New Hope Village (NHV) located in Holly Springs, MS is a safe haven for those in transition after losing their homes, due to a variety of circumstances. Families are allowed to live in the housing while they get back on their feet. NHV was spared the devastation left by the tornado that affected so many lives on December 23rd. Over two hundred homes were destroyed in the area forcing people to search tirelessly for places to stay. New Hope Village is just such a place. However, largely due to a lack of funding several of the cottages at NHV have become in disrepair. These cottages need to be completely renovated to accommodate families in need and we need your help.

The Knights of Columbus and the Queen of Peace Men's Club are proud to be active sponsors of New Hope Village. We have committed to demo the interior of two cottages and completely renovate them within 30 days. The cottages have water damage & mold issues from leaks, drafty & rotten windows & doors, broken & warped cabinets & countertops, worn out fixtures & furniture with damaged walls. These cottages are basically uninhabitable. As you can see in the photo's we have spent to last two weekends working on the cottages demoing the interior and weatherproofing the exterior.

# Grenada St. Peter Rosary Walk

On October 7, feast day of Our Lady of Holy Rosary, 2015 was the celebration of the completion & dedication of the rosary walk at St Peter's Catholic Church in Grenada, MS.

The groundbreaking started just 3 weeks before by KOC members & parishioners of all ages meeting with shovels and garden tools to begin the process of digging holes where the stones would be laid in the ground to form a rosary.

The idea came from someone just talking about a rosary walk from other locations. Our parish had recently knocked down an older building therefore the lot was empty. "I knew there was a reason God wanted me to get the bricks when the old cab was knocked down. I just didn't know why until someone mentioned the rosary walk. That was the first item that came to mind of materials", said Christy Strong. The bricks were used as the decades of the rosary. To differentiate the decades, concrete was colored & poured into the middle of the four bricks that formed a square. The mysteries are made from a concrete mold of a rose then was painted & sealed. The rosary walk begins with a concrete cross shaped & the profile of Jesus in the center for the apostles creed.

The church came together to finish the design with several others giving ideas of how to complete the look of the rosary walk. A statue of the Blessed Mother was added to the middle. She sits in a broken bird bath with flowers planted at her base & the bird bath sits on a wrought iron stand. KOC Walter Lim designed landscaping timbers to form layers that are filled with pea gravel underneath the stand for the Blessed Mother.

KOC member, Billy Griffin built an arbor for the entrance & also donated a concrete bench for persons wanting a place to sit during meditation.

Solar lights were hung on a surrounding fence & building to give light at night. Also, the Blessed Mother has her own solar spotlight.

The rosary walk has been used several times by the CCD to say the rosary at the rosary walk. Children & youth take turns by standing on the stone & reciting the prayer that their stone represents. During the afternoon meetings, candles are placed on each stone and lit after the prayer is said for the particular stone.

In the future for Lent & when weather is warmer, we are looking forward to reciting the Divine Mercy Chaplet using the rosary walk to go with our year of mercy.

This project was a work of unity and a labor of love of our parish during the absence of a priest since the death of our former pastor, Fr. Ruane.

### **Blue Mass And Special Olympics**

The National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund says that we lose an average of one officer every 60 hours to a Line of Duty Death (LODD). The first known LODD happened in 1791, with more than 20,000 officers lost since in the U.S. In 2015 we lost 124 law enforcement officers in the U.S. (42 by firearms) with five of them being from Mississippi.

Every day they button up their uniform shirt they know it could be for the last time. They do it knowing we cannot live without them. There is no better way to recognize their service and sacrifice than by hosting a "Blue Mass". In doing so you show them how much you appreciate them and give the kind of exposure money can't buy for your Council.

This is one of my favorite programs of the year. Consider that most of these individuals are Protestant and this will give them a different view of our Church/Order than they have had before. We also feed them after Mass in our Parish Hall which gives us a chance to spend time with them. While they are eating we give out door prizes we collected from businesses around the area. We also give out awards we call "Community Spirit Awards" to a member of each department for service on and off the job.

The U.S. Fire Administration lists 91 Firefighter LODD in 2014. Fifty-six of them were from Volunteer Departments so don't forget them. A large number of these deaths are from heart attacks due to stress and over exertion.

Do your part to show the love for these Heroes. Plan your Blue Mass today! I'd be glad to help.

## **Our Spiritual Worship**

(In the coming months the seminarians studying for the two Dioceses of Mississippi will be sharing their reflections as they continue on the road to priesthood.)

Aaron Williams is a native of Jackson and attended St. Joseph High School in Madison. He is a 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree member of Council 848 in Jackson and is currently in his second year of Theology studies for the Diocese of Jackson. He studies at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans.

For the past two years, I have had the privilege of attending the summer session of the Liturgical Institute in Mundelein, IL in order to pursue a Masters of Arts in Liturgy (MAL) following the summer of 2018—the same year, God-willing, I will be ordained a priest for the Diocese of Jackson. To be able to study the sacred liturgy along-side my normal coursework in seminary has afforded me the great opportunity to see how the ancient and beautiful rites of the Church flow from and embody the teachings, spirituality, and history of the Church. Often I find myself saying, "If people only knew this thing or that, it would certainly change how they approach the Mass." Therefore, I was immediately delighted, when I was approached to write this article, about the possibility of sharing some of these thoughts with my brother knights. Albeit, I am only able to share a few thoughts, thus I have chosen to write about two rites which are often not understood yet are full of meaning: the sprinkling with holy water, and the offertory.

At some Masses, especially during the Easter season, the priest begins the liturgy by passing through the church and sprinkling the faithful with holy water. It is a practice which, regrettably, has fallen into disuse in most parishes, but is a serious rite and one that I would strongly encourage priests to make use of from time to time, especially at key moments of the liturgical year.

The rite has two meanings. The first is that recalls our baptism, just as we each recall our Baptism by taking holy water at the door of the church when we come to Mass. However, in the sprinkling rite, the whole congregation is sprinkled together not individually. In Baptism we are not simply incorporated into a personal relationship with Christ, but are brought into the communal body of the Church as a member of the Mystical Body of Christ. It is fitting, therefore, that we are sprinkled together from time to time, and not limit this symbol to personal use.

Likewise, the rite symbolizes Christ's cleansing of our souls from sin. In the Old Covenant, the Jewish priests were instructed to take a branch of hyssop and sprinkle the people and the altar of sacrifice with the blood of sacrificed animals for the forgiveness of sins. Christ, however, gives us living water to cleanse our soul. Thus, when we are sprinkled with holy water, we can say with the psalmist, "You will sprinkle me with hyssop and I shall be cleansed; you will wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow" (Psalm 51:7).

The Offertory is a significant point of the Mass for the lay faithful because it is rich in symbolism of their daily lives, which can be helpful for prayer. The reforms brought by the Second Vatican Council restored the practice wherein the members of the faithful present the offerings of bread, wine, and water to the priest to be offered to the Lord in the Eucharist. These items are significant and deserve our consideration. Bread symbolizes the toil we put into our daily work. Those long hours of work during the week are worthy of offering to the Lord. Thus, the bread (and, indeed our monetary offerings) remind us that the work we do in order to support ourselves and our family is pleasing to the Lord and we should offer it entirely to him.

Wine has historically been seen as a symbol of divinity. It takes time and patience to make wine and, once it is fermented, there is a precious nature about it. It is fitting that Our Lord chose wine as the sign of his Blood because of this double meaning of divinity and value. In Rome, it is tradition to use golden-hued wines for communion to further this symbolism of Christ's Blood being both divine and precious, though there are certainly other meanings which can be applied to red wines. The wine brought forth at Mass is thus a symbol of those good things, especially our prayers, which we have to offer to the Lord, so that it may be perfected in him.

Finally, water is an earthy element. Bread and wine require labor to produce a finished product, but water is unaltered. In this way, water is a symbol of our humanity and with it all our sins and failings. Yes, our sins must also be offered to the Lord. Incidentally, when the water is poured into the chalice by the priest or deacon, it completely dissipates into the wine, just as Christ's blood totally washes away our sins.

Thus, all three of these elements, both the physical elements we offer, and the spiritual offerings we call to mind, are offered to the Lord in the Eucharist and transformed, at the word of the priest and by the power of the Holy Spirit, into the actual Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Just as God took on human flesh to redeem us in his Son, so too does he take our offerings and joins them to his sacrifice on the cross. And, what is the result? We receive back from the Lord something that has been transformed—made entirely new: the Body of his glorified Son for our own food. It is for this reason that I often find it fitting for the choir alone to take up some piece of music which aids in our own meditation as we consider carefully what we have to offer to the Lord during the offertory of the Mass.

There is so much more I want write, but I hope these two points will suffice for your consideration now. May the Lord richly bless all the knights in their great ministry to the Church. Vivat Jesus!

# Persecution Of Christians In The Middle East

Christians in the Middle East continue to suffer, and in order to help them further, we need to do our part in convincing the U.S. Government to officially designate their persecution as genocide. Already many of our brother Knights have helped us give generously to humanitarian relief for those affected, with more than \$8 million dollars raised. These funds have provided assistance in the form of food, clothing, shelter, general relief, education, religious instruction, medical care and much more.

**Pope Francis has called what is happening to Christians in the Middle East "genocide."** The European Parliament has done the same, as have prominent voices such as the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom, and Genocide Watch. This is not a partisan issue. Presidential candidates and elected leaders of both American political parties have said Middle Eastern Christians are facing genocide. But despite the evidence that these individuals and institutions have found compelling, the U.S. State Department has still not made such a designation. Experts indicate such a designation could help those who are suffering so much by opening up for them certain legal protections and options that might otherwise be unavailable.
