## From Our State Deputy



As we begin November, I want you to think about how we can grow our councils from within. By that I mean, strengthen our "muscles and bones". Take a look at how your meetings are run, how you keep the parish and your members informed about your activities, how you interact with one another, and how you "evangelize" your Catholic faith... by your example.

Rather than tell you how to do all these things, I want you to talk about it among your council. Have a relaxed gathering and invite all interested members, especially your past grand knights, your chaplain and at least 3 first degree members. Have food and take notes. There are several really good videos on the Supreme website. None are very long. One of my favorites is the story of Fr. McGivney. Oct 31 - Nov 2, all state deputies convened in Baltimore, MD to share ideas, discuss common problems and be updated by the Supreme officers

and staff. We were invited to hold it in Baltimore by our Supreme Chaplain, Archbishop William Lori so we could participate in the 225th anniversary of the Archdiocese of Baltimore. Our opening mass was held in the Cathedral of the Assumption, now a Basilica. The cornerstone for the Cathedral was laid in 1806 by Bishop John Carroll and consecrated in 1821. It is considered the mother church of America. The funeral mass for Charles Carroll, only Catholic signer of the Declaration of Independence, was held there. Fr. McGivney was ordained there. For me, it set the tone for our meeting. Supreme Knight Carl Anderson eloquently defined our status and goals.

We'll do the same thing on December 6, when all of our District Deputies gather in the Jackson area to share their ideas and discuss common problems within their jurisdictions or district. It is important work they do and for that reason, it is a special leader who accepts that challenging job.

To insure this is a successful meeting, just as Supreme does, we will have various program and membership chairmen talk about their focus and how it helps the councils as well as their parish/community. It's a state meeting but our District Deputies are the Stars.

about Star Councils and how we
are stepping up to the next level
in assisting you to achieve this
prestigious accomplishment. On
November I, former District
Deputy Bill Heath became

Mississippi's first Star Council Director. His primary job is to work with councils and districts in tracking your progress toward Star Council. Bill has been working with the Star Council leadership team in Texas getting Mississippi ready to go on this initiative. You'll hear more about this as we present the Star Awards to councils this month.

Earlier in the year, I said of our 61 active Councils we have over 50 who can attain Star. II others have shrinking parish sizes. Some of these may qualify next year, based on eligible candidates.

Roundtables can be a factor for all of you but it will require action and faith. The key man on your council's star team is your Chaplain. He will tell you one of the best recruiting tools is seeing Knights regularly attending mass. Wear your name tags or KC pins. Simple things have big results.

My goal is 42 Star Councils. Your goal is 1.

As a closing reminder, when a Second Degree is scheduled, make every opportunity to personally invite every I<sup>st</sup> degree member you believe is ready to advance and learn the lesson of Unity.

This will be Mississippi's opportunity to lead the Order by our example. We will do this together.

# Catholics Take Pro-Life Campaign To The Streets

As October is Respect Life Month, Sunday October 5th was Respect Life Sunday. Knights and their families from Biloxi to Southaven joined priests, religious, and other concerned Catholics to show their communities what we believe and to ask others to join them to join in the fight for the rights of all from conception to natural death.





### Oxford Council 10901 Hosts Respect Life Fundraiser

Knights of Columbus Council 10901 and parishioners of St. John the Evangelist, Oxford, celebrated Respect for Life Month by hosting a fundraiser to benefit the Pregnancy Test Center in Oxford on Sunday, October 5th.

Barbeque chicken, cole slaw and baked beans were on the menu as some 150 St. John parishioners made free-will donations to enjoy fellowship and help Sav-A-Life of Lafayette County to continue their work with new mothers.

The Pregnancy Test Center is the operational organization of Sav-A-Life of Lafayette County, a non-

denominational, non-profit Christ-centered ministry. Sav-A-Life receives no government or United Way funding, but depends on donations from churches, organizations, businesses and individuals.

Women receive free pregnancy testing services and ultrasounds to confirm pregnancy. Many who get these services are young women, teenagers and single mothers who may have unsure futures with new or additional children and may be considering options, including abortion. Volunteers and paid staff (only 3 paid staff) provide counseling and alternatives to abortions.

including marriage, parenting, adoption and other options depending on individual circumstances. Clients receive points for attending a variety of classes and can trade those points for baby clothes and equipment necessary for new child care. Post-birth counseling helps mothers make the transition to their new lives. If a mother previously had an abortion, post-abortion consultations are available.


The most important choices, however, are for mothers who choose life instead of abortion. So far this year, 21 of the Pregnancy Testing Center's clients have chosen life instead of abortion. These young lives will not be counted in the 1.2 million abortions carried out in the United States this year.

#### Oxford Council 10901 Supports Sav-A-Life

About 15 Knights of Columbus Council 10901 members and wives attended the annual Sav-A-Life of Lafavette County Banquet September 29th. The Council sponsored a table and purchased 8 tickets for Council members and parishioners.

Sav-A-Life is a non-denominational, nonprofit, Christ-centered ministry which depends on donations of churches, organizations, businesses and individuals. Sav-A-Life receives no marriage, parenting, adoption and Federal or United Way funds. Women receive free pregnancy testing services and ultrasounds to confirm pregnancy and other services for new

mothers. The Pregnancy Test Center is the operational organization for Sav-A-Life of Lafavette County that conducts the testing and provides counseling to women of all ages who may be facing uncertain futures with new or additional children or considering options including abortion.

Volunteers and paid staff (only 3 paid staff) provide counseling and alternatives to abortion, including other actions depending on individual circumstances. Clients receive points for attending a variety of classes and can trade those points for baby clothes

and equipment necessary for new child care. Post-birth counseling is offered to help mothers make the transition to their new lives. If a mother previously had an abortion, post-abortion consultation is available.

The most important choices for at-risk mothers, however, are for the mothers who choose life instead of abortion. 21 at-risk clients so far this year have chosen life instead of abortion. These young lives will not be counted among the 1.2 million babies that will be aborted in the United States this year.

#### Fourth Degree Convenes, Installs Officers







On Saturday, Oct 18th, at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, D'Iberville MS, members of the Knights of Columbus, 4th degree, representing the Bienville Province (LA, MS, AR, TN and AL), convened a day of training for state and district deputies, and Masters of the 4th, and culminating in the installation of Masters of the 4th for the Bienville Province.

It was a day utilized for training and up-dating policies and procedures on current administrative processes, and the timely coordination in reporting of objectives and expectations for each master of the 4<sup>th</sup> jurisdictions," stated Vice Supreme Master of the 4<sup>th</sup>, Russell Ruh.

"The key to the success for all 4th degree assemblies is to have masters of the 4th attuned to recruiting new members through each assembly; to support the efforts of the state council and to set effective exemplification dates with honorees. These are but a few ways his jurisdiction of assemblies can all share in their combined success."

Information supporting the John MCDevitt and Pro Deo & Pro Patria scholarship programs of the 4<sup>th</sup> Degree; how to use the Honor Guard/Color Corps Drill Manual, and use of the Regalia and dress policies were presented along with support for priestly vocations, a Memorandum from Dennis Stoddard, Supreme Master, was circulated and discussed during the meeting.

It was stressed that all 4th Degree assemblies actively support priestly vocations for the military. The Knights of Columbus has established the military chaplain scholarship fund, reserved exclusively for seminarians who will, once ordained, serve both their home diocese and the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, as a uniformed chaplain. Through the Knights of Columbus Charities, Military Chaplain Scholarship Program, the military archdiocese contracts with each participating diocese to fund 50 percent of the cost of a seminarians five-year educationtypically \$12,500 per year. To date, the goal of \$1,000,000.00 pledged needs \$129,000.00 to meet that goal.

- Double Best Project Submittals
- Triple Councils Submitting Best Projects
