PROCEEDINGS OF THE 89TH ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Friday, April 23, 1993

The 89th Annual State Convention of the Mississippi State Council, Knights of Columbus was convened at 6:00 p.m. with State Deputy Stanley M. Swentkowski calling the meeting to order. Father Brian Carroll, State Chaplain, said the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag led by Norman Kiehm, Fourth Degree Master. State Convention Chairman Marvin Lott, Immediate Past State Deputy, introduced General Sam Fleming who welcomed the Knights and their ladies and guests to Tupelo.

State Secretary Tom Zettler gave the response on behalf of the State Council to General Fleming. State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski officially called the convention to order at 6:32 p.m.

Our fund has grown to about \$5,000.00 and we have given three scholarships to two students this year. We have discontinued the football bowl this year and have now gone to basketball tournaments for our fund raiser. This has proven to be much better because it is indoors and does not depend on the weather to get the crowds.
- We were planning an outing on Labor Day for the purpose of funding our donation to the Priest Education Fund, but decided to move this up to spring and have a spaghetti dinner. The dinner netted \$1,000.00 for the fund.
- Gerald Graham headed the tootsie roll program and this activity netted some \$2,800.00, the smallest amount in recent years, but Gerry was very busy in his own behalf to do more.
- 4. In November, we had our Memorial mass for three deceased brothers.
- In December, we had a Christmas party and had donations put on the Christmas tree for food for the needy. We also rang the Salvation Army bells and help them raise over \$400.00 in one day.

STATE DEPUTY'S REPORT

Most Revered Bishops, Reverend State Chaplain, Worthy Supreme Representative, Worthy State Officers, Worthy District Deputies, Worthy Insurance General Agent, Worthy Past State Deputies, Worthy Delegates, and My Brother Knights:

It has truly been a privilege to have served as your State Deputy for the last 22 months. I have taken this opportunity to travel extensively throughout the jurisdiction to witness first hand the tremendous acts of charity and love that our Order extends to the less fortunate, the bereaved, and those in need. It is exciting to see our Brother Knights spreading the word of God by acts of love which is the theme of our evangelization.

Although the theme of evangelization was heard more frequently during the 1991-1992 fraternal year, it is a concept which we must embrace forever. We as Catholic Christians have been given the task of spreading our faith to all people. There is nothing which will bring a person closer to our church than the true, sincere concern of another human being by another human being. Being a Christian in name alone is not enough, as being a Knight in name alone is worthless. You have heard me quote St. James many times this year when he stated in Chapter 2, Verses 14-17 "What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith, but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, Go in peace, keep warm and eat well, but you do not give them the necessities of the body, what good is it? So also faith of itself, if it does not have works, is dead."

I also caution you Brothers, that insincere acts of charity are as transparent as a window pane. Recipients of this type of charity will feel that they have been used, and may be lost to our attempts of evangelization forever. You also must be aware that our Order will be judged on how the weakest of our Brothers perform. We as Catholics still have enemies lurking about who will jump at the chance of finding faults in our membership. We also have not won over many of our own faith, including the clergy who judge us by past failures, both individual and organizational. I ask you to uphold the highest sense of morality, conduct, and integrity when wearing the symbol of our Order. A true Knight of Columbus would not want his religion, or Order embarrassed by public showings of weakness. Let us inspire others by living up to the principles of our Four degrees. Then we as proud Knights will be the envy of all.

During this 89th annual convention I encourage you to join with friends of the past, make new friendships, and reaffirm your commitment to our Church and our Order. It is a time to reward councils and individuals for excellence in performance, pray for our Brothers who have gone before us, and set goals for future accomplishment. I pray that you will all be inspired by the Holy Spirit so that our decisions will be made for God and the church, and not for individual or group benefit.

I will also point out areas of need and deficiencies so that we may be aware of their existence and make plans to eliminate them. There is no organization worth its salt that does not identify weaknesses, make plans for improvement, and measure its progress.

STATE DEPUTIES MEETING

On June 4-6, 1992, I was accompanied by my wife, Regina, to the State Deputies' meeting at Supreme Headquarters, in New Haven, Connecticut. Although this was my second trip, it did not take away from the awe one feels when visiting St. Mary's Church, the birthplace of our Order. My wife and I also had the honor of placing a rose on the resting place of our founder, Father Michael J. McGivney.

It was good to socialize with State Deputies who had now become friends, and with the Supreme Officers, Board of Directors, and various employees at the Supreme Office. One is very aware of the pride each feels for our Order, and the obvious intelligence and leadership in our Order. I will always remember our Supreme Knight, Virgil Dechant, as an intelligent impressive leader, but above all a Catholic gentleman.

The only sad feeling we all had was that it would for most of us be the last time we assembled together in New Haven. But we would retain our memories for the rest of our lives. I have always felt that our Order was divinely inspired. A trip to our birthplace only strengthens that belief.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

The installation of State Officers and District Deputies took place in Clarksdale, Mississippi, June 26-28, 1992. On Friday, June 26, with the help of Msgr. James T. McKenna Council 2969, I hosted a welcome party at my home. The attendance was excellent again this year and all seemed to have a good time.

On Saturday evening at the 6:00 p.m. mass at St. Elizabeth Catholic Church, the State Officers, District Deputies, and Ladies Auxiliary Officers were installed by our State Chaplain, Reverend Brian Carroll. Unfortunately, due to a schedule conflict Most Reverend Bishop Houck was unable to attend. Following the installation, Msgr. James T. McKenna Council hosted a dance and feed for all the visiting dignitaries.

Meetings in all the areas of our State program were held on Saturday and Sunday. It was felt that our leaders had the information they needed to make a difference in our jurisdiction.

SCHOOL OF COLUMBIANISM

On July 26, 1992, a large percentage of the leaders of our jurisdiction met at St. Paul's Church in Brandon, Mississippi. The meeting was hosted by St. Paul Council 10216. I owe much gratitude to Grand Knight John C. Lewis III, and District Deputy Lewis Zylka for their help in setting up this meeting. All the aspects of the State program were covered. Members who were present left with a greater understanding of our Order and the significance of the State program.

NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Knights of Columbus National Convention was held in New York City August 4-6, 1992. This was my third national convention, but one I will always remember and cherish. As a child growing up in New Jersey I had visited St. Patrick's Cathedral on many occasions. The Cathedral for many

is a symbol of the Catholic religion, both for Catholics and Protestants. I was not prepared for the great honor our Supreme Knight bestowed on me and the Jurisdiction of Mississippi. I was appointed an altar server and had the distinct privilege of carrying the thurible which contained the incense. In this duty I led the procession of some 70 Cardinals, Archbishops, and Bishops, as well as a large gathering of priests into St. Patrick's Cathedral for the opening mass on August 4, 1992. It was the highlight of my tenure as State Deputy.

I had the distinct privilege of hearing Mother Teresa of Calcutta address the congregation at mass and again at the States Banquet. My wife and I along with Past State Deputy Marvin Lott, State Membership Chairman Roy Patterson, and Brother John Maloney and their wives, observed Mother Teresa of Calcutta become the first recipient of the Knights of Columbus Gaudium et Spes Award. The award bears the Latin title of the Second Vatican Councils "Pastoral Constitution on the church in the Modern World" which translated means "Joy and Hope". The Board of Directors presented Mother Teresa with a check for \$100,000.00 which accompanied the award as well as an amount equal to the cost of the States Dinner.

On Wednesday morning we had the honor of the appearance of then President George Bush who promised a stand for family values, moral leadership, life, and self initiative. In the afternoon Brother, and then Attorney General William Barr addressed the convention on family values.

The Supreme Knight had also appointed me as Chairman of the Committee for "the Papal Greeting". On August 6, 1992, I read my address which was sent to Our Holy Father to a room full of standing delegates. This was another honor bestowed on me and the Mississippi Jurisdiction. In all it will take an extraordinary convention to top the memories, honors, and events of the 1992 New York Convention.

BIENVILLE PROVINCE MEETING

My wife Regina and I attended the Bienville Province meeting of the Fourth Degree in Birmingham, Alabama, October 17-19, 1992. The Bienville Province consists of the Jurisdictions of Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Tennessee. The major event was a tribute to Columbus which centered around an Italian marble statue of Columbus erected on the grounds of the University of Alabama, Birmingham. I was very proud of our Jurisdiction's progress in the Fourth Degree under master Norman Kiehm. I was also proud that past masters John P. Myhers and Paulino Carrubba attended. We were all proud of Past Master and State Deputy and now Executive Secretary John P. Myers for receiving the prestigious Charles C. Jaubert Memorial Award. This award is presented to a Sir Knight who has achieved excellence in the Bienville Province. I think we should give John a round of applause.

SUPREME MID-WINTER MEETING

I attended the State Deputy's Mid-Winter meeting November 21-22 in Atlanta, Georgia. This meeting was devoted to membership and developed the theme "Columbus the Man" to honor the Quincentennary.

STATE MID-WINTER MEETING

On December 5, 1992, we again called on the hospitality of St. Paul's Council 10216 to host the Mid-Winter Meeting. At this meeting all aspects of the state program were covered with emphasis on membership. We had excellent attendance, and a wealth of information was disseminated. I again want to thank Grand Knight John C. Lewis III, District Deputy Lewis Zylka, and Membership Chairman Roy Patterson for their help in setting up this meeting.

STATE OF THE ORDER MEMBERSHIP

Membership is a very important aspect of our Order. Failure to bring in qualified, energetic men into our fraternity would set the stage for eventual extinction. We can do no better to our individual councils or our Order than to recruit new leadership with vision for the future.

Membership is also the criteria for which Jurisdictions are compared and awards are given. As I mentioned last year the numbers don't tell the whole story. I am proud of our membership standing despite the fact that we are not number one. I will explain our situation in more detail.

As of April 1, 1993, we are in fourth place in Division VI out of fourteen jurisdictions. We have gained 272 new members, suspended 130, and shown a net gain of 142. I am proud to say that we have been in the top 28% of our division for two years, or in other words have always performed better than 72% of the jurisdictions in our division.

I think it is very important to look at the consistency we have shown over the last two years. There are jurisdictions who are ahead of us this year that were behind us last year. If you graded jurisdictions on a point system for placement you would find us grading out well due to our consistency. We have never been in the negative column, shown drastic peaks or valleys, or fallen below the top 28%. We have accomplished this despite heavy suspensions from various councils.

We knew two years ago that we had many councils with excessive numbers of non dues paying members who were on the verge of suspension. I beseeched you to make every effort to limit suspensions, and to make every attempt to save these members. So many of you responded in a positive manner and only suspended when all other means failed. To those councils I give you my thanks, not only for me, but for our Order. I also asked you to stay in the positive column, recruiting more members than you suspend. Again, many of you responded, and not only recruited more members, but saved many of those you thought you would lose.

Over the last two years we have seen a tremendous turnover of Financial Secretaries. These new leaders were intent on clearing their rolls of unproductive members. This was also a source of suspensions. I congratulate these new men for the enthusiasm they brought to their job. I hope they will continue to perform their duty so that when suspensions are necessary, they will be in small numbers and not in mass. The jurisdiction can overcome small numbers of suspensions, but those of 20 or more members are hard to offset. A council should never reach this point if the Financial Secretary is doing his job.

I want to thank the many Councils who made every effort to aid us in recruiting. At this time I would like to recognize the 7 Top Gun Council's who achieved a minimum of a 10% increase in membership. As I name these Councils, I would like their delegates to please stand and remain standing until all have been named.

Let us give these councils a hand. We owe all these councils a great deal of appreciation for what they have done for our Order.

The membership portion of my report would not be complete if I did not mention the tremendous job our State Membership Director Roy Patterson did for us this year. He has traveled extensively to promote membership. He has made many lonely trips at night to the Coast, Cleveland, Clarksdale, Meridian and other locations to present "Top Proposer of the Month" awards. He has attended most degree work, and all membership drives. He was always there to help Councils with questions and could retrieve membership information on request. Last year he and his family were picked as Family of the Year. I think we all owe Roy a sign of our appreciation.

Obviously we have been praising the Councils who have excelled this fraternal year, but we must also address the area of need. We have nine councils who did not recruit a new Knight this year. If my memory is correct some of these are the same Councils that did not recruit a new member last year. Needless to say this is not a good sign. The State Officers were excellent recruiters. When we come into a parish for a recruitment drive we usually do well. All you have to do in order for us to come is ask us. All parishes responded to new faces with new ideas.

When I became State Deputy in 1991 I told you that there was no Council more important than another, and that no matter what your membership numbers we would not turn our back on you. That has never changed. My analogy to this is "the Parable of the Lost Son" in the Gospel of Luke, Chapter 15, Verses 11-32. In that parable one of the father's sons take his inheritance and squanders it in a distant country while the other son is productive and loyal to his father. On returning from losing all his possessions the son who squandered his possessions is gratiously greeted by his father after admitting failure. The loyal son cannot understand this behavior and questions the father. But his father explains, "My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your Brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found." My Brothers this is how we will react to you. If we can help you, please don't hesitate to call.

NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

I am disappointed to report that we have not added any new councils as of this date, but the same was true at the Convention last year. Following last year's convention we were able to establish Council 10901 in Oxford. I truly believe we will have at least one new council before this fraternal year ends.

Last year I mentioned that the direction of New Council growth must change due to the large number of small parishes left without a Knights of Columbus Council. Only St. Richards in Jackson remains as a large parish without a KC council. We need to continue to develop interest in small parishes through the Round Table. If we can establish a foothold in the parish then we may eventually gain enough men and interest to form a council. This takes serious effort and is very time consuming, but it must be done.

This year I attempted to address this problem by dividing the state into a Northern and Southern District. Gerry Clark accepted the position of New Council chairman for the North and Bruce Pabon accepted it for the South. I want to thank these men for their efforts. I know the time they have invested will eventually come to fruition.

We are now looking at three major sites: St. Richards in Jackson, St. Frances Xavier in Wiggins, and St. Mary of the Pines in Chatana.

Brother Gerry Clark has worked extensively trying to get a new council in St. Richards which is our largest parish. The initiative was started by Brother Henry Kadjan, and continued by Brother Clark. It is my understanding that Fr. Summers will allow us to speak at mass during the weekend in May. If enough men show an interest we will be allowed to form a council. We already have several Knights from St. Richard's parish in other Jackson area councils. Keep us in your prayers in this matter.

District Deputy Hollis Moran and Program Chairman Larry Tabor have promised us an all out effort in Wiggins. District Deputy Joe Bonfiglio has promised us the same at St. Mary's of the Pines in Chatana.

State Advocate Jesse Quinn, III made contact at St. Mary's parish in Vicksburg, Mississippi. The parish which is predominately black had interest in both the Knights of Columbus and the Knights of Peter Clavor. A strong influence in the parish was Charles Davenport, the Chief of Police, who was a Knight of Columbus from New york. A vote was taken and the men of the parish were split. As a result, a men's club was formed. Brother Davenport has told me that he will try to influence the men over time to reconsider a Knights of Columbus Council. There is a great need for us to look at increasing minority membership in our Order, not only black, but also our Vietnamese brothers on the Coast. We must be willing to spread Columbianism to all eligible Catholic men.

It is my hope and prayer that these areas become new councils before my term in office is up, but in any event I see them becoming councils in the near future. We have laid the foundation for future success. It is not as important "when" they become councils as "if" they become councils. Pray for our success.

CEREMONIALS

An area that we can all be proud of is our ceremonials, especially the Second and Third Degrees. As you know until March 15, 1992, we only had one second third degree team in our state and that was the Msgr. P. J. Carey team of Pascagoula. On March 15, 1992, the Msgr. John F. Clerico Second, Third Degree team was certified by our Ceremonials Director, Sam Dambrocia. Both these teams have performed outstanding work eliciting some of the most profound responses that I have seen in the years I have attended degrees. I want to thank team captain Don Cox of Msgr. P. J. Carey team, and Brian Cooper of Msgr. John F. Clerico team, for their outstanding performance. Special thanks also goes to our two CO's, State Warden Guy Todaro, Jr., and State Advocate Jesse Quinn, III. We can be very proud of our degree work.

As of this date, 47 First Degree Exemplifications have been performed, it has come to my attention that there may have been several more not reported. We are looking into that situation at this time. We have performed eight Second Third Degree Exemplifications as of this date. They are as follows:

The reality of a new Second Third Degree team has brought into focus some needs that we must address. It is important that:

- (1) We keep both degree teams active.
- (2) We look at the financial aspects of performing degrees.
- (3) We seek a way of increasing candidates and Brothers at Degrees.

It is important that both our degree teams work as often as they can to stay on top of their performance. At this time the price of degrees has differed, which at times has made one degree team more acceptable than another. As State Deputy I cannot ask a council to pay more, or take a loss for a degree when another team can perform the degree at a cheaper price. On a few occasions this year the State Council reimbursed smaller councils for losses they took in degree work. This is a new problem for us, but let me emphasize a problem of progress and growth. I would rather face these problems than not be able to field a degree team. We need to study this problem and make recommendations. Any help that Mr. Dambrocia can give us will be appreciated.

It has been suggested that we cut down the number of degrees we perform to increase class size and decrease financial loss. I do not think this is a valid solution. We need to keep our degree team working, and offer as many opportunities for degrees as possible, We need to work hard to increase our class size. We also need to encourage Brother Knights to lend their support and attend these degrees. With our two degree teams it is something worth seeing.

I would like to thank Past State Deputy Wiley Price, our Ceremonials Chairman, for all the work he has done this year. I would also like to encourage the Pass Christian-Long Beach team to continue their efforts for another team. We will never have enough qualified teams or team members.

INSURANCE

Without a doubt, our order's greatest fraternal benefit is our insurance program. It is what underlies all the charitable programs we undertake as a Fraternal Order. We are very proud of the millions of dollars we give to charity, for our aid to the Pope, our scholarship programs, and mass programs of support of our Church and Religious. But many of us fail to realize that it is our insurance program that makes it all possible.

Our insurance program has a total of over \$22 billion in force. This is a great testimony to the quality of our program. Our insurance program has again this year received high marks from Standard and Poor's and A. M. Best. Standard and Poor's rated our program AAA (Superior) based on "superior capitalization, strong operating performance, and its unique strategic advantage in marketing the Catholic population." Best gave the Knights of Columbus its highest rating: A++ (Superior) for the 18th year in a row.

We have accomplished all this with only about 30% of our membership buying into the program. No one is forced into buying Knights of Columbus insurance, but please make sure your family is protected in case of unexpected events. We need to support our General Agent Henry Mosco and his field agents as they set out to protect us.

I want to thank all our agents for the fine job they have done. I also want to welcome new agents Jim Rigby, Tom Rossetta, and M. J. Landry. Let's give all our agents a show of appreciation.

SUPREME COUNCIL AWARDS

I congratulate all of you on your effort and hope to see this list increase in the future.

In the Contest of Champions for 1992, Council 10499 Ocean Springs won both the overall percentage award (500%) and net gain (25 members). This was an outstanding accomplishment. Let's give Council 10499 and Grand Knight Bruce Pabon a show of appreciation.

Another accomplishment in need of mention is Msgr. John J. Burns Council 802 of Meridian, Mississippi, being chosen as one of the top ten council activity programs in the 1991-1992 International Services Program Awards Contest. This program emphasized the care for widows of deceased Knights. Let's give Council 802 a show of appreciation.

Most of our awards are subject to the submission of the necessary paperwork. While most of our councils are punctual with their reports, we still have councils who fail to send in required forms. Gentlemen, the paperwork is part of the responsibility one accepts when taking an office. You do yourself and your council a disservice by failing to send in the forms. Let us all make a commitment to being 100% with our paperwork in the coming year.

QUINCENTENNIAL

The past year has been a very important year for our order as we celebrated 500 years of Christianity brought to the New World by our patron Christopher Columbus. The Councils of the Mississippi Jurisdiction celebrated this event in many different ways. I would like to mention two events of historical significance.

On October 11, 1992, a Quincentennial Mass was celebrated by the Most Reverent Joseph Houze, Bishop of Biloxi. The mass was sponsored by the D'Iberville Assembly of the Fourth Degree and held at the Cathedral of the Nativity. A special thanks goes out to Faithful Navigator Windell D. Norris and his Sir Knights.

On the same date I had the opportunity to attend a re-enactment of Columbus' landing at the reservoir in Jackson, Mississippi. The event was sponsored by the six councils of District 4, and the Bishop Gerow Assembly 554 and the Brandon-Richland Assembly 2269, under the guidance and direction of District Deputy 4, and Faithful Navigator Louis F. Zylka, the event was a great success.

Three sail boats designed to look like the Nina, Pinta, and Santa Maria left Friendship Dock to land at the Yacht Club. All observers were able to ride in a three deck boat built and designed by Father Balser of St. Paul's parish in Brandon. On arriving Columbus was met by native American Indians. An ecumenical prayer service followed accompanied by a Fourth Degree honor guard. The day was completed by a social aboard Fr. Balser's boat.

Brother Zylka submitted to Supreme photographs, a report, and videocassette of the event. We received a letter from Supreme Knight Virgil Dechant stating that the materials were being transmitted to the Supreme Council museum and archives.

I want to thank Quincentennial Chairman Bruce Pabon for the time he invested in organizing information and motivating councils to promote the 500th year of Christianity. I feel we had a very successful year of celebration.

STATE OFFICERS AND DISTRICT DEPUTIES

As I close I want to thank my fellow state officers for their dedication to our Order. I wish them well and pray that they will lead our order into great achievements in the future. To my Il district deputies I owe much. If a jurisdiction is to be successful, the District Deputies are the key. Some of these men are completing their eligibility as District Deputies, while others will continue to serve.

Two years ago I spoke to you about developing leadership. We need and depend upon our tested, experienced Brothers, but we must add men to their ranks. The only way one gets experience is by being given an opportunity. In the last two years, I feel I have given many men the opportunity. I am proud of how many of them responded.

I want to give a special thanks to our State Chaplain and my Pastor, Father Brian Carroll. I realize that Father Carroll was not able to attend all the functions he would have liked to attend. Being the only priest in a good size parish does not allow for much free time. I want to thank Father Carroll for honoring me by taking this position. He represents a shortage in the priesthood that all Knights need to be concerned about. We need to not only support our seminarians through financial means, but through prayer, and vocation awareness programs. Remember our slogan "Vocations are everybody's business."

CONCLUSION

At the start of my address I talked about the importance of true charity, which is the first principle of our order. At this time I would like to talk briefly about the other three principles.

The second principle of our order is unity. How much more powerful we are when we are joined together in a common bond. I implore you not to get involved in petty arguments, internal bickering, or jealous competition on the council or state level. Don't look for things which separate us, but look for the greatest common denominator we have - our Catholic religion. Jesus wanted his apostles to be united and to support each other. I challenge you to do the same.

Fraternity is the third principle of our order. We should stress that we are a "Catholic Fraternity." We are not a club, country club, social club, or independent club. We are a Catholic fraternal organization. We must keep this in mind at all times when conducting business, and in all affairs of the council. We have set by-laws, rules, and regulations. They were established for the good of the Order. Let us abide by them. As I mentioned before our greatest fraternal benefit is our insurance program. I ask you to consider buying "not part of the rock, but part of your faith", socialize together, bring your families together, make good friends and protect the welfare of each other.

Patriotism, the principle of the Fourth Degree means to most people a love of country. If you love your country, then you want what is best for that country. Governments are elected by the people and are supposed to follow their direction. I challenge you men to take patriotism to a higher level. When you see injustice, prejudice, hatred, and rules which are morally wrong, stand up and condemn them. If you want to show patriotism you must speak up when you disagree. A man who refuses to take a stand against injustice really does take a stand. He has decided to do nothing which in reality is giving in to the other side.

We talk about separation of church and state and this is a noble concept. But can any Catholic, or Knight, separate what they know to be morally right from their stand on issues? I don't think you can, and I implore you not to attempt to do so. Let your faith be your guide on issues of state. You will find decisions easier to make, and more successful in nature. It is never too late to start. What lies behind us and what lies before us are tiny matters compared to what lies within us. The church, the state, and the nation need men like you now more than they ever have. There has never been a greater need for dedicated, loyal laity as there is now in our world. Over the last three decades, there has been a 560 percent increase in illegitimate births; a quadrupling of divorce rates; a tripling of the percentage of children living in single-parent homes; and a tripling of the teenage suicide rate. Despite all this you men stand out like beacons of light in a dark world. You give us hope that things can change. It is not easy being a Catholic or a Knight, but the rewards will far outweigh the pain.

I am personally motivated by men such as our own John Szymonik, Paulino Carrubba, Tom Zettler, Pat Myers, and I could go on and on. These men have faced many difficulties in their lives, but their faith has kept them on a steady course. People say there are no heroes anymore. I disagree. They are there, but we look for them in the wrong places. They are your mothers and fathers, priests, Bishops, and the Brother Knight who sits next to you. I pray that you continue to stand firm in your faith.

During the two years of my stewardship as State Deputy I have attempted to project a positive image of our jurisdiction to the Supreme Officers, Board of Directors, and my fellow State Deputies. I feel I have succeeded in this role. A jurisdiction may be judged by the conduct of its State Deputy and I have attempted to conduct myself appropriately at all times.

Most importantly, I have tried to be fair, honest, and positive to all my Brother Knights in the Mississippi Jurisdiction. I have attempted to be there when you needed my help, but never there to chastise or belittle you. I only hope that I have earned your trust and respect as well as your friendship.

A special thanks goes out to the Clarksdale Council, Msgr. James T. McKenna 2969 for all their support over the last 13 years, especially the last six. I would like to thank Brother Emilio Zepponi and the late Tony Antici for the ultimate gift - asking me to become a Knight of Columbus. I would also like to thank Jim Glover PGK, and James Rossetti GK for their friendship and support.

None of this would have been possible without the support of my wife, Regina, and my sons, Sean and Ryan. It is my love for them that motivates me to accomplish what I can for God. As we approach our 24th wedding anniversary, I thank God for my wife. If she were taken from me tomorrow I would have to thank God for the "short time he has lent her to me."

I hope the Lord allows me to live long enough to see my sons grow into good men and join our Order. I look forward to spending more time with them in the near future.

Although my time as State Deputy is drawing to a close, I pledge to stay involved and to help in the areas our future State Deputies see fit. I hope in years to come you can look my sons in the face and tell them that their father's legacy to this order was that "he was a good Knight and a Catholic Gentleman" and inspired others to be the same. If I can do that my job will have been complete.

STATE ADVOCATE'S REPORT

Brothers, it has been an honor and a privilege to serve as your State Advocate for our Mississippi Jurisdiction for the past two years.

My official activities as State Advocate began on the very first day of my tenure in office, because on that day legislation went into effect which began the process of setting the rules and operating procedures for bingo games conducted by charitable organizations in Mississippi. During the past two years, I have worked diligently to keep you informed about the current bingo laws and operating procedures, and to make you aware of the important deadlines concerning the filing of forms and license applications.

During the past two years, I have also had many opportunities to meet with my Brother Knights throughout the state to hear their concerns, to answer their questions, and to help find workable solutions to the sometime complicated problems that arise within our local councils.

I also had the privilege of helping to conduct membership drives in many of our councils and in assisting with organizational drives in Oxford, Philadelphia and Vicksburg. I am very proud of the fact that I have been involved with the establishment of three of our present councils, those being Grenada, St. Elizabeth Seton in Ocean Springs and our newest council in Oxford.

A year and a half ago our State Deputy challenged our state leaders to form new 2nd and 3rd Degree teams because distance and financial concerns were making it difficult for the existing teams to perform in the central and northern sections of the state. Along with the good men of my home council in Greenwood, and Brother Terry Lott, I accepted the challenge, and we began to work to form the much needed Degree teams. After several months of organization and practice, the Msgr. John F. Clerico 2nd and 3rd Degree teams performed a Degree in Tupelo and were certified by Brother Sam Dambroccia, the Supreme Director of Ceremonials. Since their formation, our 2nd and 3rd Degree teams performed for exemplifications in 1992 and three thus far in 1993.

In addition, I served as the conferring officer for the 3rd Degree Exemplification that was held this past August in Biloxi.

I believe that the way a 3rd Degree Exemplification is performed is very important, because it is one of the two unique opportunities that we as Knight of Columbus have to really have an impact on our Brother Knight's sense of values and principles.

STATE WARDEN'S REPORT

It has been an honor and privilege to serve you these past two years as your State Warden.

This time has truly been a rewarding experience for both myself and my wife, Lisa. We have visited numerous councils. What is more important, we made many new friends whose friendship we will treasure for a lifetime.

I have learned quite a lot in this office. I have offered to assist anyone in any way I could. This was no polite statement on my part. Many of you accepted my offer. I appreciate the trust and confidence you have shown in my abilities.

I would like to share with you one particular time someone asked for my assistance. This is not to brag. Rather, I share this experience with you only as an expresion of how much I love, my Brothers, and our Order.

A Brother Knight came up to me during one of my council visits and said, "You know, according to Supreme, the Deputy Grand Knight's jewel is the Compass of Virtue. It consists of 32 rays which represent the 32 virtues that a man might possess. Do you know what these 32 virtues are?"

I was speechless. I had no idea what the answer was and only a hunch on where I could find it. However, I quickly accepted the challenge and promised this Brother Knight that I would do my best to find the answer to his question.

A couple of weeks later, I went to the public library and started looking up the word 'VIRTUE'.

Virtue is defined as a habit of doing right. It also referred to the philosophers Socrates and Plato. Intrigued by this find I continued on my quest.

After further research, I discovered that there are four virtues known as Cardinal virtues that are naturally acquired. The Cardinal virtues are prudence, temperance, fortitude and justice. There are also three additional virtues known as Theological virtues namely faith, hope and charity — the three spiritual gifts listed by St. Paul as the sources of Christian life and holiness.

Only able to research and find a few more virtues, I contacted Supreme and posed the question to them. One week later, I received a letter from Robert Ennis, a Program Consultant at Supreme, which contained the information I requested.

PRIEST'S EDUCATION FUND REPORT

Since the last convention I have sent three letters to the councils, assemblies and auxiliaries. The reports I have received are mixed; some good and some not so good.

The opening of the casinos on the Coast has caused a large drop in the attendance at bingo games, the main source of revenue for most of the councils. Some weathered the storm after a few months and recouped. Others were not so fortunate and had to cut down on the number of games and the amount paid. One council, one of our largest contributors, had to suspend play altogether. We hope and pray that the other councils, assemblies and auxiliaries will increase their contributions to help take up the slack.

To date I have received \$16,040.00 from eight councils, two assemblies and four auxiliaries. If this trend continues, we might still make our \$50,000.00.

I will make a complete report of contributions on Saturday at the convention.

STATE CEREMONIAL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As State Ceremonial Chairman, I am privileged to report the Ceremonial Activities within the state for the 1992-1993 fraternal year.

Four 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were scheduled for the first half of the fraternal year and four were performed. Five 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were scheduled for the second half of the fraternal year and four were performed. One more degree is scheduled for June in Pass Christian.

The Supreme Status Report for the first half of the fraternal year shows that four 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were scheduled, but we received credit for one and four were performed. The report gave us credit for four 1st Degree, but fourteen were performed.

Eight 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications were performed and 42 1st Degrees were performed.

For the state to receive credit for exemplifications performed in its jurisdiction, the proper report form must be submitted to the Supreme Office. Supreme obtains its information from the "District Deputy Exemplification Report", form #450. The host District Deputy is the one that has to submit form #450 to the Supreme Office.

We have two 2nd and 3rd Degree Teams in the Jurisdiction, one in the southern part and the other in the northern part of the state. The expense for bringing the southern team to the northern part of the state and the northern team to the southern part is very expensive. That also presents a problem for the Greenwood Council and Pascagoula Council to get their members their 2nd and 3rd degree. An out of state degree team has to be brought in to perform the degree work. To keep from bringing an out of state degree team to perform the Degree Exemplification two more degree teams are required, one in the central part and another in the southern part of the state.

More 1st Degree teams should be formed in the Jurisdiction. I know that small councils might have difficulty in forming a team, but the only way is to try.

CEREMONIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1993 Ceremonial Committee recommends the following:

- 1. That each council form a 1st Degree team.
- That two more 2nd and 3rd Degree teams be formed, one in the central and one in the southern part of the state.
- 3. That the dress code for 1st, 2nd and 3rd Degrees adopted at the 1985 convention be strictly enforced to preserve the dignity of the ceremony. This requires dress pants, dress shirt, and dress shoes with coat and tie optional.
- 4. That all District Deputies submit Form 450, "District Deputy Exemplification Report" to the Supreme Office with copies to the State Deputy and State Ceremonials Chairman.
- That all District Deputies submit Form 2408 "District Deputy Ceremonial Report", to the Supreme Director of Ceremonials with copies to the State Deputy and State Ceremonials Chairman.
- That more members attend the Exemplifications being performed throughout the state, especially the 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications.
- 7. That all members refrain from talking to the Ds when attending the 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications. Let the Ds do their work.
- That 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications be performed every 2 months. This time span is to allow councils to get more members.
- That 1st Degree Exemplifications be performed at least one or two weeks before 2nd and 3rd Degree Exemplifications.
- 10. That a committee be formed to study the possibility of coming up with a fixed price for 2nd and 3rd Degrees being performed in the state, that councils can afford.
- 11. That the degree work be scheduled more centralized so councils can bring their members to receive their 2nd and 3rd Degrees. One month in the north, one in the central and one in the southern part of the state.
- 12. Contact other states when their Degree work is being done so councils may bring their members over to receive their Degrees or bring another team in.
- That membership chairman, ceremonials chairman and State Deputy get together when scheduling 2nd and 3rd Degrees.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE MEETING REPORT

How can we make future conventions easier for host councils?

State Convention Chairman brought up fact that we may need different color delegate badges so candidates can know who to talk to when running for office. Host Council should make these up ahead of time and make changes at registration desk if needed. A different background color was suggested. Motion made by Davis Hughes, Jack Cunningham seconded the motion. Motion passed by majority.

This is the last year that state will be responsible financially for any convention. It will be the duty of the host council or district.

Members brought up concern about a KC able to get a refund on pre-paid registration fee if he could not attend at the last minute. Pick Noble made the point that the host council has to guarantee the number of dinners for Friday and Saturday nights. If someone gets sick and cannot make it at the last minute because of a legitimate reason, that member should be allowed a refund of the entire registration packet or transfer to another KC member. Motion for this made, motion carried unanimously.

Discussion concerning Resolution #11 about raising the registration fee from \$40.00 to \$50.00 per person. Pick Noble stated reason this resolution was submitted was because of the cost of meals, etc. Marvin mentioned the way to make up for any loss would be to sell convention ads. Jack Cunningham felt that over time the quality of the conventions will go down and host councils will have to cut corners if registration fees were not allowed to be increased.

CONSIDERATION FOR STATE DEPUTY. Turn over to State Deputy and new Convention Committee Chairman that if host council cannot cover their expenses with registration packet fees at the current levels that the fees can be adjusted as needed by host council with approval from State Deputy and State Appraiser.

Biloxi Council, Natchez have asked to host 1997 convention. Normally the state convention chairman receives a letter in January for site consideration. State convention chairman has not received any this year. Decision to be made by delegates when state deputy brings up at the end of Sunday session.

Need to consider council request for site if special milestone event is taking place in council history. Tupelo graciously withdrew its name from consideration of hosting the 1997 convention out of respect for the important 90th anniversary of the founding of the Biloxi council. A recommendation that Tupelo host the 1998 convention was made.

This fraternal year has been the most significant year yet in Pro-Life. More serious happenings have taken place than in the last 20 years since the Roe vs. Wade decision. Various states have passed various Pro-Life bills ranging from individual items to a complete Pro-Life bill. They have all been to the U.S. Supreme Court and back except the South Dakota bill, which is on its way. We won some and we lost some.

You ask, how did we fare in Mississippi and what did we as Knights accomplish? Mississippi came out in good shape. Informed consent, and clinic regulations are in force. We don't have a full Pro-Life bill. When it comes up Brother Jim Glover and I will ask you for your help.

The statewide 1-800 Crisis Pregnancy phone line is operating but not yet in full swing. Funds are short. Most of the councils in the Biloxi Diocese have voluntarily contributed and some in the Jackson Diocese. I will submit the program as a special activity. Councils will be asked to voluntarily contribute \$1.20 per member, per year. This will pay for ads in the yellow pages and college directories throughout the state and for some billboard service. Some salary will be paid to Diocese counselors answering the phone. The billboard service hit a snag. Four billboard companies allow free billboard space for non-profit organizations. Only one will install a Pro-Life poster free because of the political nature of the poster. Cameron Outdoor in Greenville has Pro-Life posters installed in their area. I recently found out that Lamar Outdoor of Jackson is installing the KC billboard poster.

The Fetal Model program started off with a bang but has slowed down. To date 22 sets have been purchased and loaned or donated out to schools or Pro-Life organizations.

The Rally For Life that is held in Jackson each January to commemorate the infamous Roe vs. Wade decision was not held this past January. Don't know if there will be one this coming January to qualify for 500 points as one of the options.

The National Life Chain was held October 4th. We didn't get a follow-up report on participation in Mississippi by the councils but Brother Jim Glover and I supported it strongly. We are aware of 20 chains being held. Nearly a million persons participated nationwide and in Canada.

The Fourth Annual Knights of Columbus Respect Life All Denomination Collection Drive was held the last Saturday of October. Items were collected for crisis pregnancy centers in support of women with problem pregnancies, for substance abuse centers and for women and children abuse centers.

Operation Rescue did a rescue in Baton Rouge, July 1992. Many Mississippians were there. I, Antoine Otto, was there for a prayer rally and I participated in recitation of the Rosary at the abortion mill. I was in my first rescue in Houston, Texas, during the Republican Convention. I was in the line where the rescuers broke thru and 34 were arrested.

The Freedom of Choice Act (SZS & HZS) is being attacked heavily by Mississippians of all walks of life. Supreme has been sending out mailings on a regular basis with the Stop FOCA message. We must be making an impact. No sounds are coming from the Congress. The word is, if the pro-aborts are not sure FOCA will pass then they will not bring it up for discussion. Keep the KC national telegram hot-line, the telephone and the letters going to our legislators. Once is not enough.

Again we ask all of you to form Pro-Life committees in your parish. "Where two or more of you are assembled, I am with you."

NOW, therefore, be it resolved that the Missisippi State Council of the Knights of Columbus reimburse the Financial Secretary or his council the per diem and mileage for travel/training, that is placed on him because of his duties, that is in-place with the Mississippi State Council Constitution by-laws for his council incurred expense.

Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit ecumenical ministry which builds houses in partnership with the working poor. Each Habitat partner works 500 hours and makes a down payment of \$500-\$1,000. The partner also signs a long term agreement with Habitat for Humanity Inc.

Whereas:

Habitat for Humanity Inc. has 31 Habitat for Humanity affiliates and 10 groups in the process of being affiliated. Knights of Columbus members and Councils can get involved with local affiliates, help start an affiliate, or send work teams, money and material to another affiliate.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved:

The Mississippi State Council of the Knights of Columbus sponsor at no expense to itself Habitat for Humanity the sponsorship shall be in name only. This program will be voluntary only.

RESOLUTION NO. 11

The registration for the State Convention has been \$40 for at least 10 years and due to the rise in cost this is inadequate.

Our State Degree Team rates for fair compensation have varied from \$675.00 to \$375.00 Now Therefore Be It Resolved:

That the sponsoring council accept the responsibility for any meals or subsequent fee for its responsible candidate to ensure a fair distribution of monies during each respective degree lessening the burden of the host council

Let It Be Further Resolved:

That the meals during or after the degree proceeding for the visiting degree team be no burden to the team and payment of such be given by the host council.

The fourth business session was opened at 10:20 a.m. by State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski. The prayer was offered by State Chaplain Father Brian Carroll and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by State Master Norman Kiehm.

The State Deputy recognized the 75th birthday of Delegate Jerry Santuci and recognized the presence of the Honorable Melvin Ray.

State Deputy Stanley Swentkowski offered his thanks to all for their concern over his son's illness. He offered special thanks to Rick Noble, Greg Glover and his wife.

Bishop Joseph Howze, Bishop of Biloxi, addressed the delegates and offered his thanks for their support not only of the Priest's Education Fund but in all of the activities they do.

Supreme Representative Sam Dambroccia, Director of Ceremonials at Supreme addressed the delegates and offered his thanks for the hospitality shown to him and to his wife during the convention proceedings.

PRIEST EDUCATION REPORT

Since the last convention I have sent three letters to the councils, assemblies and auxiliaries. The reports I have received are mixed, some good and some not so good.

The opening of the casinos on the Coast has caused a large drop in attendance at bingo games, the main source of revenue for most of the councils. Some weathered the storm after a few months and recouped. Others were not so fortunate and had to cut down on the number of games and the amount paid. One council, one of our largest contributors, had to suspend play altogether.

The Fourth Degree Assemblies have contributed \$8,725; the Ladies Auxiliaries have donated a total \$1,600. The helping hands of the Fourth Degree and the Ladies Auxiliary are greatly appreciated.

The Greenville/Leland Assembly received the award for the largest donation of \$6,100. The Assembly also received the award for the largest donation per member with \$78 per member.

For this fraternal year the contributions for the Jackson Diocese is \$24,585, and for the Biloxi Diocese \$24,282, for a total of \$48,867. A grand total of \$736,347.

You are all to be congratulated, each council, each assembly, each auxiliary, for your outstanding efforts. This committee thanks you.

My personal thanks to Brothers John Szymonik and Jerry Santucci for their assistance throughout the year.

The shortage of priests has become critical. As members of the Knights of Columbus, "the right arm of the Church", we must exert every effort to ensure the future of the Church in America. The Priest's Education Fund should be the primary objective of every council.

After reviewing the bills and writing checks, it appears that the 1993 Convention will profit approximately \$2,500.
