PROCEEDINGS OF THE 88TH ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Friday, April 24, 1992

The 88th Annual State Convention of the Mississippi State Council, Knights of Columbus was convened at 6:00 p.m. with State Deputy Stanley M. Swentkowski calling the meeting to order. Father Frank Cocoran, past State Chaplain, said the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag led by Norman Kiehm, Fourth Degree Master. Convention chair Freddie Biglane introduced Mayor David Armstrong who welcomed the Knights and their ladies and guests to Natchez.

State Secretary Tom Zettler gave the response on behalf of the State Council to Mayor Armstrong. State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski officially called the convention to order at 6:26 p.m.

The delegates voted to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the 1991 convention on a proper motion and second. The minutes were then passed out to all delegates in attendance. State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski appointed the following convention committees and asked that they meet and report in writing at the appropriate times during the convention. Our council has been a driving force behind charitable endeavors, especially in the East Mississippi area. We hope to continue to progress and have even greater success next year.

JOHN T. SAVAGE COUNCIL 848 JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

Worthy State Deputy and Brother Knights,

Not too long ago, all of you received a copy of the special edition of COLUMBIA magazine. The contents of this issue dealt mainly with the concept of stewardship. A steward, according to Webster's Dictionary, is one entrusted with the management of the household or estate of another. What follows is a report of my stewardship as Grand Knight of John T. Savage Council 848 since assuming office on July 1, 1991. For me, this is a brand new undertaking, never having held office of this magnitude before. When first approached about accepting nomination, I was hesitant. But, I did accept and was elected. Now that I am Grand Knight, I will do my best to fulfill the duties of my office to the best of my abilities. At this point, I doubt if there is a Grand Knight in this jurisdiction who would trade places with me.

STATE OF THE COUNCIL

For the past several years, my predecessors have reported a steadily worsening condition of our council. I regret to state, that things have not improved. If anything, our finances are precarious and it is only through the efforts of a few of us that we are managing to keep afloat. The discontinuation of BINGO was the blow that brought us to our knees and from which we have not recovered. At no time did we enjoy a big income from this activity, but we managed nicely with what we got. After BINGO became legal, we endeavored to start the operation again, but it was too late. The old customers, by that time, were attracted to bigger BINGO operations elsewhere and we had to close shop. I am sure that all of you can understand our predicament because for a time we all suffered equally.

In previous Grand Knight reports, you have been informed of our property being up for sale. To date, nothing of consequence has developed. We are confident, however, that a buyer will turn up. In the meantime, we operate as usual. At the same time, we are well aware that some day we will be faced with making a decision on the course our council will have to take. Under present conditions, it appears that there is a good possibility of dissolution.

MEMBERSHIP

I hate to bring up this subject in my report because to our council this has been a no-win situation for many years. Once other parishes began coming into the picture, our membership started to drop. Suspensions, deaths, withdrawals, changes in life styles, all left their mark. As of January 1, 1992, our membership stands at 79 active members. At our peak, our council had over 400 members. Records will show that we have failed to recruit any appreciable number of members for several years. Several reasons could be cited here, but none would be a credit to our efforts or, rather, the lack of same.

The reason that our council is not affiliated with any parish is probably the biggest cause of our continued failure to increase membership. I will touch on this subject later in my report. Also, location is a factor. Our council home is in an isolated, high crime area, which is reason enough for the lack of candidates. Now and then, we manage to pull in a "live one" but not often. We have just about run out of recruitment ideas.

ACTIVITIES

Despite our miserable status, the same 12 to 16 members keep showing up for meetings and so we manage to hobble along, doing what we can to keep up the morale. It is a difficult task to keep depending on the few, but up to now we have held fast. We still have our covered dish suppers with the Ladies Auxiliary every first Tuesday of the month and with the ladies have perpetuated the annual dinner for graduating seniors and the awarding of two scholarships to sons or daughters of our members.

In September, we conducted a spaghetti dinner for the benefit of The Stewpot, a volunteer organization which helps feed the poor. In November, we sponsored our 22nd Annual KC Memorial Scholarship Bowl at St. Joseph High School Bishop Brunini Field. The proceeds from that activity went to the Scholarship Fund. In addition to the scholarships, our Council made donations to the St. Joseph High School Tuition Assistance Fund and to the St. Peter's Parish Tuition Assistance Fund. In December, we held our annual Christmas party in conjunction with the Ladies Auxiliary at which we had a money tree for the benefit of the Community Service Program for Senior Citizens. This project brought in just under \$200 plus several blankets donated by the members of the Auxiliary. This last mentioned activity wound up our activities program for the first half of the council year.

FUTURE ACTIVITIES

Our plans for the next six months included the following major activities:

- 1. Annual invitational basketball tournament for elementary grades. This was held in January.
- Spaghetti dinner for the benefit of the Bishop Gerow Memorial Priest Education Fund. This was held in February.
- 3. Free Throw Contest. This was eventually cancelled because of previously scheduled events at the St. Richard and St. Mary gyms.
- 4. Tootsie Roll Drive in May.

PARISH AFFILIATION

Earlier in my report I touched on the subject of becoming affiliated with some parish. The purpose for the affiliation would be to gain more exposure and recognition for the Knights of Columbus while at the same time becoming absorbed into the mainstream of parish life which we now do not have. A survey was conducted among our members with encouraging results. The consensus was to, hopefully, become a part of St. Richard Parish. Past Grand Knight Henry Kajdan volunteered his services to pursue this matter and meet with Father Somers, the pastor. He did meet with Father Somers on four occasions and discussed the matter. Since a report on these meetings was prepared by Brother Kajdan and submitted to State Deputy Swentkowski, I will not go into the details of these meetings. We were not turned down, but neither were we accepted. At this time, it looks like the proposition is on the back burner.

CONCLUSION

There is no way to describe the difficult times we are going through. And there is no way to tell when we will be seeing the light at the end of the tunnel. As the second oldest council in this jurisdiction, we have survived other crises and you may rest assured that we will persevere.

In May, our Brothers were there to assist where needed with St. Ann's annual bazaar which runs for four days. In July, we turned out for work again at our Church's \$10,000 draw-down. We assisted with the set-up, all food preparations, the serving of refreshments, and with the draw-down itself. This project took two days of preparation. Our Council provides floral arrangements for the altar throughout the year. Thanks to the services of Brother Michael Moran, we have provided special display decorations for all holidays in the Church. We have subsidized the parish utility expense, a total of \$2,868.60, and a donation of \$1,703 from our Rodeo proceeds for a total of \$4,571 to the Church. We purchased supplies for Rosaries to be made by our Ladies Rosary Makers of St. Ann Parish. These are designated for the Saltillo Mission for its use.

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES:

We purchased a Life-Pack and donated it to our local Volunteer Fire Department.

On the first Sunday of October, we asked everyone in the parish to bring two canned goods with them each time they came to Mass until Christmas to make food baskets for the needy. The Council would buy turkeys to complete the baskets at Thanksgiving and at Christmas. The Quincentennial Year of Discovery was celebrated by our Council on October 12, 1991, the birthday of Christopher Columbus. The Council prepared and served seafood and/or chicken gumbo with all the trimmings to the members of our parish at no cost to them. During the meal, films about the Knights and about Christopher Columbus were shown.

It was our pleasure on October 20, 1991, to assist the Ladies Auxiliary by providing Bingo gifts and our services to help with a very successful annual Senior Citizen Free Soup, Sandwich, and Bingo Luncheon for members of our parish and community.

Each week we designate a special Bingo game in our program for the de l'Epee Deaf Center. A total of \$696.68 has been donated.

We also raised \$640.00 for the Mental Retardation Drive.

On Sunday, November 24, 1991, members of our Council prepared 16 food baskets with turkeys and delivered them to the needy from a list provided by our Pastor. On December 21, 1991, members of our council again prepared and delivered 16 food baskets with turkeys to the needy of our parish.

COUNCIL ACTIVITIES:

We have once again exceeded our goal for new members. We have admitted 10 new members to our Council and dropped 2 members for non-payment of dues with a net gain of 8 members. Our goal was set for 5.

Meeting attendance has increased over 100 percent. We are averaging 18 to 23 members per meeting. This is out of a total membership of 52.

We have applied for, and are waiting to get, our tax exempt status for our Lizana Home Board Corporation so that our plans can move forward on the purchase of a building from the Diocese of Biloxi for a permanent home for our Council. It will be moved to our property which adjoins St. Ann's on Highway 53 in Lizana.

Our council has two basic fund raisers each year. They are our Rodeo and our Bingo. The third annual rodeo was held on April 19 and 20, 1991. Even though it rained out our crowd on Friday, it was a success. This two day event required the services of our whole Council. Each member showed up to help. This is the only Council function where we had 100 percent participation. This rodeo provides a family type entertainment for our community at a very reasonable cost. On a good weekend we entertain up to 4000 people.

Bingo in our Council is held each Tuesday night. We have from 60 to 100 people playing. We are averaging 13 members per night working on the Bingo game. Our average month runs \$1200 clear.

We work hard, but the effort is worth it to our Council and to our projects.

FAMILY ACTIVITIES:

On August 24, 1991, we initiated and sponsored a drive to help five school age children orphaned when their widowed mother was killed in an automobile accident. Clothing and school supplies were our prime objectives. It was a success.

Each month before our regular meeting after the 9:00 A.M. Mass, we serve sausage & biscuits with juice, milk, and coffee to our members, wives, and children. This in itself has increased our meeting attendance.

We provide a Quarterly Dinner for our members and their guests. It is an opportunity for the husband and wife to go out without the children, sit down, and have a full course dinner served to them by our CYO members, who graciously handle all serving and cleaning. For this we guarantee them a minimum of \$50.00 in tips. The food is purchased by the Council and prepared by volunteer member families. There is no cost to our members or guests. A hospitality hour is always held one hour prior to the dinner.

On May 12, 1991, a silk rose was presented to each lady of the parish for Mother's Day. This was done at all Masses at both St. Ann and Our Lady of Chartres which is our mission church. On June 16, 1991, coffee, milk, and donuts were served at all the Masses to honor the Fathers on their day.

Thanks to our Ladies Auxiliary, we are again beginning to enjoy the covered dish dinners. They will be providing these four times a year.

On December 15, 1991, we assisted Father Fintan in preparing and serving his annual Parish Christmas Dinner for the families of the parish.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES:

We continue to designate special Bingo games in our weekly program to support the CCD program in our parish. \$739.97 has been donated to the CCD program this year. Members also serve as teachers for the CCD.

We provide chaperones, when asked, for CYO functions. A \$500.00 donation was made to the CYO to help with expenses on their trip to the Saltillo Mission.

On December 8, 1991, the Knights and the Ladies Auxiliary jointly sponsored a Christmas Party with Santa and refreshments for the children of our community. Each received a small gift from Santa. Children for ages 1 to 12 years of age were invited.

Our Council also gave a sponsorship donation to the Lizana Youth league for softball.

We have donated \$1,334.89 to local charities and to one-time emergency aid.

As you can see, we have been active. We have been busy. We are working for something and are enjoying it.

The Knights of St. Ann-Lizana Council #9958 are ever present when help is needed, as is evident by all the red council shirts and caps you see in the crowds at St. Ann Church.

At a meeting I attended in Natchez concerning the State Convention, at which our Worthy State Deputy was in attendance, the agenda of the forthcoming event was aired in complete detail. Duties and events were outlined, attesting to the fact that this Convention will be a most memorable event. This distinct honor has allowed me to travel throughout our jurisdiction and to personally witness the tremendous activities that our Order performs. It has also allowed me to witness first hand the great successes we have had as well as the areas that need more of our energy

Our meeting on this the 88th Annual Convention is a time for us to renew our commitments to our Order. It is a time to join with acquaintances, to make new friendships, and to strengthen our Fraternal Bond. It is a time to reward councils and individuals who have excelled and to pray for our Brothers who have gone before us. On August 6th through the 8th, 1991, your State Deputy, along with Immediate Past State Deputy Marvin Lott, State Treasurer Greg Niolet, and State Advocate Jesse Quinn III, attended the 109th Supreme Council Meeting in St. Louis, Missouri. The National Convention is a time that makes you proud to be a Knight. The support we receive from our Pope, cardinals, archbishops, bishops, and priests is evident at this affair. The State of the Order is indeed in good, stable hands.

SUPREME MID-WINTER MEETING

I attended the State Deputies Mid-Winter Meeting in Chicago, Illinois, on November 23-34, 1991. This meeting was devoted to membership and to commemorating the 500th anniversary of Columbus bringing Christianity to the New World.

STATE MID-WINTER MEETING

Holy Savior Council #7854 of Clinton was the gracious host of the State Mid-Winter meeting on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1991. At that time, our new Membership Director, Roy Patterson, was introduced. All Councils were instructed on where they stood on membership and on what we would like them to achieve. Our new Membership Director impressed us all with how quickly he had organized the data for the State, having taken the position only thirteen days prior.

BIENVILLE PROVINCE MEETING

December 14th and 15th found your State Deputy and his wife in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for the Bienville Province Meeting of the Fourth Degree which includes the Jurisdictions of Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Tennessee. I was proud of our jurisdiction's progress in the Fourth Degree as well as the attendance of our Master of the Fourth Degree Norman Kiehm and Past Masters John P. Myers and Paulino Carrubba. This meeting featured some of the greatest supporters of our Order, the men who have achieved the Patriotic Degree.

STATE OF THE ORDER MEMBERSHIP

Membership is a topic which consumes much of the time of the State Deputy and State Officers. It is the criteria, whether right or wrong, upon which Jurisdictions are compared to each other and upon which ultimate rewards are based. We have done well this year considering the excellent year we had last year. Our standing in our Division has fluctuated from a high of second place to a low of fifth place in net gain. The April standings show us in third place in net gain out of 14 jurisdictions in our Division. We show that we have recruited 288 new Knights, suspended 119, for a new gain of 169. This results in a 3.36 percent gain. We know that this is not a poor showing, but we also know we can do better. Unfortunately though, I have received a large number of intent to suspend forms from two councils in the Jurisdiction that will hurt us in overall membership. I hope these two councils will do all they can to retain a majority of these members.

I know better than anyone that numbers alone do not tell the story. I want to thank all the councils who worked so hard to keep our membership growing. As you know, I do not believe in playing the numbers game. I have never told you not to suspend a member, but I have beseeched you to make every effort to limit suspensions by saving those members whom we may lose. I have also asked you to try to remain in the plus column by not suspending in mass number and not suspending more than you recruit. I know this can be a financial hardship, but if your financial secretaries perform their job, there should be no mass suspensions. The state can contend with small suspensions, but

those of 15 and 20 at a time hurt our standing and make an offset difficult.

I want to thank the many councils who made every effort to help us in recruiting. At this time, I would like to recognize the 13 Top Gun Councils who achieved a minimum of 10 percent increase in membership. As I name these Councils, I would like the delegates from these Councils to please stand and remain standing until all have been named.

Although they were announced last night, I would also like to recognize the four councils who won the net gain and percentage awards by council size:

Small Council - Net Gain & Percentage: 10499, Ocean Springs Medium Council - Net Gain & Percentage: 7910, Orange Grove Large Council - Net Gain & Percentage: 8848, Tupelo Extra Large Council - Net Gain & Percentage: 2969, Clarksdale

Let us give these councils a hand. We owe all these councils a great deal of appreciation for what they have done for our Order.

I want to mention with pride two council who are represented here today that were in serious trouble and in danger of non-existence. Both Councils 1908 Hattiesburg and 7910 Orange Grove responded to the challenge and pulled themselves to respectability. In Hattiesburg, we saw the leadership of Grand Knight Mike Bucciantini and District Deputy Joe Harvey turn this Council's fortunes around. In Orange Grove, we saw Grand Knight Frank Labigang, District Deputy Jack Cunningham, and Father Lynch work miracles with Council 7910. Both these councils deserve our appreciation.

I want to thank the State Officers and District Deputy Jack Cunningham who accompanied me to Orange Grove to speak at Mass about the Knights of Columbus. We are an effective group and good

things have happened when the State Officers come to speak and recruit. The only thing you need to do to get us to come and recruit in your parish is to "ask us." This invitation stands for struggling councils as well as old and established ones. All you have to do is ask. We all can use a shot of new and different energy in our parishes.

Before I close, I want to thank Roy Patterson for the tremendous job he has done this year as Membership Director. He assumed the position at a difficult time and has done more than I could have asked of him. He has traveled to various councils to present the "Top Proposer of the Month" Awards, attended most Second and Third Degree Exemplifications, kept accurate statistics on membership, and has been very active in New Council Development. I think we all owe Roy a sign of appreciation.

Obviously, we have been praising the Councils which have excelled this fraternal year, but as I mentioned at the start of my report, we must also address the areas of need. We have 9 councils who have not recruited a new Knight and 6 councils who stand in negative membership numbers at this time. There is no need to mention names because you know who you are. This is not meant to embarrass you but to allow you to realize that we want to help you. In years past, Councils who were not productive were outcasts and left to fend for themselves. Last April when I was elected State Deputy, I told you that no council was more important than another. I still believe that. I have great respect for you all and realize that there are many reasons for recruitment difficulties. Please know that I still support you and will do anything to help you. This State Deputy will never turn his back on you because your numbers are low and you can take that to the bank.

NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

I have been slightly disappointed at the slow rate of new council development this year, but this is no indication of the job P.S.D. Jesse Quinn Jr. has done. He has continued to work with District Deputies to initiate contacts for New Council Development. We are now very close to obtaining new Councils in Philadelphia and Oxford. At the writing of this report, we are 8 members short of the 30 needed in Philadelphia. We have signed thirty members, but need eight more to go through the First Degree. In Oxford, we have fostered interest in approximately 44 members and must now get them organized.

I would like to thank District Deputy Dick Benton, General Agent Henry Mosco, Field Agent Larry Campbell, Membership Director Roy Patterson, New Council Chairman Jesse Quinn Jr., State Secretary Tom Zettler, and State Advocate Jesse Quinn III for their help in Philadelphia. I want to give a special thanks to the Council 802 Meridian who has aided us in the formation of this council and supplied the First Degree Team. Although Philadelphia is in close geographical proximity to them, they did not try to supress development, but encouraged it. Thank you again, Council 802.

I would also like to thank District Deputy Gene Ingram, General Agent Henry Mosco, Field Agent Fred Ward, Membership Chairman Roy Patterson, Round Table Chairman James Rossetti, State Advocate Jesse Quinn III, and Brother Ken Lubers for their help in Oxford.

Needless to say, we cannot rest until these locations become Councils. District Deputy Larry Tabor has also made contact with the Parish of Wiggens where there seems to be interest in New Council Development.

In December, at our Mid-Winter meeting, I heard our District Deputies recite a list of potential new council sites. It is imperative that we not wait to initiate contact and do so as soon as possible. I feel we were a little tentative this year and not as aggressive as we should have been in new councils. We had 5 District Deputies who are first term DDs. I think this year of experience will make a difference in this area in the future.

I also think our vision of New Council growth must change. With the exception of St. Richard's, most

of our remaining parishes without KC Councils are small. We need to look into developing interest in the KC through Round Tables. We then may draw enough interest to begin a new council or combine Round Tables of parishes of close approximation to form a council. We can no longer afford to avoid parishes who do not have significant numbers. We must spread Columbianism in every way possible. I ask all our members to help us in this endeavor.

CEREMONIALS

On March 15, 1992, in Tupelo, MS, a historic event took place. On that date, the "Delta Second and Third Degree Teams" which originated in Council 5267 Msgr. John F. Cleriro, Greenwood, performed their first exemplification. Under the watchful eye of Supreme Ceremonials Chairman Sam Dambrocia, the team performed in dramatic fashion bringing praise from our Supreme Ceremonials Chairman.

For years, the Mississippi Jurisdiction has been handicapped by having only one Second and Third Degree team and one CO located in Pascagoula, MS. Distance and financial concerns made it difficult for those teams to perform in the central and northern sections of this Jurisdiction. Although the team under Captain Ted Knowles and CO Guy Todaro Jr. perfromed admirably, the Jurisdiction needed help.

In June 1991 at the Installation of Officers, I challenged our state leaders to form new degree teams. State Advocate Jesse Quinn III and Grand Knight Brian Cooper of Council 5267 accepted this challenge and brought this dream to a reality. All the men on this team deserve our praise. Please give them a hand. At this time, we also have a third Second and Third Degree team forming in the Pass Christian-Long Beach area under Captain and State Treasurer Greg Niolet. This team is looking at a certification date of June 1992.

As of this date, 42 First Degree Exemplifications have been reported to me. Unfortunately the Supreme Council does not list us with this number. We must make sure that all District Deputies file the proper forms with the Supreme Office and keep track of their submission. Sending the form to Mr. Ron Tracy will insure our jurisdiction credit.

As of this report, we have had 7 Second-Third Degrees performed in our jurisdiction. They were:

August 18, 1991: Biloxi-New Orleans team November 10, 1991: Pass Christian-Pascagoula team November 17, 1991: Clarksdale-Memphis team January 19, 1992: Brandon-Pascagoula team February 9, 1992: Vicksburg-Baton Rouge team

March 15, 1992: Tupelo-Delta team

March 29, 1992: Gulfport-New Orleans team

We are planning two more degrees this fraternal year with Meridian on May 31, 1992, with the Delta team being the next scheduled degree. In June we look forward to the Pass Christian-Long Beach team at a site to be announced.

I would like to thank P.S.D. Wiley Price for his help in ceremonials. This is an area we can truly be proud of this year.

INSURANCE

Our Order's greatest fraternal benefit, our insurance program, reached new heights this year by receiving a AAA superior rating from Standard and Poor rating firm. The Knight's insurance in force now totals 20 billion dollars. We as Knights, although supportive, need to overcome the phobia we have about insurance and insurance salesmen. We need to support our General Agent and field agents. In my

mind, we all should own a piece of the KC no matter how small. In a way it is our extra donation to the good of the Order.

I want to thank all our agents for their support this year. We need you involved in all aspects of membership and New Council Development. A special warm welcome to new field agent Deacon Larry Campbell of Southaven. Please give him your support.

While I am mentioning our tremendous insurance program, I cannot avoid referring to the regretful events which have unfolded recently against our Supreme Knight Virgil Dechant. As most of you know, a former agent of the Order, who will go unnamed, in Illinois has set out on a campaign of vengeance against our Order. In a report given to the National Catholic Reporter, he compared us to the United Way of America and questioned the salaries of our Supreme Knight, State Officers, and Board of Directors. Let me point out a few facts:

- Not one cent of money raised by our Councils for charity goes to the Supreme Office or to the Supreme Knight's salary.
- 2. We are an enormous insurance corporation with 20 billion dollars of insurance in force.
- 3. Our Supreme Knight has 26 years of experience with our order:
 - (a) 10 years as Supreme Secretary
 - (b) 15 years as Supreme Knight
- 4. Under his leadership:
 - (a) Revenue has increased 593% or 6.9 times from 1976 to 1991
 - (b) 20 billion dollars of insurance in force compared to 3.6 billion in 1976
 - (c) Assets of 3.5 billion in 1991 compared to 656 million in 1976, an increase of 434%
 - (d) Dividends of 157.7 million in 1991 compared to 17.5 million in 1976, an increase of 801%

I invest in the Knights of Columbus Insurance Plan. My future and the future of my family is with the Knights of Columbus. Yes, gentlemen, I put my money where my mouth is. I want competent men to handle my future and I suspect you do too. Men of this caliber must be paid salaries comparable to other insurance corporations.

I resent the implications made to our Supreme Knight, Supreme Officers, and Board of Directors. I know you do too. I ask you to give me and our Supreme Representative, Newman Flannigan, a sign. Do the Knights of the Mississippi Jurisdiction support our Supreme Officers and Board of Directors? Thank you, gentlemen. Supreme Director Flannigan, please convey the support of the Mississippi Jurisdiction to our Supreme Knight.

SUPREME COUNCIL AWARDS

We also had two District Deputies receive the Cross for conducting and reporting an equal number of First Degree Exemplifications to the number of Councils in their district. Those two individuals were DD #4 Roy Patterson and DD #9 Jack Cunningham. We congratulate all the Councils and DDs.

In the Contest of Champions for 1991, Council 10216 Brandon won the overall percentage award with

a 1,300% increase and Council 1244 Biloxi won the net gain with 33 new members. This was an outstanding performance in both instances.

A highlight for the Mississippi Jurisdiction was the third place showing in the 1990-1991 International Service Program Award by Council 6872 Oscar J. Gelpi Council. Its project titled "Renovation of St. Charles Parish" placed third in the category of Church Activity. We all owe Council 6872 and Past Grand Knight Floyd J. Naquin a round of applause.

Many awards are subject to the submission of forms necessary, not only for Supreme Awards, but for the everyday function of the State Council. While most of our councils are punctual with their reports, we still have difficulty with some councils in submission of forms. Part of the position of leadership is reliability. Your State Deputy and District Deputies should not have to beg you to submit mandatory forms. Please make an effort to submit forms 365 (Service Program Personnel), 1728 (Annual Survey of Fraternal Activities), 1295 (Semi-annual Council Audits), and 185 (Report of Officers) as well as all other forms on time.

QUINCENTENNIAL

At the Supreme Convention in St. Louis, I was presented with a "Cross of the New World" to take back to the Mississippi Jurisdiction for the Sacred Journey through our State. A cross was then sent to us to allow for one in each Diocese. It was up to me to appoint two men who would schedule the Cross on its journey, no small task. The two men I called upon accepted this challenge at the first request despite other pressing duties. Deacon Larry Campbell, a Mental Retardation Co-Chairman and now Quincentennial Chariman and KC insurance agent, accepted the challenge for the Jackson Diocese. John Szymonik, Priest Education Chairman for the Biloxi Diocese and Church Director for the State, accepted the challenge for the Biloxi Diocese. I cannot thank these men and the District Deputies who helped to move the Cross enough. Gentlemen, you have my sincere thanks.

Time does not allow me to mention everyone, but I also want to thank our State Program Director Larry Tabor and the six State Directors for their efforts this year. I also want to thank all the State Chairmen who labored so hard for the Knights of Columbus.

STATE OFFICERS AND DISTRICT DEPUTIES

As I close, I want to thank my fellow State Officers. Their loyalty to me and their hard labor for the Knights of Columbus have set the tone for the future. These men in time will lead us to further heights. To my ten District Deputies, I owe much. If a jurisdiction is to be successful, the District Deputies must be exceptional. This year 50% of our District Deputies were first year DDs. With a year of experience, I look for great things from them in the near future.

CONCLUSION

During my stewardship of the Knights of Columbus this year, I have attempted to set a tone for our organization. All my dealings within the Order have been above-board and I have been totally honest with you. I have done my best to bring harmony and direction to our honorable Order. I have traveled extensively, being gone on KC business 86% of the weekend days in 1992 alone. I appreciate the manner in which my family and I have been treated by the host councils and at all the functions we attended. Leadership to me is making sense out of confusion, staying focused on goals despite outside turmoil, and following the example of only one leader, Jesus Christ.

Gentlemen, there are Jurisdictions that have more Knights, but none that have any better Knights than sit in this room. We will never reach our potential until we believe this and pass it on to other Knights and would-be-Knights. Our greatest enemy is ourselves. We must rid ourselves of internal strife and petty arguments. We are not just any organization, but a Fraternity of Catholic Gentlemen and Catholic Families. There is no higher honor.

Dale Carnegie made the statement, "Any fool can criticize, condemn, and complain - and most do." Do not be a destroyer of dreams, but a builder of vision and hope. Support and love each other as Father McGivney would have wanted us to do.

As I close, I want to thank the Clarksdale Msgr. James T. McKenna Council 2969 for all the support it has given me over the years. I would also like to thank Brothers Emilio Zepponi and the late Tony Antici PGK for the ultimate gift - asking me to become a Knight of Columbus. The Clarksdale Council will always be special to me.

My remarks today, as well as my life, would be incomplete if I did not mention the support of my wife Regina. I remember a quote from Mignon McLaughlin which stated "A successful marriage requires falling in love many times, always with the same person." The Lord has blessed me in this respect. As we approach our 23rd wedding anniversary, I thank God for the wife who has truly become a "KC Wife."

I must apologize to my sons, Sean and Ryan, for the times I was not home to throw the football or be present at a party. I only hope that one day they will understand what this journey was all about and that they will honor us by becoming "men they call Knights."

I will close with a question that my youngest son asked me at this time last year. After I was elected State Deputy, he approached me and asked, "If you had not won the election, would you be just a Knight of Columbus?" I laughed at that and explained the situation as well as I could. But then I thought about that statement "just a Knight of Columbus." If we men could just live our lives in the spirit of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism. If we could just live up to the ideals of Father McGivney. If we could just live up to what we preach in our ceremonials. If we could do that, then on our day of Judgment, I honestly believe the Lord will determine that being "Just a Knight" will be "Just enough" for eternal happiness. God bless you and God bless the Knights of Columbus.

STATE ADVOCATE'S REPORT

Brother Knights, it is a pleasure for me to be with you again.

My official activities as State Advocate began on the first day of the Fraternal Year. On July 1, 1991, House Bills #72 and #74 went into effect and became the law in the State of Mississippi. As your State Advocate, it was my responsibility to keep you informed and to determine how these two Bills would affect the Mississippi State Council.

After consultation with the legal counsel for the Secretary of State's Office, we determined that House Bill #72 was designed to require registration and reporting by those charitable organizations that use paid solicitors to seek contributions from the public. We felt that the Mississippi State Council qualified for an exemption under this law, so we filed a Statement of Exemption form with the Secretary of State's Office on behalf of the Mississippi State Council.

House Bill #74 provides for the regulation of Bingo games. Since this is a matter of great importance to many of our councils, I supplied a copy of this bill to all of the councils throughout the Mississippi Jurisdiction. This Bill requires, among other things, that any organization conducting Bingo games have on file with the State Tax Commission, a letter of exemption issued by the United States Internal Revenue Service. After obtaining permission from the Mississippi State Tax Commission, I filed a Letter of Exemption from the Internal Revenue Service which not only fulfilled this requirement for the Mississippi State Council, but also for all of our local councils.

This Bill also requires organizations conducting Bingo games to file quarterly reports with the State Tax Commission. I supplied a copy of the quarterly report form to all of our councils, so that those conducting Bingo games would have it for their use and the other councils would have it for their information.

At the Supreme Convention, which was held in August in St. Louis, MO., resolutions were adopted to raise the monetary limit of SEC. 122(b) Council Funds of the Charter, Constitution, and Laws of the Knights of Columbus from \$100.00 to \$200.00. After the convention, I promptly composed a letter and mailed a copy to each council informing you of this by-law change.

During the entire Fraternal Year, I have worked closely with our local councils on a wide range of issues.

In dispensing my official duties as State Advocate, my first allegiance, as always, has been to the Order and to you, my Brother Knights. In addition to official duties, I think that the most important responsibility of a State Officer is to be a good representative for the Knights of Columbus.

Because I wanted to be a good representative for you, I attended the Installation of Officer ceremonies for 17 of our councils. I attended all of the 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications held in our state, and the Cross of the New World ceremony in Jackson as well as numerous local council functions.

I helped conduct membership drives in several of our councils and I assisted in conducting organizational drives in Oxford and Philadelphia where new councils are presently being formed.

I also had the privilege of working with the good men of my home council in Greenwood and District Deputy Terry Lott who enthusiastically accepted the challenge of forming a much needed 2nd and 3rd Degree team.

After several months of hard work, we performed a dynamite exemplification in Tupelo and were certified by Brother Sam Dambroccia, the Director of Ceremonials for the Knights of Columbus.

Brothers, I work to promote the Knights of Columbus because I know that there is no group of Christian men more dedicated to God and the care of those in need than you, my Brother Knights.

Recently, the reputation of our Order and the Supreme Knight was challenged in an article printed in both Mississippi Today and the Gulf Pines Catholic.

This was a matter of great concern to me. I want the Catholic people of our state to appreciate the good men of the Knights of Columbus as I do and I do not want the people that depend on us to suffer because of an undeserved shadow of doubt cast upon our Order.

After reading these articles, Brothers, I could hardly wait to respond on behalf of our Order. I composed a letter and sent it to the *Mississippi Today* and the *Gulf Pines Catholic*. In it, I informed the readers how you united together as Brother Knights to raise over 3.6 million through the Tootsie Roll Campaign which has been used to brighten the lives of thousands of mentally retarded children throughout the State of Mississippi. I told them about our Priest Education Fund through which the Knights have raised over \$600,000.00 for the education of the future priests of our state. And I informed the readers that a true Knight's compensation for all of the work that he performs is in the knowledge that by serving those in need and our Catholic Church, he is serving Our Lord and growing closer in his relationship with God.

I could have stopped there, but the Catholic people of Mississippi needed to know that our Supreme Knight has given us excellent leadership, especially with our insurance program through which you and I and the other members of the Knights of Columbus donated over 94 million dollars to charity last year alone.

Is that hard to match? Brothers, if you were to go back and check, you would find that the Knights of Columbus donated far more than any other organization of its kind.

I'm proud to be a Brother Knight. The Knights of Columbus is precious to me and I consider it a privilege and an honor to serve as your State Advocate.

QUINCENTENNIAL REPORT

My report on the Quincentennial will focus on the progress of the Quincentennial Cross program for the Diocese of Jackson. To date the Cross has been present at 20 different programs viewed by over 6,300 individuals. The first of these was on September 14, 1991, at St. Peter's Cathedral in Jackson. Our Bishop requested that the Cross of the New World be circulated throughout the diocese by Deanery.

At this time the Cross has journeyed through three of the six Deaneries in the diocese and is currently traveling through a fourth. We anticipate that the remaining two Deanery visitations will be completed by the end of the summer.

Additionally, the Diocese of Jackson has planned six area convocations on Evangelization. Two of these convocations have already been held, one in Walls, MS, and the other in McComb, MS. The four remaining convocations will be held at locations yet to be named between now and 1993.

The Diocese has asked the Knights of Columbus to maintain possession of the Cross until this time and be responsible for seeing that the Cross be available for the four remaining convocations. This would require our consent as my understanding was that the New World Cross Program would conclude on or about Columbus Day 1992. It is my recommendation that we honor this request from the Diocese.

Circulating the Cross through Deaneries has resulted in some procedural difficulties since the boundaries for the Deaneries do not correspond with the boundaries of the six District Deputies assigned to the Cross program. The District Deputies were to coordinate with the Dean in each area to facilitate Cross programs in all parishes of the diocese, not just those with the Knights of Columbus Councils. However, not every Dean shared our Bishop's enthusiasm for this program. As a result, many parishes without councils have not participated.

With regard to Columbus Day 1992, I would suggest that we make an all out effort to promote our Supreme Knight's address on tape and in print throughout the Jurisdiction. Additionally, I would hope that we would have a major Columbus Day celebration somewhere in the state on the weekend of the Columbus Day holiday.

Perhaps this would be a good time to remember the lesson of charity contained within the First Degree. We as members of the Knights of Columbus have a duty to assist the less fortunate. No group could be more worthy of our service than the special persons handicapped by mental retardation. Let us make the dream of our founder, Father Michael McGivney, a reality by giving our best to this year's drive. Each and every council should dedicate itself to working for the cause by mobilizing Brother Knights and their families and their parish communities for the effort. In closing, I feel a certain clarification needs to be made. One hundred percent of the funds raised through the Mental Retardation Drive in the Mississippi Jurisdiction, less expenses (Tootsie Rolls, aprons, supplies, and postage), remains in the State of Mississippi to benefit the mentally retarded of the state.

The Financial Secretaries meeting was convened by Chariman George F. Souderes, Jr., Natchez Council 1034, at 1:00 P.M. The meeting was opened with a prayer and each Financial Secretary introduced himself and told what council he represented along with the number of years of service as the Financial Secretary.

Chairman Souderes told the attending Financial Secretaries about a Resolution that was presented to this Convention to reimburse the Financial Secretary for travel to State Council requested meetings. There was a discussion on the need for local council By-Laws, the Form 100 Supreme Council Membership Document, and the need of suspension of a delinquent member. Also discussed was the billing form and final notice form.

There was a discussion on the new pegboard system of record keeping and on the need to computerize our records and also to be compatible with Supreme Council computer. We want to have a standard for Knight of Columbus computers for the future of the Financial Secretaries who will come after us.

STATE CEREMONIAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As State Ceremonial Chairman, I am privileged to report the Ceremonial Activities within the state for the 1991-1992 Fraternal Year.

Four 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were scheduled for the first half of the fraternal year and six were scheduled for the second.

The Supreme Status Report of January 1, 1991, shows that four 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were scheduled, but we received credit for two. Seventeen 1st Degree Exemplifications were performed in the state for the first half of the Fraternal year.

The Status Report of April 1, 1992, shows that six 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were scheduled but we received credit for only three for the second half of the Fraternal Year. Twelve 1st Degrees were performed in the state.

For the State to receive credit for exemplifications performed in its jurisdiction, the proper report form must be submitted to the Supreme Office. Supreme obtains its information from the "District Deputy Exemplification Report," form 450. The host District Deputy is the one that has to submit form 450 to the Supreme Office.

I am proud to announce that the Mississippi Jurisdiction has another 2nd and 3rd Degree team. The Greenwood Team was certified March 15, 1992, in Tupelo, MS. Another 2nd and 3rd Degree team has been forming in Pass Christian, MS. The Pass Christian team is scheduled to be certified in June of 1992.

Two 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were performed in March, one in Tupelo and the other in Gulfport. A 2nd and 3rd Degree is scheduled for May 31, 1992 in Meridian Council 802. The other is on the Mississippi Gulf Coast in June.

Now that we have two 2nd and 3rd Degree teams in the Jurisdiction, there will be less expense. Bringing in a team from another Jurisdiction is more expensive than using our own. The certification of the Pass Christian team will be a great help, but we still have a problem. The problem is that there is still only one 2nd and 3rd Degree team in the northern part of the state. The Greenwood council will be unable to bring its candidates to receive their 2nd and 3rd Degree. The only solution is that another team has to be formed, either in the central or northern part of the state. This will be our priority for the next Fraternal Year.

More 1st Degree teams should also be forming in the Jurisdiction. I know that small councils might have difficulty in forming a team, but the only way is to try.

- That the Dress Code for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Degrees adopted at the 1985 Convention be strictly enforced to preserve the dignity of the ceremony. This requires dress pants, dress shirt, and dress shoes with coat and ties optional.
- 4. That all District Deputies who have Degree Exemplifications performed in their district submit Form 450, "District Deputy Exemplification Report," to the Supreme Council Office with copies to the State Deputy and State Ceremonial Chairman.
- That all District Deputies submit Form 2408, "District Deputy Ceremonial Report," to the Supreme Director of Ceremonial with copies to the State Deputy and State Ceremonial Chairman.
- That more members attend the Exemplifications being performed throughout the state, especially the 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications.
- That all members refrain from talking to the Ds when attending the 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications. Let the Ds do their work.
- That 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications be performed every 2 or 3 months. This time span is to allow councils to get more members.
- That 1st Degree Exemplifications be performed at least one or two weeks before 2nd and 3rd Exemplifications.
- 10. That a fixed price for 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications be charged by Degree teams and be presented at the mid-winter meeting.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

The Public Relations Committee met and discussed "what" we have to publicize and "how" we are to publicize it.

It was determined that we first of all must start with each one of us ourselves. If we can not sell ourselves, then we have no hope in selling the Knights of Columbus. We should wear our name tags. We should wear t-shirts and jackets and caps that bear the K of C name. When we are out in the public, at our jobs, or doing community volunteer work such as on the school board, at the Rotary Club, or even on the golf course, let people know, one way or another, that we are members of the Knights of Columbus. By our good example, this will do more to sell the Knights of Columbus than anything else.

Start your P.R. work right in your own parish, especially in parishes where people may not understand too clearly the work of the K of C, or where the pastor may be a bit on the antagonistic side. Let your actions do your P.R. work.

Next, so to the media. Actually, every member must be a part of your Public Relations Committee. Have one member as your co-ordinator. Other members must get to know various members of the media and develop a certain rapport with them: sports editor, social editor, news editor, tv newsmen, etc. If this rapport has been established, then when that member approaches them with new releases, they will more likely be printed or broadcast on tv or radio.

The co-ordinator should review all news releases and edit them before submitting them to the media. Make sure the releases are completely written up. Just facts and figures will not do. Those working in the media do not have the time to write up your stories.

A word about the *Magnolia Knight*. Most on the committee feel it should go back to a monthly publication instead of a bi-monthly one--but only if all the councils and assemblies will feed the editor with news on a timely basis. We all see from the reports of this convention that there are many, many events and programs going on throughout the state, but that very few of them ever reach the desk of the editor.

As our Fraternal Year ends, it concludes on a high note. It is easy to see by the quantity and quality of the reports that I have received that the Knights of Columbus is alive and well. Our history will show that this year many councils were active in works of mercy. It will show that our families were a big part of our success. Our love for our fellow man is mirrored by our relations with our family.

Five councils that scored 100% reporting to Supreme were: Meridian 802, Biloxi 1244, Ocean Springs 5654, Pearl 8038, and Ocean Springs 10499. These councils should be recognized for their efforts. This year's second place "ain't too bad" councils that were only one off the mark were North Biloxi 9094 and West Biloxi 9409. Congratulations and a personal thanks goes to each of these councils for a job well done.

This past year has been special to me in that more councils are actively participating in our Family of the Month Program. This year there has been a thirty plus percent increase in participation. A special thanks to the Fr. Patrick McAlpine Council 9094 in Delberville for sending me, month after month, a copy of their Family of the Month selection. Their criteria for selection was excellent.

At our organizational meeting and mid-year meeting, we, the directors, had requested a copy of each council's newsletters. Thanks to **Kiln**, **Greenwood**, **Greenville**, **Bay St. Louis**, **Vicksburg**, and of course, **Meridian** for being so faithful in this request. Judging the newsletters that are submitted at our convention becomes easier when we have had the opportunity throughout the year to read and analyze the quality and formats of the newsletters.

In conclusion, I want to thank our State Deputy Stan Swentkowski and you, my friends, for the opportunity to have served you.

STATE PRO-LIFE REPORT

Three years ago, I was appointed Pro-Life Couple Chairman by our State Deputy Marvin Lott. As I began my work, I became discouraged at the response I was getting. But soon, the Pro-Life sentiment that was not evident on the surface started appearing. Now I see and experience a response far beyond any expectations. It surely is true, the Knights of Columbus of Mississippi are for life and for the respect of life. The Knights of Columbus of Mississippi are standing up and being counted as pro-lifers.

The 1-800 Hotline number program is progressing. The councils are making the commitment to aid in funding the program. The 1-800 calls are answered in the office of Catholic Charities of the Jackson Diocese for women who call for help with a problem pregnancy. Father Elvin Sunds, Director of Catholic Charities of the Jackson Diocese, and Father George Murphy, Director of Catholic Social Services of the Biloxi Diocese, have informed me that KC donations are funding the 1-800 number phone service and listing in the yellow pages in Jackson, Cleveland, Greenville, Greenwood, Grenada, Meridian, Oxford, Pike County, Tupelo, Vicksburg, Columbus, Clarksdale and listings are scheduled in Pascagoula, the Biloxi-Hattiesburg and Picayune areas, and 2500 posters cost \$440.00. 200 calls have been received since January 1st. Donations of \$1.20 per member and more in most cases have been forwarded by me to Fr. Sunds from the State Ladies Auxiliary (the first to donate), Lizana #9958, Clarksdale #1583, Ocean Springs #5657 & #10499, McComb #5084, Ridgeland #9543, and Picayune #6872. This totals to \$2,123,80. I have commitments from Hattiesburg #1908, Laruel #2180, Natchez #1034, North Biloxi #9094, and West Biloxi #9409. Brother Jim Glover has been calling the councils in the Jackson Diocese and asking for their participation in the program. I have been meeting with councils on weeknights and on weekends to discuss the 1-800 Hotline program and the Fetal Model program.

The Fetal Model program is coming along. Councils may purchase a set of Fetal models for \$70.00 plus \$3.00 shipping to loan or donate to schools or organizations. When you talk to public schools, explain that the models may be used for anatomy, health, or science classes in lieu of pro-life. To purchase a set send \$70.00 plus \$3.00 shipping to Antoine Otto with your mailing address (no PO. Box). I maintain 10 sets from National Right-to-Life. As of the convention, 17 sets have been purchased. It is important that young people see the fetal models so they may understand that there is really a baby in the mother's womb.

Three years ago, I started a collection drive for the needy that I call the Knights of Columbus Respect Life, All Denomination collection Drive, where we collect clothes, food, furniture, and money for Pregnancy Care Centers, Battered Women and Children's Homes, Substance Abuse Homes, etc. This is a one day project where we collect and deliver on the same day, if possible. The project is held on the last Saturday of October, which is Respect Life Month. I will endeavor to make this a State program. We all put on collection drives. Why not do one all at the same time throughout the state with media coverage and recognition by all Knights of Columbus who care to?

The Rally for Life that is held in Jackson every year in January to commemorate the infamous Roe v. Wade decision of the Supreme Court in 1973 was attended by our State Deputy Stan Swentkowski, State Officers, 3 councils with banners flying, and members of the Ladies Auxiliary. The total count was lower than usual. Brother Jim Glover and I, by conversation with our State Deputy, want to make this a state program with other pro-life groups.

NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Worthy Brothers: After the State Deputy appointed me New Council Development Chairman for this Fraternal Year, I obtained a list of all the parishes in the State of Mississippi and the number of families in each. I took this list and listed off all of the parishes that did not have Knights of Columbus councils in them as prospective new council sites. With the help of the State Deputy and the General Agent Brother Henry Mosco, I found out which district deputy and field insurance agent they would want to handle each potential site. At the State Organizational meeting in June, I handed out a list of the potential council sites with a district deputy and a field agent assigned to each location. Stan and I explained that we wanted the district deputy and field agent to work together as a team, to explore each location, and to see what they could do about bringing the site into the Knights of Columbus organization.

There were 33 potential sites on the list, including some locations in moratorium that needed reactivation. According to the information in ny files, I believe 13 of the sites have been explored in one way or another this year.

Two, we believe, are about to become new councils and should be in our organization by the end of June.

Brother Dan Burt, who now lives in Philadelphia, contacted us about a council there and has done some excellent groundwork for us. We got a group up, went to Philadelphia one weekend, and put on a drive. Approximately 30 signed up, some of whom were former members of the Knights of Columbus. Since that time, we have been trying to get the new signees initiated into the First Degree. We lack 8 and expect to have them in on May 2. We are being strongly supported by Br. Jeff Jenkins of Philadelphia, a new Knight who took all 3 Degrees in the last 6 or 8 weeks.

The State Deputy contacted the pastor at Oxford and obtained permission for us to have a drive there, which we did at the start of this month. The team that went to Oxford obtained 40 signed Form 100s and we should be successful there also.

I am concerned about both councils. We seem to be meeting minor difficulties in matters such as getting prospects to First Degree, scheduling First Degrees, too many activities in the same time frame such as Easter, our State Convention, the Tootsie Roll Drive, and Third Degree Initiations, etc. I have developed a personal problem as I am involved with both New Council Development work and Third Degree work and there is a conflict working with potential new members in these two fields.

Minor difficulties have a way of delaying New Council Development, and delays kill enthusiasm. Two or three months development time for a new council after you once start is all you normally have. We are depending on our district deputies Br. Dick Benton and Br. Gene Ingram and our field agents Larry Campbell and Fred Ward to keep the push on in both locations.

Hopefully Philadelphia and Oxford will be in shortly. I know of no other positive developments to report on at the present time in new council development work, but other work is continuing.

But the District Deputy of this District had a copy of two of these councils' reports so at least two were lost in the mail or at Supreme, filed wrongly.

All of these reports are mandatory for the Mississippi Jurisdiction Program Activities. The first state report was due November 15, 1991, and the second was due March 31, 1992.

STATE CONVENTION COMMITTEE REPORT

The State Convention Committee met in Room 603 of the River Park Hotel.

Purpose: To make recommendations to future host Convention Committee of the next year and State Deputy in order to improve our State Conventions.

The Committee wishes to commend Convention co-chairmen Freddie Bigbee and Richard Spence and their staff from Council 1034 Natchez for organizing and performing their duties in a excellent manner. Sometimes, however, there are items this committee feels need to be pointed out.

Tupelo MS will be the site of the 1993 K of C Convention hosted by District #1 which is comoposed of Southaven, Corinth, Holly Springs, and Tupelo and hopefully Oxford which is being formed at this date.

The Convention Committee recommends the deadline for pre-registration packets be moved from April 1, 1993 to April 10, 1993. Also, Committee recommends that Convention Packets for 1993 be handed out at the Mid-winter meeting to be held in December of 1992. This will enable the members to make plans and also to cut down on mail out expenses.

The Committee also recommends that the State Convention Agenda be mailed out by the State Deputy by March 1, 1993 and that the Committee assignments be mailed out by April 1, 1993.

This will enable the K of C State Convention to be more of a family affair.

FOURTH BUSINESS SESSION

Sunday, April 26, 1992

The fourth business session was opened at 11 a.m. by State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski. The prayer was said by former State Chaplain Father Frank Corcoran and the Pledge of Allegiance by Master of the Fourth Degree Norman Kiehm.

Recognition comments were made by State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski toward Bishop Houck, Bishop Howze, Immediate Past State Deputy Marvin Lott and Executive Secretary John P. Myers, PSD.

Bishop Joseph Howze then addressed the delegates in unity.

REPORT OF THE MASTER OF THE 4TH DEGREE

The 4th Degree in the Bienville Province is on the move and advancing.

The past year, the Province-Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee-experienced a total gain of 481 new members, for a 5.2% increase. The District of Louisiana had the largest increase with 210, whereas Mississippi had the highest percentage of gain, 12%.

In Mississippi, we had two exemplifications since our last convention, and added 102 new lay members and 4 clergy, 48 in Gulfport during June of last year and 58 in Biloxi in February of this year. These two very successful exemplifications now give us a total statewide of 1080 4th Degree members--21% of the total membership in Mississippi. Our goal is 25%.

We are in urgent need of an exemplification in the central or northern part of the state. During this last year we scheduled two such exemplifications, but had to cancel both for lack of candidates. We are going to try again and hope, with the support of every assembly throughout the state, to be able to have one during July. A tentative date is set for July 18th in Brandon, hosted by our newest assembly, the Madison-Ridgeland Assembly #2267.

We just added this new assembly which now gives us a total of 20 assemblies. We hope to add a couple more this year, possibly in Lizana, Gautier and the new council in Ocean Springs.

In the latest issue of *Columbia Magazine* is a feature article on our new Supreme Master Darrell Beck, PSD. In this article, in regard to recruiting, he is quoted as saying:

Ideally, every 3rd Degree member should be a member of the 4th Degree. The 4th Degree is not an elitist group. It is the highest degree of the Order, but every 3rd Degree member of the Knights of Columbus is welcome.

With that thought Beck also notes that many 3rd Degree members believe they have to be invited to join the 4th. He says:

The reality is that all 3rd Degree members are welcome. They have only to contact the 4th Degree Assembly in their area. The only restriction on 4th Degree membership is that men must be members of the Order for a period of at least one year before joining the 4th. In some cases some 3rd Degree members are reluctant to join the 4th Degree because they believe it is too expensive. Purchasing 4th Degree regalia--tuxedo, cape, chapeaux, sword, etc--is not a requirement for joining. Tuxedos can be rented for occasions that require them. To be a member of the 4th Degree, it is not required that he be a member of the Honor Guard or Color Corp.

If we explain this to the 3rd Degree member, we can make it easier for him to join the 4th Degree, and enable him to reach the highest degree of our Order.

I also would like to quote our Supreme Knight, who himself was the Supreme Master at one time:

The reason that the 4th Degree membership remains rather constant is the same reason why more eligible Catholic men do not join the Order, namely nobody asks them. Surely each one of us can look around his council chamber and identify a number of candidates who would like nothing better than to be invited to join the 4th Degree. Let us then make an effort to be membership conscious, not only in regard to new Knights, but also with the goal of swelling the ranks of the 4th Degree.

BISHOP R. O. GEROW MEMORIAL FUND REPORT

At the mid-year meeting in December of 1991, I asked for the full support of the Knights of Columbus Family (Councils, Assemblies, Auxiliaries) to go all out to attain our goal of \$50,000 to go for that last straw that broke the camel's back, then next year we will get a bigger camel. Let me state here and now, before the SPCA comes after me, we did not break the camel's back

This year, the Jackson Diocese received \$20,490, the Biloxi Diocese received \$24,552 for a total of \$45,042. This is \$4,670 less than last year. Seven councils and four assemblies that usually contribute did not do so this year. We realize that the economy has been somewhat depressed, some areas more than others, and that soon all councils and assemblies will join forces with us to assure our children

and grandchildren of the comfort of having a priest to counsel and administer to them. Total to date \$684,711.

The Fourth Degree Assemblies have contributed \$40,710, the Ladies Auxiliaries have donated a total of \$6200. The helping hands of the Fourth Degree and the Ladies are greatly appreciated.

The St. Vincent de Paul Council #4898 in Long Beach is continuing its policy to donate an equal amount to the Vincentian Order, which has staffed its parish for many years.

Pascagoula Council #1605 received the award for the largest donation of \$5,000. With a donation of \$4,800, the Greenville/Leland Assembly received the award for the largest donation per member with \$55 per member.

You are all to be congratulated; each council, each assembly, each auxiliary, for your outstanding effort. This committee thanks you.

My personal thanks to Brothers John Szymonik and Jerry Santucci for their assistance throughout the year. Due to a major illness of his wife Annie, John is in our prayers, that God, in His infinite goodness and love, will grant Annie a speedy recovery.

The shortage of priests has become critical. As members of the Knights of Columbus, "the right arm of the Church," we must exert every effort to insure the future of the Church in America. The Priest Education Fund should be the primary objective of every council.
