PROCEEDINGS OF THE 95TH ANNUAL STATE MEETING MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

First Business Session Friday, April 23, 1999

State Deputy Guy S. Todaro, Jr. called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. At that time he called on Brother Ed Canizaro to introduce Brother Lauderdale, President of the Warren County Board of Supervisors. Brother Lauderdale welcomed all delegates and members to Vicksburg.

State Secretary Bruce Pabon responded on behalf of the State Council.

State Deputy Guy S. Todaro, Jr., called to order and opened the First Business Session of the 95th Annual State Meeting of the Mississippi Jurisdiction at 6:15 p.m. State Warden Larry J. Tabor verified that all present possessed current membership cards of the Third Degree. State Chaplain Father Dennis J. Carver opened the meeting with a prayer. He stated that he was proud to be part of the last convention of the 20th Century. Mississippi District Fourth Degree Master Norman M. McDonald lead the delegates in the Pledge of Allegiance.

State Deputy Guy S. Todaro, Jr., welcomed the delegates and introduced Supreme Director Louis A. Mautino.

The State Deputy then entertained a motion to waive the reading of the minutes from the 94th Annual State Meeting. A motion was made by Bill Gatzman, Laurel Council 2180 and seconded by Gordon Cowie, Pearl Council 8038.

Reports not previously received were submitted. District Deputy No. 12, Donald F. Cox, presented his report to the delegates.

State Warden Larry J. Tabor explained the assignment of chairs to the delegates. The Mississippi District Fourth Degree Master's Report was given by Sir Knight Norman M. McDonald. Thomas R. Zettler, Immediate Past State Deputy presented the report on the State Program for People Mentally Disabled.

State Advocate Richard T. Lieding distributed the resolutions and State Deputy Guy S. Todaro, Jr gave the Committee Assignments.

Other administrative remarks and announcements were made, including the theme of this year's convention, "Spread The Word - Witness Our Faith."

State Officer Reports

State Chaplain's Report Rev. Dennis J. Carver

Bishop Houck, Supreme Director Louis Mantino, State Deputy Guy Todaro and members of the State Council, my Brother Knights,

Once a month, for one day per month, I travel to New Orleans from my little parish in Dedeaux to do something I think is very important: to attend to my continuing religious education. For a solid year, the small group of eight priests and nuns, to which I belong, have studies in depth the 500 year-old Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Loyola. I think it's right and providential: it took St. Ignatius a full year to put his Spiritual Exercises together and we have followed suit by studying them for a year.

It fascinates me to learn where this giant saint ends after the near-contortions of his Spiritual Exercises. Ignatius ends them in the unitive-way, asking God, begging God, to take everything that he is, to take everything that he has in return for God's grace and his love. The unitive way.

However, I'm convinced that being united cannot be adequately expressed in words. When we, as Knights of Columbus, try to show other people that we are united simply by what we say: number one) it's not very convincing, and number two) it sounds like we're talking in circles...talking in circles. "May they be one, as you are in me and I in you, so they may be in us." That is priestly prayer, the unitive prayer from the mouth of Jesus in gospel of John. But taken by itself, taken out of context, it's a circular talk and means very little unless it is acted out.

That's the rub, my brothers. In order for the Knights of Columbus to convince other people that it is a united body, united to the Church, united to it's bishops and priests, united within each council, we've got to act it out. A good friend of mine once told me, "It's not what you say but what you do that tells me who you are!"

How does your council express its allegiance, its unity, to your parish priest? Brothers, it can only be expressed by the sweat of your brow. Sometimes by taking the first step. If you just tell your priest that you are with him, for him, it's like talking in circles, not very convincing. (PAUSE) What does your council do to be the sign of unity in your parish? It can only be expressed by very public and very visible WORKS. It is to do something for the parish. Dare I say, not for your council but for your parish and the church at large. The list goes on: for your Bishop, your Catholic schools, CCD, youth, vocations, family, for all of the great and high ideals of the Knights of Columbus, "it is what do you do that says who you are?" The unitive way.

Do you know what is interesting about St. Ignatius Loyola? After spending a year in a cave at Manresa, Spain, spending a year in the contortions of the Spiritual Exercises, Ignatius comes out and pledges his allegiance, his unity to the Pope. And he does so at a very controversial time in the history of the church, just after the Protestant Reformation. And then he worked and worked and worked at publicly showing that unity, even at a time when it was not popular, at a time that was full of division. And what came out of it was the great Society of Jesus, the Jesuits, who are very united within their order, very public.

And do you know what is very interest about Jesus of Nazareth? Just after his wordy prayer, his great unitive priestly prayer, "I in you and you in me and we in them," he goes out to the cross, publicly working out, acting out the unity that he so desires within his church and within our hearts and with our God.

Brothers, if we just say that we are united to the Church, it's not very convincing. Let us model workable communities. COM-UNITY, with unity.

Ceremonials

We continue to be blessed with two outstanding Second and Third Degree Teams who are willing to travel up and down the state to perform our Order's ceremonies with dignity and in a professional manner. We have also had the added flexibility of reciprocating degree performances with our neighboring jurisdictions of Alabama and Tennessee. I wish to publicly thank Harvey Caldwell and Fred Clark and their Degree Teams for their support during these past two years.

I would be remised if I did not note the untimely death of our State Ceremonial Chairman, Lessie Ladner, this past December. He had an intense love and dedication for our Order. He will be truly missed.

Fraternal Activities And Programs

The programs that are conducted on the state and local levels are second to none. Many brothers comprise the State Program Team which is led by Gerry Clark, our State Program Director. These men have traveled to meetings across the state to serve you on a personal level. Through their efforts you brothers have exceeded in the quality and number of the programs you conduct. Plus participation in state sponsored programs is nearing record levels. This was evident by the number of awards given out Friday night.

In fact there was an overwhelming participation response with the newest program offered by Supreme, the Substance Abuse Poster Contest. We submitted our three state winners to Supreme for further competition.

Membership

Along with our Insurance Program and Fraternal Activity Programs, the third important leg of the tripod that stabilizes the growth and vitality of our Order is membership. In this area we have been at a constant and steady pace.

I am referring to Hurricane Georges which devastated much of the Gulf Coast on September 27. Many were left homeless. Many council homes sustained damage. And many of the churches and diocesan schools and buildings sustained severe damage.

Two days after the storm hit I received a phone call from our Worthy Supreme Knight, Virgil Dechant. He was extremely concerned about the health and safety of our brothers and others in the community. He over-nighted me a check for \$10,000 to assist the Mississippi Jurisdiction in it's relief efforts.

We also received checks from Louisiana, North Carolina, Arizona, Illinois, Wyoming, Iowa, and an additional check from Supreme. I wish to publicly thank our brother knights in those jurisdictions and Supreme for their fraternal generosity.

I also wish to thank Supreme Director James Murphy from Iowa who was very helpful assisting me in setting up a distribution system for the relief victims.

Despite the major damage, compared to the other places Hurricane Georges hit, Mississippi was spared the worst of the storm.

Good Of The Order

Under the Good of the Order, I would like to make a few comments regarding the Fourth Degree, our deceased members, and our State Ladies Auxiliary.

I wish to first congratulate our Former Master Mike Gilly for an outstanding stewardship as Master of the Mississippi District. He truly brought the Fourth Degree to a new level in this state.

Secondly, I would like to welcome our current Master, Norman McDonald. Norman and I have worked together these past few months since the start of his term and it has been a great relationship.

I would be remised if I did not also recognize our District Marshall Ken Broussard. The Fourth Degree Honor Guard has never performed better than under Ken's leadership.

1998 was a devastating year not only in the form of storms but also from the hovering angel of death. First with the death of our State Treasurer Ted Knowles last April. Then late in the year with the death of Past State Deputy Wiley Price. Wiley was an icon at all of our State Conventions. He assisted with pride every State Secretary in the delegate registration process. He was always there to guide us with his wisdom and his experience, and he broke the tension with his cajun humor. There is definitely a void at this year's State Convention. Wiley's wife Mary also died several months after he did.

Following closely behind Wiley's was the death of our State Ceremonial Chairman and Former District Deputy Lessie Ladner. Lessie's true love for our Order and Jurisdiction is unequalled. As his pastor described Lessie, he stated that Lessie should be the poster boy for the Knights of Columbus. Lessie too will be missed by this and future administrations.

Finally, I must mention the sudden and unexpected illness and subsequent death of our State Secretary's wife, Marilyn Pabon. Our apparent future first lady was always the model K of C wife; very supportive and encouraging, and always very loving and giving. Bruce you know how much our heart goes out to you. Marilyn loved figurines of angels. They were all over her home. Along with our support, Bruce has his own personal angel looking after him. We love you brother.

I mention these deaths as examples of all of those who have died this past year. As we started last year, we continue to enroll our deceased brothers in the SMA Father's Perpetual Mass Association (provided we receive in a timely manner notice of the death). I can't tell you how many beautiful expressions of thanks I have received from the families of our deceased brothers when they see someone from the State Council attend the services, and receive the beautiful Mass card and Knights of Columbus Resolution of Condolence. It is an honor that all our brothers deserve. It is the essence of our existence as a fraternal order.

The State Ladies Auxiliary continues to gain momentum and strength in our State. Under the leadership of Anna Fratesi, these ladies and their state affiliated auxiliaries have been very supportive of programs initiated by this administration. I congratulate them on their dedication to our Order.

Now that I've dwelt on past performances, what about the future for this great jurisdiction? I believe it is great and glorious!

New Council Development

For a small jurisdiction, we still have many areas that are overdue for a new council and more new areas opening up every day. The growth that dockside gaming has provided in the form of jobs and secure futures for our families, has also provided the Catholic Faith with an influx of new people into areas that had been dormant. This has not only brought in new Catholics but also potential converts to our Faith.

Currently we are seeking to start a new council at St. Richards in Jackson, the parishes in Hurley, Vancleave, and existing roundtables in New Albany and West Point. We are also excited about the possibility of starting a new council in the new Vietnamese parish being built in Biloxi. And I know that there are several more prime spots to look at.

I am also very excited about the rejuvenation of Council 4472 Pass Christian. Their delegates are Gene Rogers, Grand Knight and E. C. Niolet, DGK. Thank you brothers for keeping the dream alive in Pass Christian.

Along with growth comes experience. This is where our Past State Deputies fold into every administration. They've been there. Done that. And have the T shirt as the saying goes. It makes good sense to ask them for input into a situation. Worthy Past State Deputies, I truly appreciate all you have done. And I challenge you to also get involved with other administrations.

Yes brothers, the future is very bright for our Jurisdiction. But in order for us to be successful we must be willing to change. To change is difficult, not to change is fatal. And remember, people do not resist change, they resist being changed. It's a fact: Change is inevitable, but growth is optional.

I believe that we must continue to change our behaviors in order for us to make step changes in growth. But before we can do that, we have to recognize our differences. As an Order our biggest difference is our ages. By design, we have brothers ranging in age from 18 to 90+ years. We have generational differences.

For example, pre-baby boomers (60+ years) they went through the Depression, WWII. They believed in saving for the future. They were motivated by wanting stability and security. Long marriages, etc. Yet most are overwhelmed by technology.

Today's 18 to 25 years olds grew up with both parents working, want to have everything now, have little in savings, and would sacrifice security for pleasure.

Do you see where I'm leading to. The very driver for one generation is of little or less concern to the other. And the very core of one generation Technology is the fear of the other. We have to recognize this and be aware of it. We have to adapt in order to attract new men, new family men to our Order.

I know we can do it. We can continue to take baby steps and attract more and more family men by making the family more and more part of all of our activities. You can bet on one thing, if we don't attract these men, another organization will.

Worthy Supreme Director Mautino, when you depart us tomorrow, please take with you this message to our worthy Supreme Knight. Tell him that the 5,749 knights and their families in Mississippi are proudly setting the pace to the Third Millennium.

As I stated earlier, from the beginning, this administration bonded together as a TEAM, a fraternal team, a family. I congratulate you, my brother knights for electing this State Family to serve you this past year. I hope you have been pleased with our performance. We have not accomplished everything we have set as goals. But we have achieved some successes. I know in my heart that

everything we have done as a Team of Catholic men, we have done for the Glory and Honor of our Lord, and Him alone.

I would like to close with Ralph Waldo Emerson's definition of SUCCESS.

State Treasurer's Report Thomas F. Chady

Most Reverend Bishop Houck, Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy Supreme Representative, Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Brother State Officers and Brother Knights,

This past year the state family undertook several measures to reduce operating costs. We incorporated a special program meeting with the mid-winter meetings; reduced the number of mid-winter meetings from our to three; reinstated the per diem for food reimbursement; reduced number of Magnolia Knights published; and car pooled as we traveled throughout the state the best we could. Our efforts reduced our \$8500.00 deficit from the prior year to break even, however a change in per capita assessment for inactive members reduced our revenues by \$1328.00 contributing to a \$1437.00 loss. Next year' per capita will be reduced by \$2656.00.

The Christopher Fund generated \$194.50 in interest, equating to 11.16% on our \$3486.00 investment. Efforts need to be made to increase this fund to the maximum level.

Forms 990 for the state and foundation were caught up, and all necessary documents have been forwarded to the IRS to re-activate our exempt status for the foundation and to the Secretary of State's office for our exemption under the Charitable Solicitations Act.

Attached are copies of the financial statement for fiscal year 4/1/98 to 3/31/99 and Christopher Fund.

FYI: the last eight councils generate 100 new members or per capita revenues of \$800.00. The cost associated with those 16 delegates for this convention is \$2180.00.

Don't forget the Knights must take a very active part in vocations - let Mississippi take the lead.

May the blessing of the Lord rest upon you and all the works of the Knights of Columbus.

great food. Thanks again to them for a wonderful visit to Picayune. Every active Circle in our State was present at the convention this year. This was super. Thanks to the councils and counselors for your participation with these young men.

This years elections for State Squire Officers were all very close in the balloting. Every young man that ran for one of the offices were fine young Catholic gentlemen and it showed not only in the way they conducted themselves at the convention, but in what the young men had to say about each other when they read the nomination speeches.

Each Squire Circle reported on the projects they participated in over the past year. State Program for the Mentally Disabled Report

Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Supreme Director, Worthy State Officers, Delegates and Brother Knights:

As most of you may know, I took over the State Program for the Mentally Disabled in mid year fully realizing that I had some very large shoes to fill and not knowing a lot about what had been going on other than from a cursory

level. As the year progressed, however, I felt more and more at ease with what was going on in this particular part of the State Program area.

Most if not all of our monies are raised through solicitations by Knights and/or Councils in what used to be called the Tootsie Roll Drive. In the year just past, that is 1998 for our purposes, we raised some \$99,312.31. Of this amount 75% was returned to you in distributions as you directed. This amounted to roughly \$69,500 with matching funds of roughly \$25,600. This was the result of 40 of our Councils participating.

The State Council retained 25% of collected funds and distributed them as follows:

- Internships for: James Carr, Eric Arline, Bobby Smith, and John Toche at \$4,000 per internship.
- We presented \$6,500 to the Christian Service Center project coordinator, Sister Cyrena Harkins.
- We presented \$4,500 to the Mississippi Special Olympics to be distributed at \$300 to each of the 15 areas.

We are quite proud of our continuing association with these very worthwhile projects and can only hope that it continues into the next millennium.

Of particular note during these past several months has been the official tax status of the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi. I am very happy to announce that this long over looked but vitally important situation is all but resolved and successfully as far as we are concerned. I would be remiss were I not to personally thank State Treasurer Tom Chady for all of the work he has done in this particular area. Thank you, Tom, on behalf of everyone who will benefit from your efforts.

As everyone knows, the State Deputy presents a trophy to the council that collects the largest net income per member. This year's winner is Council 11956, Columbia, with a net income per member of \$80.68. The trophy for the largest gross income will be presented to the Tupelo Council with a total gross income of \$12,584.26. I congratulate both of these fine Councils for their excellent work.

The 1999 State Program for the Mentally Disabled will be held during the week of May 10 through May 16. I ask all of you to appoint your drive chairman now and report this appointment to me. I also urge you to forward your collected funds to me as soon as your drive is over with your Audit and Account Form. As soon as you have determined the recipient of your 75% of the funds, submit your disbursement fund request form to me and we will make as rapid a turnaround as is possible. But I assure you, there will be no funds forwarded to you until I have received the disbursement form.

In closing, let me say that there is no reason for this particular program to drag on over the course of 12 months as it has done at least for the past year. You know the dates of the drive and you know how vitally important the monies are to the organizations that receive them from you. You know how desperately the funds are needed by those who are supported by the foundation's 25% and you know what forms are required to both send in and retrieve your monies from me. Then as I have said many, many times to you from this podium – do your duty. If all of us do only this, we will have the most successful drive ever. Thank you and Vivat Jesus.

Tabor verified current 3rd Degree membership cards. State Chaplain Father Dennis Carver opened the session with a prayer and Master Norman McDonald led the delegates in the Pledge of Allegiance.

State Program Director's Report For Program Year 1998 - 1999

It is strongly felt that Program Guidelines are set up in a very simple and council friendly manner. They allow the local councils to submit any project worked on over the year and to categorize them in one of the five program areas. The most frequently made mistake in filling out the program report is categorizing the individual program under the correct program area. recommend that next year, instead of trying to cram the program area into thirty minutes or a hour during the School of Columbianism and the Mid-Winter meetings, to have separate district or regional workshops to more thoroughly explain and go over the program guidelines. This is a must. Every year we are getting new members and councils involved that haven't the slightest clue as to what we are trying to help them accomplish. This should help us obtain an even higher program reporting percentage than we now have since the individuals submitting the reports would have a better understanding of the guidelines and not be frustrated filling them out. These guidelines only there to assist and guide them in spreading their good works, not to just add more paperwork and take time away from their families.

This past year we had thirty-four of fifty-four local councils submit the mid-year program reports. Those councils were: 802, 898, 1034, 1244, 1605, 1908, 2134,2180,2969,4898,5267,5556,6592,7120,7211,7854,7910,8038,8285,8848, 9094,9124,9409,9543,9673,9958,10216,1044310499,10901,11541,11904,119 34, and 12166.

Year-end submissions finished out at forty-three of fifty-five local councils. Only two councils submitting year-end reports were not eligible for an award.

One was due to excessive loss in membership, which was outlined in the program guidelines, and the other was extremely late submission date (day of the convention). Those councils submitting and receiving awards were: HONOR COUNCIL: 802, 1908, 2945, 5267, 6592, 6872, 7087, 7974, 10443, and 12331.

During this past year there have been several successes within our retention program. Local councils are using more of the proper procedures to retain members such as putting on programs of interest of the members as well as making more personal contacts with MOST members prior to and during the suspension process.

We have seen the resurrection of at least two councils that have been dead or dormant for years. Both of these have recruited new members and elected new officers to fill empty positions of leadership this year.

We have diagnosed a few potential problem councils where proper retention procedures were not being followed. These are councils where there have been virtually NO suspensions for several years and they appear to be sitting "TIME BOMBS" waiting for large drops.

Our largest problem this past year was with two councils which had large drops of members, each with one large purge. The state has lost a total of 148 members as of 1 April for the year. Ninety-eight of them were from these two councils.

Through the coordinated efforts of the State Retention Chairman and the State Deputy, the State Deputy has taken positive steps to ensure procedures are followed. These were done through coordination with Supreme to ensure ALL members being considered for suspension have been contacted by the State Deputy through his personal letter, and every REASONABLE effort has been exhausted before a suspension goes through. He has also worked with Financial Secretaries and Grand Knights, on individual basis, to ensure proper systems are followed.

The retention program of our state has involved not only the retention of members but the retention of councils, as well. We have assessed and evaluated the situations and taken appropriate steps to ensure EVERY Brother Knight in every council that is in jeopardy of being suspended is contacted and every council that has appeared dormant has had the personal attention of the State Family.

It has been a pleasure and honor to serve this state for the past four years as the state retention chairman.

The Knights of Columbus Audit Committee met and reviewed the report of State Treasurer Tom Chady, which covers the period of April 1, 1998 through March 31, 1999.

This review consisted primarily of an examination of receipts and disbursements occurring during the year, a comparison of revenue and expense balances with previous year amounts and a cursory examination of the general ledger, bank statements, canceled checks, deposits and invoices. This review is substantially less in scope than an audit.

Based upon our review we are not aware of any material changes that should be made to the State Treasurer's Report nor are we aware of any significant problems with the supporting records.

1999 State Convention Mileage and Per Diem Report.

We discussed that mileage is computed based on Mississippi Highway Department Maps at 10 cents per mile one way and per diem would remain at \$50.00 per day for two days for stated individuals as determined by resolution at last year's convention. The committee had an active and lively discussion. We discussed using gas receipts in lieu of mileage but realized that it would be impractical to do so. We also considered exempting a 50 or 100 mile radius for mileage computation. We realize that some councils already reimburse delegates. The committee does recognize that we have a financial problem and either we reduce mileage and per diem or raise per capita. We recommend the new officers study options and review other state programs even if the outcome means raising per capita.

State Membership Committee Report

The following report is submitted based on discussions held during the 95th Annual State Convention at Vicksburg, MS, on April 24, 1999. The membership committee met in Room 3, at 1:30 PM, and was chaired by the State Membership Director.

The membership committee opened its discussion with a prayer and introduction of each committeeman. Each brother knight present was asked to give a short summation of what they thought to be specific new member recruitment difficulties facing their council. In addition, everyone included working solutions to resolve shortfalls in new member recruitment and retention.

Some common problems noted were: (1) Dwindling populations and declines in the local economy (2) A stagnate or decreasing number of parish families (3) varying degrees of support from parish priests (4) increasing competition among other church supported activities.

The next topic of discussion addressed dealt with the high number of suspensions noted for this fraternal year. The number of suspensions this year (214) had a negative impact on the overall recruitment efforts for the state. Half of the suspensions (106) where the result of five councils "cleaning house" in their membership rolls. The general consensus of the committee attributed these high numbers to: (1) Personnel changes in Financial Secretaries (2) Insufficient control of council records (3) Inadequate involvement of council leadership, i.e., Grand Knight, Trustees and/or retention committees.

As chair of this committee, I reaffirmed to all that the State Officers are available and willing to support their membership recruitment efforts. We as a committee, encourage councils to utilize any and all resources available to support their recruitment activities. We suggest involving the District Deputies and Insurance Agents and even tailoring their drives and program from council's with successful recruiting programs. The one important suggestion holds the most truth—it is each Knight's responsibility to be prepared and knowledge of the techniques to recruit new members. Everyone should be confident and prepared when asked, "why should I become a Knight of Columbus?" All of us should be ready to provide prospective members with information concerning our Order. We all must be a positive role model in all we do and say, as others will form their opinions and perceptions by what they see in us. Another suggestion is to have a solid Public Relations program in each council to share with others the good works of their individual councils.

In closing, the committee expresses its hope and confidence that all councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction have success in the upcoming fraternal year. Our Order's continued success depends heavily on new member recruitment, as it is the lifeline to our growth, prosperity, and continuance.

Financial Secretaries' Meeting Report

This years meeting was attended by thirteen Financial Secretaries, including the chairman. An across the board representation was achieved, from Biloxi to Southhaven.

The Financial Secretary's Personal Computer program (FSPC) and the benefits that can be realized through its use, especially by our larger councils, was discussed in depth. Each of us are eagerly anticipating the eventual release of the Windows 95/98 version of this program. It was generally agreed that the features of this program could be put to good use by each committee chairman, especially the Family Chairman. This, however, can only be achieved if members of each council are willing to share some personal information about themselves and their families. Eg., birthday, anniversaries, children's names, etc.

Proper billing procedures as well as suspensions were discussed and it was generally agreed that the following Supreme guidelines, the job would be made easier for the Financial Secretary involved. It was noted, that Supreme was very strict as to adherence to the rules when it comes to Suspensions.

We also discussed the importance of the Form 100, it's proper completion and the importance of its timely submission to Supreme in the event of a member's death. The importance of legibility, especially the prospective member's name and address was stressed. It was agreed that the primary responsibility for this falls on the shoulders of the proposer, but in the final analysis, it is the financial Secretary's responsibility to be sure that supreme will have no problem in reading and recording the Form 100 information. Proper distribution was also discussed.

Perhaps the most important discussion that took place during the meeting pertained to the retention of members. It was generally agreed that no member of a council should ever be suspended for not paying their dues, unless someone has personally contacted him on the Retention Committee, the Grand Knight, the proposer, or the Financial Secretary or any combination thereof. It is the prerogative of the Grand Knight to waive any member's dues as he see fit, and without explanation in the event of financial hardship on the part of that member. It was also noted that the proposer's responsibility does not end when a member he signed on receives his 1st Degree. In fact, a proposer should be ever mindful of the fact that when he signs up a new member and brings him into his council, his job has just begun.

8. With expenses going up and revenue going down the committee suggested that the State look at ways to increase revenue. Suggestions of a 50/50 raffle on drawdowns at the State convention were brought up to decrease the need for per capita increases.

Many widows are still in a state of shock within the 90 days, and

Whereas,

Widows are not normally ready to make decisions on the undertaking of another bill within 90 days of the passing of their husband, and

Whereas,

Riders have been established to add protection to the existing policies for future occurrences, i.e.: children to be born on family plans, or Guarantee Purchase Options for future ages,

Now Therefore Be It Resolved,

That we the members of the Knights of Columbus within the State of Mississippi suggest that the Knights of Columbus Insurance Department look at creating a rider to allow widows of previously insured Brother Knights the added time beyond the 90 days to purchase Knights of Columbus Insurance, from the time of their husband passing away until they either remarry or die, provided that

they meet normal insurability requirements of health, age, and lifestyle.

The Knights of Columbus believe and advocate that the pledge of liberty and justice for all as recited in the Pledge of Allegiance specifically means all persons both born and unborn and that this should be a constant reminder of the principles of spirituality and morality that is our way of life,

Now Therefore Be It Resolved,

That the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council recommend and encourage that the phrase "born and unborn" be added after the words "with liberty and justice for all" when the Pledge of Allegiance is recited at all meetings and official functions of the Order, and

Be It Further Resolved,

That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Supreme Council for its approval, and

Be It Further Resolved,

That upon approval of this resolution by the Supreme Council, the Supreme Council petition the Congress of the United States of America to make effective this amendment as set forth in the Public Law relating to the use of the Flag of the United States of America.

Now, Therefore Be It Resolved,

That the Mississippi State Council recommend and encourage the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council that the phrase "born and unborn" be added after the words "with liberty and justice for all," and

That the State Council, starting with the year 2000 Convention, reduce by one-half the per mile expense for all future conventions.
