Happy New Year- The End Is Near





West Biloxi Council Distributes Funds Collected for Those With Special Needs

Reinhart Schroeder Council #9409 of the Knights of Columbus recently presented three checks in the amount of \$800.00 each to representatives of Cheshire Parents Association, the Arc of the Gulf Coast and Biloxi Community Homes. These funds have been raised through the participation of its member volunteers and members of the Biloxi Community Homes collecting donations during its canister drives held at Winn-Dixie and out side of Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Church.

The canister drives that were held were jointly done with some of the family members of the council and residents of Biloxi Community Homes with the benefits going to the three community organizations. The organizations that received the benefits are all non-profit organizations that support people that are intellectually and developmentally disabled.

The Cheshire Parents Association is a group of parents that have children that live in the Cheshire Home and apartments. The Arc is an organization that supports these special needs people by finding others who can help train them. The Biloxi Community Homes is a living community for these special needs people.

All three of these organizations believe that *all* people have worth and purpose. It is for this reason that the Reinhart Schroeder Council has selected these three community groups to receive the funds.

King Cake and Catholicism



The current King Cake is believed to have originated in France around the 12th century. However, the original custom could have had its start in the Roman Empire from the pagan festival of Saturnalia. This celebration was thought to praise the god of Saturn as he brought the world from the bleakness of winter into the fertility of spring. It is believed that the Catholic Church used the Feast of the Epiphany to draw pagans away from the god of Saturn into the arms of Christ

It was these early Europeans celebrating the coming of the three wise men bearing gifts twelve days after Christmas calling it the Feast of the Epiphany (Greek for "the showing"), Twelfth Night, or King's Day. It was St. Augustine who is credited with first bestowing the title of Kings to the three Magi; a name that quickly stuck. At a time when Kings and Queens were held in high esteem, the poor people of the time could relate well to the image of three mighty Kings doing homage to a poor child destined to rule Heaven and Earth. The festivities begin January 6th, Kings Day, and ends on Fat Tuesday (Mardi Gras in French), which is the day before Ash Wednesday, the start of the 40 day Lenten season. It is during Lent that the Christian people sacrifice comforts and indulgences to prepare themselves, spiritually, for the resurrected Lord of Easter Sunday.

The main part of today's Mardi Gras celebrations, beginning January 6 going through midnight of Mardi Gras, is of course the parades; elaborate street parties that last hours at a time. On a more intimate and personal level, is the sharing of King Cakes through weekly or monthly parties to honor the three Kings finding of our Savior. The cakes are made in a circular form to portray the circular route used by the kings to find the Christ Child and return to

their home land. In Matthew's Gospel, it is said this route was taken to avoid King Herod who feared the new King of the Jewish people and was secretly plotting to kill the Christ Child. The circular pattern also represents that God, in the body of Jesus, lived as man, died and rose from the dead, never to die again. He is eternal in nature thus the never ending circle of the cake.

In the earliest King Cakes, a bean, pea or coin was hidden inside the cake. The person who got the hidden piece was declared King for the day or was said to have good luck in the coming year. Soon after this tradition was firmly established the ceramic baby doll or a small crown began to be used as a symbol of the baby Jesus. Like the three Kings who found the original baby, offering Him gifts, the person who finds the doll or crown is expected to provide the next cake as a gift to all their friends. The deeper meaning from the Catholic faith's perspective is that by finding the baby Jesus, you are reminded that you too found Jesus in your personal life; always being a presence in your life and a part of your family and friends. As Jesus gave freely to all, we are expected to give freely of ourselves; carrying on the carnival festivities by providing the next King Cake for the group to enjoy.

The King Cakes are usually formed as braided dough to represent the whips that will be used in Christ's suffering. Though He was God, as man, He endured much suffering for us. We are asked to remember the price that He paid even as we celebrate with fun and festivities of this carnival season because we know Good Friday is also approaching. Even the frosting used in the decoration of the cake has meaning to our faith. The traditional Mardi Gras colors are used; gold (for power), green (for faith) and purple (for justice).
