PROCEEDINGS OF THE 86TH ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Friday, April 27, 1990

The 86th Annual State Convention of Mississippi State Council, Knights of Columbus was convened at 6:00 p.m. with State Deputy Marvin L. Lott calling the meeting to order. After the opening prayer by State Chaplain Father Frank Corcoran and Pledge of Allegiance to our flag led by John P. Myers, Fourth Degree Master; Convention Chairman, Gregory Niolet of Pass Christian, MS, introduced Mayor Halet who welcomed the Knights of Columbus to the City of Biloxi, MS.

The State Deputy called for all Grand Knights' reports to be turned in that had not been previously mailed before April 1, 1990. He also asked Mike Crandall, the Grand Knight from Madison Council 9543 and Jessie Quinn III, District Deputy of District No. 2 to read their reports.

State Deputy Lott related that Attorney General Mike Moore had established a 90 day grace period for Charitable Organizations to play Bingo. The Legislature will meet in a special session to decide the matter.

State Deputy Lott appointed Harry L. Steinwinder to chair the Financial Secretary's meeting at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday. He asked State Secretary Stanley M. Swentkowski to read the names of the delegates present.

Supreme Representative Ron Tracz made a few remarks. After announcements were made that were related to the evening's activities, the meeting was closed at 7:16 with a prayer by State Chaplain Father Frank Corcoran The delegates then adjourned for the state raffle and banquet.

Saturday Morning, April 28, 1990

The meeting opened by State Deputy Marvin L. Lott with a prayer said by State Chaplain Father Frank Corcoran. Master of the Fourth Degree, Pat Myers led the Pledge of Allegiance. Brother Ronald J. Tracz, Vice-President of Fraternal Activities for the Supreme Office was in attendance at this meeting. State Deputy Lott had committee reports turned in to be printed in the minute book along with Grand Knights' reports.

MSGR. JOHN J. BURNS COUNCIL 802 MERIDIAN GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

It should not come as a surprise to anyone the hardships and difficult times we have gone thru this year. The main reason was that our main fund raiser was almost eliminated by professionals in the city and as of late the suspension of all Bingo and raffles activities by the State Attorney Mike Moore.

It was in the late Spring, upon our return from the 1989 Convention that our programs continue to develop with the annual Tootsie Roll Drive. Our First Communion and Graduation Breakfast stopped? No, the Fourth Degree took on the financial part and the Knights did the rest with successful results.

I transferred to Council No. 7120 in the spring of 1987 and was elected Deputy Grand Knight for

When I transferred to No. 7120 in 1987, the council was lucky to get six to nine members to attend the council meetings. I had the honor and pleasure to serve under Brother Vic Hageman (Grand Knight 1988-1989). Brother Vic was a solid and stable leader. Vic was able to get to the punch line on every issue, and talked to me regularly in making it to "Past Grand Knight". At the time I never understood this. Believe me, now I do. Under Vic's term the attendance at our regular monthly meetings grew to an average of sixteen and eighteen members a meeting, out of a total roster of fifty-nine. Vic made a hard decision and cleaned up our membership roster with around eleven suspensions and we still

During my term as Grand Knight I continued to balance our financial statement. Now in two years we have all our bills paid and \$5200 in the bank. Most of this money came from our Christmas tree sales. Last December (1989) our council sold over \$19,000 worth of trees. Raised \$5748 profit, gave \$3120 to our churches out of this sale. This has helped unite three local parishes.

Our council has continued to erode. Our February meeting did not keep a legal quorum of twelve at the meeting to conduct business. We had only eleven. Since then our meetings have gotten back

STATE DEPUTY'S REPORT

Most Reverend Bishps, Reverend Father, Worthy State Officers, Worthy District Deputies, Delegates, and Brother Knights:

As I report on the status of the Order in our jurisdiction for the fraternal year 1989-1990, I do so with a great deal of humility. Briefly I shall give you an account of my stewardship of the office that you entrusted to me. I hope to point out the attempts we have made, our accomplishments, and our failures. I ask that you make notes on the points I bring to your attention. They will not apply to all councils on all subjects.

As State Deputy I was required to attend the State Deputy School in New Haven, Connecticut, on June 6, 1989. Both my wife and I enjoyed going to the Supreme Office. I was kept busy, but during this orientation I learned a lot about the function of the Supreme Office. I commend the staff at the Supreme Office for being very helpful in teaching me the ways of how to be a better State Deputy.

The organizational meeting was held in Cleveland, Mississippi, Saturday, July 15 and Sunday, July 16. 1989. The installation of the State Officers was held at Our Lady of Victories

Catholic Church at Saturday evening Mass. After Mass, all out-of-town guests were treated to a cocktail party with a dance afterwards. Let me clarify a few details at this moment concerning the expenses of this occasion. First of all, there were seven councils that donated money and a host of friends of the Knights of Columbus that donated not only their money but also their time to make everyone that came to Cleveland this weekend an enjoyable event. For those who may have wondered what the State Council paid, it was \$226. It never ceases to amaze me what people can do only if they unite for the same cause. At this time I would like to personally thank my home council, Council 5556, for making this weekend a memorable one to me as well as to my wife.

On August 1-3, 1989, as your State Deputy along with Past State Deputy Dennis Ladnier, State Treasurer Tom Zettler, and State Advocate Greg Niolet, I attended the One Hundred and Seventh Supreme Convention in Baltimore, Maryland. I would have to comment that not only did the delegates and wives enjoy themselves, but all the children that came with their parents from Mississippi really had a great time also.

After discussion with the State Officers concerning the School of Columbianism, the decision was made to have just one instead of three. The School of Columbianism was held in Jackson, Mississippi. Even though there were only 29 of 45 councils represented, it still turned out to be a very educational event. I would like at this time to commend George Harrison, who has a dual role with our State Council as State Warden and as State Program Director for a job well done concerning the one School of Columbianism. I would like to suggest that all councils in the future plan on making the school because it is very educational and has a worthwhile purpose.

As your State Deputy I attended the Supreme mid-winter meeting in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, on November 17-19, 1989. The Supreme Board of Directors voted that the theme from January 1, 1990 to December 31, 1990 would be "Share the Spirit: A Tribute to Our Founder, Father Michael J. McGivney." Let us as Knights of Columbus continue to pass on the Heritage that was given to us to other Catholic gentlemen. We must recruit new members for our Beloved Order to continue. Because it is said that if we don't bring new members into our Order, we will certainly just dry up. Look around, the average age of our Knights Statewide is in the mid to late fifties. If you don't recruit new members for us, then why not for the future generation to come after us. We must always remember what has been given to us is just a gift. We must take care of it so in turn we can give it to some other Catholic Gentlemen.

There are many aspects of the State of the Order in Mississippi that I would like to talk to you about. At this time, I will focus on several areas, one being "membership" and the other being "suspensions". This year since July 1, 1989 to April 1, 1990, the jurisdiction of Mississippi has recruited 330 new members, but due to suspension we have lost 208 giving us a net gain of 122 for nine months. It seems to me that some councils have been carrying members for several years just to get an award. I will not single out any one council but if the shoe fits then wear it. At the beginning of the year we all set goals for membership. I can truly say the 14 councils lived up to their expectations. They are the councils that we call "Top Gun" winners. These councils received and recruited at least a 10% increase in their membership. At this time as I name these councils, I would like for the delegates of these councils to please stand and remain standing until all have been named: Council No. 4472, 5556, 6592, 6765, 7087, 8058, 8848, 8912, 9094, 9124, 9409, 9543, 9673, 9959. Please give a hand of applause. Thank you and now you may be seated. Gentlemen, please take special attention that these councils just named set their goals at 10% and they held fast not for recognition for themselves but they do so for their beloved Order.

"Suspensions". We have always had to worry about this. But it seems this year that more and more

Catholic gentlemen left our order than ever before. I ask why? There must be some soul searching to find out why they left. There must have been something good that these men saw in our order to join. We must learn from this lesson. We must look and listen to keep our men in our ranks. Don't just let them sit on the sideline, let them play, give them something to do in our councils. Let them pick something out that they like to do and put them to work. Because it is the working man that is "happy" and the "idle" man that finds fault.

On ceremonials, with 10 District Deputies reporting, we've had a total of 38 lst Degrees through April 1. You are to be commended for a job well done. We have one 2nd Degree team and another studying the parts. We only have one 3rd Degree team but we have books to start another one in the Jackson area. With four 2nd and 3rd Degree exemplifications held so far this year (1) Biloxi, (2) Greenville, (3) Gulfport, (4) Clinton, I would at this time like to commend the Degree team Captain, Mr. Emmry Elder and his fine team from Pascagoula for a job well done. They went out of their way this year to aid in promoting Columbianism. Again a personal thank you to each of you! We must in the future look for another Degree team to aid in offsetting expenses as well as aiding in the recruitment of new members.

On new council development we have one new council, but we still need two more to meet our goal of three that Supreme has set for us. The St. Paul's Council No. 10216 in Brandon, Mississippi is our new council. It was instituted on January I, 1990. It is only right at this time to commend Gerry Clark, the insurance field representative and D.D. Joe Goellner for doing an outstanding job in getting this council instituted. They took time to go that extra mile for Columbianism, something they truly believe in! We now have 17 Form 100's at our college council, the University of Southern Mississippi. We hope that this council will come about in the next few weeks. This will be our first college council ever in this state. A special thanks goes to Al Boddin, Jr. He has labored hard and needs all the encouragement that we can give him to finish this task! Also, a new council is under way at Grenada, Mississippi. They have 24 Form 100's signed at this date. Dates have been set for a First Degree and a Second and Third Degree is pending for early June 1990. I commend District Deputy Jesse Quinn, III and Fred Ward for their hard work. We hope this council will come through. There are other areas that are being looked into for a possible council. This will be reported by our New Council Development Chairman at a later time. We must keep in mind our founder's dream that every parish should have a Knight of Columbus council. Let us not let his dream go in vain!

Squires, we have 2 new circles formed with 1 new circle reactivated, for a total of 3 circles this year. In reference to the fraternal activities: you as a group are to be commended for the hard work that was done in getting the fraternal activities report in. With the date being changed by Supreme from March 31, 1990 to January 31, 1990, I can truly say that this jurisdiction is 100% in reporting this very important form. This is the report that helps us keep our tax free status.

The past year Supreme Council awards for 1988 - 1989 were presented. The Mississippi jurisdiction had 29 councils of its 45 councils to receive an award. Ten councils received the Columbian award, eleven councils received the Founders award, eleven councils received the Father McGivney award, and eight councils received the Star Council award. These councils were Meridian 802, Jackson 898, Biloxi 1244, Bay St. Louis 1522, Gulfport 1583, Hattiesburg 1908, Laurel 2180, Leland 2945, Clarksdale 2969, Long Beach 4898, Cleveland 5556, Shelby 6555, Starkville 6765, Picayune 6872, Kiln 7087, Southaven 7120, Gulfport Orange Grove 7910, Broookhaven 7915, Columbus 7974, Jacson St. Therese 8285, Holly Springs 8760, Tupelo 8848, Corinth 8912, Gautier 9124, Indianola 9234, West Biloxi 9409, Madison 9543, Woolmarket 9673, and Lizana 9958. I commend each of you on a job well done, please continue the good work.

The following councils have won the "1989 Share the Spirit" papal blessing. This award is given to the council for attaining or exceeding the special 1989 5% net membership gain quota. The following councils qualified, 1908, 2180, 2969, 4472, 5556, 6555, 6592, 7915, 7974, 8912, 9094, 9234, 9409, 9543, 9673, 9958. The total councils attaining the blessing was 17 of 45 councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction. You are to be commended for a job well done.

The State programs have been very good this year, but the job will not be finished until the paperwork is done and sent in so you and your councils can win Supreme awards. This past year there were 8 councils who won Star Council awards from Supreme. As June 30, 1990 quickly approaches, are our councils making that final push that will put our Jurisdiction on top for the number of Star Councils?

In the contest of Champions, the Council 1244 Biloxi, won for the highest net gain, and the Council 9543 Madison won on percentage. We also had Council 1244 Biloxi to receive a certificate for Council Service award from Supreme for making the top 10 councils order wide.

I have had the honor of visiting 41 councils and ten districts this year. Each council showed me honor and respect for the office I hold as State Deputy that my fellow brothers elected me to. The office of the State Deputy is always open to an invitation to any council function.

It is with deep regret that I report to you that the State raffle did not do as well as the officers and board members of Columbus of Mississippi Inc. had planned. We had hoped to pull all the councils together in unity for this just cause. But due to lack of cooperation from different councils around our State, the raffle fell way short of our expectations. The excitement last night was felt by everyone as the tickets were being drawn. I know the winner will always remember their ticket number and thank the Knights that sold their share of tickets. At this time on behalf of the State Council, I personally thank the councils that sold their tickets. For those councils that did not participate fully, I can only hope that in the future, if the State needs your help, you will join in unity to promote your State Council. It is with you that we grow and flourish for when you lose everyone loses.

In closing, I would like to thank all who have worked with me over this past year. I personally wish to thank immediate Past State Deputy, Dennis Doc Ladnier, for his personal advice and guidance when I needed it. I want to thank P.S.D. D.R. William LaForge, P.S.D. John P. Myers, P.S.D. Jesse Quinn, Jr. and P.S.D. Robert Fratesi for giving their advice at times that I called upon them. At this time I want to thank the other State officers for their help and guidance in leading our State to higher levels of Columbianism. These men have labored hard and have pulled together for the one cause that you and I truly believe in, that is the Knights of Columbus. They are to be commended for living up to the expectations that their fellowmen had of them.

And last I wish to express to my wife, Kathleen, a special thanks for standing with me in times of failure and joys of accomplishment. To my two sons, Brian and Michael, who wondered why I had to go on those different weekends and not stay home with them, I can only say someday in the future you will know why and you will be proud to be Catholic and hopefully a Knight of Columbus.

Each year, many councils are eligible to be recognized for their efforts but fail to submit the requested paperwork. Still others miss out in qualifying for awards by not meeting one of the requirements. Many councils are not even aware that their programs, activities and efforts could be recognized on a state or international level. All of the facts point out a need for more work and follow-through.

There are four report forms that have to be completed and mailed to the Supreme Office and a copy mailed to the State Deputy. Form 185 (Report of Council Officers), Form 1295 (Semi-Annual Audit Report), Form 365 (Service Program Personal Report) and Form 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report).

- Form 185 (Council Officers Report) was due August 1, 1989. This report is very important
 to Supreme and the State Council. Supreme needs the information, so the proper material can
 be sent to the Grand Knight to help him perform his duties. Also, the State Council needs
 the information so the State Directory can be printed and mailed to each person in need of
 the information.
- Form 1295 (Semi-Annual Council Audit Report) was due August 15, 1989 and February 15, 1990. Some councils sent the report in time and some were late as usual.
- Form 365 (Service Program Personal Report) was due September 1, 1989. Report Form 365
 is a requirement for the Columbian, Father McGivney and Founders' Awards and requirement
 for the State Program Awards.
- 4. Form 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report) was due January 21, 1990. The last report that I received from Supreme indicated that two councils had not sent in their report. The report is one of the most important ones due in at Supreme. The information that Supreme receives from the report is used to retain our free tax status.

All these reports are mandatory requirements for the Mississippi Jurisdiction Program Activities. The first State Program report was due November 15, 1989 and the second was due March 31, 1990.

All Supreme Awards requirements remain the same as they were last fraternal year. All reports to qualify for the Columbian, Father McGivney, Founders' and Star Council Awards are due in before June 30, 1990.

DISTRICT DEPUTY'S REPORT DISTRICT NO. 4

District No. 4 of the Mississippi Jurisdiction is comprised of John T. Savage 848 in Jackson, Holy

Savior 7854 in Clinton, St. Jude Centennial 8038 in Pearl, St. Therese 8285 in Jackson, St. Francis of Assisi 9543 in Madison, and the new council at St. Paul 10216 in Brandon, which chartered on January 1, 1990.

After the 1989 Convention and my appointment as the incoming District Deputy, I accompanied District Deputy Gerry Clark on Council visits during May and June. By making these visits we were able to plan events on the July and August calendars.

As District Deputy I attended the State Summer Meeting and Installation of State Officers in Cleveland on July 15, 16, 1989; the School of Columbianism in Jackson on September 17 and assisted in hosting the State Winter Meeting in Clinton on December 3, 1989.

Holy Savior 7854 hosted a joint Installation of Council Officers on July 23, 1989. Four of the five councils participated. St. Francis of Assisi Council Officers were installed on August 6, 1989 in Madison.

Two District Meetings were held with representatives from all councils present. The July 30th meeting was held in Clinton. The agenda was a training workshop with group sessions for council officers and chairmen. The February 4th meeting was hosted by St. Francis in Madison.

New Council Development activity had been in progress at two locations last year. After assessing the status, we postponed development at Sacred Heart Parish in Canton and continued to develop a new council at St. Paul Parish in Brandon. They were issued a Charter on January 1, 1990 after several months of dedicated effort. The new council of thirty-four members became St. Paul Council 10216. A special thanks to Charter Grand Knight Louis Zylka, Financial Secretary Marvin Ackerman and Insurance Representative Gerry Clark for their valuable assistance.

The membership formation structure of the St. Paul Council is very unique. Normally, new councils which are geographically located near active councils have a significant number of transfers from those councils. Only four members were from councils within the state. Other totals by admission type was seven out-of-state transfers, eight readmissions, one reactivation, and fourteen new members. As the numbers indicate, thirty of the members in the new council was not active in other local councils and likely would have remained inactive until a council was formed in their parish. Fifteen of these members moved to the parish from out-of-state councils with seven retaining out-of-state membership and eight dropping membership. That's eight out-of-state members that terminated and another seven that may terminate if they do not join a local council. These statistics indicate that we must recruit out-of-state members who move into our Districts.

We have two First Degree Teams in the District. They are located at St. Jude in Pearl and St. Therese in Jackson. Holy Savior in Clinton has three certified team members who participated with the teams during the year. St. Francis of Assisi Council has received a set of First Degree Books and is in the process of developing a team. First Degree Ceremonials were performed six times in the District since July 1989. The seventh First Degree is planned prior to the end of the Fraternal Year.

Membership and New Council Development have been priorities this year. Membership gain is above the State Council average. Councils in District 4 have recruited sixty-six new members and added seventeen insurance members during the first nine months. These numbers are commendable but, the councils terminated a total of thirty-four members.

As I conclude this report, I am confident that the councils will continue to perform well for the rest of the fraternal year. I thank the State Deputy for the opportunity to serve and the Grand Knights, Council Officers and members for their dedicated support.

District 9 comprises Bishop Gunn Council 1583, Gulfport; St. Vincent de Paul Council 4898, Long Beach; Father Harry Wade Council 7910, Gulfport (Orange Grove); Reinhart Schroeder Council 9409, West Biloxi; James D. Hart Council 9673, Woolmarket.

The installation of council officers was conducted within the prescribed time and in accordance with the rules and ceremonials of the Order: Council 1583 July 5; Council 7910 July 11; Council 9409 July 12; Council 4898 July 22; Council 9673 July 24, 1990.

In attendance at the Installation of State Officers and Organizational Meeting in Cleveland on July 15-16, the School of Columbianism in Jackson, September 17, and the Mid-Winter Meeting in Jackson, December 3, 1989.

All councils were visited periodically and audited. Also attended many other functions such as Insurance Nights, Awards Nights, Health Programs and other special activities and First Degree Exemplifications.

As we near the date of our state's annual convention, District 10 can be proud of its accomplishments, but we can also say that we could have done better, and we will.

It has been a privilege to serve this State and the Order as District Deputy for District No. 10. I have pledged to perform my duties to the best of my ability. The job has been rewarding yet more of a challenge than I have envisioned, but I have enjoyed it. Primarily I have enjoyed the open communica-

tion and fraternity that has been shown throughout District 10. This fraternal spirit hit an all time high during the Pro-Life program (initiated by Brother Antoine Otto of Fred L. Westbrook, Sr. Council No. 5654 of Ocean Springs), and spread to the surrounding districts. This spirit of cooperation allowed the program to be a big success.

However, Membership and Insurance promotion has been trailing. Retention is a continuing problem.

As of 4-1-90, membership has increased only 58.0% and insurance 14.2%. This figure for insurance is the same as reported on 10-1-89.

Six (6) First Degrees and two (2) Second and Third Degree Exemplifications have been held in the district. These have kindled the flame of membership, but there is much room for improvement.

Improvement should start with the District Deputy, this District Deputy. Several times I have found an excuse (legitimate, but still an excuse) to re-schedule a visit. I realize now that my leadership and commitment to Columbianism is an example to the Grand Knights in my district.

In my mid-year report, I reaffirmed my commitment to the Order and pledged to improve in the exercise of my duties as District deputy for the remainder of the fraternal year. I feel I have accomplished that goal.

I have made a total of twenty-two (22) visits to the councils in my district. All five (5) councils are complying to the Laws and Rules of the Order, and are spreading Columbianism in their communities.

Requiring more frequent and different ways of raising money, I can see where the loss of bingo could help unify a council, not tear it apart.

As I mentioned earlier in this report, FRATERNITY in this district is very high. Hopefully, this will continue and increase our momentum for the second half of this fraternal year.

STATE INSURANCE AGENT'S REPORT

Reverend Father, Worthy State Deputy, State Officers, and Brother Knights, thank you very much and good morning.

Right before I came up to speak, one of the members said to me "Jerry, we've been waiting a long time for a speaker who can dazzle us with charm, wit, and personality. I guess we can wait a little longer."

I promise not to speak too long this morning. It's worth noting that the Lord's Prayer is only 56 words long. The Gettysburg Address is 226. The Ten Commandments are 297, but the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's order on the price of cabbage is 15,629 words. I'll try to finish somewhere in between!

There are many people who are responsible for our heritage that has been handed down to us today. As we look behind us, we stand on the mountain peaks of the past. But as we look ahead, we stand in the valleys of the mountain peak of the future. We, at the present time are working to reach the mountain peaks of the future. That is the heritage we are going to leave our children, their children, and their children, and etc. You are all to be commended on the wonderful and beautiful job you have done and are doing. Congratulations are in order, and I would like to congratulate each and every one of you for the part you have played.

Now I would like to move to Financial Strength Competitive Product.

When considering a company from which to purchase insurance there are two basic things one should look at: (1) financial strength and (2) competitive products.

There is today in the insurance industry a solvency crisis as there is in the savings and loans and banking industries. The insurance press includes many articles in this regard each week. The October issue of **Best's Review** quotes a report issued by the Congressional Research Service which states "Insurers face new risks for insolvency because of changes they have made in their business practices in response to changes in the investment environment and the economy."

In order to increase their potential investment yield companies are investing in high risk investments such as junk bonds, real estate and mortgages. Connecticut Mutual recently wrote down their assets by \$120,000,000 because of losses on high mortgages, and Travelers wrote down millions of dollars in assets because of deteriorating values in real estate. Because of changes such as these, rating companies have lowered or are reviewing the ratings of many insurance companies. Besides the extra investment risks undertaken by companies many have also been issuing new products with low profit margin. In addition, companies are experiencing increased cost due to AIDS.

In the September issue of **Best's Review**, there was an article titled "The Capital Crunch." It states "Cock your ear only slightly and you will hear mutual life insurance companies gasping for surplus, which is their life's breath. How real, how acute and how widespread is their surplus shortage? How did the companies get there, and how do they get out? The capital shortage is real enough, and it is widespread, but it is of uneven depth. The fix the mutuals are in is largely one of their own creation, born of confusion about the purpose of a mutual. These companies can get out of most of their problems by returning to the mission of a mutual, and becoming disciplined in pricing and expenses." The Knights of Columbus never departed from its original mission, to provide individual protection for its members and families. We never squandered money going into other businesses such as mutual funds, savings banks, credit unions, leasing companies, mortgage companies, etc. We stayed with our mission. We have maintained our discipline in pricing and kept our expenses low. We are, therefore, doing what the other companies have to do to rebuild the financial strength they have lost.

There are two reasons that a company maintains surplus: they are to avoid ruin (going out of business) and to finance expansion. Let's look at how the Order compares to the industry in regard to surplus.

As can be seen from the table above, the 10 largest mutual insurance companies had an average ratio of 7.2% for the year 1960, which was the historically high year. In 1988, the average dropped to 6.0%. It should be understood that these are large and very sound insurance companies with only a remote possibility that they could become financially insolvent. But when you compare the percentage for the Order in 1960 of 14.4%, or twice that of the average of the 10 largest mutual companies, you can see that the Order is even less likely to become insolvent. When comparing 1988, it can be seen that the Order has increased its rate to 15.7%, now over 2½ times the average of the 10 largest mutual companies. Thus the Order is in a much better position to avoid ruin and to be able to finance expansion in the future than the 10 largest mutual companies.

But what about the quality of the product sold by the Order. There is a comparison made by **Best's Review** which compares the experience of companies over the last 20 years. While this comparison is not without flaws, we compared the results of the Order to the other companies. The major flaw in the comparison is it is made on unloaned policies and most companies introduced a change in their dividend scales in about 1983 to pay a higher dividend on unloaned policies. The Order did not introduce this procedure until 1989, and it is phased in over a 5 year period. Even with this inexact comparison, the Order compares very favorably. Out of any group you could divide the group in half and if you are in the top half of the group you might feel you have done well. If you are in the top one fourth of the group you would be even better off. Being in the top 10% is in the Magna Cum Laude area. If I were to tell you that the Order ranked in the top 10 companies, that's in the top ½ of 1%, would you be impressed? Out of over 2000 insurance companies the Order was 10th on one comparison and 9th on the other and that is in spite of the unfair comparison. In prior years the Order ranked higher and we expect to increase our ranking as our direct recognition dividend program is phased in. We are proud of our dividend paying record and this is something in which all members of the Order should take great pride.

Are we ready for the 1990's and the 21st century? You bet! Are we going to finance a shot to the moon

to bring back cheap cheese? That's not likely. We are not going to take unnecessary investment risks with our members funds.

To summarize, we have a company with the financial strength to meet its obligations and to support the necessary growth. As a Fraternal Beneficiary Society, it reflects your moral values in its daily activities and it sells an insurance product which compares with the very best. The insurance program supports the fraternal activities of the Order and we solicit your support for the Order's insurance program. Thank you.

1990 KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS MENTAL RETARDATION PROGRAM

The Knights of Columbus in Mississippi have had another successful Tootsie Roll Drive for the Mentally Retarded in Mississippi. This money will be distributed to over 75,000 mentally retarded persons in Mississippi. We will send everyone a final distribution report when we receive all of the data from the councils.

We want to thank each and every Knight, their families, and their friends of the Knights of Columbus, and the Mississippi Association for Retarded Citizens, for all of their hard work in helping others who cannot help themselves. We set a goal of \$76,000.00 in 1989. We achieved this goal, and with your enthusiasm and devotion to this project, we collected a net income of \$78,045.53.

The Mississippi State Council will again act as the Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi. I have asked the District Deputies to act as District Chairmen for the 1989 program.

The District Deputies will present this program to the Grand Knights at their District Meeting in January. The Grand Knights are asked to present the program to the membership at a council meeting prior to the Drive.

The Grand Knights should have appointed a Local Council Chairman and sent his name and address to me. We ask your serious consideration in selecting a Local Chairman, and give him your full support and aid in selecting his Committee Chairman.

We have set a Net Income Goal of \$85,849.00 for the State of Mississippi in 1990. We should achieve this goal if we maintain our enthusiasm in this program. We hope that each and every one of you will visit your local Mentally Retarded Association and see how your contribution has helped that organization. If you need any stimulation in this program, that visit will be all that you will need. Not every Council participated last year. We hope that every council will participate this year.

The State Deputy presents a trophy to the council that collects the largest net income per member.

The Tupelo Council won the 1989 trophy with a net income per member of \$253.52. The State Deputy will present the highest gross income per Council Trophy to the Tupelo Council. They collected a gross income of \$18,528.41. We all want to congratulate this fine Council for their extraordinary work for the Mentally Retarded in Mississippi.

The proceeds of this drive will be sent to us and we will deposit your proceeds in an account for the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi. The co-signers of this account will be the State Deputy and the State Directors. When you send your Council Disbursement Fund Request Form to us with your Federal Tax Exempt letter, we will return your funds immediately. Remember, ALL funds must be disbursed prior to June 30, 1990.

This year we ask you to use the week of April 30th through May 6th to collect for this drive. The first part of the week is for business donations and Friday the 4th and Saturday the 5th for city-wide drive. Our insurance for workers collecting for this drive will only be in effect on Friday, May 4th and Saturday, May 5th.

Twenty-five percent (25%) of the net will be for the State Council Retarded Program and seventy-five percent (75%) of the net for local council retarded programs. The money raised must be spent to aid in the area of **mental retardation and only that area**.

Remember, with every two cases of Tootsie Rolls you receive one cap and one cannister bank free. Additional caps and cannisters may be ordered at a nominal cost, but don't wait until the last minute. If aprons are needed they can be ordered from N. Henry and Sons, Inc., 1644 N. Honore Street, Chicago, IL 60622. The cost of the aprons are \$3.50 each, plus \$1.50 handling charge per order - and postage - (United Parcel Service) Direct your correspondence to the attention of Mr. David von Bergen.

All monies less the cost of Tootsie Rolls and aprons should be forwarded to the State Co-Chairmen immediately on completion of the drive. Billing for Tootsie Rolls and aprons will be to the ordering individual (council) and they should be paid for at that level with monies withheld from the total receipts for that purpose only - no other monies can be expended. Strict control by councils should be exercised in all areas of this program. Tootsie Roll orders of 50 cases of more will be sent freight prepaid - smaller councils can consolidate their orders through their District Deputy and take advantage of prepaid freight. The District Deputy will order for all councils in his district. The interest on savings paid all of the expenses of the 1989 State Mental Retardation Program.

REPORT TO MEMBERS OF COLUMBUS OF MISSISSIPPI INCORPORATED

Last year at the state convention, delegates voted to adopt three resolutions. One authorized the creation of a corporation whose purpose was to establish an annual fund raising project with several objectives. One of these was to generate revenue to subsidize the Mississippi State Council. The second authorized the establishment of a board of directors for the corporation and the third autorized a raffle consisting of 50 prizes, the grand prize being a 1990 Cadillac and 49 cash prizes of equal amount.

In due course, a corporation was created which became known as Columbus of Mississippi Incorporated and officers of the corporation were elected at a meeting of the board of directors on May 21, 1989. The wheels of the raffle, called Super Drawing, were put into motion at the state organizational meeting held in Cleveland or. July 16, 1989, with the distribution of ticket packages to the district deputies who later distributed them to their respective councils.

As president of the corporation it is my duty to give you a report on the status of the corporation or in this case, on the status of the Super Drawing. A chart has been prepared showing how much money has been turned in by the councils as of midnight last night. All of us should have studied it because it more eloquently tells the story of where we stand than I could have. Lack of sales by certain councils tells the story as to why we did not do as well as expected.

So, to what do we attribute this disappointing showing? For openers, we certainly did not share the spirit. In my opinion, we lacked in unity; we reneged on our commitment to the State Deputy and a negative attitude became apparent early on. It would be unfair to paint all councils with the same brush.

On March 29, there was a meeting of the Board of Directors because of the concern about progress or, more specifically, the lack of it in the sale of tickets. After much discussion, it was decided that the show must go on. We all knew that we have reached the point of no return. It was the consensus of the Board that to terminate the project at this late date would have caused considerable embarassment to all of us. The Board of Directors took a calculated risk in making the decision and the results reflect it. We gambled that the final three weeks would produce enough sales to make the venture worthwhile although not outstanding. It appears that we were right on course.

The bottom line is this. The Cadillac will be rewarded as we had planned as will the cash prizes. What's left will be distributed after a final accounting is made.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to all of you for giving me the opportunity to serve as the first president of this corporation. I consider that an honor. Serving in this position, I learned even more about human behavior and how to accept disappointment gracefully. But even more, I have come to realize how precious little some of our members really know of the extent of our Jurisdiction's financial woes and what's more disturbing, their care less attitude. Until such time as we can convince these members that this is for real, we will continue to struggle.

Now that we have established a corporation with defined objectives, we must go on and I wish good fortune to all future endeavors. Thank you for being so patient, good night and let the fun and games begin.

REPORT OF THE GOOD OF THE ORDER COMMITTEE

The Good of the Order Committee met and the following recommendations are offered to improve the health of the order in the State of Mississippi:

- Greater emphasis must be made by councils to prevent loss of new members. We are doing a
 good job recruiting new members but we seem to be falling down on retention. Members must
 be made to feel welcome and put to work on projects they feel productive and comfortable with.
- 2. Great strides have been made in moving the Financial Secretary's meeting to times that do not conflict with Convention business sessions, however, some way needs to be found to make this time available at a time that does not conflict with committee meetings so that Financial Secretaries are not faced with having to be at 2 meetings at the same time.
- 3. Have each council share thru a column in the Magnolia Knight their ways of raising funds so that other councils may get some ideas of how to raise monies more creatively now that some avenues of fund raising may be cut off in the future.
- 4. The State Deputy should appoint a high-level committee to look into bringing the State Council finances and expenses under control. It is not fair to continue raising per capita assessments to cover expenses because this will ultimately drive less affluent councils out of business.
- 5. While it is good to have the state council be more involved in the financial responsibility for degree exemplification, it is important that a committee be formed to look into all aspects of this financial responsibility so as to preclude, this from becoming a further drain on State Council finances.

STATE CEREMONIAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As the State Ceremonial Committee Chairman, I am privileged to report the Ceremonial Activities within the state for the 1989 - 90 fraternal year.

A resolution, approved at the 1989 State Convention, authorized and directed the State Deputy to appoint a State Ceremonial Committee. Those named to the committee were Norman Kiehm, Freddie Roberts, Harold Hardin, Emery Elder, and Joe Goellner, Sr., Chairman. Guy Todaro, Jr., who serves as a Ceremonial Conferring Officer, was appointed as an advisor to the committee.

The Ceremonial Committee's purpose was as follows:

1. To assist with Second and Third Degree Ceremonial Activity at the State Deputy's direction.

To develop and propose a set of Ceremonial Guidelines and Procedures to be presented for approval of the Delegates at the 1990 State Convention.

The State Deputy did not choose to involve the committee in the direct planning and implementation of this year's ceremonials. Therefore, the committee used the additional time to analyze the requirements and develop the guidelines and procedures for conducting the ceremonials for the first three degrees of the Order.

The committee's diligent research and review of previously suggested ceremonial resolutions provided the initial facts for structuring the guidelines. Additional ideas were taken from copies of other State Council Ceremonial Guidelines. Also, the State Ceremonial Chairman's reports for the past three years did provide a valuable source of information.

One important item of information was not available for analysis. Detailed Degree Team and Host Council Expense records from previous years were not located. Partial records and expense details were provided by the Pascagoula Degree Team.

Using available information, the committee projected what the amount of each Degree Team and Host Council Expense should be. Our goal was to fairly compensate the degree team and host council for expenses and remain within the projected budget provided by Initiation Fees. These expense amounts were used to calculate the expenses for future degrees. Estimated expenses per candidate are more than the present Initiation Fee. An increase in the Standard Initiation Fee must be supported. A resolution to increase the fee should be presented for consideration at this convention.

A review of these statistics is submitted as an attachment to this report. This information has been provided to each delegate as part of the support information to the proposed Ceremonial Guidelines. It is important to report and record these facts to support future analysis, budgeting and approval of Initiation Fees, Degree Team Expenses and Host Council Expenses. A careful analysis of these facts is strongly suggested.

At this time the Pascagoula Second and Third Degree Teams are the only functioning teams within the state. Without another Third Degree Team, the State Deputy must obtain an "Out of State" team to perform degrees within forty miles of Pascagoula and the northern part of the state where travel expenses are not practical. We must have at least one additional team to decrease team travel expense and the need to use "Out of State" teams.

The formation of a Second and Third Degree Team in the Jackson Area has been discussed for several years. I am happy to report that a Degree Team Organizational Meeting is scheduled on May 20, 1990 in the Jackson Area. All Third Degree members with an interest in ceremonials are urged to attend. The goal is to have a functional Second Degree Team by late Summer and a Third Degree Team by the end of the year.

1 strongly urge the approval of the proposed State Ceremonial Guidelines. It provides us with a real tool for use while planning, conducting and reporting Ceremonials.

I express my sincere thanks to the members of the committee for their dedicated support and to the State Deputy for asking me to serve in this capacity.

STATE PROGRAMS DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The 1989 - 1990 program year just ended was a productive one in some areas, and not so productive in others. Once again we had a response from 29 councils out of 44 in the Mississippi Jurisdiction. These 29 program reports represent 66% of the toal. Of the 8 extra large councils, all 8 turned in reports; 8 of 11 large councils; 8 of 15 medium councils, and 5 of 10 small councils. 15 councils did not turn in any report at all. I was coordinator of the Membership meetings at the summer meeting at Cleveland, MS and at the School of Columbianism held at 898 Jackson Council's home. Plans for New Council development and council promotion of Membership through the "Share the Spirit, Honor the Clergy" campaign were explained as the theme for the remainder of the 1989 year.

At the Mid Year Meeting in Clinton, MS in December, a VCR tape explaining the 1990 membership campaign was shown on Membership Promotion. Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechant encouraged membership recruitment in our order. A presentation of our Founder was also included, and three other training programs on membership recruitment and promotions where on this tape. This tape has been sent to each Grand Knight of the Order. This tape should be kept by councils in years to come as a valuable teaching aid to help in membership recruitment in local councils. The Supreme Office should be commended for the expense which was undertaken in supplying this great tape to the councils of the Order. 1990 has been chosen as the year for the Order to have as its goal of recruiting enough members for our order to accomplish 1 million and 500,000 members. The 1990 membership campaign is "Share the Spirit, Honor our Founder."

In August, it was determined after the State Summer Meeting by the State Officers, that some type of promotion was needed within our state to try to promote councils to encourage membership recruitment. The TOP GUN Award was the idea which was decided upon.

The TOP GUN AWARD was an idea used in another state for membership promotion, and had success. So it was of the opinion we may receive some interest by our state councils in promoting the theme of which the name would reflect "THE TOP GUN", "THE BEST", the councils which put forth the extra effort to accomplish more than what was required, which is the current 5% gain needed for awards. This idea was just to promote pride within the councils of the state to promote membership recruitment. The qualification for this award was that a council would have to have a 10% gain over losses by the April 1990 Supreme Report. The reward was to have each memebr of that council be recognized by their badges at the 1990 Convention.

At the Mid-Year Meeting in Jackson a statewide Membership drive was explained and a commitment by each District Deputy was made to try to get 10 new members from each district. The campaign was a success. The State was able, for the first time from July, to gain more than we had lost during the proceeding months. I wish to take this opportunity to thank all the District Deputy's, who encouraged the councils in their districts in promoting membership during the state drive and this past year. Without your help the information could not have got to the councils.

At the writing of this report, the following is the results of the March 1990 State report, and does not reflect the end of our state convention year, or our supreme year.

The result of my labors this year have been disappointing. I have seen our membership drop by 202 members and our councils recruit 288 new Knights. This is where I feel the greatest disappointment. The fact is we are losing as many as we gain. This has been a serious problem during my term as the state membership director. From July to November each month the Mississippi Jurisdiction lost the exact number we gained. The problem of retention has faced our state in the past and looks as if we have no solutions to curb this problem. The problems of retention are ones which face each council of our state. The success of our Order's growth will depend on the ability of our future leaders

to face this problem, and find ways to keep our members, and to promote our orders growth.

Membership recruitment has been a subject in the past and present which the leaders of our state and local councils endure, and expect to hear about at every Knights of Columbus meeting we have. No one is willing to understand, that our life, as an organization, the MS Knights of Columbus Fraternal organization, depends on each member of our organization keeping and replacing members to our order. This responsibilty is our's as members of the Knights of Columbus. The organization we profess to support is in need of help. Our Mississippi Knights of Columbus, needs help. We need new members to promote our order. Brothers, this is our legacy to our future. If we do not find a way to stop our losses the endless task of replacing what we lose will cause our organization, somewhere in the future, to start losing more that we take in. This will be the beginning of the end. For when we start losing more that we recruit, you start to look at a loss of our councils of our order.

Membership is every members business, not just the Membership Directors or the Grand Knights. Until our members understand we should try to keep every member we have, and promote the recruiting of every eligible Catholic man. Our order is in trouble.

In conclusion, let me thank our Worthy State Deputy for having the faith in me to assign me the responsibility of being the State Membership Director. Let me express my thanks to him for his perseverence in the troubles we both have faced this year with the losses we have had in membership. Brothers, our Worthy State Deputy Marvin Lott, has been one of the greatest supporters of Membership Recruitment this past year. He has suffered every time a suspension came to him. Brothers, Marvin Lott cares that we are losing as many members as we gain. As members of this great Mississippi Knights of Columbus Jurisdiction, we all should feel a loss for what we have experienced this year. Many thanks must go to the state officers who have worked hard during this past year in Membership Recruitment, and especially Greg Niolet, our State Advocate, who has been of great assistance to me personally.

To the councils of our state who attained the TOP GUN COUNCIL qualification. You are the ones who cared, who went that extra mile to recruit our future leaders. The new members you recruited will be our replacements in the years to come. To you I can say our Order owes you a debt of gratitude for caring. Many thanks.

THIRD DEGREE TEAM CAPTAIN'S REPORT

At the beginning of the fraternal year, the second and third degree team of Council 1605 in Pascagoula, was chosen by State Deputy Marvin Lott to act as State Team under the guidance of Emery Elder.

On November II and 12, 1989, our team was requested to perform in Greenville for initiation of thirty-eight candidates into the second and third degree. This exemplification cost team a total of \$1122.56 with \$500.00 reimbursement to team from Host Council. During this Degree our team was certified by Brother Sam Dambrosia, Supreme Chairman. Our team was said by him to be in the top ten of the nation, and we were very proud to serve our state in this capacity.

To rebuild our funds, five of our team members served as bartenders at the Chevron Christmas party. On February 4, 1990 our team was asked to perform Second Degree and support an out of state Third Degree team with the use of our equipment. There were seventy-four candidtaes initiated in the Host Gulfport Council. Our team received \$50.00 for Degree work. The cost for the trip was \$31.00. After all long distance calls, stamps, and letter materials for previous degrees were added up a cost of \$50.00 payed.

On March 24 and 25 we traveled to Clinton. This was an overnight trip to initiate fourty-four candidates into the second and third degree. The total cost to team was \$773.27. The Host Council reimbursed the team \$500.00 for the exemplification. The team captain through a finance report request State Deputy Marvin Lott for payment of overrun above the \$500.00 from State Treasury to State Degree team. We have not been requested to perform any local out of state initiations this year, which greatly reduced our financial status.

ANNUAL REPORT OF NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT CHAIRMAN

At the beginning of this year we set out to attain a minimum of 3 new councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction - three is the quota given us this year by the Supreme Council.

I immediately made a survey of all the parishes in the two dioceses of Mississippi and found that there were a total of 34 parishes which did not have a Knights of Columbus Council but which could well support one. These 34 parishes all had in excess of 120 families. I thereupon mailed to each of the District Deputies a list of these parishes in their particular district, together with the names of the respective pastors and their phone numbers. Every district had at least one of these parishes. I obtained 10 extra copies of the NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT manual from Supreme and mailed one to each of the District Deputies so that they each would be familiar with the tried and tested procedures of signing up a new council.

D. D. Joe Goellner, of District 4, continued the work of former D. D. Gerry Clark and successfully brought to a conclusion the formation of a new council in Brandon (10216), with 34 charter members. As of this date this is the only new council we have for this year.

We have three months till the end of this fraternal year, and we have several prospects which, if signed up in the near future, could still give us our quota.

- D. D. Richard Hollingsworth of District 7 will be giving us our first college council of our jurisdiction's history University of Southern Mississippi. Whether or not he can have this completed by July 1st is not known. He is experiencing some difficulty at present signing up the required number of members.
- D. D. John Maloney is looking into the reactivation of the Philadelphia council.
- D. D. Guy Todaro is working on two possibilities a second council in Ocean Springs and one is Moss Point.
- D. D. Harvey Mitchell hopes to soon have a council in Waveland.
- D. D. Paulino Carrubba has been working on a council in St. Theresa's in Gulfport and meeting some resistance at present. He thinks he may be able to do something in Wiggins also.
- D. D. Jesse Quinn III thinks he has a good chance in Grenada if he can find a good "lead man" there.

And finally, D. D. Joe Goellner also sees a possibility in Canton.

I have not received any information of any NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT activity in Districts 1, 3, or 5.

I sincerely urge all District Deputies to put forth all efforts possible in order to complete at least two of the above prospects. I firmly believe with an all out effort, come July 1st, that we will have our three new councils that we are seeking.

PRO - LIFE REPORT

As State Pro Life Chairman I see a big job ahead of all of us. When you look around and see the rumblings being made by the Pro Aborts throughout the country and add to that, the lack of equal coverage by the media, it is very evident what the future holds for us.

After my appointment by our State Deputy, Marvin Lott, to finish out this term started by Brother John Cucuzza, I mailed out a letter to all councils to announce my appointment, to ask all councils to become active in the Pro-Life Movement and to ask for support of Mississippi Right-to-Life.

I spoke of abortion related legislation that would appear in the legislature in January, and did it ever appear. Numerous bills were submitted. The lobbying took place and bills quickly came and went.

My report to you on legislation is simply this; we took a beating on the Pro Life scene by the Pro Aborts in and out of the legislature and by Governor Ray Mabus' veto of the "Informed Consent" bill. Our accomplishments for the year leave a lot to be desired. But, we are Knights of Columbus. We can do the job and we will do the job.

The legislative scene changed so rapidly that as soon as a letter of information on the status of bills was ready to mail out, the situation would change and then the letter would be outdated. This happened with the second letter I sent out to the councils. In any case, even though it will happen again, that is the way we must play the game.

When the state of Idaho was in the nation's eye with their Pro Life bill, I endeavored to contact as many people as I could to call the governor and ask him to pass the bill. There was no time for letters.

I also called the superintendent of the Catholic schools of Biloxi and the Jackson Dioceses. I asked to give the phone numbers of Governor Andrus and the Idaho Right-To-Life hotline to the students to give to their parents in order to make the calls. The superintendents graciously agreed and pledged their support for Pro-Life.

I was able to help councils by locating a speaker for Pro-Life night and by furnishing legislative information.

In another area of Pro-Life, or maybe better known as Respect Life, I have been working with Father George Murphy. Director of Catholic Social Services Biloxi Diocese on a project in support of women that need help in their pregnancies and want to take their baby to term. Father Murphy wants to install signs and advertise throughout the Diocese for an 800 number for calls for help and staff a 24-hour answering service. My suggestion was to make it statewide, in cooperation with the existing program in the Jackson Diocese. Father Murphy would like for the Knights of Columbus to lend support to the program. I have talked with our State Deputy on the matter. As the project develops you will be informed and will be asked for your help.

There are many avenues of endeavor available to us to join the Pro-Life battle. Since it is God's babies that are murdered, then we can't possibly lose the battle if we walk along side of Him into this battle and work at saving the babies.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Convention Committee could not obtain all the needed financial data to submit an accurate financial report to the Sunday morning convention session. Complete information was not available until now.

Although the attached financial summary shows a net profit of \$2627.62 paid to the committee councils, the ad sales for the convention booklet, \$3595.00 and one donation of \$150.00 covered expenses of \$126.16 not paid by the registration costs.

The convention was an overall success, but, we did have some problems. The \$12.50 registration fee for Friday night event limited the options available to the committees. Food for Friday was ordered on Thursday and we had more late registrations (59) than expected. We show a gain of 340.99 for the Friday night event, but we would not have been in a much better position had we spent this small amount at this facility for the 385 attending.

Problems with the convention facility was the result of the person preparing the facility setup sheets not entering our instructions on the setup sheets for the staff.

The committee has prepared a complete convention summary with recommendations for improvements for our use at the 1994 convention.

Thank you for the opportunity to host the 1990 Convention. We look forward to 1994 for a bigger and much better convention.

MISSISSIPPI DISTRICT FOURTH DEGREE MEETING REPORT

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 pm by Master John P. Myers. The Master appointed Sir Knight Louis Rotundo as Faithful Pilot and Sir Knight Gerald Darnell as Inside Sentinel. Former Master Paulino Carrubba was appointed as Secretary of the meeting.

The Faithful Pilot certified that all present possessed a current traveling card.

Prayer was offered by the members present and Pledge of Allegiance was led by former Master Henry A. Kajdan.

Sir Knights Fred L. Westbrook, Jr. and Frederick Liscoe were appointed as the Committee on Credentials. Sir Knights Robert Murrah and Louis Bailey were appointed to the Resolutions Committee.

The Committee on Credentials reported that there were 25 delegates and the Master present. The Committee on Resolutions reported that no resolutions were submitted.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting were dispensed with.

The Master read his report and a copy is attached.

Under unfinished business a report was submitted to the meeting that there is a Fourth Degree Hospitality Room for the State Convention this weekend hosted by the Vicksburg Assembly with eleven assemblies making a voluntarily contribution of \$50.00 each to the Vicksburg Assembly to defray the cost. Banners indicating that it is a Fourth Degree Hospitality Room were supplied and applications for membership in the Fourth Degree were made available and it appears that at least 10 Third Degree members will be candidates for the exemplification in June as a result of the hospitality room.

It was announced that all of the assemblies had submitted their fraternal activity report, although some of them missed the deadline of January 31, 1990.

Not all of assemblies had reported whether or not candidates were furnished swords at the last exemplification in October 1989, but it was reported at this meeting that none of the assemblies furnished swords.

It was announced that an exemplification is to be held at Jackson at the St. Joseph's High School on June 24, 1990 and that the exemplification fee would be \$55.00, but on July 1, 1990 the exemplification fee would be raised to \$65.00.

The minimum number of candidates for this exemplification would be 40 and it was hoped more than that would be present. The class was to be named in honor of State Deputy Marvin L. Lott, but at his request, it will be named in honor of Sir Knights Hilton A. Seymour, PSD, and F. J. Bartlett, who died this year.

Each assembly was asked to indicate how many candidates they would have for the exemplification in June and a total of 36 were pledged, so far.

The delegates were reminded that there can be no assessment or donation to the Master's Fund, per letter from the Vice-Supreme Master.

It was announced that a new assembly, the Father Gregory Bezy Assembly, was approved at the January

meeting of the Board of Directors. The name of the St. Vincent DePaul Assembly has been changed to the Father John P. O'Connor Assembly at Long Beach.

The Delegates were reminded that the petitions to make Christopher Columbus an honorary citizen of the United States had not been received from all assemblies and petition forms were made available for those needing them.

There is a new Faithful Comptrollers Handbook issued by the Supreme Council and the Master announced that any who had not received one should notify him.

Since there have been no changes submitted for the by-laws, they will be sent to the Supreme Council for approval.

Knight of the Year Award forms were made available and they need to be sent to the Master by May 15, 1990.

Master Myers read the requirements for the Color Corps and advised that a new Drill Manual was being prepared by the Supreme Council and that the Color Corps will have to be certified by the Master by January 1, 1991. He also read the Supreme Master's letter concerning the official suppliers. He reminded the delegates the official dress and the procedures for establishment of new assemblies.

The Master announced that Barbara Schmittzehe, the daughter of Supreme Master Hilary F. Schmittzehe, died on January II, 1990 and that a card of condolence was sent to Mr. & Mrs. Schmittzehe.

Sir Knight Henry A. Kajdan spoke on the restrictions on the Master's Fund and the removal of identification, patches, cords, and etc. Sir Knight Louis Bailey expressed his displeasure with removing Faithful Navigator from Cape and Baldric.

Sir Knight John Szymonik reported that Msgr. Igoe Assembly had donated \$6000.00 to the Bishop Gerow Priest Education Fund this year.

A Sir Knight asked for a ruling on drawing the swords at Mass and the Master advised that the local parish priest should be consulted as to whether or not the swords could be drawn.

Sir Knight Frederick Liscoe wants to promote a Master's Ball where the profit could go to the Master's Fund.

State Deputy Marvin L. Lott spoke in defense of the Supreme Master.

The floor was opened for nominations for Master for the term beginning September 1, 1990 and the following nominations were made:

The election of Master's Audit Committee was next on the agenda and Sir Knight Fred L. Westbrook, Jr. made a motion that the Master appoint three members of his assembly to the Audit Committee. The motion carried.

There being no further business the meeting was closed with a prayer by the delegation.

REPORT OF THE FOURTH DEGREE MISSISSIPPI DISTRICT

The Fourth Degree Membership in the Mississippi District added 59 new members at the exemplification held in Jackson on October 1, 1989, 54 lay members and 5 clergy. We have had six deaths and five suspensions and five restoration of membership reported to me during the last year giving us approximately 938 members in the district. I say approximately because I don't always get the Master's copy of the form 4 when there is a death or suspension. It was also reported to me that Sir Knights Nandor V. Halasz and Kinson L. Martin of Msgr. P. J. Carey Assembly in Pascagoula were made Honorary Life Members of the Fourth Degree. Please advise the Faithful Comptrollers that the Master's copy of the form 4 should be sent to the Master when there is a change in membership records.

An exemplification is being planned for Sunday, June 24, 1990 to be held at St. Joseph's High School in Jackson. It will take at least forty members for the exemplification to be a success, but it is hoped that more that the fifty-nine exemplified last October will be present for this exemplification.

I installed the officers of all the assemblies that notified me of the installation, except for the ones former Master Henry A. Kajdan installed and I thank him for assisting me in doing the installations.

On October 14 and 15, 1989 I attended the Bienville Province meeting in Nashville, Tennessee and had a chance to meet with our new Vice-Supreme Master George E. Harvey, PSD, of Decatur, Alabama and the other Masters of the Bienville Province. This was a very good meeting and a lot of information was given to the Masters.

We are fortunate in having almost 100% participation in submitting election of officers report in July 1989 with only one assembly not reporting. We also had almost 100% participation in submitting the fraternal activity report, which was due on January 31, 1990, instead of March 31, 1990, again with only one assembly not reporting. Although some assemblies failed to send the Master's copy to me.

The Honor Guards have been functioning in some of the assemblies and I hope they will continue to function when the new Fourth Degree Drill Manual is issued by the Supreme Council. Honor Guards will have to be certified by the Master by January 1, 1991. It is suggested that this certification be done at the time of the installation of officers after July 1, 1990.

It is hoped that a new assembly can be established in Gautier, Mississippi as there are at least 21 members living at Gautier, and with the exemplification coming up in June enough members could be added to form the assembly.

As most of you know, I underwent open heart surgery on November 1, 1989 and was kind of out of action for approximately two months and I want to thank those who remembered me in their prayers and sent cards.

A new assembly was instituted at Southaven, the Father Gregory Bezy Assembly on Sunday, February 18, 1990 and we were fortunate to have Vice Supreme Master Harvey and his wife, Joan at the installation ceremonies. Sir Knight Gordon Coker is to be commended for all of his hard work in getting this assembly activated.

I wish to thank all of the members of the Fourth Degree in Mississippi, former Masters, and Vice Supreme Master, George Harvey, for all the help they have given me during the past year.

STATE CEREMONIAL COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT

The Ceremonial Committee was appointed by the State Deputy from the Delegates and Chairmen at the convention to review and report on the Ceremonial Activities during this year and make recommendations for the future. The Committee was called to order by Chairman, Joe Goellner, Sr., at 1:00 pm on April 28, 1990. The meeting was opened with a prayer.

ITEMS DICUSSED WERE AS FOLLOWS:

The Committee reviewed proposed Ceremonial Guidelines as presented by the State Ceremonial
Committee and agreed with the proposal but offered its recommendations for certain amendments. The proposed guidelines are well constructed and provided the basic requirements for
conducting ceremonials. The State Committee is to be recognized for the research analysis
and planning evidenced in the detailed responsibilities and format of the guidelines.

The Committee suggested amendments to the proposed guidelines.

· To require the Degree Team Captain be responsible for assuring that the Degree Team adhere to the same Dress Code as the candidates

- That the maximum number of vehicles for Third Degree Team travel be increased from three to four vehicles
- That very unusual expenses experienced by the Degree Team may be submitted to the State Deputy for consideration for approval
- That the mileage rate for travel should not read a specific number, but be worded to read "the same rate as the current approved mileage rate for State Officers and Chairman".
- Recommended that the State Council consider insurance coverage for Degree Teams and other representatives that function on behalf of the state
- The committees reviewed the information provided by the State Committee on analysis of Second and Third Degree Ceremonials for 1987 thru 1990. This information was provided to each delegate and we urge you to study this detailed information.
- 3. The Committee discussed the Standard Initiation Fee and if it should be increased. We agreed that it should be increased from fifteen to twenty dollars now. If candidates meals are to be paid from this fee, additional increase may be justified. Detailed statistics should be kept to support any future increase.
- 4. The Committee recognizes that Supreme does not permit the First Degree to be conducted on the same day as the Second and Third Degree. The Committee feels that our geographic area, travel conditions, timeliness of recruiting and Major Degrees are major problems if the First Degree can not be held on the same day. First Degree Candidates can easily find an excuse for not attending Second and Third Degrees held weeks or months after the First Degree. They do not understand the value of the Second and Third Degree in making them a dedicated member. The number of "First Degree Only" members has increased the retention problem. We feel the First Degree should be held on the same day.

THE 1990 MEMBERSHIP DRIVE "SHARE THE SPIRIT, A TRIBUTE TO OUR FOUNDER"

The Supreme Office of the Knights of Columbus supplied every Grand Knight of the Order a copy of a fine VCR video tape on the new "Share the Spirit, a Tribute to our Founder" 1990 membership drive promotion, in January or February, 1990. This tape was developed by the Supreme Office to be a training film for councils of the order. The tape consists of five parts all used in the promotion of our order, and membership techniques to be used by councils in the promotion and retention of membership.

The part of the VCR production on Fr. Michael McGivney's life is a great work of filmmanship. This VCR tape should be used by councils at socials and at regular meetings in an effort to promote our fraternity and better explain the reasons for our formation as a fraternal organization.

The recruitment instructional part of the VCR tape on the "Share the Spirit" distributed by Supreme, should be made available to the council membership directors in the coming years by the Grand Knights who received the tapes.

The councils of our state should be using this VCR tape as a means to train recruiters for our state councils. This is a great way to explain what a recruiter should say and do to recruit a member.

All councils of the state should keep and make use of these VCR tapes for future use. It is further recommended that these valuable tapes should be used in district meetings by District Deputies at the beginning of each new fraternal year to help explain the How-to's of membership promotion to new council membership directors in the future.

EACH COUNCIL OF THE STATE CAN WIN A FREE PORTRAIT OF FATHER MICHAEL J. McGIVNEY

From January 1, 1990 to December 31, 1990 any council in the Mississippi Jurisdiction who host a first degree at their council, brings in 5 new members at those degrees, and dedicates the First Degree to our founder Father Michael J. McGivney, will receive a portrait of Father Michael J. McGivney which is on display at this convention.

NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT: Norman L. Kiehm Chairman

New Council Development has been promoted during this past year.

The establishment of the Brandon Council 10216, by Joseph B. Goellner, and his work in the development of the recharter of the Canton Council.

The Hattiesburg, USM College Council which Richard Hollingsworth has been working on but has had enough form 100's completed, but has not been able to get those candidates to get initiated and progressed. Work will be continued.

After the end of the 1990 results were discussed.

Brother Leleux reported on the activities used this year for Knights of Columbus membership promotions:

1. - 6. The installment of bi-monthly articles promoting membership in the Magnolia Knight was an effort per Brother Leleux to try to encourage membership by every possible means.

During this past year the losses of our membership have been devastating. From July 1989 to November 1989 the Mississippi Knights of Columbus did not have a net gain of a member, due to losses being exactly the same as our gains.

THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS AS OF APRIL 1, 1990

We have lost 208 members, while only gaining 330 members, giving the state a net gain of only 122 members.

There has been much discussion on retention during this past year.

From the installation meeting where membership retention was discussed to the School of Columbianism in Jackson where councils discussed retention to the Mid-Year meeting at Clinton where a whole program in the "Share the Spirit" campaign was discussed on retention. The Knights of Columbus, just as all fraternal organizations, are facing the problems of retention. The fact is, if there are not members in local councils who make the effort to contact past due members, and get those dues collected when a member is to be suspended, we will always be faced with this problem of retention in our state, and in our order, of the Knights of Columbus.

Brothers, the answer to retention is simple. Geting the member to want to pay his dues. Until we have members in every council, other than the financial secretary, to contact the past due members to get his dues paid up, we can not and will not solve the problem of retention. Each council has got to want to get those past due members paid up on their dues.

The solutions of retention begin in each council when someone other than the financial secretary gets involved. This member is the retention chairman and he should be getting involved to help solve the problem of retention in the local council.
