#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE 92<sup>ND</sup> ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

First Business Session Friday, April 26, 1996

State Deputy Jesse J. Quinn, III called the Delegates to order at 6:06 p.m. He then called Convention Chairman and Grand Knight of Meridian Council #802 Bob Leo to the podium to introduce Councilman Richard Coleman of Ward 2 who welcomed the Delegates to Meridian. Councilman Coleman also serves as President of the City Council.

State Secretary Guy S. Todaro, Jr. gave the response on behalf of the State Council to Councilman Coleman's address.

The Council had a successful year including activities in all five areas of the Knights of Columbus Service Program. A summary of membership and highlights are noted below.

I am proud to mention that Council No. 2969 has done more activities this past year than any year previous. When I took office in July, I made a commitment to myself and my Brother Knights to do everything we could to raise money for various charities, organizations, etc. that would come to us this year. In the past, we relied heavily on Bingo for our charitable contributions; however, the economic situation has changed drastically with the introduction of the casinos. This forced us to look at other avenues to raise money. It is a wonderful feeling to develop and organize a fund raiser and watch it mature into an successful event.

We started this fraternal year with our annual Fourth of July Star Spangled Celebration at the KC Hall. Approximately two hundred members, parishioners and guests feasted on a hamburger plate lunch and relaxed around the pool. We raised \$250 for our charity fund. Our main goal was to help St. Elizabeth School raise money for their Building Renovation Fund. We succeeded to raise over \$2500 for the school.

We honored our deceased members at a Mass in November at the KC Hall. Members and parishioners attended in which our deceased members names were read by Jim Glover. Refreshments were served afterwards.

We held an Open House in November and in April for men within our parish who were interested in the Knights of Columbus. Our officers were present to answer questions. All Catholic men and their families were invited to attend.

Members of this Council were invited to membership suppers on the second meeting of every month. This gave them the opportunity to meet and socialize with the officers and witness first hand how much of a difference we were making in our parish and community.

We spent the entire week prior to this event cleaning the KC Hall and grounds. That weekend was an opportunity for the youth in our diocese to come together and share in our Catholic faith to Christ. This Council learned many things from the youth of this parish and showed us their faith in each other, their families and in the Lord.

Approximately two hundred people from various denominations participated in the annual Life Chain. The Knights of Columbus is the driving force behind this peaceful demonstration against abortion. The Knights of Columbus funds this activity and directs and organizes the participants along State St. holding signs, Rosaries or just standing in prayer. Our Pro-Life Chairmen Jim Glover and volunteers do an outstanding job in contacting and organizing the many churches throughout the area whose members participated in Christian unity against abortion. The Life Chair was praised by civic and church leaders as a peaceful and prayerful demonstration. Later on that day, our Pro Life Chairman held a question and answer session with the CYO and other Christian youth organizations at the KC Hall. He showed them a video on the importance of life to the group. We encourage all members of our community to take the time and stand united for this important cause.

This Council conducted its first extensive and organized Vocations Program in years. We started our Vocations Program in August with a communion breakfast in honor of our parish priest. We passed out prayer cards for vocations we ordered from Supreme. Father gave a brief talk about the priesthood and what it means to him. Proceeds from this breakfast went to the Priest Education Fund. In October, we sponsored a Vocations Program at our church Sunday School for students in grades seven through twelve. Father Bill Henry gave a talk and passed out literature on vocations and religious life. This Council is taking part in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP) in supporting Mr. Jerry Daniels from our Diocese who is studying for the Priesthood. We support a scholarship fund at St. Elizabeth School, organize and sponsor many fund raisers to raise money for the Priest Education Fund and sponsor a Religious Appreciation Breakfast. This Council used every resource we had at our disposal to promote and educate our parishioners and parish youth about Vocations.

I feel that we have accomplished much of what we set out to do and that we are continuing to meet and accomplish our goals. We have been extremely fortunate in having the tremendous support of our families and of our parish. We are especially blessed with the loving guidance and active support of our pastor and Brother Knight, Father Brian Carroll, who also is our chaplain. His help and spirit have been a welcome presence in our Council, and are truly appreciated.

This year has been very active and fast pace. My success as Grand Knight has been the hard work of Program Director Jim Ulmer, the committee chairmen and the workers who wanted to see this Council grow and be the best it could be. I thank all my Brother Knights, and their families for all of the support and dedication they have exhibited this past year.

#### District Deputy's Reports

#### District Deputy #1 Robert L. Hudson

Worthy State Deputy and all State Officers:

It has been both a pleasure and an honor to have had the opportunity to serve the Mississippi Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus as the District Deputy of District One since December 1, 1996. Reed Fontenot, the previous District Deputy was relocated by his employer in November to Kansas City and our Worthy State Deputy asked me to complete his term. I want to thank our Worthy State Deputy Jesse J. Quinn, III for asking me to serve as a District Deputy.

District One consists of the following Councils: 7120 - the Hernando Desoto Council in Southaven; 8760 - the St. Joseph Council in Holly Springs; 8848 - the Father Robert Reitmeier Council in Tupelo; 8912 - the St. James the Less Council in Corinth; and 10901 the St. John's Council in Oxford.

Since becoming a District Deputy I have had the opportunity to meet and interact with the Knights of the Councils in District One. Getting to know the Knights from other Councils has been a very beneficial part of being a District Deputy. Working closely with these outstanding men has been an opportunity that some Knights may never have.

As the mid-year transition District Deputy most of the wheels had been set in motion by Reed Fontenot. My job at that point in time was to follow through, complete the Fraternal Year and continue what Reed had started.

My first official duty as the new District Deputy was to attend the Mid-winter Meeting in early December in Brandon. That meeting recapped the first six months and set the tone for the rest of the year.

Those of us at that meeting were presented by our Worthy State Deputy with a membership challenge of 300 new members between January 1 and June 30. Each district was presented the challenge and each district accepted with their own commitment and District One pledged fifty new members. Through April 15th, District One has exemplified fifteen First Degree Knights and

currently has nine more candidates with Form 100's in hand for future First Degrees. The Councils in District One have assured me that we will meet our district goal of fifty new Knights before June 30th.

A District Meeting was held on January 21st in Oxford. At that time we reviewed the past six months, set our goals for the remainder of the year, and put in motion our membership recruitment plans.

As District Deputy I have actively campaigned and encouraged all the Councils in District One to recruit new members to the Knights of Columbus. Membership has been the focus of District One and a personal focus of mine. Each of the Councils will have added new Knights to their rosters before June 30th.

Two of the Councils in District One have done an outstanding job during the period of April 1995 - March 1996 at recruiting new members. Council 10901 in Oxford had a net gain of twenty-one and Council 8848 in Tupelo had a net gain of seventeen new members. Both of these Councils should be commended on their commitment to recruiting new Knights to the Order.

Council 10901 in Oxford has been successful in establishing a Round Table in Batesville. At the organization meeting nine Form 100's were signed, with four more added shortly thereafter. A First Degree exemplification has been scheduled for Sunday, May 5th in Batesville. The Oxford Council should be proud of this accomplishment. Additionally, Council 8848 in Tupelo has contacted the priest in New Albany and Pontotoc with a very good possibility of a Roundtable soon to be established there. A great job by these two very active Councils.

Three Councils in District One have First Degree Teams - Oxford, Tupelo and Southaven. Since January 1st I have attended six First Degree Exemplifications and nine more are planned through June 30th.

During the year District One attended Second and Third Degrees in Clarksdale, Oxford and Greenwood with over forty Knights participating. Additionally seven Knights also participated in the Fourth Degree in Greenwood. Council 10901 in Oxford currently has twelve Fourth Degree Knights and is planning on establishing its own Fourth Degree Assembly in the fall.

Council 8848 in Tupelo is in the process of establishing a Columbian Squires Circle. Their initial meeting had sixteen in attendance and should be finalizing their Circle in the near future. An exemplification of these young men should be accomplished before the end of the Fraternal Year.

Another Council in District One, Council 8912 in Corinth, had the highest donation per member. This Council has lead the state in this category for ten years. This is the smallest Council in the state with only thirty members. It only goes to show what a small Council can do when they make a commitment. My personal compliments are extended to Tupelo and Corinth.

Holly Springs Council 8760 had a successful Membership Drive in early April and two Form 100's were received with two more expected to follow very soon.. This is the largest gain in that Council in several years.

In closing I want to personally thank each Grand Knight, their Council Officers and members for their commitment to the Knights of Columbus. Their support and cooperation was the key to the success of District One this past year.

We gather as disciples of Christ, who in the spirit of our forefathers lead by Fr. Michael McGivney, pledge to continue to share our gifts and talents for the betterment of the order and of society.

Yes, it is with distinguished honor that I stand before such a body of men who have embraced Jesus' command to 'go out and proclaim that the Reign of God is at hand.' For truly, we are about giving God the glory and honor due him for working, moving and stirring within each of our lives and those lives around us.

Dennis Riecke and the urging of Council 9543 in Madison. It was there that I began to see a group of men striving to promote the principles of our Catholic Faith through many long and hard hours of trying to reach out to those in the parish and community. As a child holds on to their first memories of life to help form their future life, so too do I treasure those first memories of Brother Knights in Council 9543 defending the good of the

My journey as a Brother Knight has lead me to be called forth by our Worthy State Deputy, Br. Jesse Quinn, to be your Worthy State Chaplain. As Chaplain, I have been privileged to attend several state council gatherings and witnessed an enthusiasm about serving God and one another that goes unmatched. And, in talking with some of you and reading your monthly or bimonthly newsletters, I sense your commitment to service that you and many other Brother Knights have.

And too each of you, who in your own hearts know that you have tried to share God's love in word and action the best that you can, on behalf of our beloved order I salute you.

This is where I perceive that we have been and where we are. Now we must look at where we are going. Worthy Brother Knights, as your State Chaplain, I want to remind you of several principles and goals that we must untiringly hold before us in the next year. Our society, our communities and even our families are not encouraging individuals, including

our young people, to be priest and religious. You have it in your power through the resources available to you through prayer, programs and finances to aggressively encourage people to consider a religious vocation. It is my opinion if you don't, who will. I plead with you. I plead with you to aggressively start working on promoting vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Lastly, never forget the importance of holding up the value of life from the moment of conception until that moment we pass over into everlasting life. For, if we are to hold true to our Catholic Faith and principles set down by Fr. McGivney, then we can't help but cherish and work for promoting the value of life in both the young and old.

In conclusion, there have been many great things that have happened in the past year. Under the guidance of our Worthy State Deputy, no stone goes unturned and no person uncared for. However, to proclaim Christ present in our lives through the principles of our beloved Order brings us into contact with many differing peoples. Some will be as generous and give until it hurts and then a little more. Others, will not lay a finger to help out and will hold tight to what God has blessed them with. Then, you have everyone else in between these two poles. The quest for each of us is how do we use that which God has blessed us with as Brother Knights to help everyone know of God's love? My response is by "loving people one person at a time." And through following Christ and witnessing Christ's love through the basic precepts laid out by Fr. McGivney, each and everyone of us has no reason not to be impelled to spread Christ's love one person at a time.

We have come a long way and there are many rivers to cross and mountains still to climb. But, with the enthusiasm and energy in this room, together we should pledge ever more faithfully to hold up our Catholic Faith and to be there to help out those in need. We must be proud of what God has blessed us with and pray that God will ever more faithfully protect and care for us, as we strive to best serve his will through our beloved Order.

See, in the end it is not about numbers, figures or awards. Being a Brother Knight is about service; it's about being there; it's about loving; it's about encouraging; it's about living out our Catholic Faith; it's about me loving you and you loving me.

Let us take these few days together as a time to renew our spiritual life, our friendships and our goals so that we may better within the principles of our honored and beloved order, serve God and one another more faithfully.

#### State Deputy's Report Jesse J. Quinn, III

The Knights of Columbus is officially a Catholic, family, fraternal, service organization, but, Brothers, it has always been much, much, more than just an organization to me.

As I grew up, the men that I looked up to, my Father, Grandfather, Uncles, and friends, would all talk about the usual things. They talked about their work, fishing, hunting and sports, but when they talked about the Knights of Columbus, they sat a little straighter, and their eyes lit up with excitement as they talked about the wonderful and important things that they were-being able to accomplish through the Knights of Columbus. Even when I was very small, it was apparent that membership with the Order was something very special. It was an opportunity to unite with other Catholic men to successfully and dramatically do God's work here on earth.

When I was elected State Deputy of the Mississippi jurisdiction, I felt it most important to find true leaders to fill the positions of the State Council. In choosing leaders, I did not look for men who had the most tenure or who had held the most offices. I looked for men with fire in their eyes and a burning desire in their hearts to see our order grow and prosper as never before. With these men by my side, I knew that we, the Mississippi Knight of Columbus, could be successful, but I also knew that they too would need support, more support than I alone could give them.

For this support, I first turned to Bishop William Houck and Bishop Joseph Howze. Last year, at our state convention, we heard our Bishops reaffirm their support for the Knights of Columbus, and you gave them a standing ovation. Brothers, the words that they spoke that day were not merely words, it was a commitment to action. When I telephoned Bishop Houck to invite him to our state organizational meeting and to participate in the installation mass of state officers, his schedule did not have a free weekend. He could have easily said, "I just cannot make it. I am booked up." But, he did not say this. Instead, he rearranged his schedule so that he could be with us, even though it meant that he would have to leave Greenwood, Mississippi at night and travel five and one half hours by himself in order to keep an appointment the next day. Would you have done this? Bishop Houck did, because he cares about us and he believes in what we are doing.

At the beginning of the year, Bishop Howze, whom I consider a life-long friend and inspiration, meet with the State Officers and the District Deputies, whose districts cover the Biloxi Diocese. He expressed his support for our Order, but he too went a step further. Throughout the year, he has help open doors that were previously closed to us. He has assisted our leaders and given us opportunity after opportunity to expand the Order into new parishes. We are truly fortunate to have a great man like Bishop Joseph Lawson Howze as an honored member of the Mississippi jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus.

At the State Council Organizational Meeting, our leaders endorsed the idea that you, the local Councils do not exist to serve the Mississippi State Council, but that we are here to serve you. State Program Director Tom Chady, State Membership Director Dennis Riecke, and our State Council Program personnel developed an outstanding state program designed to promote the ideals and growth of the Order. They volunteered to travel to three locations across the State of Mississippi to bring the School of Columbianism to you, rather than asking you to travel to one location for their convenience. Over 200 Grand Knights, Council Officers and Chairman responded by attending one of these meetings.

Our state Council personnel, also wanted to include you, the Delegates of our local Councils, in State Council Award Winner Selection process. We believe that your input is important, and this afternoon, for the first time in Mississippi State Council history, 35 delegates will meet in five committee meetings to select the Mississippi State Council Knight of the Year, Family of the Year, and the winners of the five best activity awards.

While State Program Director Tom Chady will be recognizing the Councils that received awards last night, I would like to take time to recognize those Councils that received the Supreme Council's highest award, The Star Council Award, for their performance during the 1994-95 fraternal year. I would like to ask the Council Delegates of these Councils to rise, Council 898 Vicksburg; Council 1908 Hattiesburg; Council 6872 Picayune; Council 7910 Orange Grove; Council 7915 Brookhaven; and Council 10901 Oxford. These Councils did an outstanding job in promoting our Catholic ideals and Columbianism and certainly should be commended.

#### PRO-LIFE

Since the Supreme Court decision in the case of Roe vs. Wade, our society has developed the most permissive abortion laws in the developed world. According to the National Conference of Catholic Bishops, there are 1.6 million abortions performed in our country every year, and most

of these are performed strictly as a means of birth control.

I believe that this year several of our Councils have significantly heightened the awareness of their communities to the abortion crisis through the use of a dramatic display.

A little over a year ago, Brother Bradley Burden, the Grand Knight of my home Council in Greenwood, lead our Council in constructing a field of 4,400 crosses representing the number of abortions that occur in our country per day. This project was highly successful and received front page coverage in both the local newspaper and the Mississippi Today. In addition it received news coverage on the local television channels.

In January of this year, Council #7211 in Lumberton borrowed this most dramatic display and reconstructed it at their local Catholic Church. This display again had such a dramatic effect on those who saw it that it received front page coverage in the local paper in Poplarville and coverage in the Gulf Pine Catholic. In addition, television stations in Hattiesburg and Gulfport ran stories about the field of crosses and its significance.

Our Councils in Wiggins/Lucedale and Pass Christian have also requested an opportunity to use these crosses to impact their communities. I truly believe that each time this display is erected, lives are saved and attitudes are changed.

#### **COLUMBIAN SQUIRES**

This year, I have had the opportunity to become familiar with the Columbian Squires. This Knights of Columbus youth organization provides one of the most effective tools available in guiding our young men toward honest and upright lives.

Through the diligent and dedicated work of State Columbian Squire Director Jim Yaggi and State Youth Director Jim Lambert, this year the Columbian Squires were organized on a statewide basis, and for the first time in the history of the Mississippi jurisdiction, State Columbian Squire officers were elected and a State Columbian Squire Convention was held. We also had the privilege of welcoming a new Columbian Squire's Circle thanks to the dedicated work of District Deputy Curt Stasny and the members of the sponsoring Council 7211 in Lumberton.

If you council does not support a Columbian Squire Circle, you owe it to the Catholic Youth in your area to investigate the possibility of forming a Circle for your young men. Don't miss out on this wonderful opportunity to insure the future of the Catholic Church in your parish.

#### **CEREMONIALS**

One of the most important aspects of the Knights of Columbus is our Ceremonials, for it is through our Ceremonials that we teach the principles of our Order to our membership. Our Jurisdiction is blessed with many fine First Degree Teams, but I would like to especially recognize two teams that I had the privilege to watch this year. They are from Council #10901 Oxford and Council #898 Vicksburg. These teams are spectacular and certainly among the best in the Order.

Dealing with our two Second and Third Degree Teams from Council 1605 in Pascagoula and Council 5267 in Greenwood has truly been an uplifting experience. The cooperation and support these teams have accorded one another has allowed our jurisdiction to benefit from a number of Exemplifications that would not have otherwise been possible. In the past, Second and Third Degree Exemplifications scheduling and expenses have been major problems for our jurisdiction. I am very pleased to say that due to the combined efforts of both Degree Teams and

the Mississippi State Council, these problems have all but been eliminated.

For a period of approximately one and one half years ending in March of this year, none of the Fourth Degree Exemplifications held in Mississippi were performed by a Mississippi Fourth Degree team. We have two very fine fourth degree terms in our jurisdiction, one composed of members from several of our Coast assemblies and one composed of members from Greenville, Jackson and Vicksburg. It gives me great pleasure to report that with the help of the Degree Team Captains, with the cooperation of District Master John P. Myers and Vice Supreme Master Marvin Lott, and the assistance of Supreme Master Darrell Beck and Supreme Knight Virgil Dechant, we were able to work out the existing problems sufficiently enough to use a Mississippi Fourth Degree Team to perform an exemplification in Greenwood on March 16, 1996.

#### GOOD OF THE ORDER

As your State Deputy, I have had an opportunity to see the very best of the Knights of Columbus, but I have also become aware of some significant problems. My experiences have proven beyond a shadow of a doubt that the prosperity of our Order is directly tied to the image of our membership. People judge the Order, and to some extent the Catholic Church, by the way in which our members conduct themselves. This is an awesome responsibility for a Knight, but it is one that we must live up to.

Just before the beginning of this fraternal year, I received a copy of a letter from a Council officer addressed to the Supreme Knight, which accused two council members of various improprieties. This was followed with a series of letters which seemed to attack every Knights of Columbus authority that this individual had come to know, including a State Deputy, District Deputy, and the local Council Grand Knight. Later, as I assumed the office of State Deputy, this man assumed the position of Grand Knight, and the conflict began to escalate. Even though I had several conversations with this man about acceptable behavior, he and his cohorts refused to change tactics, and the unity and harmony of the local Council and parish began to be adversely effected. Eventually he went so far as to threaten the local priest by declaring that he would report the priest to the Bishop. As a result of his activity, the reputation of the Knights of Columbus suffered tremendously in this community. During this episode, one of his cohorts, who is a Past Grand Knight and former District Deputy, telephoned me and threatened to turn his own Council into the Bingo Commission and to have an eyewitness reporter available to capture the moment for a large television station.

Our Order's reputation is built on the character and deeds of many, many good Catholic men. This reputation is a very precious, yet fragile thing, and I can assure you that I will not allow it to be compromised, while I am you State Deputy. Charges were brought against this Grand Knight. He was found guilty, and he was removed from office. But, how do you think this priest feels about the Knights of Columbus? Do you think he will be overjoyed to learn that his next parish supports a Council, or will he be apprehensive about the disruption that might be caused in the parish? Remember his next parish could be your parish.

Contrast this episode with the story Father Anthony Quyet told his parishioners as an introduction for District Deputy Nat Zummo and I as we approached the parish in Forest to form a new roundtable.

Fr. Anthony told his congregation that he came to the United States from Vietnam with nothing—no material possessions, no family, no friends, nothing. But he did have a strong belief in God, and a desire to serve the Catholic Church. After being accepted into the Seminary, he was assigned to St. Patrick's Parish in Meridian. He told us that as he arrived in Meridian, he did not know if he would be accepted by the people of the parish, and didn't know

if he could even relate to them, but he said that immediately after the first mass that he attended, a man came up to him with a green and white form and said, "Sign this." Fr. Anthony said that he did not even know what he was signing, but he said as soon as he signed that form 100 the members of the Knights of Columbus in Meridian became his brothers, and their families became his family. They supported him financially, emotionally, and spiritually throughout his time in the Seminary. As he finished his introduction, he proudly proclaimed that not only was he a Knights of Columbus, but he was a Fourth Degree Member of the Knights of Columbus. A few weeks later, a First Degree Exemplification was held in the parish center, and we welcomed the men of Forest as members of our jurisdiction's third roundtable.

Brothers, remember that when we put on the mantle of the Knights of Columbus, we are graced with the sterling reputation of the Order. A reputation that was built by dedicated Catholic gentlemen that stood up for their ideals and beliefs, and worked hard to support the Church and their fellowman. Be proud of this reputation, defend it, and add to the legacy that is ours as members of this great Order.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Our approach to membership retention does not include a demand that you do not suspend members; rather, we do not want you to suspend any Brother Knight until every effort is made to save his membership. When a Council fills out a Notice of Intent to Suspend Form, the Council is essentially saying that it has done everything that it could possibly do to save a particular member without success. Notices have been sent. Personal contact has been made, but nothing has worked.

Each time that I have received a Notice of Intent to Suspend Form, I have contacted the District Deputy assigned to that Council, along with the State Membership Director Dennis Riecke, State Retention Chairman Jim Rigby, and the nearest state officers. These men have made personal contact with the members facing suspension and have established an outstanding record by saving 93 or 42% of the members whom we were told could not be saved. The Order to date has lost only 126 of the 219 members that were in danger of being suspended.

In almost every successful case the key factor in retaining a member was convincing that Catholic man that the Order cares for and sincerely needs him. In many cases, we found that the member in question had not been contacted personally, but had instead, received a bill from someone who appeared to place a higher value on the money to be gained than the member to be saved. In the future, we do not expect to receive a Notice to Suspend form on any member that has not been personally contacted by a local Council member.

I am aware of a number of Councils who really worked hard to retain their membership. I ask that their members stand as I recognize these most distinguished Councils; Council 8285 St. Therese retained 17 members and lost 3; Council 10499 Ocean Springs retained 15 members and lost none; Council 1605 Pascagoula saved 26 members and lost 5; Council 5267 Greenwood saved 9 members and lost none; Council 1583 Gulfport saved 11 of 25 members and Council 2134 Greenville saved a number of members.

At the State Organizational Meeting, State Membership Director Dennis Riecke outlined an aggressive membership campaign that was designed to get every member involved with membership recruitment. This was followed with three expertly run membership training sessions held at the Schools of Columbianism, and a commitment by our State Membership Director, State Officers and District Deputies to assist Councils in recruiting members at every opportunity.

These efforts have been highly successful, resulting in 11 Councils reaching their Supreme Membership quotas during the first nine months of the fraternal year. Council 5654 Ocean Springs is currently leading the way by exceeding its membership quota by 342%

Our District Deputies made a commitment at the beginning of the year to honor the dream of our founder, Fr. Michael J. McGivney, by working to bring the Knights of Columbus to those parishes that do not have a Council or Roundtable. In November, with the help of Fr. Patty Mockler, District Deputy Curt Stasny established our newest Council 11654 Wiggins/Lucedale. District Deputy Nat Zummo, working with Fr. Anthony Quyet and Fr. Jose Lopez established a Knights of Columbus Roundtable in Forest. District Deputy Bob Hudson currently has commitments from the required number of men to form a Roundtable in Batesville, and Grand Knight Aaron Achord and Roundtable Chairman Joe Bonfiglio also have the required commitments to form a Roundtable in Magee. District Deputy Lessie Ladner has conducted an Organizational Meeting for a new Council in Delisle and is anticipating its establishment in the near future. District Deputy Curt Stasny is also working with Fr. Tommy Conway to establish a Council in Columbia.

Since our last convention Council 1583 Gulfport has distinguished itself with its support of the new Council development activity in its area. This Council has supported Council 11541 in the finest traditions of the Knights of Columbus, and it has assisted our efforts in Columbia by supplying the manpower, equipment and food needed for a fish dinner to promote the establishment of a new Council. At this time, I would like to invite Grand Knight Terry Hurst of Council 1583 to come forward and make a presentation to Grand Knight Ed Croal of Council 11541.

Who are the best membership recruiters in the State of Mississippi? I have heard a lot of boasting from a lot of Knights! But, just who are they? Well, we are going to find out! The Mississippi State Council and the Mississippi Knights of Columbus Insurance Agency have joined hands to issue a challenge to all the Knights in the Mississippi jurisdiction. If you are one of the top ten recruiters in the State of Mississippi during the months of April, May and June, you will receive one of these beautiful jackets distinguishing you as a member of the 1996 Top Ten Proposer Club. Will John Ward be wearing one of these jackets? How about Tom Chady, or Dennis Riecke, or John Maloney, or Bob Hudson? Or how abut you? The race is on, and later Dennis Riecke will explain the details of this exciting new program.

My ardent desire for the future of our Order is to see the Knights of Columbus become the premier organization of Christian men in Mississippi. An organization that all the people of the Catholic Church in our state will look up to with boastful pride. These aspirations are attainable, but to reach them, we must value every member as a brother, and we must live by the principles that we endorse.

Your Excellencies, Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy Supreme Director, Worthy State Deputy, my fellow State Officers, Worthy District Deputies, Worthy Vice Supreme Master, Worthy Grand Knights, Delegates and Brothers:

At the 1995 Convention, I ran an unsuccessful campaign for this office. The vote was close, but I accepted the will of this body with dignity and as a gentleman. I said then, and I say now, that when one puts their best foot forward in offering themselves for service, there is disappointment in losing but not shame. Win or lose, my heart is with this order and the relationships I have gained with many of you will last me for my lifetime. I could ask for no greater reward. Then, due to circumstances beyond my control, this office was not taken, and through the diligent efforts of each District Deputy, the Grand Knights of each council were contacted and their will was to offer me the job. I would have taken it the first time, but the second time around is just as sweet. At the Schools of Columbianism, and at the Mid Winter meeting I publicly thanked the District Deputies and Grand Knights for their rapid response to an unfortunate situation. Those efforts to quickly fill this office reaffirm your understanding of its importance to the day to day stability of the order. I am deeply humbled by your vote of confidence in me, and by my conduct, you will always know that at every step I hold your interests and the financial well being of this order far above any interests of my own.

The Report you have before you is a summary of our financial activity since April 1, of 1.995 and through March 31 of this year. It is self explanatory and lists our sources of income, our expenses, and year-end balance. At the beginning of my term, the State Deputy put forward some simple ground rules that would help us manage our expenses and provide efficient services to our members. These rules were explained to the membership at each School of Columbianism. Among them were: all expenses for travel must be pre-approved by the State Deputy. When visiting councils on State business, all meals would be reimbursed at a fixed maximum amount, i.e. \$4.00 for breakfast, \$6.00 for lunch, and \$10.00 for dinner. All requests for reimbursement and all official invoices for supplies or services must be reviewed and signed by the State Deputy. I review all signed requests, make changes if I detect an error, write and sign checks, and then send

these back to the State Deputy for his final review and counter-signature. He then mails the check to the proper recipient. The effect of this careful process is to pursue a wise and prudent course. It protects from inadvertent overpayments or duplicate payments. I write and sign checks in Tupelo. The State Deputy reviews and signs checks in Greenwood. Neither he nor I have countersigned checks in our possession. Each and every expense must follow this procedure. I would like to note that I selected a statewide banking system for our State account. This will allow for optimum continuity when I leave this office. The process of starting and stopping bank accounts from one Treasurer's home town to another is disruptive and cumbersome. Any Treasurer can now conduct our business from the location in which he resides without disruption of services or loss of interest revenue. On my report please focus your attention on the Net Income to Expenses. We finished the year with a positive \$6200. I want to point out that we achieved this with proper management, but more importantly without the need for a State Raffle. In the past, the raffle brought in over \$6000. We discontinued that raffle, provided a full year of services to our members, and yet have a surplus. And now, I would like to draw your attention to a matter of which I am very concerned. As I prepared my records for the State Audit Committee and gathered together all my bank statements, all my receipts and put them together with all past State Treasurer Jesse Quinn's records and receipts for open review by the Audit Committee, a dark truth settled upon me. What I am about to say effects each and every one of you assembled here today. What I am about to say is not about me or my views; it is about the well being of this order.

Look at this box. Inside are all the records I just talked about. This is All the records I have. There are no canceled checks, bank statements, receipts or any other documentation of any kind from June of 1993 back. This situation is serious. Two years ago this body passed a resolution that demanded that financial records from the previous five years be handed to the incoming Treasurer. Regardless of personal conflicts, those records which protect the integrity and solvency of this Order, must be turned over for continuity and safe keeping. Again, just last year, in the 1995 Convention Minutes Book, in the report of the State Audit Committee it was stated in paragraph four, and I quote, "except for those of the current State Treasurer, financial records for the five years prior to July 1, 1994, were not in a location that was readily accessible to the audit committee, State Treasurer, or other interested parties. We recommend the State Deputy maintain these financial records. This problem was reported by the audit committee at last year's convention." End quote. In that paragraph, I translate that the "other interested parties" referred to are the IRS.

Have any of you ever been audited? Even with complete records, anyone would be nervous. If the IRS wanted to audit us today, it would not be for the current year. At the very least it would be for 1994 and we must have available records for at least the prior three years. As I reflected on the past year I could not count the many hours of effort I have put into the integrity of maintaining this office. It disturbs me greatly, and it should disturb you greatly, that no matter how meticulous my records are or the immediate past State Treasurer's records are, the fact remains, that because of the inaction of one or more men who are required to do what is honorable and right, the records have not come forward. It is imperative that we have those records. Until they do, each one of us is at risk. I have asked for the records. The State Deputy has asked for the records. The State Audit committee for two years in a row have asked for the records. Two years ago, this body of assembled delegates, with great concern, demanded these records. And yet, nothing. It is my personal responsibility to maintain current records. I have no interest in the past records beyond simply maintaining them per the express will of this Order. That is my duty as State Treasurer. And it is my duty to make sure that you are aware of the gravity of the situation at hand. If any one of you can help us to retrieve these records, please do so immediately.

Lastly, with all the challenges of the past year, it has been the honor of my life to serve you and to live the KC life with you. Each of us lives happier because of the love we share with the Lord, with our Church, our families and with each other as true Brothers. I look forward with great anticipation to living new experiences with you as we move forward into the new fraternal year.

God Bless you all. Thank you.

# State Vocations Chairman's Report

A report on the State of Vocations Programs for the Mississippi Jurisdiction.

I have received reports from several Councils throughout the state that are very encouraging. I will not report on each Council, but will summarize the total responses. Let me add that although I did not receive reports per se from many Councils, I did learn from the newsletters that were sent to me that many Vocations Programs were held this past year.

Councils held programs as part of the Sunday School class during which information that was obtained from the Diocese concerning vocations was distributed to the appropriate age groups. One Council had Fr. Henry speak to the students and the parents as well and had a good question and answer period. Following this, Fr. Henry spoke at mass on his vocation and on the priesthood.

Some Councils had Fr. Henry come and speak at their meetings on the importance of vocations. One Council sponsors quarterly masses for vocations. They supported a retreat for vocations and one provided meal service at one such retreat. A breakfast honoring the parish priest was held during which vocation prayer cards were passed out. This priest then gave a talk on the Priesthood.

Some Councils are taking part in the RSVP supporting a Seminarian and getting the community involved by sending cards and letters and packages. Of course many are donating to the Priest Education Fund.

A great many Councils pray the rosary or say a prayer for vocations at their meetings.

As we do our best to promote vocations, let us not forget that a vocation or call-to-serve also includes the religious life and we must include our girls in these programs and the young men who may be called to serve as brothers. We must also pray for those who have a vocation to the Diaconate. For those who are serving in the Diocese of Biloxi and that one day this program may be implemented in the Diocese of Jackson. At the beginning of this fraternal year I asked that a rosary be prayed before masses on the fourth weekend of each month and this is being done in many parishes and in some on every Sunday.

Let these examples of what is being done perhaps inspire you to adopt some of them and make them a part of your program. On a whole, our vocations programs are doing well. If you do not have a Vocations Committee, appoint one.

In all of our activity let us not forget that the greatest influence on a young person begins in the home. Talk to your children about the religious life and pray with them and for them.

Thanks to all who responded by sending me reports and thanks to all for your work this year.

Jesus told his disciples to pray always and this is what we must do. The harvest is great and the laborers are few. Let the favor of the Lord be upon us. Bless the work of our hands.

# State Columbian Squires Report

From 1989 to 1995, the Squires in our state have taken a big step in membership recruitment and Circle development. At the end of the 19941995 fraternal year, Mississippi ranked #1 in highest per cent gain in Circle development and #1 in highest per cent gain in membership worldwide. Now, in the 1995-1996 fraternal year, we are still ranked at the top of our division #6 with total members gained and per cent gained and we haven't fallen from that position not once during the fraternal year.

We have had some great service work performed by our Squires. They have been active in helping the elderly at nursing homes, hospitals, and helping those that are shut-ins. Their participation in church activities has soared to its highest level ever. When a young man becomes a Squire he is asked by his new brother Squires to perform certain duties. One of these being to become an alter server so that he may better serve our lord at mass and in his everyday life. In membership for the past 5 years, the Squires have grown in leaps and bounds. In their activities within their communities, the Squires have exemplified the actions of the young Catholic gentlemen that they truly are. They have not only become a Squire, but are also the leaders in their schools, their fraternities, and in sports as well.

During the fraternal year 1992-1993 and again in 1994-1995, Laurel Circle 3768 was the recipient of the Brother Barnabas Award. Their projects of tornado clean-up and renovation of the second oldest Catholic Church in Mississippi for its 150th anniversary at Paulding, gained them the only Brother Barnabas Awards ever to be presented in our state. For the fraternal years from 1992 through 1995, Ocean Springs Circle 2852 won it's third in a row Corp de Elite Award, with Laurel Circle 3768 and Gulfport Circle 3091 also winning Corp de Elite Awards once each over the past 6 years.

Currently there are 7 Squire Circles in Mississippi, they are as follows, Ocean Springs Circle 2852, Gulfport Circle 3091, Laurel Circle 3768, Lizana Circle 3872, Picayune Circle 4234, Kiln Circle 4251, and Lumberton-Poplarville Circle. Thanks to the hard work and planning of the Worthy Grand Knight, Mr. Wilson John, and the Worthy District Deputy Curt Stasny, the reality of having a Squire Circle sponsored by the Lumberton-Poplarville Council took place on March 3,1996. Eleven young men said yes to the call on becoming a Squire. There are several Knights of Columbus Councils that are currently considering sponsorship of a Squire Circle in their area. A challenge has been sent out to all Councils in our state to sponsor a Squire Circle. The greatest activity a Council can participate in is the sponsorship of a Columbian Squire Circle. There is no better way to share our love for God, our Brother Knights, our families, and community, than to share it with the young Catholic gentlemen known as the Columbian Squires of Mississippi.

On January 27,1996, our state Squire officers traveled to Ocean Springs for their first meeting of the year. Many goals were set for this year and plans are in the making for the state softball tournament and for state convention, both which will be sponsored by the Picayune Circle 4234. A sincere thanks goes out to those young men in the Picayune Circle and to their counselors for the

fine work they are performing. They are truly a Circle that lives up to their motto of "esto dignus".

The first State Squires Convention was held this past fraternal year and was hosted by the Laurel Circle 3768 and the Laurel Council 2180. Squires from all over the state came to meet one another and join in the planning of the future of the Squires in our state for years to come. At the convention, new state officers were elected, a Squire of the Year for the state was selected by the membership present, and a Squire Counselor of the Year was selected. After their meeting, they enjoyed a great meal prepared by the Knights of the Laurel Council. Then the Squires took their place on the playing field. There was a football game in the park, a basketball game at the parish hall, and a voiley ball game in the parking lot. Around 5:00 p.m., they all gathered at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church to give thanks to our Lord for a beautiful and productive day that they all spent together. Each Squire Circle and newly elected state officers were recognized by our Council Chaplain Father Ken Ramon-Landry, for their outstanding work performed over the past year, and he blessed them that they may continue to perform their duties for many years to come. After mass was celebrated, they all returned to the parish hall where they said their farewells to one another, only until they meet again on the playing field at Picayune.

Since 1989 the Squires have been growing at a rate that can credited to many things. The state officers of the Knights of Columbus for their continued support and prayers, to the Councils who have worked hard in sponsoring their Squire Circles on a local level, and to one man who is known state wide as Mr. Squire, our state Squires Chairman, Mr. Charlie Underwood. Without any of the above supporters, the Squires in our state would not have survived. But with the hard work and efforts focused as one, our Squires have became the best at what ever they have done. May God bless the Squires organization and all those who contribute to them.

# State Mental Retardation Report

All District Deputies, Grand Knights and Council Members:

The Knights of Columbus in Mississippi have had another successful Tootsie Roll Drive for the Mentally Retarded in Mississippi. This money will be distributed to over 78,000 mentally retarded persons in Mississippi.

We want to thank each and every Knight, their families, the friends of the Knights of Columbus and the Mississippi Association for Retarded Citizens for all their hard work in helping others who cannot help themselves. We set a goal of \$102,200 for 1995. We did not achieve this goal, but we collected a net of \$81,899.95 even though 11 (approximately one fourth) of our Councils failed to turn in a report for 1995. When these reports are turned in the proceeds will be added to the 1996 Program.

The Mississippi State Council Officers and named Past State Deputies will again act as the Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi, Inc. I have asked the District Deputies to act as District Chairmen for the 1996 Program.

District Deputies will present this program to the Grand Knights at their District Meetings in January. Grand Knights are asked to present the program to the membership at a Council meeting prior to the Drive.

Grand Knights should appoint a Local Council Chairman and send his name and address to Dave Atteberry. We ask your serious consideration in selecting a Local Chairman and give him your full support and aid him in selecting his Committee Chairmen.

We have set a Net Income Goal of \$124,800 for the State of Mississippi in 1996. We should achieve this goal, if we maintain our enthusiasm and devotion to this program. We hope that each and everyone of you will visit your local Mentally Retarded Association and see how your contribution has helped that organization. If you need any stimulation in this program, that visit will be all that you will need. Not every Council participated last year. We hope that every Council will participate this year.

The State Deputy presents a trophy to the Council that collects the largest net income per member. The Corinth Council won the 1995 trophy with a net income per member of \$152.70. The State Deputy will present the highest gross income per Council Trophy to the Tupelo Council again for 1995. They collected a gross income of \$19,742.57. We all want to congratulate these fine Councils for their extraordinary work for the Mentally Retarded in Mississippi.

The proceeds of this drive will be sent to us and we will deposit your proceeds in an account for the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi, Inc. The co-signers of this account will be the State Deputy and the State Mentally Retardation Chairman. When you send your Council Disbursement Fund Request Form to us with your Federal Tax Exempt letter, we will return your funds in September 1996. Remember ALL funds must be disbursed prior to November 1, 1996 to be included in the 1996 Fund Drive Report.

This year we ask you to use the week of May 13th through May 19th to collect for this Drive. The first part or the week is for business donations and Friday the 17th and Saturday the 18th for citywide Drive. Our insurance for workers collecting for this Drive will only be in effect on Friday May 17th and Saturday May 18th.

Twenty-five percent (25%) of the net will be for the State Council's, retarded program and seventy-five (75%) of the net for local Council's retarded programs. The money raised must be spent to aid in the area of mental retardation and only that area.

Remember, with every two cases of Tootsie Rolls, you receive one cap and one canister bank free. Additional caps and canisters may be ordered at a nominal cost, but don't wait until the last minute. If aprons are needed, they can be ordered from Developmental Services Center, 1304 West Bradley Avenue, Champaign, Illinois 61821. The cost of the aprons are \$5 each plus a \$2.50 handling charge per order.

All moneys less the cost of Tootsie Rolls and aprons should be forwarded to State Chairman Dave Atteberry immediately on completion of the Drive. Billing for Tootsie Rolls and aprons will be to the ordering Council and they should be paid for at that level with moneys withheld from the total receipts for that purpose only—no other moneys can be expended. Strict control by Councils should be exercised in all areas of this program. Tootsie Roll orders of 50 cases or more will be sent freight prepaid—smaller Councils can consolidate their orders through their District Deputy and take advantage of prepaid freight. THE DISTRICT DEPUTY WILL ORDER FOR ALL COUNCILS IN HIS DISTRICT.

A program outline, along with a set of guidelines and sample proclamation, are enclosed for your convenience to promote the Drive. As soon as the project is completed, send all moneys to State

Chairman Dave Atteberry with report forms as indicated.

If you have any questions or difficulties, please contact us. We would appreciate it if you would invite one of us to your Council to help explain this program.

# State Program Director's Report

The State Program's area underwent some significant changes this year. To become more visible and to encourage greater participation, we split the School of Columbianism into three regions hosting regional schools rather than one statewide event. We added additional special projects to each category and broadened some of the other regional some of the other regional activities in order to bolster more regional involvement.

We added a new award category; the Council of Excellence to reward councils completing more activities while achieving a positive net growth. In the inaugural year, one-fourth of the state's 48 councils attained this new level. We also added second and third place certificates in the Supreme Award areas.

Another significant change was the incorporation of delegates in the judging of all major award categories. Finally, we added a "Knight of the Year" to the State Awards Program.

We exchanged ideas about ongoing and planned projects that the various councils in our jurisdiction are performing in their communities. The interchange of ideas was excellent and very beneficial to all participants. Our next goal is to develop a homepage for the State Council and to encourage other Mississippi councils to go on-line, which will facilitate sharing of ideas.

# State Membership Director's Report

This report details my efforts as state membership director for the period of July 1995 - March 1996. For additional information on membership recruitment activities and awards please refer to the Membership Committee report in this edition of the Convention Minute book.

#### TRAINING AT SCHOOLS OF COLUMBIANISM

At the schools of Columbianism in Greenwood, Madison and Biloxi, Grand Knights and council membership directors were treated as prospective members and invited to an open house or informational night associated with a wine and cheese social. Each of them was given the engraved invitation that can be ordered from the Supreme Supply department and an invitational letter announcing the wine and cheese social. Members were then let into the social where they socialized for a period. Wine, cheese and snacks were available and all watched the video entitled "Membership Recruitment Flip Chart". After the video I spoke on what types of activities the council was conducting and what membership in the Knights of Columbus means to me. A table was arranged with councils scrapbooks, Columbia magazines, literature, council awards etc.

The sole purpose of these events were to show members how to conduct such a social. My experience has been that if you send out a large number of invitations to prospects and follow these up with reminder phone calls, this level of personal contact results in an excellent attendance. Once the prospects attend this type of function about 75% of them elect to join our Order.

Grand Knights and council membership directors were provided a handout that detailed every step and time frames necessary in order to conduct a successful information night or open house.

Other materials provided were recruitment brochures and a recruitment supplies order form from Supreme, details of the "Quick Start" membership incentive program and state quota requirements.

# MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT HANDBOOK

I spent one week developing a membership recruitment and retention handbook that consisted of 11 topics detailed in 21 pages. My intent was to summarize all I knew about these topics and provide it to each council and district deputy so that they could benefit from my experience and study the techniques throughout the year. Hopefully this handbook will remain in the councils and be passed on each year to the new membership director to guide him in this office. Topic in the handbook are:

- 1. Who's in charge of recruitment and characteristics of a good council membership director
- 2. Advertising and Public Relations
- 3. Comments from Mississippi's Top Proposers
- 4. Developing a Prospect List
- 5. Phone Contact Skills
- 6. Can You Send Me Some Information?
- 7. Very Important Proposer Club Program
- 8. Other Recruitment Incentives
- 9. How to Retain Members
- 10. Transfers, Withdrawals, and Suspensions
- 11. Statewide Membership Goals

These handbooks were provided to each District Deputy and council membership director or grand knight either at the School of Columbianism or shortly thereafter.

# PLANNED MEMBERSHIP DRIVES WERE REQUESTED OF ALL COUNCILS

Early in the year at the Schools of Columbianism and by letters afterwards each council was encouraged to plan an organized membership drive by providing a date for such activity to the State Membership Director.

At least 22 councils held one or more planned membership drives.

# **MAGNOLIA KNIGHT ARTICLES**

To stress the importance of recruitment, provide status reports and success stories and recognize achievements the following articles were written for the August, October, December 1995 and February 1996 <u>MAGNOLIA KNIGHT</u> issues:

New Council Development Progress, State Membership Standings, "Quick Start" results, Top Proposers of the Month Awards, Membership Drive Updates, Mississippi VIP Club members, Retention Advice, Degree Announcements, Developing Prospect Lists, and "In Solidarity with Our Priests and with Bishop Daily" membership campaigns.

#### DISTRICT AND STATEWIDE MEETINGS

At the mid-winter statewide meeting and district deputies meetings I talked about the new membership recruitment campaign, reviewed successful and unsuccessful recruitment techniques, discussed retention, provided membership updates, discussed future recruitment strategies, and reviewed individual council standings.

At these meetings the following was provided to all councils:

recruitment posters and flyers, proper billing procedures, Knight Alert letter, Notice of Intent to Suspend Form, copy of each councils recent Grand Knights report, Church Drive handout, Retention handout and membership incentive handouts.

I was the warden for 8 First Degree Exemplifications, attended 5 district meetings, 18 church drives, 3 organizational meetings and 1 open house.

I spent 554 hours performing all these activities from June 1995 to March 1996 which averages out to 55 hours per month.

# COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP AWARD WINNERS

In the small council category - council 10901 (Oxford) recruited 21 members and also had the highest net percent gain of 42.9%.

In the medium council category - council 11541 (Gulfport-St. James) was the winner with 33 members and also ad the highest net percent gain of 50%.

In the large council category - council 5654 (Ocean Springs) recruited 20 members and 8848 (Tupelo) had the highest net gain with 13.9%.

In the extra large council category - council 898 (Vicksburg) had the highest gain with 17 and the highest net gain with 6.5%.

Arranging for financial relief in some cases helped, being persistent in speaking to some made the difference, but in almost every successful case the one factor that SAVED more suspensions was when the member BELIEVED that the organization cares for and sincerely needs him.

The creative and helpful writings of Dennis Riecke, our State Membership Director along with the true support of all of our leaders from the State Deputy up to the Grand Knights, Financial Secretaries, Program Directors and Sponsors all contributed to a new perspective of Retention that can not be measured. The vast majority of our 5000+ members were ACTIVELY retained. We must be doing something right. This coming year, we need to have more personal contact with our members and get their ideas and help—not only their money. If each member was made to feel as special all year long as he was when he took his 1st Degree and his 3rd Degree, our State would have the lowest suspension rate of any state in this organization, regardless of category.

I would like to thank the Worthy State Deputy, State Membership Director, and State General Agent for allowing me this opportunity to help serve the State.

# State Roundtable Chairman's Report

During the year, a Roundtable was organized under the supervision of Brother Nat Zummo, District Deputy of District No. 5. I was advised by him that a Roundtable would be formed in his district, and that I was invited to attend for obvious reasons, but owing to a viral infection I had to ask to be excused but added that if I was needed to finalize the procedure I would go as soon as I could travel. All was accomplished successfully and a Roundtable was installed in the Forest, Miss. area with some members from nearby missions. Brother Zummo is to be commended for his leadership and dedication.

Prior to the efforts mentioned above, I was informed that a possibility for a Roundtable existed in Magee, Miss, where Fr. Bob Goodyear is pastor. That had as its beginning during the late summer of 1994. At that time I was co-chairman of New Council Development. I was finally able to contact Fr. Goodyear and asked him to have a group of us go to Magee to see if it were possible to have a Council. After some further contacts and trying to set a date which would be convenient for everyone concerned, a group of us headed by then State Deputy Thomas Zettler and officers and members of Brookhaven, Miss. Council 7915 met with Fr. Goodyear and a few eligible man of his parish to see if a Council could be formed. Since he did not have 30 eligible Catholic men it was decided to form a. Roundtable until such time that the required number of man could be recruited, In the interim I was replaced by someone else as New Council Development, and asked

to be Chairman of Roundtable by the incoming State Deputy Jesse Quinn. III.

After further contacts with Fr. Goodyear, pastor of St. Stephens Church in Magee, Miss., it was decided to go to Magee and to have a meeting with the eligible men the names of which were supplied our Grand Knight by Fr. Goodyear. This being accomplished the men were contacted by phone and they agreed to be at the meeting scheduled. Grand Knight Aaron Achord and Wade Ditcharo, Head Services Chairman, met with State Membership Chairman, Dennis K. Riecke and together were successful in signing up 13 men. Unfortunately, I, the undersigned Roundtable Chairman was unable to make the trip due to illness.

The plan as prepared by G.K. Achord, was to take the Brookhaven First Degree team to Magee on Saturday, April 13, initiate them there and the following day to take them to Vicksburg, Miss. for the 2nd and 3rd Degrees, but due to an impending death in the Grand Knight's family, which actually took place during the weekend of April 7th. Having known this was going to happen Grand Knight Achord called Fr. Goodyear and set the data for the initiation for April 19th. Therefore, on April 19th the First Degree team from Council 7915 went to Magee and initiated seven candidates (including Fr. Goodyear), and 2 from the Brookhaven Council, for a total of nine. Our District Deputy Warren Doiron was unable to be present. There are five applications from Magee of men who could not be present at the exemplification since many of the candidates either work "off-shore" or commute from nearby areas including Jackson, Miss. We will have to keep in touch with Magee to see when its best feasible to get the men initiated. We are expecting a total of 19. Once the Magee area is completed we will then concentrate on what men are eligible in Raleigh, Miss., where Fr. Goodyear visits weekly at that Mission.

Magee can be regarded as having a Roundtable for all practical purposes despite the fact that only 7 were initiated. The enthusiasm is there and Fr. Goodyear is most cooperative and is looking forward to having a Council. With the continual arrival of families particularly Jackson, Miss., there is great expectation that this will occur.

I know this report could have been much less detailed and I could have done that quite easily. My reason for not doing so was premeditated on the fact that anyone who tries to form a Council or Roundtable will find that the procedure, even though it might appear routine, is far from it. One has to be patient and take his time. To appear to be overly aggressive is counterproductive for not every parish priest is as cooperative and enthusiastic as Fr. Bob Goodyear. Of course there many other cooperative parish priests, to be sure, but since I have been working hand in hand with Fr. Bob I could easily be spoiled. And I was!

Lastly I wish to close by thanking our State Deputy Jesse Quinn, III for affording me the opportunity to serve as Roundtable Chairman. This year's activity has been productive, to a great extent, but much more can be done. With determination many goals can be achieved. VIVAT JESUS

# State Public Relations Chairman's Report

The 1995/1996 Fraternal Year was a year of fast-paced action and movement in the Mississippi Jurisdiction. As Editor of the Magnolia Knight (State Newsletter), it was my responsibility to follow the events of importance in the state and report them to the membership. As Public Relations Chairman it was my responsibility to communicate to the membership and to the public the expose of action and good deeds achieved by the Knights of Columbus. If I were grading my own results, I would give myself a B for effort and a C- for content as Editor and a solid F as Public Relations Chairman.

Because of my (self-owned) business, I was kept away from many events occurring in Mississippi this past year. Though part of my responsibility is to communicate and coordinate information, I was further limited in my ability by ongoing business trips to gather as much information as should have been reported on to the membership. Recognizing now, from experience, some of the areas I am lacking in I should be better able to represent the State Council and the membership in the coming year.

I look to the State leadership to assist me in getting the word out to the State with regard to providing more information from the districts, Councils, Columbian Squires, and auxiliaries. I will accept information in almost any format. If I can get the "facts", I can add the "the's", the "and's" etc. I can put the sentences together if need be. I still will accept information on napkins when I can get it.

We saw five issues of the Magnolia Knight published in the 1995/1996 Fraternal Year. I have attached copies of those issues to this writing to become part of the historical records of the jurisdiction. The state newsletter is a bimonthly publication and is scheduled for publication the 15th day of even numbered months (April, June, August, October, December, and February). Information for publication should be detailed and provided to the Editor by the last day of the month preceding publication. Each issue contains from eight to twelve pages of articles and pictures. Some of the recurring columns in the newsletter are articles of "around the state" (what's happening on the Council levels), a bi-monthly calendar of events coming up, membership updates and notes, fraternal service announcements, and insurance advertising and updates.

The cost of each issue to be published varies with number of pages, number of pictures, additional inserts, etc. The basic issue of 12 pages costs about \$320 (pre-tax and before the cost of inserts, pictures, etc.) to publish and about \$60 to mail out approximately 500 issues. The current mailing list includes the Supreme Council, State Officers, State Chaplains, Program Consultant, Past State Deputies, District Deputies, State Directors and Chairmen, the Priests in Mississippi, Grand Knights, Financial Secretaries, Supreme Master, Vice Supreme Master, Former Vice Supreme Master, District Master, Former Masters, Faithful Navigators, Faithful Comptrollers, Ladies Auxiliary State Officers and Chairmen, Ladies Auxiliary District Regents, Ladies Auxiliary Presidents and Secretaries, Columbian Squires Chief Counselors, Insurance Agents, two copies to the council address, and the Editors for Columbia Magazine and Mississippi Today.

I hope within the coming year to reduce the cost of the average issue by using the "Photo Plus" software package to place pictures in the issues just as I currently do for clip art. I will continue to look for avenues to ignite the interest of the Knights in Mississippi so that the "readership" of past and future events goes up. I continue to be open to comments, suggestions, and solutions to better represent my fellow Knights and their needs.

#### State Pro-Life Director's Report

Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains forever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end. God alone is the Lord of Life from its beginning to its end: no one can, under any circumstance, claim for himself the right directly to destroy an innocent human life.

The Knights of Columbus have had a long history of advocating for the rights of the unborn. The 4,400 traveling crosses from the Greenwood Council; the numerous memorials and monuments to the unborn innocents; the candlelight vigils; the telephone networks all testify to this.

However, our efforts in this area are far from over as can be seen by the veto by President Clinton of H. R. 1833 (The Partial Birth Abortion Ban Act). We can only hope that this veto will be overridden. More letter writing, telephoning, telegraphing and faxing is in order.

Pro-Life involves more than just concern for the unborn. It involves life in all its stages, in all its ages. We need to be equally concerned with the "Dr. Kavorkians" who are sponsoring the "aid in dying" legislation which in effect is advocating physically assisted suicide. Direct euthanasia consisting in putting an end to the lives of handicapped, sick or dying persons is socially unacceptable and must be vigorously opposed.

Statistics show that only about one percent of women facing an untimely pregnancy choose adoption; sixty percent have abortions, and the remainder choose to raise the children themselves, often as single parents.

Since adoption is good in itself, support for the young woman who is not ready or able to take on the task of parenting must be provided. In addition, the child benefits by being received into a family that is ready and willing to parent fully and lovingly. We must lend support to the various programs that exist such as the Adoption Option Open and also press for legislation that would make adoption an easier task.

For those wishing to stay abreast of the legal issues concerning Pro Life I suggest that you affiliate yourselves with the National Committee for a Human Life Amendment, Inc., 1511 K Street, N.W., Suite 335, Washington, D.C. 20005. Beth Luteran visited many parishes this past fall, urging the formation of Phone Trees, so that the populace could be apprised of the issues coming out of Washington. I urge the Knights to be the nucleus of these phone trees across Mississippi.

Another organization that very much deserves our support is Birthright of Jackson Inc. It is staffed by volunteers, run entirely on private donations and serves the three state area of Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama.

Birthright of Jackson Inc. needs our financial support, our support through collecting infant items, our support through volunteer man hours, our support through prayers.

# 1. MEMBERSHIP RECRUITMENT

# TRAINING PROVIDED:

At the Schools of Columbianism, the Grand Knights and Council Membership Chairman were are the schools of Coulombianism, the Grand Knights and Council Membership Chairman were treated like prospective members and invited to an open house wine and cheese social. We socialized, showed Supreme's Membership Recruitment Flip Chart video, and discussed the planning steps required to conduct such an event. Through letters and at these schools the State Deputy and I repeatedly urged each council to conduct an organized membership drive and plan membership recruitment activities.

# 2. ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO COUNCILS

I attended 18 church drives at 18 parishes. Ten involved existing councils and eight involved new councils or roundtables. The State Deputy and I gave short speeches on the history and activities of the Knights of Columbus at masses and handed out information after the masses and encouraged men to join our Order. I also attended 5 district meetings, 1 open house and 3 organizational meetings.

For the June - March, 1996 period I devoted 554 hours in service to the perform the duties of my office. This averages out to 55 hours per month.

Twenty six councils (55%) had organized membership recruitment programs. At the mid-winter meeting, I announced that as of 11/1/95, 47.6% of all new members joined as a result of these

# Knights of Columbus Audit Report

The Knights of Columbus Audit Committee met and reviewed the report of the State Treasurer, Keith Merritt, which covers the period of April 1, 1995 through March 31, 1996.

This review consisted primarily of inquiries of the State Treasurer, analytical procedures applied to the financial data and a general examination of the ledger, bank statements, canceled checks, deposits and invoices. This review is substantially less in scope than an audit. A financial audit of State Council books is now being prepared annually by an independent CPA firm. However, their audit covers a period ending June 30th and does cover any review of records in the nine month interim between the year end and the state convention. Therefore an independent financial audit has not been performed on those transactions occurring between July 1, 1995 and March 31, 1996. An audit including that time period through June 30, 1996 will be provided to the State Council at next year's State Convention.

Based on our review we are not aware of any material changes that should be made to the State Treasurer's report.

However, the Audit Committee would recommend that a standard system of revenue and expense classifications be developed. This would aid us and you in making comparisons of specific revenues and expenses between reports of differing years.

Secondly, as part of our examination of State Council financial records, we reviewed the audit report prepared by an independent CPA firm covering the period July 1, 1994 to June 30, 1995. It should be noted that the audit prepared by the CPA firm is a financial audit and does not cover the compliance of financial transactions with the By-Laws of our Order which is the duty of the Audit Committee. We noted no problems were disclosed in this audit report, therefore we recommend that the State Council accept their audit report as presented.

Finally, we noted the following problems reported at the last State Convention which require follow-up:

- Financial records for the three years prior to July 1, 1993 were not in a location that was readily accessible to the Audit Committee, State Treasurer or other interested parties. This problem was reported by the Audit Committee at the last two conventions. A resolution was adopted by the Delegates to remedy this situation by requiring financial records for the five previous years be located and placed in an accessible location, but this resolution has never been implemented.
- Financial discrepancies occurring prior to July 1, 1994 discussed in the previous year's report have not been explained to the Audit Committee.

In summary, our review of both of these reports did not reveal any significant problems with the current financial records of the State Council nor evidence of any misuse of State Council Funds.

The Knight's of Columbus Audit Committee met and reviewed the financial statement of the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi, Inc., which covers the period of April 1, 1995 through March 31, 1996.

This review consisted primarily of inquires of the treasurer, a general examination of the ledger, bank statements, canceled checks, deposits and invoices. This review is substantially less in scope than an audit.

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material changes that should be made to the financial statement as presented.

It has come to our attention that the foundation disbursements man not have been used by councils for matching fund purposes. The intent of the foundation is to assist programs in obtaining matching funds.

It is our recommendation that councils be advised in the proper use of these funds and that funds be held in trust until matching fund programs are available in their area.

#### Financial Secretaries' Meeting Report

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Fritz Oberlies.

We were honored with the presence of Supreme Director Albert Benedetti who told those attending that this was his first opportunity to attend a meeting of financial secretaries at a state convention. We enjoyed having him with us and appreciated his comments regarding Supreme's efforts to improve their lot.

The first part of the meeting was devoted to addressing the fourteen members present by Harry Steinwinder, a veteran financial secretary who stressed the importance of using the Financial Secretary manual provided by the Supreme Office. He called attention to the various forms financial secretaries should use in their day-to-day conduct of their council's financial business and to stay on top of report submittals required of them. He especially stressed the importance of staying with the basics of reporting and to be on time with report submittals.

The second part of the meeting consisted of an overview of the computerized program offered by the Supreme Office. Several councils are already on-line and reported varying degrees of success with the program. There is not yet a clear consensus as to how the program is working. It became evident, from remarks made, that there is still a number of glitches to be resolved by Supreme. It was suggested by Financial Secretary Steve Farry and agreed by Brothers Gerald Rose and Mark Frederic that Supreme should look into the possibility of conducting an all day hands-on school, with experienced instructors, for those who have recently switched to computerized record keeping. This suggestion was enthusiastically seconded by the majority present. Supreme Director Benedetti promised to look into it.

A question and answer period on manual and computerized methods of record keeping followed after which the chairman brought up a subject which he thought the financial secretaries might find interesting. He thought the financial secretaries should consider forming a financial secretaries association similar to Louisiana's. The purpose of such an association would primarily be to bring about unity that such an organization would offer. In addition, it would foster and encourage a more lively consideration for the work of the financial secretary and stimulate in its membership a higher spirit of perfection. It was suggested that a questionnaire be prepared and mailed to all financial secretaries in the jurisdiction and if the responses were on a positive note the matter would be pursued further.

The chairman suggested to the State Deputy that consideration be given to having the financial secretaries meeting held at the Mid-Winter meeting thereby allowing more time for deliberations. The State Convention meeting would be of shorter duration, mostly devoted to reviewing what progress has been made since the Mid-Winter meeting.

- Continue to provide the convention packet at the Mid-Winter meeting, but follow up this

#### District Master's Report

Your Excellencies, Rev. Fathers, Worthy Supreme Representative, Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Vice Supreme Master, Worthy Past State Deputies, Worthy Former Masters, Worthy Faithful Navigators and Worthy Sir Knights.

My reappointment as the District Master of Mississippi, Bienville Province for the period September 1, 1994 through August 31,1996 was received in September 1994.

During this period the following Exemplifications were held:
On 9/18/94 in Tupelo with 43 Lay Knights & 3 Clergy became Sir Knights, honoring Sir Knight John Brown, faithful comptroller of the Father Clarence J. Meyer assembly in Tupelo and the guest speaker at the banquet was former Vice Supreme Master George Harvey.

On 3/25/95 in Orange Grove with 29 Lay Knights & 4 Clergy became Sir Knights, honoring Bishop Joseph Lawson Howze, Bishop of the Biloxi diocese and the guest speaker at the banquet was Father Antone Lynch Fr. Harry Wade Assembly, Orange Grove.

On 9/16/95 in Meridian with 21 Lay Knights & 1 Clergy became Sir Knights, honoring Bishop William Houck, Bishop of Jackson and the guest speaker at the banquet was our State Deputy Jesse Quinn, III.

On 3/16/96 in Greenwood with 21 Lay Knights & 1 Clergy became Sir Knights, honoring our Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechant and the guest speaker at the banquet was our Vice Supreme Master Marvin L. Lott, Past State Deputy.

As of 7/1/94 there were 1160 Fourth Degree members out of a total of 5152 Knights in

Mississippi giving a 22.5% of Fourth Degree Knights.

As of 7/1/95 the percentage of Fourth Degree Knights to the total was 24.03%. We are trying to make this percentage to be over 25% by June 30,1996.

During 1994 a new assembly was instituted at Orange Grove, the Father Harry Wade Assembly 2347 with Sir Knight John R. Ward as Faithful Navigator. The credit for the formation of this assembly belongs to Sir Knight Chris Carrubba, who did all of the paper work.

Much to my regret no new assembly was instituted in 1995. Although there are a number of areas where a new assembly could be instituted. It will take some work on the part of the Sir Knights in these areas to start a new assembly. You only have to have 20???? Members to form an assembly.

I attended the Bienville Province Meetings in Memphis on 10/16/94 and in Baton Rouge on 11/5/95 and acted as Secretary to the Vice Supreme Master at both these meetings. These meetings were well attended by some Mississippi Sir Knights. The next provincial meeting will be held in October 1996 in Vicksburg and all Sir Knights who can, should attend this meeting. A letter will be sent to each Faithful Navigator when the date is firmed up.

The Supreme Council is still writing me that 5 of the Mississippi assemblies have not submitted the Fraternal Activity Report which was due January 31, 1996 for the year 1995. I have written the Faithful Navigators of these 5 assemblies several times and have yet to receive a copy of the report or a reply from any of the 5.

This report is essential for the Supreme Council to show the Internal Revenue Service proof of our tax exempt status in order to maintain it. Based on our record if 22.7 percent if all the assemblies of the order matched it we are not doing so good to help maintain our tax exempt status. It would be disastrous if the Knights of Columbus lost this status.

During the installation of officers the following statement is directed to all the officers "Worthy Sir Knights, you have been elected to the various officers of this assembly for the ensuring year, and Anights, you have been elected to the various officers of this assembly for the ensuring year, and you have received from me an explanation of the duties of each office. I believe that you accept willingly the offices to which you have been elected by the members of this assembly. "And those officers have answered "I do" to the question: "Do you by this acceptance promise to perform faithfully the duties of your respective offices?" In the future if you accept an office in the Fourth Degree and do not intend to abide by this promise, please do not accept the office.

The next reports due to the Supreme Council and a copy to the District Master are:

The RSVP/Plaque application due June 30,1996, The civic award application due June 30,1996.

The Report of Officers chosen for the term July 1,1996 to June 30,1997. The annual assembly audit report due August 1, 1996

The To Be A Patriot Award entry form due by June 30.

Official order form for recorded Columbus Day program due by September 15,1996. Copies of these reports and forms are in the 1996 calendar year Assembly Report Forms booklet each assembly should have.

It is necessary for these reports to be sent timely in order for the District Master and the Supreme Council to function properly.

The Sir Knight of the year for 1994-1995 was Dennis K. Riecke of Madison, MS. A Sir Knight of the Reservoir Assembly 2269 at Brandon, which is now the Bishop Joseph B. Brunini Assembly 2269. This name change was approved by the Supreme Board of Directors at their meeting of April 12,13, & 14,1996.

The new Sir Knight of the year for 1995-1996 will be presented a plaque at the banquet tomorrow night. Since I will not stay for the convention, I have asked Vice Supreme Master Marvin Lott to present the plaque to the new Sir Knight of the Year.

Each Faithful Navigator was requested to submit a name of one of their Sir Knights to me by April 15,1996 for the Sir Knight of the Year award. Only 4 out of 22 Faithful Navigators saw fit to nominate one of their members for this award and have the nomination to the District Master by April 15,1996. One other Faithful Navigator made a nomination in a letter dated on April 15,1996 which was mailed on April 16,1996 and received on April 17, 1996 after the judging was completed and the plaque was ordered.

Surely 17 other Faithful Navigators could have found a Sir Knight in their assembly to submit a nomination for the Sir Knight of the Year award.

The last exemplification cost to the District Master was \$2081.90 and only 22 candidates showed up and the fees were \$1365 leaving a deficit to the District Master of \$716.90, but the degree team, with former Master Henry Kajdan as Captain, voluntarily waived their travel allowance of \$100.80 (for which I thank the team) which left a net deficit of \$616.10 which has to be paid out.

Of the personal funds of the District Master. No District Master can stand many Exemplifications with a deficit of this amount. The largest cost of the exemplification is the banquet, which is usually catered and a guarantee of the number to attend has to be made prior to the exemplification date. If you guess 100 to be in attendance and only 50 show up there will always be a deficit.

It is a hardship on the District Master to receive an application for Fourth Degree candidates, where the application is not properly prepared, many lack the signature of the candidate, the Faithful Navigator, the Faithful Comptroller, the Proposer, the financial secretary of the Council, the membership number, the date of First Degree, etc. This makes it hard for the District Master to prepare for the exemplification, preparing certificates, ordering social baldrics, pins and preparing the program to list the names of the candidates. It is next to impossible without incurring considerable expense for postage and phone calls. Please if you have candidates for the next exemplification scheduled in Vicksburg for June 22,1996, complete the application and have it to me not later than June 1, 1996. If we do not have at least 40 applications by that date, it will be necessary to cancel the exemplification. That I do not want to do.

I want to thank State Deputy Jesse Quinn, III and Past State Deputy Tom Zettler for their cooperation and assistance during my term of office. I also want to thank Vice Supreme Master Marvin L. Lott, Past State Deputy for his help and confidence in me during my term.

On a personal note - a week after the last exemplification in Greenwood, I suffered a complete heart block and if it hadn't been for a 911 call, a good emergency ambulance crew, a good cardiologist and a temporary pace maker implanted within an hour of the attack, and a whole lot of prayers, I would not be here to hold this meeting. I received a permanent pace maker two days later and I have been advised that when I pay the \$15000 bill, they will give me the batteries for it.
