PROCEEDINGS OF THE 87TH ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Friday, April 26, 1991

The 87th Annual State Convention of the Mississippi State Council, Knights of Columbus was convened at 6:00 p.m. with State Deputy Marvin L. Lott calling the meeting to order. Father Frank Corcoran, the State Chaplain was presented with food and money collected for the Care and Share program. Father Frank Corcoran then said the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag led by Norman Kiehm, Fourth Degree Master. Convention chair, Ray Patterson, then introduced Derwood Boyles who welcomed the Knights to Jackson.

State Secretary, Stanley M. Swentkowski gave the response on behalf of the State Council to Mr. Boyles. State Deputy Marvin L. Lott officially called the convention to order at 6:23 p.m.

State Deputy Marvin L. Lott asked Bruce Pabon, the Grand Knight of the new Council 10499, Msgr. Gregory Kennedy of Ocean Springs to read his report. He also allowed District Deputy #10 Larry Tabor and District Deputy #6 Joseph Bonfiglio to read their reports.

Community Director, Robert Murrah thanked Council 10499 for submitting excellent reports.

State Advocate, Greg Niolet passed out all resolutions received prior to the convention.

State Deputy Marvin L. Lott appointed Gordon Cowie, the Financial Secretary of Pearl Council 8038 as Chairman of the Financial Secretaries meeting.

John Bennett related that he had collected another \$153.00 toward the Care and Share Program.

After some final announcements by Roy Patterson, Supreme Representative Harvey Bacque, Senior Vice President of Fraternal Services made some remarks to the delegates.

State Deputy Marvin Lott asked that all Grand Knight, District Deputy, and Committee Reports not previously mailed to the State Secretary by April 1, 1991 be turned in at this time for printing.

The first Business Session was closed with a prayer at 7:17 by State Chaplain Father Frank Corcoran. The delegates adjourned for the state raffle and Banquet.

MSGR. JOHN J. BURNS COUNCIL 802 MERIDIAN GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

Council 802 began July under a new administration with a new Grand Knight and some very supportive officers. Goals were established by the council during the first month of service, including: increasing membership, improving the physical plant of the council home, and continuing the routine programs which we have supported in the past. We also expected to add new activities as we progressed.

During the course of the year, our Bingo program was rejuvenated, adding badly needed funds to our treasury. With the funds we proceeded to repair and renovate the Council Hall. We have plans under way for future improvements.

Listed below are the activities that the Council developed for the year 1990-91. Chancellor Gerald Graham served as general program director with activities chairmen serving under his supervision.

CHURCH AND RELATED FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES: The Council membership is made up from six area parishes: St. Peter's Cathedral, St. Richards, St. Mary's, St. Therese, Holy Family and Holy Savior. Council members perform a variety of duties at the parish level such as lectors, community leaders, Eucharistic ministers, instructors, choir members and ushers. They also assist with building and grounds maintenance of their respective parishes.

For several months on Saturday nights during the year - but now discontinued - the Council sponsored bingo and in March a spaghetti dinner. All funds raised were contributed to the Diocese Priest Education Fund.

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES: Council members served as volunteers at local hospitals such as delivering newspapers to patient's rooms, assisting in the admissions office and with mail delivery, and the teaching of reading in the hospital-associated Jackson Mental Health Center. The Council sponsored the annual Christmas and Egg-Nog party with a decorated money tree, the proceeds from which were given to the (Marie Everett) program for the aged. The annual Tootsie Roll Drive to raise funds for the mentally retarded was a success because of participation by a large number of members. Assistance was given to the Salvation Army at Christmas time through the ringing of bells for collection of funds.

A small amount of income was generated through the rental of the Council Hall to organizations or individuals.

COUNCIL ACTIVITIES: Council members visited the sick and shut-ins at local hospitals and at their homes. As part of the International "Marian Hour of Prayer", the Council sponsored a public prayer service with Father Michael Flannery serving as homolist. (The prayer service honored the Blessed Virgin Mary under the title "Our Lady of the Assumption" and centered on an Icon depicting Mary as she is assumed body and soul into Heaven.) The Council sponsored the annual memorial service for deceased members - to which the general public was invited - with Father Tony Prudenz officiating.

The annual Labor Day Bazaar - a day of fun for all ages, featuring bar-b-que dinners, special games for children, bingo, etc. - was a success.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES: in November, the Council sponsored the 21st annual Knights of Columbus Memorial Football Bowl at the Bishop Brunini Field, St. Joseph High School, which was made up of four area elementary teams: St. Richard's Parish, Clinton YMCA, Clinton Elementary School, and Timberlawn Elementary School. Each player participating in the games was given a trophy. Proceeds from the bowl were used for scholarships for students of Council members. The Council also sponsored the annual basketball tournament to which all the area Catholic elementary schools were invited. Proceeds from this tournament are used for the maintenance of the Council Hall.

During this council year, due to the various messages we received from our State Officers regarding membership and membership quotas, our council, under my leadership concentrated on recruiting new members. We sponsored a group that entertains patrons in a nursing home once a month. We operated a bingo game for the E.S.A. Sorority to raise money for St. Jude's Hospital, and they raised \$800. We conducted a blood drive for Desert Storm, and we built a handicap ramp from the sidewalk to the doorway of Liquori Hall.

We had a R.N. give a talk on blood pressure and take our blood pressure; and we had an information night. We sponsored a certified First Degree Team, and held three initiations at which we initiated 17 new members. We had our annual awards banquet at which time we installed our new officers in your presence. We sent a religious Christams Card to each members of our parish in the name of the Knights of Columbus.

ST. ANN'S LIZANA COUNCIL 9958 GULFPORT GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

I am pleased to submit as my annual report the following information, regarding the accomplishments of St. Ann's council 9958 for the Fraternal year of 1990-1991.

Our council since its charter, has always endeavored to work as closely as possible with our parish, St. Ann's Lizana. With this fact in mind, we have performed the following services.

The council has offered the services of its members to assist the parish in any matters concerning the youth. The council providess volunteers to teach in the C.C. D. program, and to serve as chaperons for youth programs when asked.

Members of our council serve as Eucharistic Ministers, lectors, commentators and ushers throughout the year in exchange for use of the parish hall.

We have subsidized the parish utility expenses a total of \$2,400.00 in exchange for use of the parish hall.

Our council provides the majority of the labor to operate the annual parish bazaar, which runs for four days in May.

As a gesture of recognition, on Mother's Day, after each mass, our council gave each mother in our parish a long stem carnation.

On Father's Day, after each mass, a donut-coffee reception is given for the fathers of the parish.

We provide the labor to work the annual \$10,000 parish draw-down and dinner which is held each July.

On July 27th and 28th we held our second annual Knights of Columbus Tri State Rodeo. This activity provides low cost, family entertainment for up to 4,000 people on a good weekend, and nets our council between \$5,000 and \$8,000 depending on the weather.

A \$200.00 donation was given to our pastor to help defray the expenses of his trip home to Ireland.

At the request of St. Ann's Rosary Makers, our council purchased the supplies for them to make rosaries, which they sent to the Saltillo Missions.

One family whose home was destroyed by fire was also assisted by our council.

This year we provided assistance to two brothers in their time of need caused by unfortunate accidents.

We began our holiday food drive in October by asking all parishioners to bring one can good or food package to church each time they came until Christmas. It became a joint effort with our parish. The council purchased eighteen turkeys and distributed them with the baskets. We repeated the food to the needy again at Christmas. The food that was left over has since been given to the needy in our community.

Brother Michael Moran prepared special decorations for the church for the Thanksgiving week masses. He performed a similar service for the Christmas Holidays.

We supported and assisted with a parish dinner given in honor of our pastor's mother, who was visiting from Ireland.

On December 9, 1990 the council, in a joint project with the Ladies Auxiliary, held a free lunch and bingo afternoon for the elderly of our community.

On December 15, 1990, we sponsored a Christmas party for children 0-10 years old. Santa passed out gifts to each, refreshments were then served to everyone.

On December 16, 1990, members of our council cooked and served the Christmas Dinner given by our pastor for the parish.

The council volunteered to conduct the New Year's Eve Dance and Breakfast given by the church.

In January, the local Free Throw Competition was held at the local school with the assistance of one of the coaches.

At the same time of the Ladies Auxiliary Easter Egg Hunt, on March 23, 1991, the council sponsored a coloring contest for children ages 2-12. Prizes were awarded to each age group.

We sponsor a bingo game each week on Tuesday night in the parish hall. The Ladies Auxiliary provides tremendous support by running the food concession. Special games have been established to support the C.C.D. program in our parish, the Gulf Coast Mental Health Center, and the De L'Epee Deaf Center. Through February 28, 1991, these contributions have totaled \$3,299.90.

In order to ensure a successful membership drive in the last quarter of 1991, the council voted to suspend the initiation fee for all new members applying before December 31, 1990. These fees were absorbed by the council, and paid for with revenue from donut sales held on the first Saturday of each month.

There were two goals which were upper most for our council this year. One was to increase our membership, and the other was to increase attendance at out meetings.

I am happy to report that we have added eight new members, and we have elevated ten to the Third Degree.

As of today we have four gentlemen with approved applications, waiting for exemplification into the Knights.

A lot of credit goes to our membership chairman, John Moran and the members of his committee, and to all the members of our council who have gone out and asked a gentleman to join the Knights.

Attendance at our meeting was averaging 25%. Our goal was to increase it to 35%. I am delighted to report that for the last three months we are averaging 42% of our members in attendance at the council meeting.

Through the Lizana Home Board, our council has finalized the purchase of a three acre tract of land, which adjoins the St. Ann's property. In the near future we will move an existing building to this property for our chamber building. It will be the beginning of our council complex.

In the coming year we are going to remain active in the activities in which we are strong and get more active in the activities in which we are weak.

These accomplishments, even though small, give those of us in Council 9958 a great feeling of satisfaction that we have served our council, our Order, our parish and our fellow man with the teachings of Christ in mind.

Following the Credentials Committee Report, Supreme Representative Harvey Bacque, Senior Vice President of Fraternal Services made some comments to the Knights of Columbus in attendance. Following these comments, Bishop William R. Houck, Honorary State Chaplain made remarks to the Knights in attendance.

STATE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

Worthy State Deputy and Fellow Knights:

I am privileged to serve as your State Chaplain and to make this annual report.

On behalf of Bishop Houck, Bishop Howze, the pastors and religious of the Dioceses of Jackson and Biloxi, I take this opportunity to officially thank the Knights of Columbus in the Mississippi Jurisdiction for their generosity in providing a leadership in so many areas of the Church.

This past year was a very special year as we celebrated the 100th anniversary of the death of Father Michael J. McGivney. It is good to review the history of our Order especially for new members. Let us visit and comfort families who have lost loved ones or are separated from them. Let the Love of the Lord Jesus be strong in the hearts of all members. Let us pray for each other and especially for all new officers for the coming year.

There is no better way to celebrate our 87th Annual Convention than to spend it here in Jackson with all our Brothers and Sisters assembled to honor our bishops, our clergy and specifically, our council chaplains. By the presence of our bishops, priests, and deacons, here this weekend, we know we are on the right track.

Thank you for the opportunity to allow me to stand here today as your humble servant, permitting me to express my gratitude to you for entrusting me with the responsibilities of heading this great jurisdiction in our order. I am truly honored!

As our convention brings happy times, it also gives us time to reflect on the depth of what we stand for by remembering the work of those faithful brothers, who have gone to their eternal reward. For these and all departed brothers we are so grateful for their inspiration and friendship.

STATE OFFICERS AND PAST STATE DEPUTIES

In my opinion there has never been a group of men, collectively or individually, who have worked harder and dedicated more of their lives to one order than these men. Each one, to a man, in his own way, has met the challenge and responded in a way you would be proud of. The accomplishments which have been achieved during my administration bear the cumulative effect of the positive results of my predecessors. Each of the Past State Deputies has generously and willingly responded each time I have sought his counsel, and I am truly grateful.

TEMPUS FUGIT

How time flies when one is privileged to join with other Knights who are committed to the principles of charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism. A year ago I asked for your support to accept positions of responsibility, knowing that several new District Deputies and Program Chairmen would be appointed. I am pleased with your response in accepting the call to service. Your attendance at State and District Meetings is indicative of your desire to promote the idea of Columbianism in Mississippi. What an inspiration it is to converse with the supreme officers and other state deputies. Attending Mass in St. Mary's Church is a guarantee that will convince any member the Knights of Columbus is a first class organization and deserves our best efforts to promote its continued existence for future generations.

INSTALLATION OF STATE OFFICERS AND DISTRICT DEPUTIES

On June 29, 1990 the installation of State Officers and District Deputies was held in my home parish church, Our Lady of Victories. Bishop Houck celebrated the Mass with State Chaplain, Father Frank Corcoran. After Mass my home council, Council 5556, hosted a cocktail party with a dance afterwards for all the out of town guests. At this time I would like to thank my home council for making this a weekend a memorable one for me as well as for my wife.

SCHOOL OF COLUMBIANISM

On July 29, 1990 the members of the Knight of Columbus in the State of Mississippi met in Jackson for one of the largest schools held. There were 138 members at this meeting. Thirty-nine of the forty-four councils were represented. This should prove that when we unite as one all things are possible.

On August 6 thru the 8th, 1990, your State Deputy, along with Past State Deputy "Doc" Ladnier, State Secretary Stan Swentkowski, and State Membership Director Jesse Quinn, III, attended the one hundred and eighth Supreme Convention in San Antonio, Texas. I wish all Knights in our state would try to go to at least one Supreme Convention. The reason is to see for yourself, first hand, just what a great fraternal organization you belong to!

Your State Deputy, accompanied by his wife Kathleen, attended the Supreme Midwinter Meeting in Atlanta, Georgia on November 16 and 17, 1990. The Supreme Board of Directors voted the theme, from January 1, 1991 to December 31, 1991, would be called "Discovery". Let us, as Knights of Columbus, continue to pass on the heritage that was given to us by our founder, Father Michael J. McGivney, to other Catholic gentlemen. We must continue to recruit new members for our beloved order. It is said, if we can't bring in new members into our order, we will certainly just dry up. Think of future generations to come after us!

MIDWINTER MEETING

On December 2, 1990 the Knights of Columbus, again in a large number, totaling 113 members throughout our state, met in Jackson for the midwinter meeting. The theme was "Discovery" and I am proud to say that the State Officers and members of the state family did an outstanding job bringing to you the message of what being a Knight truly stands for and how to promote membership!

STATE OF THE ORDER IN MISSISSIPPI

There are many aspects of the State of the Order in Mississippi I would like to talk about. At this time, I will focus on several areas.

MEMBERSHIP, probably the most difficult job in the order, or at least, the most objective for analysis, you, my Brother Knights, along with the State Membership Director and District Deputies have met the challenge!

At the beginning of this fraternal year, we set out, not willing to "play the numbers game", but to promote membership on the premise (which we firmly believe) that one of the greatest favors a Knight of Columbus can do, is to expose a fellow practicing Catholic to an organization that, with work, will bring him closer to Almighty God. With this in mind, you have achieved this endeavor. This year, July 1, 1990 to April 1, 1991, the Jurisdiction of Mississippi has recruited 361 new members, but due to-a limited suspension, we have lost 63, giving us a Net Gain of 298 Members and keeping us in first place, both in net gain and percentage gain of 6.30% in Division 6 for the first nine months of the fraternal year. But the job is not over, we must continue to recruit new members, if we are to stay in first place. At the beginning of the fraternal year we set goals for membership. I can truly say that 18 councils lived up to their commitment. They are the councils we call "Top Gun" winners. These councils gained at least a 10% increase in their membership. As I name these councils, I would like the delegates from these councils to please stand and remain standing until all have been named:

Please give a hand of applause. Brother Knights, please take special note that these councils, just named, set their goals at 10% and they held fast, not for recognition for themselves, but for their beloved order.

We today have a Top Gun District and that District Deputy is Joseph Bonfiglio of District 6. Even though 2 other districts did not receive a Top Gun District Deputy Award, their districts did obtain a 10% increase in membership. They are Jesse Quinn, III of District 2 and James R. Leatherwood of District 1.

Please give a hand of applause.

NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

We had two new councils join our state council since July 1, 1990, but we still need one more new council to meet our goal of three the Supreme Council has set for us. It is only right to commend

District Deputy Jesse Quinn III, and Insurance Field Agent Fred Ward for getting the Grenada Council 10443 instituted, and to District Deputy Larry Tabor and Insurance Field Agent Mike Leleux for getting Ocean Springs Council 10499 instituted. These four men took time away from their families to go that extra mile for Columbianism, something they truly believe in. My hope and prayer is that other new councils will be instituted in the near future. This was our founder's dream, to have a Knights of Columbus Council in every parish. Let us not let his dream go in vain! Again my thanks to these men and also to P.S.D. Jesse Quinn, Jr. for his leadership as New Council Development Chairman. CEREMONIALS

My thanks to P.S.D. Norman Kiehm for chairing this position. With 10 District Deputies reporting, we have had a total of 52 First Degrees through April 1, 1991. You are to be commended for a job well done. Both the 2nd and 3rd Degree Teams are from Pascagoula Council 1605. I would like to commend the Degree Team Captain, Brother Ted Knowles, and his fine team for the job they did in Long Beach, Brandon, and Natchez. Of the six 2nd and 3rd Degree exemplifications this team performed 3 of them. Again my thanks to all of you for going out of your way to promote Columbianism. We must, in the future, look for another 2nd and 3rd Degree team to aid in offsetting expenses, as well as aiding in recruiting new members.

SUPREME COUNCIL AWARDS

This past year the Supreme Council Awards for 1989-1990 were presented. The Mississippi Jurisdiction had 38 councils of 45 active councils receive an award. This was up from 29 councils in 1988-1989. Ten councils received the Star Council Award. They are: 802 Meridian, 5556 Cleveland, 7087 Kiln, 7974 Columbus, 8038 Pearl, 8848 Tupelo, 9124 Gautier, 9543 Madison, 9673 Woolmarket, 9958 Lizana. This was up from 8 a year ago. Fifteen councils received the Columbian Award. They are: 898 Vicksburg, 1034 Natchez, 1244 Biloxi, 1522 Bay St. Louis, 1583 Gulfport, 1605 Pascagoula, 2134 Greenville, 2945 Leland, 2969 Clarksdale, 4472 Pass Christian, 5267 Greenwood, 6872 Picayune, 7120 Southaven, 8054 McComb, 9409 West Biloxi. This was up from 10 councils the year before. Twelve councils received the Founders Award. They are: 1908 Hattiesburg, 6592 Bassfield, 6765 Starkville, 6872 Picayune, 7854 Clinton, 7915 Brookhaven, 8285 Jackson St. Therese, 8760 Holly Springs, 8912 Corinth, 9094 North Biloxi, 9537 West Point, 10216 Brandon. This was up from 11 councils in 1988-1989. We had 11 councils to receive the Father McGivney Award. They are: 1522 Bay St. Louis, 1908 Hattiesburg, 2969 Clarksdale, 4472 Pass Christian, 4898 Long Beach, 6592 Bassfield, 7915 Brookhaven, 8912 Corinth, 9094 North Biloxi, 9234 Indianola, and 9409 West Biloxi. I commend each of you on a job well done. Please continue the good work!

The following councils won the "Share the Spirit" Father McGivney Award plaque, for the period January 1, 1990 to December 31, 1990. This award is given to the councils that achieved a 5% net membership gain from the date I stated earlier. There were 25 councils in our jurisdiction receiving this award. They are: 802 Meridian, 1034 Natchez, 1244 Biloxi, 1522 Bay St. Louis, 1583 Gulfport, 1908 Hattiesburg, 4472 Pass Christian, 5556 Cleveland, 6872 Picayune, 7087 Kiln, 7120 Southaven, 7915 Brookhaven, 8038 Pearl, 8054 McComb, 8285 Jackson St. Therese, 8760 Holly Springs, 8848 Tupelo, 8912 Corinth, 9094 North Biloxi, 9124 Gautier, 9409 West Biloxi, 9543 Madison, 9673 Woolmarket, 9958 Lizana, 10216 Brandon. You are to be commended for a job well done!

The state programs have been very good this year, but the job will not be finished until the paperwork is completed and sent to the Supreme Council, so you and your council can win Supreme Awards. As June 30, 1991 quickly approaches, are your councils making that final push that will put our jurisdiction on top for the number of Star Councils? I personally wish to thank you for the job well done in being 100% in sending in the following forms, 185 and 365, and also again this year for being 100% in the Fraternal Activity Report.

In the Contest of Champions, for 1990, Council 2969 Clarksdale won in the net gain with 17 new members. Council 4472 Pass Christian and Council 9958 Lizana tied with 700% net percentage gain. You are to be commended for this effort.

I had the honor this year of making 43 council visits and visiting all 10 districts throughout the state. Each council showed me honor, and respect for the office I hold as State Deputy to which my fellow Knights elected me.

CONCLUSION

In closing I wish to thank the State Officers for their help and guidance in leading our state to higher levels of Columbianism. These men have labored hard and have pulled together for the one cause that you and I truly believe in, the Knights of Columbus. Each one of these men are to be commended for living up to the expectations their brother Knights had of them.

With this being a people administration, my closing remarks must be about you, all of you, and those many Brothers and their families who have done so much to ensure our success! THE GENERAL AGENT'S REPORT (APRIL, 1991)

Worthy State Deputy, Reverend Father, State Officers, Delegates, and Brother Knights:

Family: His Concern, Our Mission. Among the many reflections we can make on his theme, surely those on the Order's insurance program are most apropos. It is common knowledge that Father McGivney's greatest concern was the devastating effect an early death of the breadwinner had on the family - the surviving widow and the children. He had experienced this with the early death of his own father.

How often have we heard the questions asked, after the death of a friend: "How much insurance did he leave?" "Was it adequate?" "Will his widow have to go to work to educate her children?"

Father McGivney knew the questions and the answers. As a young priest he pondered the question, the answer every time he buried a parishioner from St. Mary's in New Haven. It was these heart-rendering answers that prompted him to found our society for the purpose, as set forth in our charter: "Of rendering mutual aid and assistance to the members and their families." We can never forget that insurance was a prime concern of our Reverend Founder and his associates.

Our insurance program is our greatest legacy in that it not only provides for the protection of the family but also provides the Order with the financial muscles to carry on its many programs for the betterment of mankind. It is the insurance program that supplies the revenues for most of our programming, leadership training and charitable endeavors. Per capita assessments barely pay for the cost of the magazine received by each member every month. It has often been said that were it not for our insurance program, all of us would spend a major portion of our time raising funds for our Order's survival. Because of its success the results of our efforts can be directed toward our neighbor.

As with any legacy or bequest, however, for it to be meaningful it must continue to mulitply and flourish. I can proudly say to you today that our insurance program is doing just that. The performance this past year has been very good, considering that the industry has generally had a flat year. By year-end 1989, the Knights of Columbus had 1,083,810 policies on the books amounting to \$15,770,167,000 of life insurance in force. In 1990, the Order \$3.1 billion insurance was written. Today, we have over 18 billion in force.

Knights of Columbus had \$129.1 million-dollar dividend distribution to living members far exceeds the \$36.5 million dollars in death benefits paid to beneficiaries of deceased members during this past year.

The greatest achievemnets over the years, is the security and peace of mind the multi-millions of dollars (\$513,776,430) paid in death claims have brought to the widows and children of our deceased members; and the serene and secure retirement years afforded to our living members through the hundreds of millions of dollars (\$1,132,893,490) paid in maturities dividends, interest, proceeds of annuities and disability waivers. For the first time we can boast that the Order over its 108-year history has now paid out more than \$1 billion dollars in dividends, of which 13% was paid out this year alone. This is just another reason why every member should be an insured member.

Best's Insurance Reports, the most prestigious rating service of insurance companies, says this about our insurance program:

"This society has been most ably managed. . . In operations a very important item is expenses, which have been kept low." I might mention that our ratio of operating expenses to premium income has decreased from 27.1% in 1984 to 24.6% in 1989. Best's continued: "Careful selection and underwriting of business has produced a very favorable mortality experience. Policy lapses and surrenders have been very low. Best's has further stated that our profitability has enabled us consistently to increase surplus funds which, when compared to our overall insurance risk, are significantly above those of the average life insurance company. For the 16th consecutive year Best's has given the Order a rating of A-plus (Superior)." Very few insurance companies can make that boast.

FINANCIAL RESULTS--INVESTMENTS

The operating results of the Order for 1989 were excellent considering the fact that the financial industry is experiencing serious difficulties. Every day we hear about the disaster in the savings and loan industry and commercial banking not to mention the junk-bond saga. The reason for our Order's success is simple.

Your management decided long ago that the most prudent course for the Order should be "steady

and constant growth." There is no future in building assets if they deteriorate the bottom line. For ten years all around us everybody has been expanding and in some instances literally buying assets. Now all you hear is "We need to downsize."

Fortunately the Order does not find itself in this dilemma. We are financially strong and sound. Our net operational gain amounted to \$159.3 million, which ranks us 35th in the entire insurance industry and places us in the top 1%. In this area we compete with the giants. It is results such as these that enable us to continue to pay good dividends, meet all of our obligations and promote the principles and programs of the Order on all fronts. We can face the future with confidence.

Our investments portfolio is of the highest quality, again we have been emphasizing quality over yield. Not all issues provide the optimum yield but the fact that we almost never suffer a loss provides us with an aggregate net yield consistently better than the industry. Less than one quarter of 1% of our bond portfolio was in default at year-end. The investments in question are represented by two companies.

Our cash flow, net of expenses, provided by premium income, repayments of bonds and mortgages and interest income, amounts to \$470 million dollars annually. This means we have approximately \$1.9 million dollars to invest each working day.

Our common stock portfolio at year-end had a cumulative unreaized gain of \$45.6 million dollars based on a cost of \$99.5 million. An additional \$20 million dollar profit was realized from the sale of stocks and the sale and deduction of bonds and other assets during this past year.

During the year the Order committed \$18.2 million in new loans to dioceses, parishes and religious institution, bringing the total for the last ten years to \$150.4 million secured by 190 individual mortgages. At year-end we had a \$75 million balance in church related loans, reflecting an excellent repayment experience. You should know that in 1986 we voluntarily reduced the rate of all mortgages on religious institutions that were made during the years of high interest rates to 10%: in 1987 9%; and in 1988, 1989, and 1990 to $9^{-1/2}\%$. This program calls for an annual review. These actions by the board of directors saved our dioceses and parishes \$2.606,744 through June 30, 1990.

REPORT OF THE STATE QUINCENTENNIAL CHAIRMAN

The year 1992 marks the 500th Anniversary of the discovery of America by Christopher Columbus and will be the occasion for celebration by numerous offical and unofficial groups no the least of which is our own Order for whom Columbus is the model. The Supreme Office has already given careful thought to ways in which Columbus' achievement may be commemorated and has developed specific plans to carry out appropriate celebrations thrughout 1992 culminating on Columbus Day in October of that year.

Although some of you will be past Grand Knights soon or, perhaps by the end of the 1991-1992 fraternal year, it is important that you initiate plans for your Council's participation in this unique celebration.

The State Deputy has appointed me to a three-year term as State Chairman of the Bicentennial Celebration, since this celebration will extend beyond next year's annual convention. What I would like to do is to give you a current report on the status of the celebration, a brief survey of where help can be found in planning activities, and, finally, a report on some things I intend to do as State Chairman.

As of this date each Council is supposed to have a Bicentennial Chairman in place, on a three-year appointment. His name should have been submitted to Supreme and to me. In a memorandum dated February 22, 1990, the Department of Fraternal Services reported that thirty Councils had not reported the appointment of a chairman. I followed up with a memorandum to Grand Knights dated March 8, 1990 to which I got responses from four Councils. The June 1, 1990 Program Supplement published a form on which to submit the names of Council Bicentennial Chairmen. A December 7, 1990, report showed that fifteen Councils had yet to report and the last report I have, dated February 19, 1991, inexplicably showed twenty Councils which have not as yet submitted the names of Bicentennial Chairmen. So, the current status of the celebration in this jurisdiction is that we have not yet begun to get organized in order to do the necessary planning for a successful celebration. Please send in your chairmen's name. I will also need to know the names and addresses of your chairmen in order to assist them in planning their activities.

Where can we get help in planning for 1992? The most important source is the Department of Fraternal Services in the Supreme Office and in various publications circulated by the Order. Already available are publiciations suggesting planning procedures and programs on Supreme, State, and local Council levels and the life and achievemnts of Columbus. A tape entitled "Christopher Columbus: Faithful Christ Bearer" and a film "Dawn of America" are available for showing in your Councils and committees. Camera-ready clip-art of the bicentennial logo is available for use on letterheads and other communications. The Program Supplement lists activities already on the calendars of Councils in the various jurisdictions of the Order and Columbia has been carrying articles related to the Bicentennial. And a special publication entitled "Destination Discovery" is being circulated to State Deputies and other State officials. As usual, the Order provides plenty of support for a project once undertaken.

I should also mention that there is a national organization concerned with celebrating the quincentennial of Columbus' voyage. It is the Christopher Columbus Quincentary Jubilee Commission which is sponsoring and coordinating numerous events, many in cooperation with State Commissions of which one is in Mississippi. These agencies are important sources of ideas for your Chairmen. For example, the National Commission can supply you with a calendar showing all activities planned to date.

In short, there are plenty of ideas and suggestions available to help Councils sponsor appropriate events to mark the quincentennial.

As soon as I get the name and address of your chairman I will send him a list of suggested programs and events as well as other pertinent information as to sources of ideas. I will also make recommendations to the State Deputy concerning State programs of commemorate the quincentennial and concerning the need to incorporate quincentennial projects into the State's programs recognizing Distinguished Councils.

I know that most of you will probably be Past Grand Knights by October 12, 1991. But the success of this program depends on careful planning initiated during the current fraternal year and acted upon in the 1991-1992 fraternal year. I am asking that you go back to your Councils, make sure you have a working Chairman and put him to work.

If I can be of any help, please let me know.

REPORT OF CEREMONIALS COMMITTEE

As State Ceremonial Chairman I am most happy to report that we will have had 6 major 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications in the State this fraternal year, more than in any recent year.

In August of 1990, Biloxi Council No. 1244 hosted an exemplification of the 2nd and 3rd Degree. The Degree Team from New Orleans was used.

In October 1990, a major exemplification was hosted by Tupelo Council No.8848, and put on by the Degree Team from Whitehaven, TN.

In January 1991, a 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplification was hosted by Long Beach Council No. 4898. The Pascagoula Degree Team conducted them.

March of 1991 found the Brandon Council No. 10216 hosting a major exemplification. Again, the Pascagoula Degree Team was used. The C.O. came from Memphis, TN.

On April 14 of this year the Pascagoula Degree Team traveled to Natchez for a 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplification, hosted by Council No. 1034.

Next month, in May of 1991, the New Orleans Degree Team will conduct an 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplification in the Pascagoula Council No. 1605.

You will note that of the six major exemplifications being conducted in the State this year, three out of State Degree Teams had to be used. Although each and every exemplification was very well done and very successful, the use of out of state teams is very expensive. This again points up the need of other 2nd and 3rd Degree Teams in the State that can be used in the northern part of the State and also when the Pascagoula team cannot be used on the coast.

This Ceremonials Chariman made a sincere effort to establish a 3rd Degree Team in the Delta as well as revitalize a 2nd Degree Team that had been started in the Jackson area several years ago, but had to abandon both because of, sorry to say, utter lack of interest and commitment on the part of members asked. I believe that this lack of commitment is the only reason why we cannot have additional Degree Teams in our jurisdiction, and that another attempt to form them should be made again this coming year, Perhaps some of the newly initiated members may consent to join in such a venture.

For the past two years I've encouraged each council to appoint their own public relations liaison, a job just as important as church, community, youth directors, etc. This man should be responsible for supplying the media with information on the activities of his council. The media editors would like to receive this information. If you don't have a PR liaison, please go back to your council and appoint someone.

My committee and I discussed the Magnolia Knight. We are concerned that this valuable source of information is not being distributed with the frequency it should. We understand the financial condition that required it being changed to a quarterly publication. I feel the quarterly format is not adequate and I am concerned about the deteriorating quality. The Magnolia Knight is a reflection of our State Council, and quite frankly, I'm a little disappointed in that reflection.

I will study this situation and make budgetary and frequency recommendations to our State Deputy for consideration.

Brothers, it has been a great honor and a privilege to serve you as your State Membership Director.

At the state organizational meeting in July and also at the School of Columbianism, I outlined an aggressive membership campaign for the 1990-91 fraternal year that was designed to encourage every member to get involved with membership recruitment. The first priority of the membership campaign was to recognize the members and councils who are our membership recruitment leaders.

A new award was established, the "TOP PROPOSER OF THE MONTH" award, to recognize the individual knight who recruits the most members in the state during a given month. Reactivatins, reinstatements, and readmissions as well as new members all count towards this award. The awards for the months of July through February have all been awarded at the winner's council home by a member of the state council. The winners are:

The TOP PROPOSER OF THE MONTH award program has proven to be very successful. It has not only inspired our knights who were already actively recruiting new members, but it has made membership recruitment for the Knights of Columbus an honor in the eyes of members who were not yet involved in promoting our Order.

A "TOP PROPOSER OF THE YEAR" award was also established to honor the knight who recruits the most members from July 1 until April 1. This award will be presented at the state convention in Jackson during the award's banquet.

We also have encouraged our councils in Mississippi to promote the Supreme Council's VIP program which recognizes our membership recruiters for the additions to membership which they personally obtain throughout their entire association with the Knights of Columbus. Each membership director who attended the School of Columbianism received "VIP" club rules, forms, and Personal Recruitment Record Booklets.

To recognize our councils, we continued the "TOP GUN COUNCIL" award program, which recognizes those elite councils that attain a 10% or better net gain in membership. Since this report is due April 1, the final results for "TOP GUN COUNCIL" awards are not available; however, to date, fifteen councils have qualified for this award.

Since a district deputy is the glue that brings a district's councils together, and since a district deputy has the power to be a very positive influence in the area of membership recruitment and retention in his district, we decided to establish an award to recognize our district deputies.

A "TOP GUN DISTRICT" award was established to recognize a district deputy, all of whose councils qualify for the "TOP GUN COUNCIL" award. District Deputy Joe Bonfiglio of District No. 6 has qualified to win this award.

There are also two districts that have attained a 10% net gain in membership for the entire district. They are District No. 1 and District No. 2. D. D. James Leatherwood is the district deputy for District No. 1, while D. D. Jesse Quinn III is the district deputy for District No. 2.

As the State Membership Director, I made a commitment along with the state officrs and the K of C insurance agents to assist any council who asked for my help with the membership campaign. As of this report, I have made 44 visits to 24 councils in our Mississippi Jurisdiction.

Our success as a jurisdiction in membership has been outstanding. As of the last Supreme Council report, Mississippi has been given credit for recruiting 331 members with a net gain of 269 members. This has put our Mississippi Jurisdiction in FIRST PLACE IN MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT. Our jurisdiction is not only in first place in net membership gain, but it is also in first place in percent membership gain with a 5.69% gain.

In closing, I would like to ask the Knights of Mississippi to continue to promote our Order by telling the other Catholic men of our state about the Knights of Columbus and by asking them to become members. I would also like to thank our State Deputy, Marvin Lott, for giving me the opportunity to serve my fellow knights as the State Membership Director of the Mississippi Jurisdiction.

The committee recommended continuing the Top Proposer of the Month program, which was instituted at the beginning of this fraternal year to recognize the individual knight who recruits the most members during a given month throughout the state. This program has proven to be very successful. It has not only inspired our knights who were already actively recruiting members, but it has made membership recruitment an honor in the eyes of those knights who were not previously involved in promoting our Order.

The Top Proposer of the Year award program was also established at the beginning of this fraternal year. This award recognizes the knight who recruits the most members from July 1 to April 1. The membership committee recommended that this program also be continued.

The committee encourages each council to promote the Supreme Council's VIP program, so that the membership recruiters in each of our councils will receive the recognition that they so richly deserve for building the future of their council and the Knights of Columbus.

We would also recommend establishing a Highest Net Gain in Membership award for each council category. We feel that this award, along with the Highest Percent Gain in Membership award, will properly recognize our outstanding councils.

In addition, we recommend continuing the Top Gun Council award program to recognize the councils that attain a 10% or better net gain in membership, and the Top Gun District award program to recognize a distict all of whose councils qualify for the Top Gun Council award.

We feel that these incentive programs will serve to encourage every member and every council to get involved with membership recruitment.

A review of this year's membership results finds Mississippi in first place in both percent gain and net gain in Division VI. Twenty seven of our councils reached their Supreme Council quota by attaining a 5% net gain in membership, while eighteen councils reached a 10% net gain in membership and qualified for the Top Gun Council award. Two districts, Districts No. 1 and No. 2, eclipsed their Supreme Council quota by over 300%, and District No. 6 eclipsed its quota by over 500%.

This has truly been an outstanding year for membership recruitment in the Mississippi Jurisdiction.

Thirty-eight (38) Councils have reported on their Church Activities, citing many activities, including (among others) active participation in the "Marian Hour of Prayer", Vocations, Corporate Communion, "Keep Christ in Christmas", Rosary devotions, Retreats and providing assistance to their respective parishes.

We had 100% participation in Districts 1, 2, 5, 6, 8 and 10. The activities and their timely reporting by the Councils in these districts are to be commended. For some reason we have not received a report from two (2) Councils in District 3; one (1) Council in District 4; three (3) Councils in District 7 and one (1) Council in District 9. We are fairly certain that these councils have actively participated in Church Activities but did not report same.

Brother Knights, through your dedicated Church Activities, you have provided genuine leadership in affirming the religious health in your communities. You have through untiring efforts, sponsored activities which enabled the individual brother knight to set constant and worthy examples as an ideal Catholic to his family, his community and his fellow members.

Some time ago I challenged all councils to complete their five activities and partake of all the awards they were capable of receiving and I believe it has been met. As I read through the reports I feel that our councils have finally gotten the message of Columbianism and that we are getting involved in and with our communities. Let us now work for the 100 percent mark.

We were involved in various fund raisers: Catholic charities, Saint Jude's Hospital, bake sales, festivals, cook-offs, parties, picnics, banquets, reunions, fairs, food and clothing, turkey shoots, watermelon bashes, balloon races, bar-b-ques, flea markets, crawfish boils, golf tournamentss, bingo games, doll and toy and many other worthy causes.

STATE PRO-LIFE REPORT

Once again I am allowed the privilege of talking to you. I thank all of you for this.

I want to talk to you about what has happened in Pro-Life, and where we are heading this coming fraternal year.

On September 8, 1990, Mississippi Right to Life sponsored a Christian Music Concert on the Coast. It was a fair success for the first try at this endeavor. The Knights of Columbus on the Coast supported it very nicely.

On October 27, 1990, in the Biloxi Diocese, but mainly on the Coast, we held the 2nd Annual Knights of Columbus Respect Life, All-Denomination Collection Drive to collect items for Pregnancy Care Centers, homes for abused families and for substance abuse persons. It also was a fair success.

On January 19, 1991, Mississippi Right to Life sponsored "Rally for Life Mississippi '91" at the State Capitol to commemorate the Roe vs. Wade decision of the U. S. Supreme Court and to impress the state legislators that Mississippi is Pro-Life. The KC's were there in force. Brother Stan Swentkowski represented the State Council on the speakers stand, three councils with banners were there and the Ladies Auxiliaries of the Knights of Columbus were there in force and Bishop Houck gave the closing prayer. This show of the Catholic Church and of the Knights of Columbus was a first. We should be in larger numbers next year.

Last year at the installation of state officers at Cleveland, the programs committee instituted a new awards program about Fetal Statues whereas each council will be awarded for purchasing sets of fetal statues (for \$50.00 per set but cost \$70.00 at this time) to be donated to a school, library or any organization that may properly use the set. The program took longer to get into action than anticipated. It is in operation and I will be in touch with you about it. I have a copy here on display for all of you to see. I must mail it back to Mississippi Right to Life in Washington, D. C. I have another Pro-Life Program that I am working to develop. The Jackson Diocese has a 1 - 800 number for pregnant women to call for help with their pregnancy. We want to expand the program to include both Dioceses with a phone at the Chancery Office in Jackson, phone book listings and billboard space state wide. I will be asking each council to contribute to the support of the program. Since the Informed Consent bill has been passed by the State Legislation and pregnant women will be told of the alternatives to abortion, then we, as Pro-Life Christians, must provide the means for them to locate and participate in the alternatives. The 1 - 800 number system will do just that.

Many of my Brother Knights and their ladies ask me "What can I do to help?" Well, I stayed so busy in various projects that I have not been supplying an answer. As I see it now, I realize that the most important one thing that any of us can do to combat the abortion problem is to help form and participate in a Parish Pro-Life Committee. As Catholics, it all starts and stops in our parish. Our parish is our "Base of Operations", so to speak. Therefore, our most effective method of getting Pro-Life things done is to organize in our parish with our friends and launch out with a unified effort. With the parishes working together, along with the Knights of Columbus, Mississippi Right to Life and other Pro-Life organizations, we would be almost invincible.

I have asked Brother Jim Glover, Clarksdale Council, to work with the Pro-Life Couple Chairmen in the Jackson Diocese and I am available in the Biloxi Diocese. I am in the State Directory and Brother Jim is at Clarksdale Council 2969.

Finally, I want you to get in the habit of staying in contact with your legislators. Tell them how you want them to vote on Pro-Life issues as well as all other issues. They want to know what your wishes are. Thank Lieutenant Governor Brad Dye for promoting the veto overrides on the Informed Consent bill. Tell Governor Ray Mabus you oppose his stand on abortion and ask him to consider the life of the unborn baby as being precious. But please, be careful about alienating him.

STATE OF MISSISSIPPI KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS - VOCATIONS REPORT

State Deputy Brother Marvin Lott,

Based from statistics from the Catholic Directory of 1990 and on personal observances in the church and on K of C activities, the following report is a combination of both dioceses of Mississippi.

There are 105 active dioceasan priests; 9 outside the diocese and 1 in foreign missions. We have 59 religious priests in Mississippi making a total of 171 priests in all functions and the state has 18 permanent deacons.

Mississippi has 119 parishes (5 with no resident pastor), and 40 mission churches. We have a total of 15 seminarians, 4 in Biloxi Diocese and 11 in Jackson Diocese.

I have no idea of the situation in Jackson Diocese, but in Biloxi Diocese the next ordination may be as far away as 4 years and in that time, we may lose as much as 5 priests due to retirement or illness.

The total population of both dioceses is 99,857 parishioners or roughly 900 to a thousand parishioners to every priest active in a diocese.

The total churches in Mississippi is 159 with 105 active diocese priests and approximately 30 religious in pastorate.

With a Catholic population of under 45,000 the Jackson Diocese has 2 Catholic Hospitals that assisted 120,253 persons.

The Knights of Columbus are involved in vocations by councils. They are engaged in such functions as: priest education fund, Diacontate Program, Vocation Awareness, clergy appreciation, Adopt-a-Seminarian, and various other activities.

Each council must assess its own situation and determine its own Ways and Means of assistance in the vocations area of the Catholic Church in Mississippi. We must ask ourselves if it is enough.

In addition to funds, each and every council, each and every member has at his disposal one very valuable resource - Prayer. Our Lord said, "Ask and you shall receive," are we asking hard enough?

AWARDS / REPORT CHAIRMAN REPORT

State Deputy Marvin Lott appointed me Awards/Report Forms Chairman for the 1990-1991 fraternal year. As Awards/Report Forms Chairman, I am able to help councils in our jurisdiction win their awards and meet their deadlines while helping our state council achieve a higher reporting percentage and helping the Supreme Council gather necessary information.

Each year, both state and local councils are asked to submit some very important paperwork to the Supreme Council office. More than busywork, these forms and applications serve many purposes: they help councils qualify for awards; they form the basis of the Supreme and State mailing lists so that important programming and membership materials reach the proper people; they keep Supreme Office and State Officers in touch with what our Brother Knights are doing within their communities and help document and maintain our status as a tax-exempt fraternal society. For all these reasons it is necessary that this paperwork be submitted on a timely basis by as many councils as possible.

Each year, many councils are eligible to be recognized for their efforts but fail to submit the requested paperwork. Still others miss out in qualifying for awards by not meeting one of the requirements. Many councils are not even aware their programs activities and efforts could be recognized on a state or international level. All of the facts point out a need for more work and follow-through.

There are four report forms that have to be completed and mailed to the Supreme Office and a copy mailed to the State Deputy: Form 185 (Report of Councils Officers), Form 1295 (Semi-Annual Audit Report), Form 365 (Service Program Personal Report) and Form 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report).

- Form 185 (Council Officers Report) was due August 1, 1990. This report is very important to Supreme
 and the State Council. Supreme needs the information, so the proper material can be sent to
 the Grand Knights to help him perform his duties. Also, the State Council needs the information so the State Directory can be printed and mailed to each person in need of the information.
- Form 1295 (Semi-Annual Audit Report) was due August 15, 1990 and February 15, 1991. Some councils sent the report in time and some were late.
- Form 365 (Service Program Personal Report) was due September 1, 1990. Report Form 365 is a requirement for the Columbian, Father McGivney and Founders' Awards and a requirement for the State Program Awards.
- 4. Form 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Report) was due January 31, 1991. The last report that I received from Supreme indicated that three councils had not sent in their reports, two councils were in moratorium and one was active. The report is one of the most important ones due in at Supreme. The information that Supreme receives from the report is used to retain our free tax status.

All these reports are mandatory requirements for the Mississippi Jurisdiction Program Activities. The first State Program report was due November 15, 1990 and the second report due March 31, 1991.

All Supreme Awards requirements remain the same as they were last fraternal year. All reports to qualify for the Columbian, Father McGivney, Founders' and Star Council Awards are due in before June 30, 1991.

The Star Council Award, the most prestigious of council awards, is presented to councils that meet the membership requirements of the Father McGivney, the insurance requirements of the Founders' Award and the Service Program requirements of the Columbian Awards. Last fraternal year ten (10) councils received the Star Council Awards, ten (10) councils received the Columbian, six (6) councils received the Founders' Award, two (2) councils the Father McGivney, one (1) council the Columbian/Founders' Award, four (4) councils the Columbian/Father McGivney Award and five (5) councils the Father McGivney/Founders' Award. A total of thrity-eight (38) councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction receiving Supreme Awards.

Lets make Mississippi 100% for the 1990-91 fraternal year and future years. It can be done but everybody has to do his part.

REPORT OF STATE CONVENTION COMMITTEE - APRIL 27, 1991

The State Convention Committee met in Ramada Room 1 to discuss various problems and helpful items. The purpose of this committee is to make recommendations to future convention sites and the State Deputy in order to improve our state convention.

This committee wishes to commend the convention co-chairmen, Mike Crandall and Keith Bates and their staff for organizing and performing their duties in an excellent manner.

There are sometimes items however that this committee feels need to be pointed out. The registration of delegates and guests at different locations seems to work best but this committee feels that the delegates name tag should have some type of symbol that would identify them from the convention guest members. Guest and delegates need not to have the same name tag. Pre-registration for convention packages deadline needs to be no earlier than April 15th. We feel that March 31st deadline is too early and does an injustice to convention guests. Especially those who cannot leave their employment until the last few days. Although the convention agenda is in the booklet, there should be an additional agenda sheet passed out at registration. This would enable members to carry the agenda with them. In regard to the children, we, as the Knights of Columbus are advocating family activity and participation. Children's functions and babysitting service should be a part of the convention planning. Activities such as pizza parties, dances, tours should be planned but more so should be listed in the forms that are sent to the councils. Those planning to attend the convention should know in advance that they could take their children, knowing that they can attend their functions while their children are being entertained, with proper adult supervision, of course. Presenting awards are part of the convention, however we feel that two nights in a row may be too much for those attending. These award times take approximately 2 - 21/2 hours. In the past, we eliminated some of the awards given out at the Saturday night banquet. These were given out on Saturday afternoon. Recommend to the State Deputy that these awards be given out at some other time besides at the Friday night function. The convention host spends many hours organizing the functions for during the convention. We ask the councils to show a little consideration in the opening of their hospitality rooms during the convention functions. With the opening of hospitality rooms too soon tends to take away from these functions.

FOURTH BUSINESS SESSION Sunday, April 28, 1991

The fourth business session was opened at 10:08 by State Deputy Marvin L. Lott. The prayer was said by State Chaplain Father Frank Corcoran and the Pledge of Allegiance by Master of the Fourth Degree Norman Kiehm.

Supreme Representative Harvey Bacque Senior Vice President of Fraternal Services made some remarks to the delegates.

REPORT OF THE MASTER, FOURTH DEGREE, MISSISSIPPI DISTRICT

The membership in the state continues to grow. An exemplification in Jackson this past October added 39 new members and the one in Tupelo on the 7th of this month added an additional 27. We are now just barely 40 members away from reaching for the first time in Mississippi history the one thousand member mark. A good attendance at the next exemplification should put us over that mark.

At present the Fourth Degree accounts for 20% of the total membership of the Mississippi Knights of Columbus. Our Vice Supreme Master, Past State Deputy George Harvey of Decatur, Alabama, has set a goal of 25% for the entire Bienville Province. If we in Mississippi are to do our part and attain 25% here in our state, then we must add an additional 250 members. This can be done in five or six good exemplifications.

Our next exemplification is being planned for June 8, 1991 hosted by the Gulfport Assembly 556. It will be conducted by a new fourth degree team based at that assembly and in charge of former Master Fritz Oberlies. This new team will now be able to take care of the southern part of the state, thus eliminating the expense of transporting our only other team - the Greenville team - to all parts of the state.

Supreme Master, Hilary F. Schmittzehe, was kind enough to appoint me Master of the Mississippi District. My term is to run from September 1, 1990 to August 31, 1992. As Master, I attended the Bienville Provincial meeting called by our Vice Supreme Master George E. Harvey, PSD, on October 27 and 28, 1990, hosted by our State Deputy Marvin Lott in Biloxi, MS. The duties of and regulations for the Masters and Faithful Navigators we thoroughly covered, as well as membership, manuals, ceremonials, and varrious recommendations. I thereupon called a district meeting of all Faithful Navigators of the state to be held in Jackson, December 2 in conjunction with the State Mid-Winter meeting. We covered all the items taken up at the Provincial Meeting.

I am happy to announce that the Supreme Board of Directors voted on January 25, 1991 to establish a new assembly in Picayune to be known as Father Michael Andrew Leane Assembly. This assembly received its charter in March of this year.

I am also happy to tell you that a new assembly in the Jackson area is at present being developed, to be made up of Fourth Degree Members of the Madison and the Brandon Councils.

Since the honor guard is an integral part of the Fourth Degree, I strongly urge more Fourth Degree members to avail themselves of being a part of that important body by purchasing their capes, chapeaux, and swords.

I wish to thank Supreme Master Hilary Schmittzehe for this appointment as Master of the Mississippi District. I also wish to thank Vice Supreme Master, George Harvey, as well as State Deputy Marvin Lott, for their generous and invaluable help afforded me from the very beginning of my appointment to the present time. They have certainly made my job easier and a joy to perform. In addition, I thank the Faithful Navigators of the assemblies in our state for their cooperation.

The Ladies Auxiliary started this fraternal year with their first year president Johnnie Harmon being confined to the hospital during the organizational meeting. However, her agenda was followed by State Vice President Ann Mink and State Secretary Toni Todaro as they conducted the meeting.

After our president's period of convalescing was over, she showed much vigor and spent tiresome hours trying to advance the State Knights of Columbus Ladies Auxiliary.

When we started publication of the Magnolia Knight on an every other month basis, the ladies felt that they needed to stay in touch with each other a little more frequently. Therefore a newsletter was mailed directly to all auxiliaries every month.

Last year, because of their raffle, \$203.60 was sent to the McAuley House for retired Mercy Nuns in Vicksburg, and their fund raiser contributed \$1,532.00 to the Burn Center in Greenville. At this convention their delegates will decide on the disbursement of this years raffle money: The McAuley House, The Michlin House Catholic Charities home for unwed mothers or the Children's Hospital.

In the past, demands were made to you about forming a state affiliated auxiliary in your area. The approach this year is somewhat different. First of all this administration realizes that the Knights of Columbus has enough responsibilities of their own without concerning itself with the problems of the ladies. They also feel that it is their own responsibility to advance their order.

If your council has the ladies helping perhaps you have noticed how it takes a lot less of them to accomplish as much as we can. Just imagine how active the Knights of Columbus would be if there was a Ladies Auxiliary in every council.

Several years ago a motion was made and unanimously passed that the ladies were not to present any awards at the Saturday Night Banquet. This was prompted by an abuse of the priviledge that they had. I for one agreed at that time. However, after having second thoughts, perhaps we acted a little too hasty.

The ladies are asking that we reconsider this action and allow them to present their most prestigeous award at the banquet. They promise this will be a presentation and not a yearly report of the Ladies Auxiliary.

I would like to thank State Deputy Marvin Lott for allowing me to serve as Liaison Agent this past year. It has been a pleasure working with President Johnnie Harmon, the ladies and you Brother Knights.

BISHOP R. O. GEROW MEMORIAL FUND FRATERNAL YEAR 1990 - 1991

Your excellencies, Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy State Deputy, State Officers, and Brother Knights. I come to you today somewhat saddened that it is I giving this report today instead of your Priest Education Fund Chairman, Paulino Carrubba. As you already know, he went through heart baypass surgery last month and was unable to attend this years convention. He asked that I extend to the State

Family and all those who called him to wish him a speedy recovery his appreciation and thanks, especially for your prayers. I just learned this morning that he was hospitalized last night with pnuemonia. I hope that you will once again remember him in your prayers.

The Bishop R. O. Gerow Memorial Fund was founded in 1953 by the Mississippi Knights of Columbus. Since its inception, the Fund has continued to grow. Total contributions to date total \$630,508. This figure includes \$47,712 collected in 1991 representing an increase of \$11,035 over 1990, with 38 councils, 8 assemblies, 5 auxiliaries, the State Ladies Auxiliary, and 1 Squire Circle contributing. The Diocese of Jackson received \$22,483 and the Diocese of Biloxi received \$25,229. This comes close to the \$50,000 goal set by Brother Paulino Carrubba in his report at the Mid-Winter meeting. Pascagoula Council 1605 received the award for the largest donation of \$6600. With a donation of \$6110, the Greenville/Leland Assembly received the award for the largest contribution per member with approximately \$70 per member.

You are all to be congratulated; each council, each assembly, and each auxiliary, for your outstanding efforts. This committee thanks you.

My personal thanks to John Szymonik and Jerry Santucci for their major role in collecting donations for their respective diocese.

The end of this year brings us one more year closer to the year 2000 which Past Grand Knights Jimmy Bartlett and Dudley Eckles of Gulfport set a goal of \$1 million dollars. If the Knights of Columbus in the State of Mississippi are to attain this goal, we must all make a concerted effort to increase our contributions in 1992.

The shortage of priests has become critical. As members of the Knights of Columbus, we must not forget our roots. Had it not have been for the foresight of a Catholic Priest, Fr. Michael J. McGivney, we would not be meeting here today. Had it not have been for the benevolent order of Catholic Priests that assisted Fr. McGivney and his family at the time he lost his father, we would not be here today. Had it not have been for the many Catholic Priests that were a part of the exploration and colonization of this continent, the Catholic Church would not be what it is today in this great nation of ours.

Most Reverend Bishop Houck, State Chaplain, Supreme Representative, State Deputy, State Officers, and Brother Knights,

I am pleased to report that the 1990-1991 State Program year was a huge success.

This success started with our School of Columbianism, held in Jackson on July 29, 1990. Although earlier than normal, the school was well attended. Thirty-six councils were represented. This high number allowed us to get a jump-start on this program year, and accelerated our spread of Columbianism throughout our great state. A large majority of the councils in the state are truly spreading Columbianism through their programs in Church, Community, Council, Family and Youth activities.

During the organizational meeting held in Cleveland, MS on June 30, 1990, the State Program Team emphasized that the purpose of the State Awards Program is to "guide and encourage participation on the local level," and is "a means of recognizing those councils that excel in their program activities."

This year's State Program Team wanted to go a step further and emphasize that recognition for a job well done, not awards alone, was the goal for the 1990-1991 program year.

Clara Barton, the founder of the American Red Cross once said that "Volunteerism is the rent you pay for the space you occupy in life."

George Bush in his address when he announced the establishment of the Points of Light Foundation in 1990 said that

"Any definition of a successful life contains a period of time dedicated to the service of others."

Brothers, that is what the Knights of Columbus is all about, volunteers dedicated to the service of others.

We are volunteers dedicated to spreading Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism to our family and community.

We are volunteers dedicated to serving others who are less fortunate than ourselves.

As Brother Bacque has mentioned yesterday, April 26 marked the end of a week long celebration called "The Points of Light - A Celebration of Service." It's theme, "Hearts at Work."

This unique effort sponsored by the Points of Light Foundation was designed to spotlight those Americans of all ages, races, and backgounds who are meeting today's social challenges through community service. By acknowledging those who are taking direct action to solve serious social problems, all Americans will be called to engage in the kind of service that can make a difference in the lives of people in need."

Is it coincidence that our State Convention takes place during this celebration of service? I believe it is not. I believe it is our destiny.

Is it coincidence that our Supreme Representative attending our State Convention, Brother Harvey Bacqeu, was in fact selected to be the Knights of Columbus representative to the Points of Light Foundation to coordinate activities associated with this celebration of service. I believe it was not. I believe it is our destiny.

This past February, as part of my job, I attended a conference in Washington, D. C. At this conference, I had the honor and pleasure of meeting Mr. Richard Schubert, Chief Executive Officer of the Points

of Light Foundation. During our conversation he noticed my Knights of Columbus lapel pin. He said, "You are also a Knight of Columbus?" I said, "Why yes. I am." And then he said, "You belong to a great organization. It was no accident that President Bush named the Knights of Columbus the first point of light. The Knights of Columbus are well known for their acts of charity, and their service to others."

Well, was it coincidence that I attended that conference, and that I was able to meet Mr. Schubert? Again, I believe it was not. I believe it was destiny.

It was destiny because Mr. Schubert did exactly what this year's Program Team set as our goal in our mission statement. He recognized me. He recognized me as a member of the Knights of Columbus. An organization recognized as the first point of light. An organization whose members are recognized as volunteers dedicated to the service of others.

Brothers, the point I'm making is that he did not give me an award. He did not give me anything. He merely recognized me.

Now, I am not knocking awards. Because as it is stated in the second portion of our mission statement, we are to recognize those councils that excel in their program activities. And awards do just that. They recognize "the best of the best."

Both Friday and Saturday nights, we handed out some tremendous awards. Before I repeat the winners of those awards for this convention's record, I would like to say that your State Program Team is very proud of the response you showed by participating in this year's program.

We received forty (40) reports representing 90% of the councils. Although we did not reach our goal of 100% or fourty-five (45) reports, when you can literally count on one hand the number of councils that did not send in a report, well that's pretty darn close.

To the five (5) councils who did not submit a Council Program Report, and you know who you are, I appeal to you to participate next year.

To the forty Grand Knights and the forty Program Directors who did submit a Council Program Report, we your State Program Team congratulate you for taking the extra time and effort to submit your reports documenting your members' hard work in the spread of Columbianism and solicit your continued participation.

I would especially like to thank the Grand Knights who submitted reports, scrapbooks, newsletters, and other entries, yet did not qualify for an award. I believe they truly know that recognition is the name of the game.

Nomination and Election of Alternates to the Supreme Convention in St. Louis, Missouri

John Maloney was nominated by Joseph B. Goellner, Sr., Bob Hubbard was nominated by Dean Flanner, and Guy Todaro, Jr. was nominated by Ted Knowles. John Maloney received 42 votes, Bob Hubbard 10 votes, and Guy Todaro, Jr. 35 votes.

Tommy Rocconi made a motion that the three alternates be represented by the three candidates in the order of number of votes. The motion was seconded by Leon Shapley. The motion carried.

As a result, John Maloney will be the first alternate, Guy Todaro, Jr. the second alternate, and Bob Hubbard the third alternate.

Louis E. Zylka, Grand Knight of Council 10216 Brandon, made a bid for the 1995 State Convention in the Jackson area. There were no other bids.
