Communication is the Key




What makes a council successful? This question has been pondered by grand knights for as long as anyone can remember. I don't know that there is any one answer, but I firmly believe that communication is the key. I have seen projects fall apart when there is a breakdown in communication. Communication is nothing more than the sharing of information and it should be a two way street. The grand knight shares information (date, time, location, volunteers needed, etc.) about planned projects to the council members and the council members provide feedback (agree to help, alternative options, etc.) to the grand knight. This information can be shared

in various ways: council meetings, newsletters, church bulletins, emails, phone calls, council website, Facebook, Twitter, etc. Are you using all of your available resources to communicate effectively?

On the state level, we have several methods to help you promote your councils' activities and to find out about state sponsored projects. The state website, www.kofc-ms.org has tons of information that can assist your council with activities. Please visit this site often and check the calendar of events for upcoming degrees and other state sponsored events. You should also submit your planned events to the webmaster, Ben Mokry, for inclusion on the calendar.

Plan an Activity to Celebrate Respect Life Month

Each October in recent times the Catholic church celebrates Respect Life Month. Culture of Life activities should focus on increasing awareness of our Church's teaching on various life issues which respect the dignity of life from conception to natural death. To aid your council, assembly and ladies auxiliary in sponsoring such a program, our Supreme Council mails each Financial Secretary a Respect Life folder published by the US Conference of Catholic Bishops. The letter inside of it instructs the Financial Secretary to give this folder to his Grand Knight. Your Financial Secretary should receive this folder shortly. For parishes in the Diocese of Jackson the Office of Parish Ministries of Catholic Charities mails each pastor this Respect Life folder. This is a wonderful folder that makes planning a prolife activity simple. All the resources are either in the folder or listed for ordering.

This year's folder contains a Prolife Publications and Resources catalog which is a valuable source of information you can order throughout the year. I urge you to have your pastor, council culture of life chairman, Grand Knight, and youth minister review this catalog to choose something to order for use in your parish.

Suggested Simple Activities

Have a Pro-life Mass. Respect Life Sunday is October 6 and the liturgy guide in the folder provides pro-life readings for this masses on this day, along with intercessions for life. Since it also contains homily tips, more intercessions for life for A Day of Prayer and Penance for Life on January 22, 2014 and Pro-life Rosary Prayer Intentions, and Prayers for a Novena beginning on January 19, 2014 - the 41st Anniversary of Roe v. Wade, it also is a valuable resource you can use for these activities.

Display a Pro-life Poster. Besides asking your pastor to do a special culture of life Mass using the readings and prayer intentions in the folder, you could display the poster in the folder on a church bulletin board or in a display case.

Programs An Easier Path to Star Council Status

Two important changes in the current requirements for Star Council initiated this year make it easier to attain that level of recognition from Supreme.

Star Council recognizes achievement in membership, insurance and service program activities. A council must qualify for the Father McGivney, Founder's and Columbian awards to achieve Star Council recognition.

The State's Star Council quota this year is 13. Eleven councils were recognized as Star

Council's last year. Double Star and even Triple Star designations come with increased programming.

The changes for this year are that councils need only a seven percent growth in membership with a minimum of four; and councils are no longer required to host a minimum of four First Degree ceremonies.

Councils must conduct and report at least four major programs in each of



the Service Program categories. Each category has at least one featured program, meaning that a council can fulfill all requirements of that category by meeting the requirements of one featured activity.

October's Calendar

Respect Life Month, with Oct. 6 designated as Respect Life Sunday. The day is also Life Chain Sunday, with groups throughout the nation visible from 2:30 to 4 p.m. in prayer while holding signs with Culture of Life messages. It's the month to begin checking off the Culture of Life events your Council promotes.

The first week of the month is designated as a time for Council's to conduct a charitable service activity in honor of Pope Francis. The first of two Order-wide Church Drives is Oct. 12-13, and Oct. 21-27 is Order-wide First Degree Week.

Looking ahead? It's planning time for Coats for Kids, Food for Families, March for Life, Light Up for Christ and Christmas card sales. Fall is a good time for the Soccer Challenge and the Free Throw Competition.

All of these activities are opportunities for recruitment. Invite prospects to participate. Let them see how instrumental your council is in the life of the parish.

Think One Member, Per Council, Per Month . . . and that programming is a key factor in attaining the Star Council Award.

Honor Guard Protocol

The question of an Honor Guard at Visitation and Funeral Mass for Brother Knights has been posed and this is to answer what is proper.

The Color Corps Drill Manual most recently approved by the Board of Directors states "... honors by the Honor Guard shall be offered to deceased Sir Knights of the Fourth Degree in good standing on all counts at the time of death." And "...to the immediate family of a Sir Knight in good standing and Third Degree members in good standing and to their immediate family members provided a request is made."

The District Master and the State Deputy reserve the right to grant exceptions to this rule. The State Deputy and District Master are in agreement that all Knights of any degree will have the honors of an Honor Guard granted to them, therefore, there is no need to ask for an exception in these cases.

The term immediate family will be described as spouse, children, parents, brothers and sisters. Remember, the Honor Guard is present to serve the living as the death of a loved one is grieved. It is also to recognize and celebrate the life of the deceased.

If an Honor Guard is requested for any situation other than described above please contact the District Master or State Deputy for an exception.

The request for an Honor Guard should be forwarded to the Faithful Navigator of the Assembly or to the District Marshal. The details of the Honor Guard will then be made to the Sir Knights with regalia for them to serve.

Hopefully this answers any questions, however, if there are any please feel free to contact the District Master or State Deputy.
