Supreme Launches 'Food for Families' Initiative

With the number of Americans and Canadians at risk of hunger far higher than usual and the number of those planning to give to charity

lower than usual, the Knights of Columbus has committed \$1 million and legions of active volunteers to its "Food for Families" program to collect food and financially support food banks in the United States and Canada this winter.

In a letter to State Deputies, Supreme Knight Carl Anderson urges appointment of a Food for Families state program chair to promote and direct a food collection and delivery drive to restock local food banks. The goal is to have at least 25 percent of the active Councils in each Jurisdiction take part.

As an incentive, Jurisdictions that reach the 25 percent goal will receive a share of \$1 million that the Supreme Council has set aside to

restock food banks in their areas.

"This is an emergency situation, and the Supreme Officers have decided that the Knights of Columbus must step forward once again to take a leadership role in ad-

dressing the crisis," Supreme Knight Anderson wrote in his letter.

Food for Families is the third part of the Neighbors Helping Neighbors program which began last February in response to the economic crisis. It joins the Coats for Kids and Help a Child in Need programs.
