GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

April, 1999 - March, 2000

Our year began in May,1999, with a very successful Tootsie Roll drive and \$4,219.00 was collected for retarded citizens. The weekly Bingo conducted by the brother knights continued on a successful basis. Profits from our Bingo resulted in donations totaling \$15,000.00 to the following charities: St. Vincent De Paul, Lifeline, Seminarian, Boy Scouts, Ladies Auxillary, Priest Education Fund, Thanksgiving Baskets, Christmas Baskets, St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church, MS Bike-a-Thon, Banana Bingo - Convalescent Home, Sacred Heart League, Sattillo Missions, Dedeau - Cursillo, and Fr. Noone's Life Insurance Policy. We continue to have our monthly socials sponsored by the Ladies Auxillary and a family of the month is honored at each social. Our corporate Communion on Sundays following our social includes the Ladies Auxillary, wives of Knights and Squires.

In May, 1999, the Council purchased six acres of ground in Pearl River County which will be the future site of a new council home.

The Council sponsored Boy Scout troop attended summer camp and camping trips to the Smokey Mountains.

We presented 30 Thanksgiving Baskets to needy families with turkeys, trimmings, pies, cakes, and everything needed for a full meal. Additionally, at Christmas we distributed 40 baskets with turkeys, new toys, and clothing for families in need.

A garage sale was held in December which raised \$1,265.00 for the Council's Building Fund. A Christmas party with Santa for children was held prior to the Council's Christmas party for members and wives later that evening. Both events were well attended.

In January, 2000, the Council erected 4,000 white crosses on the field adjacent to the church. The crosses represent the number of abortions committed in this country on a daily basis. The crosses are striking and dramatic and this is an on-going Council program.

Two membership drives were conducted during the year and ten new Knights were added to our ranks. We began a new program during Lent and sponsored a fish fry beginning on Ash Wednesday and on each Friday throughout the Lenten season. All proceeds are donated to the Parish's new Church Fund. Our new church (St. Charles Borromeo) will be dedicated on March 28, 2000. Brother Knights from our Council comprise about 90 % of the ushers in our Parish.

We had membership problems and problems filling officers positions this year: however, we still had a successful year. We had to suspend several people and could not fill a few officer positions. We had a better Christmas party than last year. At this party we had a potluck supper and we sang some Christmas songs. After the songs were over, we had a visit from Santa Clause. Santa gave out some candy canes to the children that were present. The children really enjoyed Santa. We had more people attend the party than we did last year.

GENERAL AGENT REPORT

Your Excellency Bishop Houck, Bishop Howze, Worthy State Deputy, State Chaplain, State Officers, Field Agents, Delegates, and Brother Knights, it is a genuine pleasure to be here with all of you today.

Progress in the '90s: During the decade of the '90s the K. C. jumped ahead in a number of ways. During 1995, charitable contributions topped \$105 million, and three years later (1998) they had jumped to \$110.7 million. In 1995 the members had given ,more than 50 million hours of volunteer service to the Catholic Church, community projects and youth programs. Three years later, this increased to 55 million hours.

A milestone was reached in 1996 when the amount of insurance issued amounted to more than \$4 billion when 88,455 policies were issued, pushing the total insurance in force to \$31.3 billion. By the end of 1999 this amount had climbed to \$38.2 billion, and the sales for that year totaled nearly \$4.3 billion. It is my honor to report the State Membership Activities for the past State Year (4-01-99 to 3-31-2000) and the Supreme Council Year from 7-01-1999 to 6 - 30 -2000.

My involvement began soon after the 1999 State Convention as State Deputy Elect, Bruce Pabon asked me to serve as the State Membership Director. I accepted my new responsibilities and immediately began to develop an action plan. The first activity was to assemble the membership information statistics from the 1998/99 Year. The previous State Director Larry Tabor was completing the last quarter of the Supreme Fraternal Year. I thank him for his assistance with the initial plans and through out the year.

The primary objective was to develop a membership team at the State Level that could effectively provide assistance to the District Deputies, Council Officers and Council Directors. After evaluating several options, I proposed a plan to the State Deputy, which changed the functional structure for the State positions of Membership Director, Retention Chairman, New Council Development, and Round Table Chairmen. Since all these positions are membership related and depend on each other for success or failure, why should not everyone at the State, District, and Council Level share the responsibility? Another primary consideration was to reduce the geographic area for travel while providing support to Districts and Councils. The State Deputy agreed with my plan and the new concept with a State Membership Director with three Regional Coordinators was developed. Each coordinator was assigned to an area consisting of four districts which provided a smaller geographic area in which to implement membership activities. Three dedicated and experienced knights, Bob Hudson, Denmis Riecke, and Don Cox accepted the challenge as Regional Coordinator in the North, Central and Southern Regions.

Now, that the structure was in place at the State Level, the next task was to introduce the new plan to the State Family at the Summer Meeting and to the Council Members at the Schools of Columbianism. To prepare for the meetings, new procedures had to be written, presentations and handouts developed for presentation by each Regional Coordinator and myself. The State Officers, District Deputies, Council Officers and Chairmen were presented with an information packet, which included promotional materials, membership analysis and a suggested program agenda for a Membership Prospect Orientation Meeting at each council. The program agenda required that Council Officers and Chairmen function as a team to conduct the Orientation Meeting. Some councils reported that the suggested agenda was used with success. Thank you for making it work. I hope more of you will implement a Prospect Orientation Meeting for prospective members in your council.

To make a successful implementation of any plan, two-way communication must occur between all team members. Using the Regional Concept, communication must occur between the Coordinators, District Deputies and Councils to properly conduct Membership Activities. Several methods of communication were used this year, including E-Mail on the Internet. The E-Mail messages worked great, but some had difficulty accessing analysis the report attachments to the E-Mail message. Hopefully, a common software solution can be determined or use of the State Web Page can be developed to provide access to the reports that are normally attached to the E-Mails. I challenge you to offer suggestions for improvement of E-Mail Communications and the successful use of the TEAM CONCEPT.

You have received several status reports during the past year. To provide a summary of activities for the State Year and a tool for the last quarter of the Supreme Year, an information packet has been provided for State Officers, District Deputies, and Delegates to this convention. The packet includes the following reports: State Year Membership Stats by council size, North, Central and Southern Regional Analysis, Supreme Year Membership Stats by council size and the Supreme Membership—Insurance

Progress Report. Please use this information to conclude the current year and plan your recruiting strategy for the next State and Supreme Years.

A review of the analysis reveals those councils who are to be congratulated and those who had Net Losses during the State Year. Please note that several councils with small net gain can achieve the Star Council Award by an excellent recruiting – insurance effort during the last quarter of the Supreme Year.

Retention efforts worked well in most councils. Only three councils had losses of ten or more members. The total losses during the State Year was 151 members. Each council should know the reason for the loss of each member and develop a plan to prevent losses. Congratulations to those councils who have a working Retention Program. Remember, the best Retention Program and Recruiting Tool is a strong Service Program.

New Council and Round Table Development did not produce any new units. Several locations provide an excellent opportunity for development and should be a high priority for the District Deputies and State Coordinators and Directors during the next year.

STATE PROGRAM DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The State program for 1999-2000 was essentially similar to those of the previous two years. At the mid-year mark, program reports were received from 33 of the 55 councils in the state. Unfortunately, the activity directors were unable to meet in one place and consequently, the reports with comments could not be distributed until after the mid-winter meetings. It was clear from the reports that were received, however, that many of the councils do not have a clear understanding of the difference between "special" and "other" programs.

At the end of the year, 38 councils submitted activity reports. (Two of the councils submitting mid-year reports failed to submit end of the year reports.) The program directors, the state membership director, and the previous program chair met in Jackson two weeks before the convention to review the submissions. These included the 38 program reports, as well as the nominations for best activities, Knight of the Year and Family of the Year. Each of these 38 councils received an award. STATE COUNCIL SERVICE PROGRAM AWARDS

Best Pro-Life Project: Abortion Crosses, Council 6872, Oscar J. Gelpi, Picayune

On the field adjacent to the church the brother Knights erected 4,000 white crosses representing the number of abortions committed in this country on a daily basis. The crosses are striking and dramatic to those who realize what they represent. Some people protest the statement they make; others leave flowers by the crosses perhaps in memory of an unborn child killed by abortion. Additionally a sign is displayed supporting our Lifeline Program that provides a 24-hour local telephone hotline that any pregnant young girl may call for help. We have done this project for several years and the crosses are stored in Father Noone's garage when not in use. Each year they are trucked to the side and erected. There is a competition between grand Knights to see who can erect the straightest lines with each cross exactly spaced. The tools are simple, iron divots to make holes, mallets and several lengths of clothesline rope equally marked for proper spacing. To erect this number of crosses takes time and when they are picked up they are trucked back to Father Noone's garage for storage until next year. It takes three days to erect the crosses and two days to take them down. Overall this is a very simple, but dramatic project and it deserves your attention.

Second Place, Pro-Life: Memorial Monument, Council 898, Vicksburg

Several years ago, in an effort to increase our visibility in a stand against abortion, we planned, designed, raised funds for and constructed a Memorial for the Innocent Victims of Abortion on a lot in the city cemetery facing one of the busiest streets in the city. After the monument was dedicated, we pledged to hold a memorial every year on the Saturday closest to the anniversary of the Row vs Wade Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion.

We decided to do something slightly different this year. In all previous years, we held the ceremony at the site of the monument, but the weather in January is unpredictable at best, and the crowds had dwindled over the past few years. Therefore, we decided to move indoors and hold a reception afterward. It proved to be a wise decision. Our attendance increased by nearly six times, to an all time high of more than 30 people. These included Knights, Ladies, religious, children and families. Prayed the Rosary at our church, with a Knight leading each decade. The reception held immediately afterward featured hot chocolate, soft drinks, and cookies. Although this memorial was not lengthy, it did have an effect on everyone in attendance. We will continue this remembrance every year until the law is changed. It's the least that we can do to visibly show our opposition to this atrocity.

Best Vocations Project: Vocation Prayers, Council 802, Msgr. John J. Burns, Meridian

The phrase "Vocations are Everybody's Business" is taken very seriously by the members of our Council. We participate in the RSVP program sponsored by the Supreme Council through our monetary support of two different seminarians. We also pray for the two seminarians from our council at every meeting. However, the main part of our program involves getting members of our parish involved in praying for vocations. Each week we pass a statue of the Sacred Heart from one family to another and the family who receives the statue agrees to pray for vocations each and every day that they have the statue. We believe that no prayer goes unanswered and we further believe that the vocations crisis is being brought to the forefront in our parish because of the impact of this particular program.

Second Place, Vocations Project: Pancake Breakfast, Council 2180, Laurel

The vocation director approached us in August 1997, about helping two seminarians with a monthly stipend. Our council was to give whatever amount they felt they could afford. After deep prayer and consultations with our executive committee, we decided to bring it before the membership of the council to give fifty dollars a month to each seminarian. After further discussion at a council meeting, it was decided that we would have a monthly pancake breakfast after the nine o'clock mass on the first Sunday of the month with the proceeds going to the two seminarians. This breakfast would allow us to subside each one of the seminarians with one hundred dollars a month. This is an ongoing project. As one seminarian graduates another one is adopted by our council. This had been a very rewarding project. It could not be accomplished without the full support of our church family.

Best Church Activity: Good Friday Event, Council 802, Msgr. John J. Burns, Meridian

As the Best Church Activity from our Council, we submit our participation in the planning and conduct of "The Way of the Cross - The Way of Peace". This city wide ecumenical project is held on Good Friday and consists of ten stations throughout the city. The Knights of Columbus are responsible for

acting out one of these ten stations as well as for supplying water at the water stops, serving as co-directors on the planning committee, proper stationing of amplification equipment, and promotion of the event. Our involvement in this event stretches over a four-month period and involves a large number of our members. As a result of our involvement our Council has received front-page coverage in our local paper in Mississippi TODAY, and on the radio and TV stations.

We are pleased with our participation in this event. We pray that through it we will help in fostering a deeper belief in what Jesus Christ did for all of us on that first Good Friday.

Second Place, Church Activity: Mission Breakfast, Council 898, Vicksburg

From 8:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. on the third Sunday of the month from September through April (in May it's the second Sunday in honor of Mother's Day), our Council prepares a benefit breakfast with the proceeds earmarked for the Diocesan mission in Saltillo, Mexico. This is a long-standing project, begun by a late past Grand Knight, and now chaired by his right-hand man of many years. Our chairman arrives at 5:00 a.m. to

begin his preparations, and waits for the rest of his kitchen and dining room crew to arrive at 6:00 a.m. The all-you-can-eat meal consists of pancakes, hash browns, grits, ham, and two kinds of sausage, biscuits, and gravy all for \$3 per person with a maximum of \$12 per family. Some of the crewmembers have changed through the years, but the price has remained the same and quality of the food has remained high.

changed through the years, but the price has remained the same and quality of the food has remained high.

These breakfasts have allowed us to donate over \$1000 to the mission for the past several years, which they have used to build many homes for the poor of Mexico. It is continuing to grow in popularity, and has turned the Council Home into a popular gathering place for families after Sunday Mass. This is a fun event for us to do, and a wonderful way for us to support the diocese.

Best Community Service Project: Love Thy Neighbor, Council 8285, St. Therese, Jackson

The Strategic Planning Committee of the parish, whose members included brother Knights, conducted a parish wide survey. The purpose of the survey was to collect data about how to meet the needs of members of the parish community, especially the poor, elderly, shut-ins and the disabled. The community that is served by members of the Knights of Columbus Council has a very large population of disadvantaged people. Data from the survey indicated that the needs of these individuals were not being met.

At the beginning of the Columbian year, Brother Knights passed a motion to establish a standing committee of the council to be known as the <u>Outreach Committee for Community Service</u>. Seven Brother Knights agreed to serve on the committee and they met with the pastor of the parish, a brother Knight and Chaplain of the Council, to establish the mission, goals and objectives of the committee. At the next meeting of the Council, member Knights unanimously passed a motion accepting the founding organization, purpose and objectives of the committee. The mission of the Outreach Committee is to: "provide service to the disadvantaged and needy persons of the parish community without regard to race or creed at no cost to the recipient of the service and, to maintain strict confidentiality of the persons being served by the Knights of Columbus".

Since the establishment of the Committee, Brother Knights have provided the following services and, continue to provide to members of the parish community without cost to the parish or the recipient:

Twenty-five visits were made by brother Knights to make electrical or plumbing repairs at homes or apartments of local residents.

Fifteen visits were made by brother Knights to provide lawn and raking of leaves for residents.

One adoption of a disabled family was made providing nine monthly contributions of canned goods, toilet articles, and kitchen utensils to be used by the family.

Five visits by brother Knights to repair or replace broken windows.

Ten visits were made by brother Knights to assist roof damage and to serve as advocates for the families to city and county agencies to secure repair work.

Brother Knights continue to provide needed services to the residents of this parish community. When the Pastor or the Pastoral Associate identifies the needs of the residents the Knights are call into action. The dedication of our brother Knights to serve the disadvantaged, elderly, shut-in and neglected people of our parish and continues to be an inspiration to all brother Knights of the council. No recognition is given to any brother Knight for the work that they so. They know that charitable works and service should be between them and our Savior. Christ Jesus.

Second Place, Community Service Project: Challenged League Softball, Council 10901, St. John, Oxford

The Council financially sponsored a team as well as participated with the team in a handicapped softball league. The team members came from group homes as well as large institutions for the mentally handicapped. Council members participated in the games by assisting the fielders, running with the batters, pitching, and passing out lots of 'high fives'. The handicapped players were very pleased with the individualized attention they received from the Knights during the games. There was essentially one Knight helping out each player in the field. The players were very proud of themselves. This is among the most rewarding activities that we have done as a council in the past five years.

Best Council Activity Project: Membership Drive, Council 10216, St. Paul, Brandon

We recently completed our spring membership drive to coincide with Jubilee 2000 membership. The results of this effort was our most successful campaign ever, gaining for us eight new brothers and one inactive member rejoining the council. This amounts to a 15% gain in one major effort. We began our membership drive by having key members of our council attend the K of C Mid-Winter Meetings. At that program we were not only given facts concerning the need for new members we were also aided by helpful hints and suggestions to light the fire of recruitment.

After the Mid-Winter Meetings the Grand Knight of our council and the Membership Chairman got together and planned the membership drive that centered around one-on-one recruiting involving many brother Knights rather than using just one or two brothers that had been successful recruiters in the past. The focal point of this campaign was to be a membership dinner held at the church to inform all prospects about the Knights of Columbus.

This plan with specific dates was presented to the council at the next meeting. It was voted on and a six-man membership committee was named. Later that week the membership committee met in the home of the chairman and decided to split up the parish directory as a starting place for recruitment. Each committee member and the chairman agreed to personally contact prospects and focus on at least 10 potential new members each. A list of prospects was compiled and returned to the membership chairman for further processing. The membership chairman then took the list of prospects to our pastor for his approval. We wanted to be sure our recruits would pass the test as practical Catholics. Each member of the committee was then returned his adjusted list and he then invited each of his prospects to the membership chairman again outlining the purpose of the dinner and further inviting each prospect to come.

Our Grand Knight contacted our District Deputy, State Membership Region Coordinator and our Pastor to ask then to attend the membership dinner. He also coordinated the membership of our council to insure that a large group of active brothers were in attendance.

The evening of the dinner was at hand. The membership chairman had assigned brother Knights to pick up prospects and bring them to the dinner. The usual last minute cancellations occurred but we expected a good crowd.

After a prayer we started the meeting with an excellent Bar-B-Q buffet. Brother Knights mingled with our prospects and we got to know each other. A short film on the life of our founder Mr. McGivney was shown to the group. Each prospect was asked to introduce themselves and our brother Knights did the same. The Grand Knight, the District Deputy, the State Membership Region Coordinator, our Pastor, and the Council Membership Chairman each gave a short presentation concerning our order. We then asked our guests to join the Knights of Columbus and fill out a form 100.

We have already discussed the fruits of our labor as far as new members are concerned. This project involved 60% of our active brothers and over 100 man-hours were spent. It was a wonderful success for ourselves, our council and for the Knights of Columbus.

The membership committee also gained a great new working list of prospects that were unable to attend this membership dinner for one reason or another.

Second Place, Council Activity Project: Cooking Team, Council 9543, St. Francis of Assisi, Madison Members of our council formed a KC Cooking Team this year. It has provided services for many various projects over the past year. Many of the projects were fundraisers for our council where the Cooking Team cooked and catered parties for local businesses or events. One of the first projects the Cooking Team undertook was to provide meals at a sponsor's tent for Sky Parade for four (Fri-Mon) days. Other projects include cooking for business Christmas parties or employee appreciation dinners and for individual wedding receptions.

All of the projects done by the KC Cooking Team were not fundraisers. The cooking Team donated their services to the local Catholic High School for various projects. Our council cooked hamburgers, hotdogs, chicken sandwiches, and French fries, which were served in the concession stand for

more than a dozen high school football and basketball games. We also cooked for the annual Catholic High School fundraising drawdown. Pork tenderloins, steamship roasts, chicken tenders, seafood gumbo over rice, pasta and potatoes were all prepared and served to over 700 people at the drawdown.

The KC Cooking Team also provided their services to help out Catholic Charities at their annual fundraising drawdown. A similar menu was prepared for the catholic charities drawdown that was attended by approximately 800 people. Two council members who own a local liquor store donated the wine and beverages served at each of the drawdowns.

The council also organized and prepared the food for the annual parish Cajun Fest. Sausage poboys, crawfish ettoufee, boudin, bar-b-que ribs, and seafood gumbo were among the menu items that were served at the Cajun Fest. Food was served to about 5,000 people at the Cajun Fest this past year. In addition, our council assisted with the local Catholic elementary school's annual Funfest Fundraiser. The KC Cooking Team cooked approximately 600 hamburgers for Funfest this year.

The Cooking Team also assisted the local Boy Scout Council by helping cook over 1,000 chicken dinners that were sold by the Boy Scouts as part of a major annual fundraiser for the Scouts.

The cooking Team has been an invaluable recruiting tool for our council. We have had men want to join the KC's just to help out with the Cooking Team. The public relations benefits that the Cooking Team generates has also been fantastic.

Best Family Activity Project: Monthly Family Breakfast, Council 10216, St. Paul, Brandon

As a council, we are trying to find a way that families of the parish could get together to meet each other and engage in parish fellowship. Our entire church membership seems to be on the go so much; we very seldom get the opportunity to sit down and enjoy a meal together. Several years ago we decided to start a monthly family breakfast that would accomplish this goal.

Our goals were to offer a good and nutritious breakfast and to keep the charges as low as possible. This will enable every parish member and family the opportunity to attend and enjoy the breakfast without high expense. We accomplished this by having a very dedicated and cost-conscience Knight in charge of procuring our supplies. His shopping ability combined with his negotiating skills with local grocery outlets enabled us to keep our price per plate to \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children. Our breakfast chairman is also a very organized individual who would call each member to make sure the breakfast event was staffed well enough to guarantee a quality breakfast that was enjoyable to all. Consequently, even though we start at 7:00 a.m. and finish by 12:30 p.m., there are plenty of fellow Knights to spread the work around.

We have now fine-tuned our monthly project to include special products to reflect the season. The highlight of our family breakfast project is the annual Mother's Day Breakfast. During this meal all mothers eat free. There are also waiters dressed in tuxedos. We serve a special menu that includes eggs benedict served with sparkling champagne.

This project has been so successful that our Pastor promotes it during the Sunday church service. He tells us it is a great help in meeting new parishioners. Also, we have form 100's ready to sign up new members. We have heard several comments from parishioners who have met people who have moved in from the same part of the country or even the same town but wouldn't have know then had it not been for this event. Our breakfast was designed to get everyone together as a family. Our records show that we will consistently serve 124 - 150 plates each month. I believe we have accomplished our goal and much more. The only complaint we receive is from families who ask us to have the breakfast every Sunday instead of only once a month!

Second Place, Family Activity Project: Family Campout, Council 9543, St. Francis of Assisi, Madison

Each year our council hosts a family campout with an outdoor mass and pig roast. This year, the campout was a huge success. A member of the council owns some land out in the country that makes for an ideal location for a campout. A whole pig was bought and was placed on the grill on Friday night so that is could cook all night Friday and all day Saturday. Families arrived throughout the day on Saturday and set up their tents around a common area that included a campfire. A pond is located on the property that provided several Knights and their children the opportunity to go fishing. Rides were given on 4-wheel all-terrain vehicles while others enjoyed relaxing in a hammock. A mounted telescope provided a great view of several celestial bodies. Saturday evening, a candlelight rosary was said for the council's deceased brothers and their widows were invited to participate in the memorial rosary. After the rosary, the parish priest celebrated an ou6door mass that was attended by over 50 Knights and their family members and potential Knights and their families. In total, over 250 people enjoyed the evening's activities. After mass, the pig was pulled and dinner was served with all the trimmings. A big pot of

seafood gumbo added to the selection of food prepared for the meal. Hotdogs, marshmallows and other food were roasted over the campfire and many stories were told on into the wee hours of the night. Breakfast, consisting of eggs, sausage, doughnuts, orange juice coffee, grits, and other food items were served in the morning before everyone packed up and went home. This was a great family activity because the wives had an opportunity to meet and socialize with other KC wives, the kids had an opportunity to meet and play with other KC kids and the Knights had an opportunity to fellowship with other Knights. It also reinforced the council's commitment to the widows of our deceased brothers. Potential new KC members and former members were invited and attended the campout. This is an activity that many Knights look forward to each year.

Second Place, Family Activity Project: Christmas Party, Council 1034, Bishop R. O. Gerow, Natchez

Our annual family Christmas party covers two days. We start by gathering at our council hall with our families and go as a group to the community caroling in the park. After a few hours of caroling it is back to the council hall for coffee and hot chocolate. When everyone has warmed up we start decorating the hall and tree for our Christmas party the next day. Everyone from the smallest child to the oldest adult gets to put something on the tree. When the halls are decked with balls of holly, everyone rushes home in hopes that St. Nick will soon be there.

Parents drop the child's gift off at the council hall early in the day and put it in Santa's special box. When the children arrive everyone is fed sloppy joes, chips and ice cream. The older children then get out the bingo set and lead everyone in bingo games where the winner of each game gets a new silver dollar. The children hear sirens and rush to the windows to see Santa arriving in a red fire truck with one of his trusty elves with him. Santa arrives in the council hall to the screams of kids and adults alike. After greeting everyone he sits on his throne with his elf handling him the toys for all the good little girls and boys. One by one they sit on Santa's knee to receive their gift and tell Santa what else they want for Christmas. Santa must then be on his way again so on his way out you here him say Merry Christmas to all and to all a good "Knight". Everyone then leaves with visions of sugarplums dancing in their heads.

Best Youth Activity: Hospital Christmas, Council 802, Msgr. John J. Burns, Meridian

Christmas is a very special time especially for children. But for those children who have suffered some type of physical setback. Christmas can be a very lonely time. The Knights took it upon themselves to ensure that these less physically fortunate children realize that there is a Santa Clause and that he visits those children who are in hospital as well as those who are safely tucked in at home.

On Christmas Eve, the Knights gathered at the Council home to wrap gifts that had been purchased for each child in the three major hospitals that serve our community. After the wrapping was completed, the members started their rounds with Santa coming along with his helper (both dressed properly for the occasion). Singing Christmas songs as we went, we visited each and every child who was hospitalized and presented them with a stuffed animal (to avoid an possibility of injury). The bright eyes and smiling faces only made this task that much more pleasant and enjoyable. The local television station covered our visit. It is interesting to note that the majority of the children who we visited were not Catholic and this brought additional thank you's from the parents when the realized that this bunch of Catholic men were out spreading a very real brand of good cheer.

Santa was the recipient of a number of hugs and kisses from some very excited children and some parents breathed a little easier when they saw their children perk up after our visit. Father McGivney must have been watching and smiling as he saw the happiness on the faces of these children. The Knights who attended all agreed that we received much more than we gave!

Second Place, Youth Activity Project: Scouts, Council 10216, St. Paul, Brandon

The purpose of Scouting is to set the feet of boys, ages 7-18, on the right path to man hood. By example of their leaders and the lessons of the Scouting program that teaches skill, virtue and self-reliance. Scout oath says it all, "Duty to God and country, duty to others, and duty to one's self".

The Scouting Program is a complex project encompassing a wide variety of smaller projects. Each year a new group of wide-eyed, shining faces take their 1st step on their trail to Eagle. Another small group that accepted and met the Eagle challenge have turned into a fine group of young men. They make you so proud; people could mistake them for your own sons.

What nobler reason to put in so many hours of dedicated service, to get volunteers from the council to raise money, to teach a merit badge class or to be a mentor for someone working to earn their religious medal?

The scouting schedule is full. Every Monday night we have a meeting and once a month a 3-day

camp out. Once a year we offer a 7-14 day summer camp. Twice a year a district camporee is held. Boys and leaders from across the state come together to discuss new ideas and problems. The National Jamboree is held every four years and lasts ten days. Thousands of boys from the United States participate as well as visitors from other countries. We took 35 boys to the last National Jamboree in Washington, D.C. They heard President Clinton speak and spent three days touring our nation's capitol. The World Jamboree was held in Santiago, Chile and was represented by scouts from around the globe.

There are also high adventure camps such as the Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico, Last summer eight boys and three adults from our group spent two weeks backpacking in the high mountains. We covered approximately 90 miles of wilderness trails encountering wildlife such as deer, elk, black bear, and mountain lions. The well being of our 11-man team depended on teamwork and putting the groups needs ahead of any personal needs. We trained a year in advance to prepare ourselves mentally and physically. It was a challenge for boys and adults alike, but the bonds of friendship overshadowed the hardships. That is what scouting is all about.

In order to advance in rank, community service hours must be earned. The majority of projects are done on church grounds. This year alone, we have built picnic tables, flower beds, kneeling benches, painted Sunday School rooms, cleaned underbrush and drainage ditches, built nature trails, built shelves in storage closets and had food drives for the poor.

I could go on for there is no shortage of things to do with the Scouts or reasons for working with the program. It is no coincidence that 11 of the 12 astronauts who have walked on the moon were scouts. If your council is not working with a scouting group, it is a worthwhile project to consider. Our Council supports Scouting efforts and individual members contribute time and hours to assure it is a

This council has not had a priest at their meetings in years. Since the priest has been attending these meetings the membership has had a big turn around. The priest has given the Knights of Columbus a big "P.R." from the pulpit after each mass.

This fine Brother Knight organized memorial services in our council home for our deceased brothers.

He has organized a fifth social for members and their wives, which have been a tremendous success.

He coordinated with the priest at church for the Marian Hour of Prayer for the parishes. He also helps the priest with a spaghetti dinner for the priest of the diocese, and the parish fairs that are held annually.

This Knight organized the children's Christmas party for the Knights of Columbus family and the parish. He spends many hours in planning this with the help of the ladies' auxiliary.

If a list of our council's activities could accompany this nomination, you would find it hard to believe the other work that this man has accomplished for the good of our order.

Incidentally, he does hold down a full time job.

Our council has never seen one person give so much of himself to the Knights of Columbus. Because of his efforts, our council is what it is today. Perhaps this council will vote unanimously to elect him as our Knight of the Year.

This family also leads the liturgy commission in the Parish. They have faithfully done both of these duties for many years. The pizza party is often the first social contact new parishioners have with the Parish. Generations of hungry and poor college students have passed through this pizza party. The family has maintained this tradition while caring for an elderly parent in a Christian manner in their home. This family has nine children, biological and adopted. These special people have many more unofficially adopted college students. Their love of the Church draws people to them. The Knight and his family run our Council's Tootsie Roll program. This family cooks supper for the Catholic Student Association every Tuesday night. In addition this family has participated in cooking for the Parish School of Religion. The Knight is in charge of grilling fish each Friday during Lent. This Knight and his family have continued these activities despite his being 70 years old and having diabetes. This family runs a pizza booth at our parish fair, another labor-intensive task. Cactus for the Lenten display are raised and donated by this family. The wife has been actively engaged at developing social activities for children in the Parish in the past year. This family heads our Knights of Columbus World Family Day Picnic held in August. This family faithfully participates in all Knights events such as the Marion Hour of Prayer. The Knights provide a free cookout to the Parish to celebrate the start of the school year.

Special consideration to this families' candidacy should be given based on the fact that they have not merely participated in the numerous activities mentioned above, but rather they have led most of these activities. It is almost unbelievable that a family could be involved in so many substantial activities without knowing them personally. It is their complete and total dedication of their lives to Christ and his Catholic Church that makes their accomplishments possible. This Knight and his wife are retired now. One

could say that this is the reason they have time to be so involved in the Knights of Columbus and their church. However, this special family has always been involved in these activities. The wife worked at a city school for severely handicapped children for many years. She taught the classroom with the most severely handicapped children in the school. The Knight was chairman of an academic department for many years. He is also the founding Grand Knight for our council.

This family deserves the Mississippi State Family of the Year Award for their activities with the RCIA program. Liturgy Commission, church service, pizza party Tootsie Roll Program, Catholic Student Association and pizza booth. They exhibit total dedication to each of these programs. Financial Secretaries Meeting Report

The Financial Secretaries meeting was attended by fifteen financial secretaries including myself as Chairman. Additionally, Robert J. Lane, our guest from Supreme, also sat in on our meeting, the discussion and took lots of notes.

I opened the meeting with some personal comments about what I felt was the major role the Financial Secretary plays in a council, besides keeping the financial and membership records of the council. This is retention, retention as it relates to suspensions and how the delinquent records are shared with the Grand Knight. The Financial Secretary must keep the Grand Knight informed of the status of possible suspensions and secure the Grand Knight's approval prior to sending suspension notices. Keeping in mind that all proper procedures were followed to personally contact the delinquent knight. The District Deputy should also be informed as to the status of any possible suspensions prior to any notice being sent. The Retention Committee plays a major role in follow-up on delinquent members prior to suspension notices being sent to those knights.

There was a lot of discussion about the Financial Secretaries Personal Computer program (FSPC). The Windows program is now available and being used by many councils. Some bugs still remain but generally the program is working fine.

Discussion about proper training of new Financial Secretaries is an ongoing concern. It was recommended by the groups in attendance that a Financial Secretary training session be incorporated into the Schools of Columbianism or at a time shortly there after to familiarize new (and old) Financial Secretaries about how to better do their job.

Proper billing procedure was discussed and it was noted that we should not allow a knight to drag out dues payment for a year or more. Follow up with your knights proposer, and Retention Committee. As noted earlier – use the proper contacts and you will save many men.

Request a copy of former members at least annually from Supreme. Circulate this information to the Grand Knights and membership Directors. These lists will produce new knights for your councils.

The Financial Secretary in your council is a "key" player in your council. Choose him wisely, hold him accountable, and the Financial Secretaries should also hold their councils accountable – Financial, Retention and proper suspension procedures.

Lastly, ask another man to become a Knight of Columbus.

- 1. The committee commends the host council (7120 Southaven) for their excellent support and service in this year's convention. Twelve dedicated men organized a superb convention.
- 2. The committee also commends Ken Lubbers for this morning's Mass preparations. In addition, the young altar servers did this convention and the Mass celebrants an honorable service.
- The committee requests, if at all possible, to prepare and make available a "lessons learned" convention report and furnish it to the 2001 (Gulf coast) and 2002 (Hattiesburg) convention chairs.
- 4. The committee realizes solicitation of convention program ads is the sole responsibility of the host council. However, all councils in the Mississippi Jurisdiction are encouraged, if not obliged, to support host council requests for program ads. The committee also agrees that working with current registration fees is indeed a challenge and provides a host council the opportunity to test their ability to do their best to meet the expectation of the convention delegates.
- 5. The convention chair and co-chair for the 2001 state convention to be held at the Holiday Inn Coliseum in Biloxi provided the following information to the committee:
- a. Since 1997, the last year the convention was held in Biloxi, over 7800 additional hotel rooms were added on the coast. The casino attractions on the Mississippi Gulf Coast have a major impact on the local tourism industry. Hotel room rates have steadily increased based on supply and demand. Negotiations are still under way to contract the lowest possible room rates for April 2001.
- b. 2001 Convention packets will be available at the Schools of Columbianism in July 2000.
 - c. Hospitably rooms will be centrally located near the hotel's pool.
- d. Two hotels will be available for the 2001 convention, the Holiday Inn Coliseum and the Holiday Inn Express, which is next door.
- 6. The convention committee concluded its meeting at 2:45pm.

Brother Knights:

The Knights of Columbus in Mississippi have had another successful year in the raising of funds for mentally handicapped citizens in Mississippi. The donated funds will impact over 75,000 mentally handicapped persons in this state.

We want to thank each and every Knight, their families, friends of the Knights of Columbus, the Miss. Assoc. for Retarded Citizens and the people of our communities across the state for all their hard work in helping those less fortunate. Our collections this year were \$97,786 with about 80% of our councils participating.

We want to recognize the councils making outstanding contributions this year. The council with the largest net donation is Tupelo council # 8848 and the council with the highest net donation per member is Columbia / Tylertown council # 1}956.

The Mississippi State Council Officers and Past State Deputies make up the Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus Foundation of Mississippi, Inc. As State Chairman, I assist the State Deputy who serves as the President of the Foundation.

The 2000 state program was introduced and the program booklets were distributed at the Midwinter meetings in January. These booklets should already be in the hands of the local chairman for this year's drive and planning for the drive should be almost complete.

One thing I would ask of our membership is that they visit the local agencies receiving our funds and see how our contributions have helped that organization. if you needed any encouragement in pushing this program I am sure that would be enough. Also if your council is one of the ones that did not participate in 1999 please consider doing so in 2000.

This year we ask you to use the week of May 15th through May 21st to collect for the drive. The first part of the week is set aside for business donations and the weekend for the city-wide drive. Our insurance for workers collecting during this drive will be in effect on Friday, May 19th and Saturday, May 20th.

75% of the proceeds sent in will be returned to the local councils with 25% being set aside for distribution by the State Foundation.

All moines less the cost of Tootsie Rolls should be forwarded to the State Chairman as soon as possible after the drive. Billing for Tootsie Rolls and aprons will be sent to the ordering council. This bill should be paid by using receipts from the drive. Each district deputy is responsible for placing orders for the councils in his district.

Additional audit and accounting and M.R Disbursement forms are available today in case your council did not get a copy. Once your funds are received a check will be written for your share of the proceeds. Since the check requires two signatures there is some turnaround in our getting your check processed. Good luck to each council in this year's drive!

REMARKS TO MISSISSIPPI STATE COUNCIL CONVENTION APRIL 29, 2000

ROBERT J. LANE Assistant Supreme Secretary, Knights of Columbus

It's a pleasure for my wife and me to be here in Mississippi for your 96th Annual State Council Meeting. We look forward to traveling to state council meetings each year. Last year we were in Arkansas. Wherever we go, everyone is warm, friendly and hospitable, continually forming a constant reminder with us of who the folks are that are "the Knights of Columbus." We in New Haven are very mindful of this!

These are historical times and each one of us is fortunate to be alive as witnesses in the closing of one millennium and the opening of another in this Great Jubilee year, a new dawning, if you will.

Today, I'd like to touch upon the business of the Supreme Council during this past year under a series of categories.

- Y2K
- 1999 Performance
- Mississippi Performance
- Products
- · System and Billing Improvements
- Museum
- Father McGivney
- Pride

<u>Y2K</u>

The Order took great precaution in preparing for Y2K investing substantial financial and human resources to ensure a successful transition to the year 2000. It is now history and history will record it as uneventful, but only because of a tremendous amount of preparation and contingency planning on the part of our Supreme Officers and staff.

1999 Performance

Best's and Standard & Poor's continue to rate the Order's claims-paying ability with their highest ratings, something that few other life and annuity insurers can point to, (but your Order can). I'm not going to bore you with an unending stream of figures and statistics, but I do want to mention that as of December 31, 1999, assets have reached an all-time high of \$8.064 billion as did our certificate holder dividend payout in the amount of \$252.7 million. In addition, we have a surplus ratio of 1.177, that is \$1.18 in assets for each dollar of liabilities.

1999 also witnessed important management changes. Carl A. Anderson succeeded Charles P. Riesbeck, Jr. as Supreme Secretary and Pat A. Cipollone succeeded Ricardo H. Garcia as Supreme Advocate. As you may or may not know, I've been around a long time (46 years in June) at the Supreme Council office, so I've seen many changes over the years. I've worked under Luke E. Hart, John W. McDevitt and Virgil C. Dechant as Supreme Knights and seven Supreme Secretaries. The Order has been blessed with outstanding leaders.

Mississippi Performance

I was pleased to note that in 1998, (1999 figures are not yet compiled) Mississippi distinguished itself in several areas. Supreme Council records indicate that:

- \$410,690 was contributed to charitable causes, an average of \$70.74 per member;
- 32,383 visits were made to the sick and bereaved with 43,925 hours of commitment involved;
- 314,762 hours of community service was provided, and
- 1,851 blood donors were recorded.

All remarkable achievements for which you are to be commended.

Also on a positive note, at last glance, in a jurisdiction of 55 councils, all of your councils are in good standing with none suspended and only 6 (10%) failing to file audit reports that were due as of February 15, 2000.

Since July 1, 2000, Mississippi membership reflects a net gain of 89 members as of April 1, 2000 (four successive net increases) after net increases of 228, 87 and 158 the previous three years. However, everyone needs to get behind the recruitment efforts of the State Deputy with two months remaining in the fraternal year in order to achieve the best increase possible. Of concern, however, are some other matters that I feel obligated to mention. Telltale signs that some of your councils may be experiencing problems, (though suspension is not one of them), indicates that in 1999-2000, eight councils have not initiated at least one member, compared to five councils the previous year. In addition, ten have not submitted Form 365 and four have not submitted Form 185. All in all, 12 councils, or 25%, have failed to submit one form or another with five of the twelve not submitting five different reports. These statistics should be viewed as trouble signs that need follow-up and assistance where necessary in order to avoid the possibility of a council becoming inactive.

Products

The Order introduced its Long Term Care Product earlier this year to round out its portfolio of life and annuity products. From the number of applications we've already received, it is apparent that interest is high and we think that the plans and options we have available will be very successful and competitive in the marketplace. You know, we're not like the commercial giants that have gone the route of forming financial services conglomerates. We've stayed with Father McGivney's vision of what the Knights of Columbus should be: "protector of widows and orphans." However, we've taken it a step further by offering protection to families by insuring wives and children as well. I'm sure Henry Mosco, an old acquaintance of mine while I served as Insurance Coordinator and Vice President of Insurance Services, and his capable staff would be pleased to discuss Long Term Care or any other product the Order offers for that matter, whenever it is convenient for you to do so.

System and Billing Improvements

The long-awaited Windows Version of FSPC was released at the end of 1999 and with the exception of a few "bugs" that were called to our attention, it has been well received. To date, roughly 3,000 financial secretaries now have it and the number requesting it is growing each day.

We have also begun working on the Council Billing Statement with several improvements in mind that, hopefully, will make the statement more informative and user friendly. The statement will include a scanable-billing stub that will enable us to automatically process all payments that are made paid as billed. Look for it to be introduced by the end of 2000.

Museum

Two weeks ago we had a major press conference to announce the Order's new Knights of Columbus Museum. As I understand it, USA Today considered it the feature news item in Connecticut for that day. Work on the museum has been accelerating recently with a preliminary fall opening planned assuming all goes well. The New Haven Register, our local newspaper, described the announcement as follows in a recent editorial:

K of C gives lift to city's culture New museum also will save architectural attraction

Thanks to the Knights of Columbus, perhaps the quietest of the community's major pillars, another feather is being added to New Haven's cultural crown.

The Knights' investment of \$10 million in its new museum not only gives the city another tourist magnet, it also will preserve one of the city's notable examples of modern architecture, the concrete and glass edifice at 1 Community Services Building.

The museum plan long has been in the works, but the renovations are now under way and Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechant only recently announced the details. The 77,000 square foot museum will display items from the K of C's collections of fine and decorative arts, plus archival material. There will be a theater, space for touring exhibitions, and there will be no admission charge when it opens in the fall.

New Haven's arts and entertainment offerings are the primary lure for more than 2 million visitors who come here annually, and the Knights' offerings should reinforce a reputation that already has been firmly established by the city's theatrical spaces and fine arts, music, manuscript and natural history museums.

The K of C, an international Roman Catholic fraternal organization, has been a key New Haven institution since its founding in 1882 by the Rev. Michael J. McGivney. Although rarely a newsmaker, its insurance business is one of the city's largest employers, and its towering 1967 headquarters is a landmark.

The Knights took an interest in the building as a museum site and bought it in 1994. In the process of meeting its own needs, the Knights of Columbus has again extended its record of contributions to the welfare of its home city, which is thankful.

Once opened, visitors like yourselves will have an opportunity to see three sites: St. Mary's Church, where Father McGivney's remains are interred; the Supreme Council office; and now the Museum.

Father McGivney

Speaking of our founder, his cause for Sainthood is moving forward. I had the pleasure of being present for the closing of the Archdiocesan phase of the Investigation of the Life and Virtue of Father McGivney by the Tribunal Commission appointed by Archbishop Cronin of Hartford. All of the papers that had been assembled during the investigation were packaged and sealed during the ceremony and delivered by the Postulator, Father Gabriel O'Donnell, to the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints. Just last week an Associated Press release said that the Vatican had released an announcement that the papers were found to be in order and that Father O'Donnell could proceed to write a biography of Father McGivney's journey through life.

That brings me to another subject involving the Cause - the Father McGivney Guild. It is very important that the Order demonstrate a groundswell level of support for the Cause. You are urged, therefore, to fill out a Guild membership application and encourage others to do so as well (they don't have to be Knights). Your membership in the Order does not and cannot, according to the norms of the Vatican, automatically create Guild membership. Application forms appear regularly in COLUMBIA and Knightline, but I've brought some with me to make it convenient for you to join and I left them in the registration area for you to use. It doesn't cost anything, unless you are of the mind and means to contribute something (it doesn't have to be much). All contributions will be used by the Guild toward the costs associated with beatification and canonization, please God, should that occur. Urge your friends to join as well as we build a guild of devotion to our Founder.

Pride

We can all take pride as Knights in the recent Pilgrimage to the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. It was a spectacular moment in the Order's history as you heard yesterday from Norman MacDonald. More on that this evening at the banquet. Also on the list of the Order's proud moments is the worldwide broadcast of the opening of the Holy Year Door by the Holy Father in the Maderno Atrium of St. Peter's Basilica on Christmas Eve 1999 that was broadcast by EWTN and paid for by the Order. Your Order also paid the cost of renovating the doors and the Atrium itself as a reaffirmation of our love devotion to the Holy See and the Holy Father. A plaque displayed in the Atrium identifies the Knights of Columbus as benefactor. You can take justifiable pride in this endeavor as a member of our beloved Order in this project.

I could go on and on with more 1999 accomplishments, but I've already taken enough of your valuable time, so thank you for listening and thank you for your patience in permitting me to bring you up to date on matters of mutual interest.

In short, it was one of the shining moments for me in the 118 years of the Knights of Columbus existence. It was a spectacular day that occurred as part of a Board of Directors meeting that began on Thursday evening, March 30th and ended Sunday morning, April 2nd. But that Saturday was entirely devoted to the Pilgrimage.

For my wife and me, the day began with our arrival at the Shrine by bus from our hotel at approximately 10:00 a.m., only to witness some 200 odd buses already there along with members and their families from all over the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Philippines. At 10:30 a.m., we had the pleasure of processing through the Holy Year Door at the main entrance of the Basilica and on to the sanctuary of the main altar where we were seated along with the Board of Directors, State Deputies, the hierarchy

and the family of Cardinal Hickey who, later that day, would receive the highest award of the Knights of Columbus.

After being welcomed by the Rector, a Rosary recited by the Holy Father via satellite uplink from the Vatican that included participants connected from other sites in the world as well as those assembled in the Shrine began at 11:30 a.m. Confessions were heard at the conclusion of the Rosary throughout the Shrine until 2:00 p.m. when the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass would be concelebrated by our Supreme Chaplain, Bishop Thomas V. Daily.

Forty minutes prior to Mass, the Fourth Degree (who, incidentally, are celebrating 100 years of existence) began their procession into the Shrine. A veritable sea of reds, whites, greens, lavenders, golds and powder blues (some 1,000 of them) paraded outside on the Basilica grounds and on into the edifice to the cheers and applause of those who admired their appearance and dedication to the Order. (Two hundred of the Honor Guard Corps remained in the Basilica for the service). It was a memorable forty minutes to this observer and to those, I'm sure, who viewed them on EWTN who broadcasted the entire three and one half-hours of events that followed.

My wife and I were honored to have been among the gift bearers to Cardinal Hickey. Although I haven't seen the video yet, I'm told that she was very evident in her presence, but at my expense. Apparently, the camera angle caused her (as tiny as she is) to block me out.

The service itself was beautiful for all 10,000 – 11,000 that were fortunate enough to be present, whether inside or outside watching on a large screen. Following Mass, a rededication of the Order to the Blessed Mother took place with everyone present taking an active part in the recitation along with the Supreme Chaplain who presided. Thereafter, Father Gabriel O'Donnell, Postulator of the Cause for Father McGivney, gave us a thorough briefing on the status of the Cause.

Immediately following, His Eminence James Cardinal Hickey was presented with the Gaudium et Spes Award by the Supreme Knight and the Supreme Chaplain in a moving tribute to him and a moving response from him. It was now 4:30 p.m. and we had been in Church six and one-half hours, but it was such a wonderful, and certainly spiritual experience that we had no conception of time and no one seemed to care if it ever ended. The Rosary, the Fourth Degree procession, the Mass, the rededication ceremony, the choir, the brass ensemble and the timpani drums, the Guadium et Spes presentation – all are still very much with me and will be a part of me always.

If you were not present that day, I hope that these words will make you feel that you were, because, in essence, all Knights and their families were a part of that glorious day.

STATE CONVENTION TALK

For obvious reasons, a lot of people have politics on their minds these days. That makes this a good time to say a few words about the Knights of Columbus and politics.

The founders of our Order were very wise men. One indication of their wisdom was the decision to exclude partisan politics from the K of C.

Over the years, this prudent policy has played an important role in helping us preserve our harmony and our unity of vision, purpose, and action. It is an indispensable source of the Order's strength.

At the same time, the exclusion of partisan politics does not in the least imply that the Knights of Columbus is not interested in politics, broadly understood. In fact, just the opposite is true.

As an organization of Catholic citizens, concerned with both the spiritual and the temporal realms, the Knights of Columbus is deeply and appropriately interested in many public issues, with a strong political dimension, that have a bearing on both.

High up on the list today is the broad range of human life issues--abortion, assisted suicide, euthanasia, capital punishment, and others. As Pope John Paul frequently reminds us, concern for

human rights absolutely demands of us a practical commitment--lived out in deeds--to the dignity and sanctity of human life.

A second cluster of issues, closely related to life, are those that pertain to marriage and the family.

It is no secret that marriage and family life is widely threatened today in a number of different ways--no-fault divorce, coercive pressures to limit family size, discriminatory economic and tax policies including in some places a so-called "marriage penalty," and now even an aggressive campaign to bestow the hallowed status of marriage upon homosexual relationships.

In face of pressures like these, our Order--a Catholic family organization--is deeply committed to the view that strong marriages and strong traditional families not only correspond to God's plan but are the indispensable basis of stable, healthy nations and societies.

For this reason, defense of the family and support of laws and policies congenial to marriage and family life also stand high among our broadly 'political' priorities.

Closely related to marriage and family is the issue of education.

Here, too, the Knights of Columbus has for many years taken a clear, uncompromising stand.

For us, education first and foremost is an issue of parental rights. Parents are the primary educators of their children. They have both the duty and the right to make conscientious choices about the schooling of their offspring.

Thus we oppose any attempt to impose a government monopoly in education, whether by law or as a de facto result of economic pressure. Parents who choose religious schools for their children have a sacred right to make that choice and deserve the support of Church and state in carrying it out.

Here is the basis of our policy of support for educational vouchers and other practical means of implementing the parental right. This issue, too, has occupied an important place on our agenda for many years.

I could go on to speak of religious liberties, of defense of the rights of the Church, and of many other issues of a broadly political nature that matter greatly to us as Knights.

But the point should be obvious: Although this is not, and will not become, a politically partisan organization, we have serious, abiding, longterm political interests and concerns that reflect deeply held convictions about the right ordering of society.

Today, the secularist mentality would seek to exclude religion and religious values from public life and the public policy debate.

Operating from a false understanding of 'separation of church and state,' people who think this way seek to silence the religious voice in the public square.

This is something the Knights of Columbus will not and cannot accept.

We believe religion and morality have something important to say to politics. They serve as a kind of conscience--setting standards, identifying worthy goals, defining norms of conduct, and helping citizens evaluate parties and candidates without telling them how to vote.

Politics is not a value-free zone, a place where, morally speaking, 'anything goes.' Politics is the area of human endeavor in which conscientious citizens, applying moral principles and norms, seek consensus on how to realize the common good--and also on which of their fellow citizens shall be entrusted with public office to this end.

Partisan politics has no place in the Knights of Columbus.

Serious, committed concern for public issues and the common good'politics' broadly conceived, as I have been describing it--most
certainly does.

Both of these principles have guided our Order from the start.

Both will continue to guide it in the days and years to come.

RESOLUTION No. 9

A RESOLUTION TO ABOLISH THE DEATH PENALTY IN MISSISSIPPI

Whereas: Bishop Joseph A. Fiorenza, President of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops in the United States has called upon the Knights of Columbus for their help in ending the death penalty in the United States in an article published in the January 2000 issue of Columbia, the official magazine of the Knights of Columbus,

and

Whereas: In 1995, His Holiness Pope John Paul II issued his pro-life encyclical, *Evangelium Vitae (The Gospel of Life)*, in which he proclaimed that all human life is under the Church's "maternal care," and it is clear that ... the nature and extent of the punishment must be carefully evaluated and decided upon and ought not go to the extreme of executing the offender except in cases of absolute necessity: In other words when it would not be possible otherwise to defend society. Today however, as a result of steady improvements in the organization of the penal system, such cases are very rare if not practically nonexistent, and.... authority had a way that fulfills the purpose of defending public order and ensuring people's safety, while at the same time offering the offender an incentive and help to change his or her behavior and be rehabilitated."

and

Whereas: throughout the Gospels, Jesus teaches us again and again about a God who is merciful and kind and who wants us to live life in abundance and the consistent thread throughout the Gospels is that of love, not hate; justice, not vengeance and, Jesus Christ our Savior himself, the victim of the death penalty, did not condemn his executioners, but forgave them:

and

Whereas: there have been more than 627 executions in the United States since the Supreme Court allowed the use of the death penalty in 1976 and more than 16 individuals, who were juveniles when they committed their crimes, have been executed since 1976,

and

Whereas: since 1973, more than 80 people have been released from a death row with evidence of their innocence presented to the courts on their behalf and

current research now indicates that 23 cases of execution have been found since 1900 where innocent people were executed,

and

Whereas: there have been four executions, including two juveniles, in Mississippi and more than 62 individuals are currently on death rows in Mississippi and, the minimum age to receive the death penalty in Mississippi is 16 and there are currently four inmates on Death Row who were juveniles when they committed their crimes and, Mississippi does not forbid the execution of the mentally retarded and, Mississippi does provide for life without parole according to the Mississippi Code Ann. Section 97-3-21 amended in 1994 that allows a jury to consider the possibility of life without any chance of parole,

and

Whereas: Mississippi does not currently have a statewide system of public defenders to serve the legal appeals of death row inmates.

and

Whereas: recognizing that every life is a gift from God and that the dignity of human life must never be taken away even in the case of someone who has done great evil,

and

Whereas: modern society has the means of protecting itself, without definitively denying criminals the chance to reform including life without the possibility of any parole including the State of Mississippi,

Therefore Be It Resolved:

That the Knights of Columbus meeting in State Convention in April 2000 hereby support the Holy Fathers call for the abolishment of the Death Penalty and hereby support the call for help to the Knights of Columbus in ending the death penalty in the United States from Bishop Joseph A. Fiorenza, President of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops

and

Be it further Resolved

That the Knights of Columbus of Mississippi meeting in State Convention in April 2000 resolve that the death penalty be abolished in our state of Mississippi or, at the least, a moratorium on the death penalty be announced by the Governor of our state while a study is conducted as to the fairness and equality of imposition of the death penalty

and

Be it further resolved

that there be no more executions of juveniles in the State of Mississippi,

and

Be it further resolved

That the State Deputy of the Knights of Columbus and the State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus of the State of Mississippi forward this resolution after its adoption, to the Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court and every elected member of the state legislature no later than 90 days after its adoption by the members of the Knights of Columbus meeting in State Convention, April 2000 with a cover letter from them attesting to the passage of this resolution.

Now, Therefore Be it Resolved,

That each Insurance Policy or Annuity that is issued to a Brother Knight that is already an Insurance Member, that new policy or annuity shall be counted towards his Council's quota as a new Insurance member.

Assistance to these organizations may increase if a State Fund was established, similar to our Priest's Education Fund, to distribute moneys collected by councils for prolife activities and,

Such a fund would provide an excellent way for councils, Knights and others to donate memorial gifts in remembrance of deceased Knights, family members, relatives, and friends,

Now, Therefore Be it Resolved,

That the Mississippi State Council of the Knights of Columbus hereby establishes, without any costs to itself whatsoever, the Mississippi Memorial Prolife Fund, and

And be it Further Resolved,

That the State Deputy appoint or assign a State Chairman to promote and publicize donations to this fund each year by councils and Knights and that all donations received each year will be given to Bishop Howze and Bishop Houck at our annual state convention for use by prolife organizations selected by their respective Diocesan offices.

Recommendation: Refer to State Deputy

Action: Delegates Richard Cameron of Madison #9543 and Bob Jones, Ocean Springs 5654, called for a voice vote. The delegates voted unanimously to reject the recommendation and accept the resolution.
