers, Fourth Degree Master, convention chairman Gerry Clark of Jackson, MS introduced Mayor Danks who welcomed the Knights of Columbus to the city of Jackson, MS.

State Secretary Marvin L. Lott gave response on behalf of the State Council to remarks by Mayor Danks. State Deputy Dennis E. Ladnier, Sr. officially called the convention to order at 6:20 p.m.

JOHN T. SAVAGE COUNCIL 848 JACKSON GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

My Brother Knights:

There follows a report of my stewardship as Grand Knight of the above-named council during the fraternal year 1988-89.

MEMBERSHIP

As of January 1, 1989, our Council's membership stood at 127. Of this number, 95 are classified as active insurance and associate members while 32 are in the inactive insurance category. Our honorary and honorary life membership remains static at 30.

With the passing of each year, our council continues on its path to increasing old age with no young blood to take the place of normal attrition due to death and other causes. In the active category the median age is 60.

There are now five councils in the Jackson metropolitan area with the possibilty of another being chartered in the near future. Four of the councils are affilliated each with a parish leaving our council in the status of "at large". This condition makes it difficult for us to recruit new members because it limits us to a much smaller field of recruitment. Another factor which has caused us concern is the lack of interest on the part of our male society to accept fraternal orders such as ours. This is not unique to the Knights of Columbus according to some accounts. We have tried in various ways to induce men to join our Order, but with little success.

Of greater concern is the lack of attendance and support on the part of our membership at meetings and projects that require membership participation. At times, we have barely enough members to form a quorum. In spite of this, those of us who are active manage to keep up the enthusiasm and spirit and not yet ready to throw in the towel.

SERVICE PROGRAMS

Like many other councils, we have suffered from inroads made by professional bingo parlors into our cash flow. As a result, it was necessary to adopt a bare bones policy where expenses were concerned. This, of course, had a bearing on our projects to the extent of limiting our efforts to those requiring the least amount of expense. Despite that, we still have managed to continue with those projects which will enable our council to be considered for Honor Council recognition. This was accomplished with only a handfull of dedicated members. We still maintain our covered dish suppers every first Tuesday of the month at which time the men plan projects for the future and the Ladies Auxiliary does its planning. The weekly steak suppers and bingo continue to sustain us, but for how long no one knows. Our annual invitational basketball tournament for elementary grades in January and the annual KC Memorial Scholarship Bowl in November have been successful ventures and we plan to continue with them as long as we can. The Tootsie Roll Drive has been, as always, very successful as far as this Council is concerned, mainly due to the efforts of our chairman, Gerry Graham, who has served in this capacity since its beginning. Considering the status of our membership, we have enjoyed fair success in the Service Program.

THE FUTURE

We are going through some tough times and the future holds little promise of success for our Council. Declining membership and revenues have forced us to accept the fact that we must divest ourselves of our council hall and the property we own. We have many decisions facing us, the least of which is, where do we go should we be successful in the sale of our property. Will we continue as a council? Will we rebuild? As the Council's Grand Knight it is incumbent on me to remain optimistic and confident and instill in our members the spirit of survivorship like phoenix the legendary bird that rose out of the ashes to live again.

This is in Convent, Louisiana. Members of our Council served in Renew groups and promoted this Church activity. Our Council continues to contribute to each "special collection" in our Parish. STATE DEPUTY'S REPORT

It gives me great pleasure to report on the status of the order in our jurisdiction for the fraternal year 1988-1989. Briefly I shall give you an account of my stewardship of the office that you have entrusted to me. I hope to point out the attempts we have made, our accomplishments we enjoyed as well as our failures. I ask that you make notes on the points I bring to your attention. They will not all apply to all councils on all subjects.

As State Deputy I was required to attend the State Deputy School in New Haven on June 9-12. My wife and I were treated royally again this year. I was kept very busy but learned a lot about the function of the Supreme office. The staff at Supreme were very helpful and could not do enough for the State Deputies. Saturday evening Anna Mae and I attended Mass at St. Mary's and sat in the Mississippi Pew. The New Knights of Columbus flag was unveiled at this meeting in New Haven.

The organizational meeting was held in Biloxi Saturday July 23 and Sunday July 24. The installation of the State Officers was held at St. John's Catholic Church at Sunday Morning Mass. The New installation of the State Officers has a greater meaning now because our wives are invited to share in this special occasion. Since the Knights of Columbus is a "Family Organization", to have our wives share in the installation adds to the meaning. In the new ceremony the Bishop, State Chaplain and the Immediate Past State Deputy take part in the ceremony. The information I received at Supreme and the regular programs of the state was shared with all in attendance, with some modifications from last year.

The Schools of Columbianism were held in three areas of the State. North, Central and the South with good attendance at most. The information received at these schools help new officers in the performances of their duties.

Your State Deputy along with Past State Deputy Wiley Price, State Treasurer Daniel Farrell and Brother Joseph Goellner attended the One Hundred and Sixth Supreme Convention in Vancouver British Columbia on August 2-4. At the States Dinner we had fourteen members and their wives from Mississippi. The Picture of Our Lady of Pochaiv was received at the Convention for the Marian Hour of Prayer devotion around the State.

As your State Deputy I attended the Supreme mid-winter meetings in Chicago. The Board of Directors voted to keep the "Share the Spirit" campaign for another year. This year we will honor all the clergy in the State when we have initiations. All brother Knights should get a new member so they can receive a medallion of the Pope. This will continue through the end of the year.

On the State of the Order in Mississippi I would like to focus on two areas. One being "membership": we had a good year in recruiting. The second area that is great concern to me is "suspensions". We must stay on top of this and get our retention committee's in all councils working. If we let a member get to far behind in their dues, and non-attendance at meetings, we are going to loose this member. This year up to April 1, we had recruited 272 members but lost 186 due to suspensions. It seems that some councils have been carrying members for years and this year they decided to clean their books. We had these councils send in 15 suspensions at a time. I was very disappointed with this because all year I have been trying to stop suspensions. At the beginning of the year I had set goals of meeting or surpassing Supreme guidlines and putting Mississippi in the Number One spot in our Division with no more suspensions so we could move up from the present seventh position.

On ceremonials we have one Second Degree team and another studying the Parts. We only have one Third Degree team, but we have books to start a new one in the Jackson Area. This will help when the team is ready and start initiating Knights into the Third Degree.

On new Councils we have one new Council, but we still need two more to meet our goal of three. Mississippi is one of the few Jurisidictions that does not have at least one college Council. We are working on a college Council in the Northern part of the State. The St. Ann's Council in Lizana is our newest Council. It was instituted on December 18, 1988. It's Number is 9958 and First Grand Knight is Patrick H. Hedden.

The State programs have been satisfactory, but we still need paperwork done this year so Councils will win Supreme awards.

The State Newsletter, the "Magnolia Knight" is still looked forward to being received at Supreme as they like to read it. I will leave it to the Public Relations Chairman to give a more detailed report later in the convention.

I have visited as many Councils and Districts and possible with the responsibilities of making a living. The Councils showed me honor and respect for the high office I hold as State Deputy that my fellow brothers elected me to. The office of the State Deputy is always open to an invitation to any Council function. Some will be attended and some the State Deputy will regretfully turn down. This year the other State Officers made many visits for me that I could not attend. I thank them very much for doing this for me.

In reference to the Fraternal Activities Survey Forms submitted to Supreme, 32 Councils sent theirs in, leaving 12 Councils that did not submit these forms. This was another area that I wanted 100% participation in. This is one of the most important reports that is made, it is the report that helps us keep our tax free status.

The past year Supreme Council awards for 1987-1988 were presented. The Mississippi Jurisdiction had 23 Councils of its 44 to receive an award. Eleven Councils received the Columbian award, 3 Councils received the Founders award, 5 Councils the Father McGivney award and 10 Councils the Star Council award. These Councils were: Southaven, Pearl, Tupelo and Woolmarket, Meridian, Biloxi, Pascagoula, Laurel, Leland, and Cleveland. Congratulations are in order to these Councils for the Achievement. The participation in these award programs is great, however, with the changes in the rules from Supreme, we can certainly do better. The following Councils have won the New Knights of Columbus Flag this year: Meridian, Biloxi, Bay St. Louis, Gulfport, Laurel, Leland, Cleveland, Starkville, Picayune, Kiln, Southaven, Gulfport O.G., Columbus, Holly Springs, Corinth, Gautier, West Biloxi, West Point, Madison and Woolmarket. I would like to congratulate these Councils on winning this beautiful flag.

In the contest of Champions, the Pascagoula Council won for highest net gain, and the Madison Council won on percentage. We also had one of our Councils receive a certificate from Supreme for making the top ten. This Council was Gulfport who was in the top ten in Youth Activities.

In closing, I would like to thank all who worked with me over this past year. STATE ADVOCATE'S REPORT

It has been my honor and privilege to serve you as State Advocate during the last two fraternal years. The office of State Advocate has allowed me to meet and serve my Brother Knights throughout the jurisdiction of Mississippi. My close relationships with the men of the Knights of Columbus has given me a greater love and devotion to the purposes of the Order.

During the last two years I have been able to meet with Brothers throughout the State to hear their concerns, answer their questions, and attempt to increase their knowledge regarding legal and Constitutional matters. Some of the more memorable events this year for me were the Installation of Officers and Organizational Meeting on July 23-24 in Biloxi. I also attended the Schools of Columbianism in Gulfport in July, 1988, and in Clinton and Clarksdale in August of 1988. These meetings were rewarding for me, because they allowed me to hear your concerns and questions and gave me the opportunity to answer them in a practical and meaningful manner.

Other memorable moments were the Mid-Winter meeting in Jackson in December, 1988; the Mardi Gras Ball in Pascagoula in January, 1989; the Degree Work in Clinton in February, 1989 and in Clarksdale in March 1989; the Religious Appreciation Dinner in Southaven in February, 1989; and the cook-out in Laurel honoring PSD John Myers and Dr. William Carr on the occasion of their fiftieth year anniversary of membership in the Knights of Columbus in February, 1989. Unfortunately, due to employment and family obligations, I was not able to attend every function in the state. I do thank my Brothers

and their councils for their invitations and hospitality shown to me and my family throughout the State.

As you know the main role of the State Advocate is outlined in Article V, Section 4 of the Mississippi State Council By-Laws. During the past year my legal advice can be divided into two basic categories. One area has been to address individual council needs and the other to address matters of concern to all councils. Although confidentiality prevents me from mentioning specific councils or situations, I have been involved with individual councils with the following issues:

- 1. Incorporation
- 2. Election of Officers
- 3. Recording of Council Minutes
- 4. Reimbursements of Financial Secretaries
- 5. Nomination of Officers
- 6. Timelines for Elections
- 7. Proper Endorsement of Checks for a Council
- 8. Council Sales Tax Requirements
- 9. Limiting Term of Office

In regard to issues affecting all Councils I have attempted to address them in three projects:

- The State Advocate Report which was published in the August Magnolia Knight addressed five issues of importance to all Knights.
- 2. The issuance of an Incorporation Packet to all Grand Knights which included:
 - a. Council Home Corporation Guidelines
 - b. Articles of Incorporation
 - c. Corporation By-Laws
 - d. A Domestic Corporate Handbook, "Incorporating in Mississippi" from the Office of the Secretary of State.
- The State Advocate's Delegate Letter indicating selection of delegates and proper form of resolutions which was published in the Magnolia Knight.

I am proud to say I have adhered to the policy I started when I became State Advocate of giving individuals and Councils an answer to their questions in the shortest time possible. My answers have always been put in writing as well as a phone call when possible. My first allegiance as always has been to the laws of our order and their proper interpretation without regard to my own inclinations or personal views.

In closing I want to state how proud I am to have served you for the past two years. I am proud of our Order who upholds the dignity of life, the concept of family, the principles of the Catholic religion, the honor of the Pope, the need of the poor and needy, and the love of God in a time when it is easier to turn our head the other way. AWARDS/REPORT CHAIRMAN REPORT

Each year, many councils are eligible to be recognized for their efforts but fail to submit the requested paperwork. Still others miss out in qualifying for awards by not meeting one of the requirements. Many councils are not even aware that their programs activities and efforts could be recognized on a state or international level. All of the facts point out a need for more work and follow-through.

So what is the solution? There may be just not one solution, but many. I had it in my mind that I had the perfect solution and that was to notify each council when the report was due and where to obtain the proper form. Most councils did, but some were reluctant to do so. If any Brother Knight has a better solution, please notify the State Deputy or myself, so we can incorporate it in next year's program.

There are four report forms that have to be completed and mailed to the Supreme Office and a copy mailed to the State Deputy. Form 185 (Report of Council Officers), Form 1295 (Semi-Annual Audit Report), Form 365 (Service Program Personal Report) and Form 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report).

Form 185 (Council Officers Report) was due August 1, 1988. All councils did not make the
deadline. Some councils were late in submitting their report forms. This report is very important to Supreme and the State Council. Supreme needs the information so the proper material
can be sent to the Grand Knight, to help him perform his duties. Also the State Council needs
the information so the State Deputy can be printed and mailed to each person in need of the
information.

- Form 1295 (Semi-Annual Council Audit Report) was due August 15, 1988 and February 15, 1989. Some councils sent the report in time and some were late and as usual some councils were reluctant to send in any report at all.
- 3. Form 365 (Service Program Personal Report) was due September 1, 1988. Form 365 is a requirement for the Columbian, Father McGivney and Founders' Awards and requirement for the State Program Awards. As of November 18, 1988 some councils have not submitted the Service Program Personal Report. The Supreme Council mailing rosters are comprised of the individuals listed on this form. Failure to submit the report form will deprive the council directors and activity charimen of valuable information that will assist them in the performance of their duties.
- 4. Form 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report) was due March 31, 1989. Thirty-two (32) councils submitted reports, eleven (11) councils didn't submit any report and one (1) council was inactive. The Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity report is one of the most important due at Supreme. The information that Supreme receives from the report is used to retain our free tax status.

All these reports are mandatory requirements for the Mississippi Jurisdiction Program Activities. The first State Program was due in November 1988 and the second was due March 31, 1989. As usual the same problem occurs in the State Program report that occurs in the Supreme reports.

The State Awards Program is designed to guide and encourage participation on a local level in various program activities as suggested and described by the Supreme Council supplemented by the State Council. Each council was provided with a set of the State Awards Guidelines to be used by the various councils, committees to plan, and review the results of each year's program activities. This guideline is not a complete and thorough compilation of activities, but rather a set of suggestions that can be supplemented by local activities that would be of value to individual Councils.

The program year is defined as the time between April 1, 1988 thru March 31, 1989 inclusive. Only projects completed during this time period are eligible to be counted. The official reporting forms will be the Program Report Form which is attached to the guidelines. The reporting form for the "Best" vocations activity, however, will simply be plain paper as it is a dicocesean award.

Each council is required to submit two official reports to the State Program Director. In addition, each council is requested to submit the appropriate sections of the Program report of the State Activity Director for that particular area. The final report is due with a postmark on or before April 1, 1989. Reports submitted after this date will not qualify for Distinguished Council Awards. The awards requirement changes in the rules governing the Father McGivney and Founders Awards for the 1988-89 fraternal year will not affect the 1988-89 State Fraternal year.

Supreme Awards requirement changes in the rules governing the Father McGivney and Founders Awards for the 1988-89 fraternal year are as follows:

 Under the new rules, to win the Father McGivney Award for membership recruitment and retention, a council must submit the Service Program Personal Report Form (365-nc) by September 1 and attain a 5% net gain in membership during the fraternal year. Councils no longer need to meet the requirements of a First Degree Team or the exemplification of two degrees during that time. In addition, councils are no longer required to submit an application for the award.

- Similarly, the Founders' Award will be presented to those councils that submit the Service Program
 Personal Report Form (365-nc) by September 1 and record a 2.5% net gain in insurance during the fraternal year. There is no longer a required insurance information program or Founders'
 Award Application.
- Even though the requirements have changed, councils are urged to continue to form their own First Degree Team and conduct frequent exemplifications. Councils should continue to conduct insurance programs for members and their families.
- 4. Requirements for the Columbian Award remain the same. A council must submit the Service Program Personal Form (365-nc) by September 1 and the Survey of Fraternal Activity Form (1728) by March 13, 1989. Then, the council must conduct and report by June 30, 1989 at least four major involvement programs in each of the following areas of the Service Programs: Church, Community, Council, Family and Youth.
- 5. In order to attain Star Council status, a council must win all three awards, Columbian, Founders', and Father McGivney. Keep these award requirement changes in mind and meet your membership and insurance quotas early. Questions concerning the council awards programs or the changes in requirements should be directed to the Supreme Council Department of Fraternal Services.

All reports to qualify for the Columbian and Star Council Award are due in before June 30, 1989. All the information has already been done, because the same information has been completed for the State Awards Programs.

Let's make Mississippi 100% in the fraternal year 1989-90. It can be done but everybody has to do his part.

In the last 10 years the assets of the Order have increased by 217.64%. This during a period of time when uncertainty in many industries prevailed.

The insurance in force during this same period increased by 216.73% and the total premium income increased by 309.80%. Measured by any standards, these were remarkable and noteworthy feats.

The insurance dividends were disbursed as per instructions of the insured. Some take their dividends in cash, some allow them to accumulate at interest. Many even use their dividends to purchase additional insurance, thereby enabling them to enhance the amount of protection of their policies, without additional outlays of premium.

It is interesting to note that with over \$14 billion of life insurance in force, and the exposure to death claims that this figure represents, we paid more in dividends to living members than we did in death claims to beneficiaries. This despels the old notion that life insurance is a "Die to Win" proposition.

We hope that this fact sheet will enlighten some, reinforce others and encourage all to participate in

"Your Fraternal Insurance Program." There is no reason why any member should seek protection elsewhere.

The 1988-1989 state program year was again a very productive one. The Mississippi jurisdiction has 42 functioning councils as of April 1, 1989. Of these 42 functioning councils 29 submitted program results. This is a 70% participating rate. A breakdown of councils filing reports is as follows:

There were 7 Distinguished Councils and 22 Honor Councils.

Thirteen councils did not submit reports.

Once again, as last year, the two major obstacles keeping councils from obtaining Distinguished Status were membership and not having a First Degree Team. Eleven councils with First Degree Teams did not receive Distinguished Status due to the lack of membership recruitment and/or retention. The second element was the lack of First Degree Teams. Of the twenty-two councils receiving Honor Status, eleven do not have First Degree Teams. Of these eleven councils not having First Degree Teams, eight met their membership quotas. It is a desire of this Program Committee that membership recruitment and retention will always remain a vital part of our State Program Competition. It is also a recommendation of this committee that the requirement of a First Degree Team for Distinguished Council Status be eliminated and reduced to a Special Bonus Point (100 pts.) status.

The Schools of Columbiansim are vital workshops of learning for the Mississippi State Jurisdiction. The Program Committee recognizes that those councils who attend these workshops have an easier time promoting Columbianism through their programs and their recruitment efforts. We strongly urge continuing this program for the betterment of Columbianism in the Mississippi State Jurisdiction.

I would like to thank the five Program Chairmen who worked very hard throughtout this year to make our awards program the success it has been. I would also like to thank all the councils I visited this year for their hospitality, especially Clarksdale Council 2969, Clinton Council 7854, and Gulfport Council 1583 for hosting our Schools of Columbianism. Lastly, I would like to thank our Worthy State Deputy Brother Dennis "Doc" Ladnier for having allowed me to serve as State Program Chairman. It has been a pleasure and honor to serve under him.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP R. O. GEROW MEMORIAL FUND

Now that we have reached our long awaited goal of \$500,000 and exceeded it by \$7,764, we are now on our way to our next goal --\$1,000,000. The total since 1953 is \$549,895.

The Diocese of Jackson received \$20,911 this year.

The Diocese of Biloxi received \$21,220 this year.

The Fourth Degree Assemblies gave a total of \$5,525 this year and a cumulative total of \$21,349. Their generous donations are greatly appreciated. The Ladies Auxiliaries have given a total of \$650 making a grand total of \$3,675 since they started participating in the program.

The two trophies authorized by the State were as follows: Msgr. P.J. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE STATE MEMBERSHIP DIRECTOR

The Fraternal Year of the Mississippi Jurisdiction for 1988-1989 is almost over. Only three months April, May and June are left in phase II of the Share the Spirit Membership Campaign. We have passed the half-way mark and are heading down the home stretch.

The March 1, 1989 report shows the Mississippi Jurisdiction new member intake goal is 8%. The Mississippi quota is 374 new members. The new member intake since January 1, 1989 is 51 members. New members needed to attain this goal are 323.

The current net gain standings in Recruitment Retention Rewards places us seventh in division five and shows a net gain of 55 new members. These figures point out once again that our biggest problem in membership is retention of members. Much has been done in the past to confront this problem, of retention of members, however it is still with us. A strong and active membership retention committee can have a vital role in solving this problem.

I am happy to report that 33 councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction have been council active. This can come about in our Jurisdiction by the recruiting of at least one new member during the Fraternal Year. I am distressed to report that ten councils have not added a member during this fraternal year as of the date March 1, 1989, I do hope that this number will change, to the positive, for all councils. We hope Mississippi will be included in the number reported by the Supreme Convention this year which will recognize those Jurisdictions with "every council active". Remember "SHARE THE SPIRIT", HONOR THE CLERGY.

The Department of Fraternal Services has sent me a preliminary listing of the winners of the Flag in the "Share the Spirit" membership campaign of 1988, which ended December 31, 1988. I am proud to say that twenty councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction qualified for the flag. The supply department has begun to forward the flags to the Grand Knights of each winning council. Sincere congratulations!!!

The goal of the "SHARE THE SPIRIT" Campaign is still simply as stated by the Supreme Office, every Knight sharing the spirit of the Knights of Columbus in honor of our clergy, bishops, chaplains,

and parish priests. We, thus, demonstrate in a pratical way the true "Fraternal Spirit". The three "R's" of membership, as I have stated before (1) Recruit new members, (2) Retain present members, (3) Reinstate former members will help complete phase II of the Share the Spirit program.

I wish to call to your attention what is being done to assist the membership in the ongoing effort to secure new members . The order has membership promotion material available at no cost to you or your council. It only has to be ordered by your council. One of these new items being developed is a wallet-size version of the popular recruiting flip-chart.

Even with these recruitment tools it still boils down to one-on-one recruiting. Men do not join without being asked on an individual basis with a one-on-one presentation and they desrve to be asked in this way.

I recall your attention that now the Orders Emblem is to be worn by all members including first and second degree members. Since many members do not advance to the Second and Third Degrees of the Order the board of directors has revised the ceremonials to permit all First Degree members to wear the emblem.

I would like to thank the councils which I have visited this year for their respective hospitality. Thanks to all my brother Knights of the Mississippi Jurisdiction for accepting my contribution to the advancement of Columbianism. I thank all ten district deputies for allowing me to be a part of the effort they have put forth.

My sincere thanks to State Deputy Dennis E. "Doc" Ladnier, Sr. for allowing me to serve this Fraternal Year as State Membership Director. We have not accomplished everything that we set out to do. However it is my hope that my service has been satisfactory and that he is pleased with the effort of his team. Remember it takes teamwork and cooperation from all brother knights to assure the Orders continued growth and activity in the future.

STATE VOCATIONS COMMITTEE'S REPORT

In the area of vocations most Councils have some program besides their contribution to the Priest Education Fund. but now is the time for each individual, each Council, to ask, "Is it enough?"

The Pascagoula Council, No. 1605, besides their donation to the Priest Education Fund, their two seminarians that they have adopted and assist monetarily monthly, have adopted the Deaconate Program.

Out of their charitable hearts they have decided to assist Deacon Martin Finnegan with contributions (since its inception a year ago they have donated in excess of a thousand dollars) and in other ways have assisted the entire Deaconate Program. You see, Deacon Martin Finnegan, in spite of his small salary is using the money to assist the permanent deacon program.

In talking to Deacon Finnegan I discovered the need for such a program.

The Permanent Deacon Fund is very much in need of assistance. It has been ten years since the last deacons were ordained. In that class of 13 candidates 10 were ordained, a very good percentage, so we can see the good of the Deaconate Program. Most of the ordained deacons we have and the list of prospective candidates are members of the Knights of Columbus.

It takes between \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year for 3 to 4 years to educate and ordain a deacon. Also, this fund is used for retreats, days of recollection, continuous education and various other programs for deacons for the benefit of the Diocese.

This information is compiled from the Biloxi Diocese and I imagine the Jackson Diocese has the same or greater need as Biloxi so we can see a need for assistance.

The number of priests is steadily on the decline, so we can see that the need for deacons is very real.

I would like to see other councils take up this program and eventually promote the need of assistance statewide.

STATE CEREMONIAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As the Ceremonial Chairman for the State of Mississippi, I am again happy to report that degree work in the state has been good for the past fraternal year (1988-1989). Four (4) major Exemplifications were held in the state. This is a repeat of the 1987-88 fraternal year.

Our first major Exemplification was scheduled for early September in Clinton. Unfortunately, this had to be cancelled due to lack to interest, ie. not enough candidates to subsidize (finance) the Degree.

Biloxi Council #1244 hosted a First, Second, and Third Degree on October 23, 1988. Forty-six (46) members were advanced into full knighthood. Biloxi conducted the First Degree, and the Third Degree was performed by the New Orleans Degree Team.

On February 12, 1989, Clinton Council #7854 hosted a Second and Third Degree. Thirty-four (34) candidates received full knighthood. The Pascagoula Degree Team performed both degrees.

On March 12, 1989, two Exemplifications were held simultaneously in the State. One was held in

Clarksdale where thirty-four (34) candidates received the First, Second, and Third Degrees. The other Degrees was held in Bay St. Louis. Thirty-four (34) candidates also completed their Second and Third Degrees. The Arkansas Degree Team performed in Clarksdale, and the Pascagoula Degree Team was in Bay St. Louis.

The Pascagoula Third Degree Team also traveled out of state to Mobile, Alabama and conducted a Third Degree on March 5, 1989. Nineteen (19) were inducted into full knighthood.

I was honored to serve as the Conferring Officer for every Degree noted except the one in Clarksdale, Mississippi.

All of the host councils are to be commended for their excellent fraternal hospitality during the planning and conducting of these degrees.

Membership is the life-blood of our fraternity. We need to have more Degree work in the State . We also need another Third Degree team, and an additional Conferring Officer (per Supreme) in the State.

I encourage every Council to consider organizing an active Second and/or Third Degree Team. Participating on a Team is hard work, but a lot of fun. It can be a catalyst to strengthen and bring a Council together.

I would also like to mention that at last year's convention, a resolution was proposed to generate money to support degree work in the state. This resolution was turned over to the State Deputy for further study. To my knowledge, no action has been taken. I respectfully request that the new State Officers consider some means of financially supporting degree work in the state, and ease the burden of the host Councils.

MENTAL RETARDATION PROGRAM REPORT

The Knights of Columbus in Mississippi have had another successful Tootsie Roll Drive for the Mentally Retarded in Mississippi. This money will be distributed to over 75,000 mentally retarded persons in Mississippi. We will send everyone a final distribution report when we receive all of the data from the councils.

We want to thank each and every Knight, their families, and their friends of the Knights of Columbus,

and the Mississippi Association for Retarded Citizens, for all of their hard work in helping others who cannot help themselves. We set a goal of \$88,000.00 in 1988. We did not achieve this goal, but with your enthusiasm and devotion to this projecct, we collected a net income of \$68, 765.13.

The Mississippi State Council will again act as the Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi. I have asked the District Deputies to act as District Chairmen for the 1988 program.

The District Deputies will present this program to the Grand Knights at their District Meeting in January. The Grand Knights are asked to present the program to the membership at a council meeting prior to the Drive.

The Grand Knights should have appointed a Local Chairman and sent his name and address to me. We ask your serious consideration in selecting a Local Chairman, and give him your full support and aid in selecting his Committee Chairman.

We have set a Net Income Goal of \$75,853.88 for the State of Mississippi in 1989. We should achieve this goal if we maintain our enthusiasm in this program. We hope that each and every one of you will visit your local Mentally Retarded Association and see how your contribution has helped that organization. If you need any stimulation in this program, that visit will be all that you will need. Not every Council participated last year. We hope that every council will participate this year.

The State Deputy presents a trophy to the Council that collects the largest net income per member. The Corinth Council won the trophy with a net income per member of \$173.14. The State Deputy will present the highest gross income per Council Trophy to the Tupelo Council. They collected a gross income of \$12,117.39. We all want to congratulate this fine Council for their extraordinary work for the Mentally Retarded in Mississippi.

The proceeds of this drive will be sent to us and we will deposit your proceeds in an account for the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi. The co-signers of this account will be the State Deputy and the State Directors. When you send your Council Disbursement Fund Request Form to us with your Federal Tax Exempt letter, we will return your funds immediately. Remember, ALL funds must be disbursed prior to June 30, 1989.

This year we ask you to use the week of May 1st through May 7th to collect for this drive. The first part of the week is for business donations and Friday the 5th and Saturday the 6th for city-wide drive. Our insurance for workers collecting for this drive will only be in effect on Friday, May 5th and Saturday May 6th.

Twenty-five percent (25%) of the net will be for the State Council Retarded Program and seventy-five percent (75%) of the net for local council retarded programs. The money raised must be spent to aid in the area of mental retardation and only that area.

Remember, with every two cases of Tootsie Rolls you receive one cap and one cannister bank free. Additional caps and cannisters may be ordered at a nominal cost, but don't wait until the last minute. If aprons are needed they can be ordered from N. Henry and Sons, Inc., 1644 N. Honore Street, Chicago, IL 60622. The cost of the aprons is \$3.50 each, plus \$1.50 handling charge per order - and postage - (United Parcel Service). Direct your correspondence to the attention of Mr. David you Bergen.

All monies less the cost of Tootsie Rolls and aprons should be forwarded to the State Co-Chairman

immediately on completion of the drive. Billing for Tootsie Rolls and aprons will be to the ordering individual (council) and they should be paid for at the level with monies withheld from the total receipts for that purpose only - no other monies can be expended. Strict control by councils should be exercised in all areas of this program. Tootsie Roll orders of 50 cases or more will be sent freight prepaid - smaller councils can consolidate their orders through their District Deputy and take full advantage of prepaid freight. The interest on savings paid all of the expenses of the 1988 State Mental Retardation Program.

A program outline, along with a set of guidelines and sample proclamation, is enclosed for your convenience to promote the drive. As soon as the project is completed, send all monies to State Co-Chairmen, Ricky Nause and Dave Atteberry, with report forms as indicated.

A full report will be made to all members in every council as soon as the project is completed. If you have any questions or difficulties, please contact us. I would appreciate it if you would invite me to your council to help explain this program.

SERVICE PROGRAMS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Program Committee meeting was called to order at 1:00 P.M., April 29, 1989, by State Program Director Greg Niolet. Topics discussed include:

- 1. Changes in report format
- 2. Changes of dates of membership requirement
- 3. Rules for newsletter awards
- 4. First Degree Team requirement and Insurance Night Requirement

Changes of Report Format

It was brought to the attention of committee members that the report was confusing to many Council Program Directors. A new program report format was intorduced to committee members and was very well received.

Changes in Dates of Membership Requirements

There is a real problem which exists in our State Program with regard to the membership requirement. We as a state family have always started our membership requirement on April 1 and ended on March 31. The Supreme Reports received each month by Grand Knights reflects membership from July 1 to June 1. This committee voted to change the dates of our membership requirement from the April 1 to March 31 period to a period July 1 to March 31. The three months April, May, and June will no longer count (gain or losses) toward State Program competition.

Rules for Newsletter Competition

In past years the Program Committee has had very few rules for competing in our Newsletter Competition. A set of rules was written by myself and other Knights to be brought up to the committee. Brother Hank Kajdan, our Magnolia Knight editor, also submitted a set of guidelines for the Newsletter Competition. Both sets of rules were turned down by the committee. REPORT OF THE MASTER, FOURTH DEGREE MISSISSIPPI DISTRICT

To the 85th Annual Convention of the Mississippi State Council Knights of Columbus - April 29, 1989 - Jackson, Mississippi:

The Fourth Degree membership in the Mississippi District seems to be holding its own. Since we have not had an exemplification in the District during 1988 the only decline we have had in membership is the deaths and a few suspsensions, but we have had some reinstatements, so the membership is not down very much. Since audit reports were due as of June 30, 1988, which showed the membership standing, it is impossible to tell at this time the exact membership in the District. An exemplification has been planned for Sunday, May 21, 1989, in Greenville and it is hoped that at least forty new members will be joining our ranks. Exemplifications were scheduled twice in 1988, but were cancelled due to the lack of candidates.

The Honor Guard continues to function in most all of the assemblies, at Masses, wakes, funerals and civic functions. There will be an ordination of a Seminarian in Hattiesburg on June 10, 1989, and we have permission to have an Honor Guard and all are invited to participate.

Councils in each District are within a reasonable travel distance which provides the opportunity to have scheduled First Degrees for all councils within the District with members of all councils participating on a First Degree Team and, Whereas:

District coordinated degrees would provide the opportunity for regularly scheduled degrees to be held in an intercouncil, fraternal atmosphere with increased participation by members and candidates and, Therefore Be It Resolved:

That two or more councils within a District may choose to form a District First Degree Team, without impeding the right of other councils to have a team within the council, and the participating councils may fulfill their First Degree Team requirement to qualify for State Program Awards by participation on the District First Degree Team as described within this resolution and, Be It Further Resolved:

That minimum council qualifications be that two or more members of each participating council shall perform one or more of the five major speaking parts and one member shall perform a nonspeaking part in a minimum of two First Degrees on the District Team during the State Program year and, Be It Further Resolved:
